### Kristin did it!

NEW YORK (AP) — J.R. Ewing was shot by Kristin Shepard, his wife's sister and his former mistress, CBS revealed Friday night in a long-awaited episode of "Dallas" in which viewers also learned she is apparently pregnant with his child.

The show that answered the question "Who shot J.R." capped a phenomenal publicity campaign, and CBS hoped the installment would become the all-time ratings champion for an episode of a regular series.

But for all those hooked on the prime-time soap opera, the nailbiting did not end with Friday night's disclosure.

Viewers learned that it was Kristin who fired two bullets into the conniving oil baron in the darkened corridor of his downtown offices.

But Lorimar Productions, which packages the series, forced viewers to wait until the Nov. 28 installment to learn her motive as well as what happens to her next.



# Reagan returns to California to begin building his Cabinet

TINKER AIR FORCE BASE, Okla. (AP) — President-elect Ronald Reagan, flying home to California to begin selecting his Cabinet, said Friday his five-day stay in Washington was "very heartwarming," and that he was surprised to find that his efforts to meet the city's power brokers were considered appared.

chatting with reporters aboard his Air Force plane before a refueling stop at Tinker Air Force Base near Oklahoma City, Reagan said he will meet Saturday with a group of advisers who have compiled a list of persons to be considered for Cabinet appointments. He said he has not seen the list yet and is keeping an open mind.

mind.
Standing in the aisle of the military jetliner in his shirtsleeves, Reagan described his Washington visit as "not only most enjoyable, but it was very heartwarming — the reception and all. I feel it was very fruitful, the relationships that were started, that were established on the Hill and so

forth

"In fact, I was kind of surprised to find out...how many things I'd done were considered unusual. I would have thought they were a natural thing." Reagan also said he was "caught by surprise, and I must say very moved, by the friendliness and warmth of just the people of Washington that I saw."

ton that I saw."

During five days in Washington, the president-elect had traveled to Capitol Hill to meet congressional leaders, talked with eight of the justices of the Supreme Court, played host at a dinner for some of the city's leading citizens and held discussions at the White House with President Carter.

The president-elect came from his forward cabin to tell reporters about the disastrous fire raging at the MGM Hotel in Las Vegas and remained to talk. "You just can't imagine that a hotel that modern — this could happen to," he said, adding that he has been to the hotel.

The president-elect said he and his wife Nancy would hold a family Thanksgiving at their ranch near Santa Barbara. Asked what he was

thankful for, he replied:

"Oh, boy. More than just an election. I'm a very lucky fellow. Life has seemed to me, every year that went by, to get better."

Reagan reiterated that he hoped to have his Cabinet named by the end of the month, "or certainly the earliest in December."

Asked whether there would be surprises, he replied: "Oh, maybe some, I don't know. I really don't." He said his advisers planned to give him "several names for every position."

But so far, he said, he has "tried to keep from getting any convictions of my own until we hear what they've had to say, because I am quite sure they'll be presenting names of people that I don't even know."

There was speculation that at least some of the Cabinet members would be selected next week. California Supreme Court Justice William Clark was considered a potential nominee for attorney general as was Reagan's personal lawyer, William French Smith. Former Treasury Secretary William Simon also was said to be poised to resume his old job.

# Death count 'could hit 100' in hotel fire

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — A kitchen fire sent suffocating smoke billowing through all 26 floors of the MGM Grand hotel-casino Friday, and authorities said at least 85 people were killed and 534 injured. Officials said a fire alarm amplifier was knocked out and only three floors of the luxury hotel had sprinkler systems.

while the death toll officially stood at 85 at 8 p.m. PST, it could "possibly" go as high as 100, said Fire Capt. Ralph Dinsman. "I know it's going to go higher," he said. The official toll was being released by the coroner's

Dr. Sheldon Green, chief medical examiner of Clark County, said no names of victims would be released until Saturday morning. "The identification process is too slow. We've got to go through wallets and other personal effects." he said

sonal effects," he said.

Clark County Coroner Otto Ravenholt said most of the victims died of smoke inhalation on upper floors, far above the reach of the fire department's nine-story rescue ladders,

Fire Capt. Wayne Littlefield said one elderly couple jumped to their deaths from the 17th floor, "holding hands." And he said another man used bedding and towels to descend from the upper floors to the 10th floor, where he also fell to his death.

Officials estimated as many as 8,000 people, including 4,500 to 5,000 guests and an undetermined number of hotel employees, were in the hotel when the fire broke out at 7:15 a.m.

Of those injured, local hospitals admitted 195 for treatment. Five of the 534 were firefighters who were injured slightly, hospital officials said.

It was the worst fire in Las Vegas and the second worst hotel fire in U.S. history, exceeded only by a Dec. 7, 1946, fire at the Winecoff Hotel in Atlanta that killed 119.

"It's a sickening sight in there," Gov. Robert List said after touring the burned-out area. "It's just burned-out devastation. It turns your stomach."

Dinsman said the fire apparently started in an exhaust fan in kitchen of a ground-floor delicatessen near the casino. He said flames spread quickly to the casino and up through the "eye in the sky" — a open catwalk above the floor used to monitor gambling.

Dinsman said investigators were

interviewing kitchen employees to determine exactly how the fire start-

Dinsman said security guards returned to the hotel after the fire was extinguished and hauled out burned chips and pieces of burned money. Casino sources said as much as \$200,000 in cash may have been burned up. Gamblers were said to have left piles of money on the tables as they fled the flames.

Clark County Fire Chief Roy Parrish said, 'We were told a wall of fire fell down in the casino.''

fell down in the casino."

He ruled out arson as the cause of fire.

Some survivors said no alarm sounded to warn guests of the danger. Parrish said the fire apparently destroyed the amplifiers on a manually activated alarm system. He had earlier said apparently "no one had pulled it."

"The amplifiers for the fire alarm were in the basement of the hotel," Parrish said. "Our theory is that the fire consumed the amplifiers before

Within 10 minutes it had gutted the 140-yard-long casino, where about 10 charred bodies were found. Most of the others died of smoke inhalation above the 20th floor, Parrish said.

Dinsman said the flames were controlled after two hours and apparently were confined to the lower two floors of the pale-pink granite hotel, one of the world's largest with 2,076

Some guests on upper floors who couldn't get outside fled to the roof, where helicopters evacuated them. Others trapped in their rooms by dense smoke got fresh air by using furniture to break sealed windows or crammed onto balconies screaming

Police helicopters circled overhead, and officers shouted over builhorns, "Don't jump! don't jump!" to panicked guests who leaned out of windows, dangling ropes made of bedsheets.

Guests who could fled out the doors and wandered on the 43-acre grounds, many barefoot and in smoke-blackened nightclothes, weeping and dazed. Others were carried out by firefighters and construction workers using the two-handed fireman's carry. Paramedics and doctors, some in hospital scrub clothes, worked feverishly over a number of victims who were sprawled in the middle of the four-lane street.

### Appropriations bill OK'd despite busing amendment

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House gave overwhelming final approval Friday to an appropriation bill that includes an amendment prohibiting government lawyers from seeking court-ordered busing plans in school desegregation cases.

desegregation cases.

Despite Carter administration complaints that the amendment would cripple federal efforts to end segregation in public schools, the House approved the measure on a 240-59 vote and sent it to the Senate.

The anti-busing amendment was attached to a \$9.1 billion appropriation bill containing money for the Justice Department and for programs in a variety of other agencies, including the Commerce and State departments.

The measure was expected to face little serious opposition in the Senate, which added its version of the antibusing amendment after the appropriations bill had been sent to the floor without it. There was no indication when the bill would be considered by the Senate, which adjourned Friday without taking up the measure.

The House vote came one day after a House-Senate conference committee agreed on final language for the measure, which had been approved in similar form in both the House and

Final Senate approval of the bill and the anti-busing amendment would send the legislation to the White House where it faces an uncertain future.

Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti told lawmakers earlier this week he would urge President Carter to veto the measure because of the anti-busing amendment, which he said raised serious constitutional questions and would seriously undermine school desegregation efforts.

The amendment would prohibit the Justice Department from using any of the money appropriated in the bill "to bring any sort of action to require directly or indirectly the transportation of any student to a school other than the school which is nearest the student's home, except for a student requiring special education as a result of being mentally or physically handicapped."

white House officials said earlier in the week that Carter would not make a decision on vetoing the measure until it reaches his desk. President-elect Ronald Reagan told reporters at the Capitol on Tuesday that he believes busing to achieve racial balance has been a failure, is opposed by most Americans and that he supports the amendment.

### On TSTA and the 'I can'

BIG SPRING — "If it is to be, it's up to me," drawled Mamie McCullough, keynote speaker at Friday's Texas State Teachers Association professional development seminar here.

The noted associate of Zig Ziglar and former high school principal from Georgia informed more than 250 area and Midland teachers of their potential success in the teaching profession and their lives during the morning TSTA session.

The south-of-the-Mason-Dixon-Line native recalled her youthful experiences as the tall, skinny, ugly duckling in her family while living in Dixie, Ga.

It wasn't until after Ms. McCullough attended Howard Payne College in Brownwood and received her teaching certificate that she began to better her self image.

"There is no such thing as 'I can't,' "Ms. McCullough said in her southern accent.
"No one can tell me what the shape, color or odor of an 'I can't' is."

Picking up a tin can, she suggested that if everyone put an "I" on the can, thus producing an "I can," most people can start living a fuller and more meaningful

Recalling the time when her daughter told her she can't do her homework, the former principal noted that when people say "I can't," it usually means "I won't" or "I don't understand."

"In my house, whenever one of my children says 'I can't,' I usually reply 'Let me help you' or 'Let me spank you.'"

One of the big changes she noted in her life came when she read Ziglar's book, "See You at the Top."

"You can be anything you want to be, if you put your mind to it," Ms. McCullough stated. Noting the aerodynamic design of the bumblebee, she

stated that by most laws of aerodynamics the bumblebee was not designed for flight.

"Yet, the humblebee doesn't know that and he

"Yet, the bumblebee doesn't know that and he continues to fly."

One must have a positive attitude despite the fact people live in a negative world, she said. And to achieve

a positive attitude one must change the way one thinks.

She warned the audience to be careful what is planted in their minds because "what you plant comes up."

One serious suggestion the Georgia principal emphasized is that teachers and administrators have to establish quality time to be with their families and to be considerate with their mates.

McCullough's recipe for "bullfrog boiling" illustrat-

ed what often happens in many divorces.

"First, you got to catch a bullfrog," she started,
"And instead of slapping him in a pot of boiling water,


"And instead of slapping him in a pot of boiling water, what I do is put him in a glass pot of nice clear water.

"Allow the frog to sleep and float above the water

while slowly turning up the heat until he wakes up dead."
So many of today's divorces are like boiling a bullfrog, Ms. McCullough continued.



### Iraqi attack seems to have failed

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — A major Iraqi attack to capture the key Iranian town of Susangerd appeared to have fizzled Friday after seven days of some of the fiercest fighting of the two-month-old war.

Iran claimed it forced Iraqis to retreat from positions farther north on the 300-mile-long warfront as the two nations battled for control of the heights that command the main highway routes to Baghdad, the Iraqi capital.

Baghdad and Tehran claimed a total of 195 troops killed in overnight and Friday fighting along the battle front. Iran has claimed 1,700 Iraqi deaths in its week-long counter-attacks, Iraq has claimed killing 1,071

Military observers in Baghdad believe Iraq launched its attack on Susangerd before the heavy winter rains make the use of armor difficult in the semi-desert and marshy terrain of the

Susangerd, 22 miles inside Iran, controls the strategic bridge across the rain-swollen Kharkeh River. It is the main obstacle to an Iraqi advance to reach Ahwaz, the capital of the oil-producing Khuzistan province 30 miles deeper into Iran.

In air action, Iraq said its planes bombed Iranian troop concentrations at Sumar, in the central sector of the warfront, and at Susangerd. Iraq reported that Iranian jets raided civilian targets at Kirkuk, in northwestern Iraq, and at Panjavin, injuring two people. It claimed it shot down an Iranian helicopter gunship and an F-5 iet fighter

An Iraqi military communique reported 45 Iranian troops killed and 13 tanks destroyed late Thursday and Friday morning on all fronts. Iran claimed 120 Iraqis killed in the same

Iran's news agency Pars said Irani-

WASHINGTON — Conferees from the House and Senate on Friday approved legislation co-authored by Sen. Lloyd Bentsen that will provide relief to small royalty owners hit hard by the so-called "windfall prof-Bentsen, who last summer presided

over a hearing in Austin attended by 3,500 Texas royalty owners protesting the tax, said, "I'm optimistic that we've cleared the last big hurdle to enactment of this important legisla-The Bentsen bill amends the Crude

Oil Windfall Profit Tax Act to permit royalty owners, when they file their 1980 income tax returns, to apply for a "windfall profit" tax refund (or credit) of up to \$1,000.

The provision was included in the Senate version of the Budget Reconciliation Bill but was not in the House version of the measure. House conferees on that bill agreed to accept the "windfall" tax refund provision Fri-

"The relief in this amendment will

be especially welcome to smaller royalty owners, those who can least afford the reductions in their income caused by imposition of the so called 'windfall profit' tax, which is in reality an excise tax on oil production," Bentsen said.

Bentsen has sighted numerous ex-

amples of hardship caused by the windfall" tax. One woman from Clyde, Texas, said her widowed 84year-old mother had been looking forward to her new oil royalty check as "a good supplement to Social Security." However, the mother found that the "windfall" tax took \$100.50 from her check for May, leaving her with only \$199.64 that month.

"There are some 650,000 royalty owners in Texas and for approximately 80 percent of them this bill means they would pay no single "windfall" tax," Bentsen said.

"This relief is sorely needed since many royalty owners are retired couples living in rural areas or farmers and ranchers who would be unable to stay on their farms and ranches without royalty income," Bentsen said.

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### Part seven: Operation Hollywood

EDITOR'S NOTE: Following is the seventh in a 10-series of excerpts from "Where Is the Rest of Me?", an autobiography by president-elect Ronald Reagan with Richard G.

### By RONALD REAGAN ith Richard G. Hubler

For a decade there had been mysterious, well-heeled persons floating around Hollywood. One of these was Jeff Kibre, an emaciated, curly-headed, voluble CIO organizer. Later he popped up on the New York water-front as an activist for Harry Bridges, head of the Western longshoremen often accused but never convicted of Communist membership.

A much less shadowy figure was that of John Howard Lawson. A competent playwright, he was very much in evidence organizing meetings and on picket lines. He had frankly admit-ted that it was his aim "to present the Communist position and to do so in the most specific manner." The direct link to the international Communist organization was evident when it be-came known that the commander-inchief of Operation Hollywood for the Communists was Gerhard Eisler. Eisler, who at one time took personal charge of the Hollywood strike maneuvers, was afterward proved to be the top Communist agent in the United States. Exposed, he fled to East

THE COMMUNIST PLAN for Hollywood was remarkably simple. It was merely to take over the motion picture business. Not only for its profit, as the hoodlums had tried — but also for a grand world-wide propagate has a second of the second of t

For my part, I owe it to that period that I managed to sort out a lot of items in my personal life. From being an active (though unconscious) parti-san in what now and then turned out to be Communist causes, I little by

little became disillusioned or perhaps, in my case, I should say awakened. One of the first examples I had was the Communist infiltration into the original American Veterans Com-

I had taken the lead in assuming a number of obligations. One of these was securing for the group the freeuse of the 750-seat auditorium of radio station KFWB. Things worked out fine - except for those who thought the AVC was ripe for infiltration and takeover. Thus when I came back after a few weeks' shooting on location, I found that the meeting place had been transferred to a hall owned spot could seat only 75. Someone preferred a hall which could hold only a "small, working majority." It was an old Communist trick but new to me.

I resigned shortly thereafter from the AVC board and membership.

Bad Boy of liberalism. vented me from giving full thought to my career. For example, I should have settled down happily and gratefully in "The Voice of the Turtle."

Guild - and I had lost my wife. Bob Montgomery, probably more

than any single individual, was responsible for the Screen Actors Guild being in a position to stand firm against the Communist attempt at takeover. Long before most of us were even conscious such a threat existed, he had proposed — and the membership had overwhelmingly approved a change in the bylaws that stymied the Comrades in their favorite practice, namely, "Come to the meeting early and stay late."

EVEN IN MEMORY it seems impossible that my workaday world was continuing through all this - meaning that I was making pictures.

As a result of "King's Row" I was a star. Jack Warner thought I was a star and I liked the idea of his continuing to think that. ### Two years after attack, Kerr confident in investigation

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — Two years after he was ambushed on his way to the federal courthouse, assistant U.S. Attorney James Kerr remains confident that the attackers who fired 19 bullets into his automobile will be brought to justice.

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"I'm disappointed that the people who engaged in this (investigation) have not been successful so far," Kerr said. "But I'm confident they (assailants) will be brought to justice."

Kerr, who built an enviable record for narcotics prosecutions in the Western District of Texas, was driving to the federal courthouse on Nov. 21, 1978, when a van forced his car to a stop, the van's tailgate flew open an 30-caliber bullets riddled the hood and windshield of his auto.

Kerr ducked under the dashboard and suffered only a few cuts from flying glass.

'I would characterize it as a miracle that I wasn't killed or injured,' Kerr recalled in a telephone interview with the San Antonio Express.

On the second anniversary of the shooting, federal officials still consider Kerr's life to be in danger.

We have information that the people who wanted Jim shot two years ago would still like to see him killed," one source close to the investigation

Kerr, 40, said he accepts the theory of U.S. Attorney Jamie Boyd that the attempt on his life was arranged by high-level drug traffickers, the same people who ordered the assassination

of U.S. District Judge John Wood Jr. Wood, 63, was killed by a single 243-caliber bullet in the back fired from ambush as the judge prepared to drive to the federal courthouse on

May 29, 1979. Kerr had prosecuted many of the narcotics traffickers in San Antonio and El Paso that Wood had given maximum prison terms, earning the judge the nickname, "Maximum

Kerr said if his attackers had been caught quickly after the ambush, Wood might still be alive.

"It would follow that if they had been arrested in my case, they wouldn't have been able to engage in further criminal activity," Kerr said, adding he was not criticizing the FBI which has carried out a massive investigation. "I don't want any charges brought until they feel they have cases which an result in convictions and be sustained on appeal," he

Kerr, a 15-year veteran prosecutor of the Justice Department who plays fugues on the organ for relaxation, remains under constant guard of U.S. Marshals at an undisclosed location in another state. He said he sees no prospect of returning to San Antonio

"I expect I'll remain under guard until the case is resolved," said Kerr, who officially is listed on temporary leave but retains the title of Assistant U.S. Attorney

### Attorney attacks police lineup

HOUSTON (AP)— The attorney for convicted hit man Charles V. Harrelson said Friday the appearance of his client in a police lineup was a "farce, circus and show, staged to hassle the news media.

Bob Tarrant said in an interview that to bring the name of Harrelson once again into the investigation of the May 1979 murder of U.S. District Judge John H. Wood Jr. was "just publicity in an attempt to justify the millions of dollars spent by the FBI in the investigation of this case."

Tarrant said Harrelson had been cleared of any connection with the Wood slaying a year ago.

"Charles Harrelson was in a Dallas bank at the time of the shooting and there are five witnesses to testify to that. There was no reason he was taken to the Houston police station for a lineup. It was a waste of taxpayers' time and money."

Tarrant was asked if he had any idea who may have slain Judge Wood and he answered, "Oh, no. I don't know and I don't care.'

Harrelson was taken under heavy guard from the Harris County jail to the Houston police headquarters Thursday and appeared in a lineup before seven

Tarrant was asked if he knew who the seven women were and he answered, "No I don't. They kept the news media out of the lineup room and they wouldn't let me in."

Although no arrests have been made and no charges filed, sources close to the investigation told The Associated Press that authorities "may be close to a solution" of the Wood slaying.

Wood, who earned the nickname of "Maximum taken away and booked." John" for his stiff penalities on drug cases, was shot to death outside his San Antonio townhouse early on the morning of May 29, 1979.

The FBI has conducted one of the most massive investigations in its history following Wood's death.

Thursday's lineup at the Houston police department was one of four conducted in the assassination and the attempted slaying of former assistant U.S. Attorney James Kerr, who had prosecuted several drug cases in Wood's court.

The two shootings have been linked during the investigation. Kerr was ambushed as he left his San Antonio home on Nov. 21, 1978, but escaped serious injury by ducking behind the dashboard of his car as it was riddled by gunfire from the windows of a

Harrelson was brought to the police station Thursday afternoon in a police vehicle flanked by motorcycle officers with sirens screaching.

He was surrounded by heavily-armed officers as he was taken into the station.

Uniformed city policemen, acting on orders from U.S. Marshal T.R. Coney, limited reporters to the pressroom of the police station, only 25 feet from the

When Houston Post reporter Barbara Canetti failed to move out of the hallway and back into the newsroom, she was arrested and charged with interfering with a police officer. She later was released on a \$205 bond.

Ms. Canetti told The AP, "I couldn't move far because there was a big ash tray next to my leg. I was up against the wall. The next thing I knew I was

Houston Police Chief B.K. Johnson said Thursday the heavy security was asked by federal officials to "protect the identification and the lives of the seven women.

Johnson said, "I haven't seen a security blanket

ever thrown over an area such as this." Harrelson was convicted of murder in 1968 and paroled 10 years later. He appeared before a San Antonio grand jury investigating Wood's death in October 1979, and said later he knew nothing of the assassination.

Present at Thursday's lineup was federal prosecu tor Jamie Boyd of San Antonio, several FBI agents U.S. Marshals and criminal investigators from the Houston police department.

Harrelson, a professional gambler, was arrested in Houston earlier this year on a drug and gambling paraphernalia charge. He failed to appear at a court hearing last July and later was arrested in the West Texas community of Van Horn.

After his Harrelson's arrest, FBI special agent Jack Lawn said federal authorities wanted to interview him about the Wood case.

Harrelson was sentenced to 15 years in prison by a Brownsville jury in 1973 after he was convicted as the hired killer of Hearne, Texas, grain dealer Sam Degelia Jr. He was paroled in the fall of 1978 from a Texas prison.

Judge Wood had been scheduled to preside at the drug smuggling trial of Jamiel Chagra on the day he

Chagra, a professional gambler from Las Vegas, is now serving 30 years in prison.

"It raises questions of how someone convicted of sex crimes could get a job with the state school,' Moten said

Travis State School Superintendent Victor Hinojosa said he had no immediate answers.

"I don't know how this happened," he said, adding he is investigating the case. Parks quit Wednesday after an internal investigation at the school. Police said the alleged rape

occurred about Oct. 24. Moten said the victim's mother learned of the incident and reported it to school officials. The victim was brought to the police station by her

mother, school officials and a psychologist. Austin Police Sgt. John Russell of the Sex Crimes Division said Parks has been definitely identified as the man convicted in 1965 and 1966 in two rape cases. At the time of those convictions, authorities revoked the probation Parks had been placed on in a

Moten said Parks' application for a job at the state school listed the forgery conviction, but not the rape



### Directors discuss bad debts

By SUE FAHLGREN Staff Writer

Directors of the Midland County Hospital District spent more than an hour of a 31/4-hour meeting Thursday discussing the hospital's monthly bad debt charge-offs.

The five directors went through the monthly list — which at the beginning of the meeting totaled \$62,080.52 in patient charges to be written-off — page by page Thursday, deleting patients from the list to be sent to outside collection agents. After all the deductions, the board finally approved a charge-off figure of \$57,641.78 for October.

Director Martin Neill said, after looking over the list, "I have the feeling that it (the list) needs an awful lot more attention than

it gets."
Nelli pointed out that if the directors could find names on the list they knew could be contacted for bill collection or could find inconsistencies, then persons investigating those accounts were apparently not making every effort to contact those people and find ways the former patients might be able to finance the

Neill said he understood that Administrator Ray Branson was

relatively new to effect any changes in this area yet.

"I'm hoping that his coming will change the colors greatly,"
Neill said. "I am aware that he needs time to make these changes," he added.

President of the board of directors Ed Magruder told Branson,

"If there's enough money in pursuing these accounts — even if it means hiring additional people — the directors are willing to see this done." Magruder went on to say that if action was taken against former patients in small claims court, for instance, "we can minimize those (accounts) that are passed on to an utside collection agent.'

"We're looking at it (the bad debt situation) in total," he said. "It'll take a little while. I don't understand it all, but Robert (Abernethy, assistant administrator of finance) and I are certainly visiting on this.'

In other board news, the directors wrote out a check for \$21,709.53 from the district to cover indigent care expenses for the month. In addition, the directors asked Abernethy to supply them with a synopsis of indigent care cases for future meetings. Previously, directors had been given only the name and address of eachindigent patient.

The directors also voted to purchase additional insurance coverage for the hospital's data processing equipment, boiler and machinery, and fire and allied lines protection.

The board approved the purchase of \$520,000 worth of equipment for the Allison Permian Basin Cancer Therapy Center as recommended to the directors by the trustees at the Octo-

The directors approved sending a letter to the Midland County Tax Appraisal Board showing their interest in a plan to allow that board to perform assessing and collecting functions for all the taxing bodies, in addition to its appraisal function for those groups. The directors voted to include various alternatives in allowing the tax appraisal board to take over those functions.

The directors also voted to lower property valuations for seven residents who have filed suit against all the taxing bodies, except the city, for a valuation change. The city already had lowered its assessed valuations for the seven in public appeals sessions. The lower valuations mean a loss of \$2,450 in tax revenue, the change ranging individually from 85 cents for one property owner to \$991 for another.

### Smoke inhalation, which claimed most lives in hotel fire, explained

Smoke inhalation, one of fire's most murderous ingredients, killed most of the victims in the fire at the MGM Grand Hotel in Las Vegas Friday, officials say.

When medical authorities say someone died from smoke inhalation, it means the victim was suffocated by carbon monoxide.

"It's internal suffocation," said a New York City medical examiner, Dr. Michael Baden. "Fire produces carbon monoxide and the carbon monoxide prevents red blood cells from picking up oxygen. Oxygen gets to the MGM stockholder Kirk Kerkorian, was patterned after the 1932 hit, "Grand Hotel." ### Some survivors say they had no warning of fire

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) - Some of the survivors of the MGM Grand Hotel fire Friday said they got no warning as the flames and choking smoke spread through the 26-story gambling spa, snuffing out the lives of dozens of people and injuring hundreds.

"You were lulled into a false sense of security," said one of the survivors, New York stock broker Jerry Rosanblam. "There were no phone calls, no alarm, nothing.'

Another guest, Walter Fellwood of Ellicott City, Md., also said he had no inkling that the fire had started.

"No alarms went off...and smoke was pouring through the building,' Fellwood said. "Everyone was pushing everybody. We didn't know what

Several said that when they tried to call the hotel switchboard for information, they got no answer. Fire officials said they believed the switchboard was located near where the blaze originated. There was no immediate explanation of why alarms didn't go off.

Peter Morse, lighting director for singer Mac Davis, who opened at the MGM Thursday night, said he was awakened in his 20th floor room by pounding and sounds of shattering glass from the room next to his, according to Jim Morey, a spokesman for Davis in Los Angeles.

Morse, who called Morey from Valley Hospital in Las Vegas where he was being treated for a cut hand, said smoke filled the room when he opened the door and he was forced back into

"It was just an unbelievable event," Morse told Morey. "I couldn't believe it was happening."

Morse said a helicopter bullhorn urged people to stay in their rooms and that he was finally rescued by firemen at 7:45 a.m.

Dozens of fire engines ringed the massive hotel, at 2,300 rooms one of the largest in the world. Dazed and confused guests, many clad only in night clothes, wandered along Flamingo Road which runs along the north side of the huge, monolithic structure.

Fire department paramedics and doctors, some of them wearing their hospital scrub clothes, worked feverishly over a number of victims who were sprawled in the middle of the four-lane street.

One doctor leaned over a man lying on the street. He pounded on the man's chest in an attempt to get his heart started. A portable cardiac unit showed only a steady line on its small

A reporter told a passing priest, "Father, that guy looks bad. "I've already absolved him," the

priest replied. At the height of the fire, which was under control two hours after the first alarm at 7:15 a.m., hundreds of people stood on balconies or at windows on the north side of the hotel. Ropes made of sheets hung from some windows, but it appeared that no one had attempted to use them.

At least one of the victims was a woman who had jumped from a 17th story window.

A fleet of school buses lined up alongside the Barbary Coast to take MGM guests to the Las Vegas Convention Center where county officials set up an evacuation center.

Security guards from a number of hotels were pressed into service and an estimated 300 Metropolitan police officiers handled crowd control. One harried police officer with a

police dog, trying to move bystanders back, warned the crowd, "get back or get bit."

The fire devastated the casino, the size of a football field.

Many of the dead discovered first were in the casino. One construction worker stumbled over a huddled? group of bodies in the pitch dark gaming room.

### MGM Grand fire worst in 3 years; Forest fire of 1871 worst in history

Friday's fire at the MGM Grand hotel in Las Vegas was the worst blaze in the United States in more than three years.

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### Synanon Foundation members sentenced in rattlesnake incident

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Two members of the Synanon Foundation were sentenced to a year in jail Friday for conspiring to put a rattlesnake in the mailbox of an attorney who won a case against the organization.

Superior Court Judge William P. Hogoboom said he doesn't believe Lance Kenton, 22-year-old son of handleader Stan Kenton, and Joseph Musico, 30, intended to kill attorney Paul Moranty in October 1978 Paul Morantz in October 1978.

"But I am just as convinced they did intend to do some rather serious violence...to intimidate him," the judge said. "We can't tolerate any organization or individual imposing their views on society by intimidation or threats of violence."

Morantz said he was satisfied with sentences, but challenged Hogo-m's speculation that the defen-its did not intend to kill him.

"I'm still in fear," Morantz said, "but not to the same extent as in the

"They did pick a large rattle-snake," the lawyer said. "If it was only to scare me, why did they re-move the warning rattles?" Morantz, who nearly died after the snake bit him, but who has fully reco-vered, had just won a suit against Synanon before the snake incident

Morantz said he had written Hogoboom a letter urging the judge to prohibit Musico and Kenton from going back to Synanon, a Northern California drug and rehabilitation ng back to Synanon, a Northern

The two had pleaded no contest to conspiracy to commit murder and to a separate charge of assault with a deadly weapon — a rattlesnake — last

Kenton was given 80 days' credit for

time already served, and Musico was given 90 days' credit.

Hogoboom also placed the defe dants on three years' probation, and ordered them not to associate anymore with Synanon. The one year sentence will be considered part of their probation time.

Synanon founder Charles Dederich was placed on five years' probation Sept. 3 for his role in the plot to kill Morantz. Dederich had pleaded no contest to conspiracy to murder

Hogoboom said the defendants should spend the first 30 days of their sentences in a county road camp or honor farm, then be placed in a work furlough program that would permit them to maintain outside jobs during the day.

Hogoboom turned down a probation report's suggestion that the two men not associate with each other.



### 'Gang' leader appears ill

PEKING (AP) - Jiang Qing, 67-year-old widow of Mao Tse-tung and leader of the "Gang of Four" currently on trial, looked sick and perplexed in film clips broadcast on Chinese television Friday night. Meanwhile, Chinese newspapers reported that

four of the 10 defendants - Wang Hongwen, Jiang Tengjiao, Qiu Huizuo and Wu Faxian — had admitted guilt after reading the indictment charging them with plotting to murder Mao, staging an armed coup, and framing and persecuting thousands of officials and other Chinese citizens. They could receive a death sentence if found guilty.

But another defendant, Zhang Chunqiao, China's former vice premier, appeared defiant in the additional film footage, broadcast in a special program on the trial which opened Thursday. There was no session Friday and officials declined to say when another would be held.

During Thursday's opening session, Jiang was said by Chinese reporters to have broken into tears at one point but in general to have maintained her poise, holding her head high and showing no effects from her detention since shortly after Mao's death in

Jiang's court demeanor infuriated the official Xinhua news agency, which said "She still uses some of the techniques from her days as a movie actress and under the public gaze deliberately holds up her head, slows her step and adopts a nauseating

But it was a different Jiang viewed by Chinese television watchers of Friday's program, which showed 35 minutes of the 21/2 hour court session. Seven minutes of the proceedings were broadcast the night before.

### Poland's independent union works for permanence

SZCZECIN, Poland (AP) — With its legal status settled, Solidarity, Poland's largest independent trade union, has turned to making itself a viable, permanent force in the nation's economic and social life.

Life-and-death confrontations with the communist government are giving way to such matters as rules for floor debate and whether sugar beet harvesters should have priority over auto workers in contract talks.

Born in the strike last August at the Lenin Shipyards in Gdansk, Solidarity reached a milestone Nov. 10 when the Supreme Court registered it as a legal union without a clause in its constitution affirming the leading role of the Communist Party in the labor movement. The union said it would order nationwide strikes if the clause, which a lower court had inserted, was not removed.

With the issue of the charter settled, the union reaffirmed its loyalty to the state, and the Communist Party newspaper Trybuna Ludu declared it a "positive force" in the development of socialist democracy.

In the months since the Gdansk strike, Solidarity has been transformed from an llegal cell of free trade unionists into a mass organization of some 10 million people, nearly one out of every three Poles.

Its members range from cleaning women to computer scientists. Chapters have been organized at the Polish Academy of Sciences and Interpress, the government information office, as well as steel mills.

Prominent actors have given performances and painters have auctioned their works to raise money for the union. Posters proclaiming "Solidarity Today, Success Tomorrow" cover the walls along major streets in cities from Gdansk to Zakopane. Leading film director Andrzej Wajda is reported planning a movie on Solidarity leader Lech Walesa and the new labor movement.

The union's success is worrying some of its leaders.

"It would be much better if 40 percent of society were hooting at us," said Andrzej Gwiazda, one of the most militant members of the presidium. "Then we would be aware. It's

much support."

After the strike wave last summer in which the workers won the right to form independent trade unions, Walesa and some of his associates envisioned a loose federation of independent, local groups allied primarily for consultation. Walesa said he wanted to avoid the centralization of the party-run labor organization which he claimed had ceased to represent worker interests.

But Lech Modzelewski, son of a former foreign minister and a human rights activist, argued that small unions would be too weak to resist government pressure and compete with the old unions backed by the government.

Despite a decision last September to organize one nationwide union, various local chapters hewed to Walesa's decentralization line and organized protests to push their own wage demands. If they met resistance, they turned to the national leaders in Gdansk to bail them out.

Walesa appealed last Saturday to various regional and professional branches to suspend contract talks with the government until a coordinated national plan could be worked out. The presidium at its meeting here decided to give priority to negotiating new contracts for sugar beet harvesters, textile workers and herb collectors, all low paid.

After a bitter debate, autoworkers from Lublin agreed to hold off their wage demands until better pay was won for lower-paid workers.

The union decided that wage demands would get top priority in the short run. Gwiazda and others hope that eventually Solidarity will have a say in the drafting of the five-year plans, the government's economic

Solidarity claims its relations with the government are improving.

Walesa told reporters that the first session of a union-government commission to draft a new labor law sounded like "a conversation between ducks and chickens, but we came nearer agreement during the second

He conceded that there are still

wildcat strikes and protests throughout the country and that even he is unable tp keep track of them all. But he said he expects the situation to calm gradually.

Other Solidarity officials suspect the regime may be trying to divide the movement by agreeing to high

wages for some groups and thus en-couraging others to break ranks and press their own demands.

Some of the union's leaders contend that Solidarity's emphasis should continue to be on the demands of the workers and the defense of their rights rather than development of a

smoothly running organization. "There are voices in the union that

want to organize the movement, but I feel the leaders of the movement and the movement are created in the process of struggle," said Gwiazda.

"There are some in the presidium

who would be glad to have nice chairs, nice desks, and then start to fight."

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

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

### Religion is removed from public schools

NEW YORK (AP) - Youngsters may now sing Christmas carols and also songs of the Jewish Hanukkah — in public schools. But they can't voluntarily pray there together. Nor can states require posting of the Ten Commandments there. So say the courts.

The decisions, one supporting and the others blocking manifestations of religion on school premises, came this month, indicating the deep and sometimes ambiguous friction over the

There were strong reactions to the decisions, pro and con, variously insisting that all vestiges of religion be removed from the public arena, and laments at the secularizing effects of doing so.

The controversy, and the legal struggle over it, centers on the U.S. Constitution's First Amendment provision that "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."

It's a two-way guarantee, both barring laws to set up an official government religion and also barring any law that abridges the free practice of

That double-barreled assurance is open to varied interpretations, as the long record of court battling and decisions shows. One theory takes a literal view of the no-establishment clause that it simply means no state church.

Others, increasingly in modern times, hold that the clause erects an impregnable wall between government and religion so that neither can help or recognize the other. A third theory takes a middle-road view, going beyond the literal phrasing, yet recognizing areas of inter-relationship between government and reli-

In any case, with steps to restore prayer to the schools a commitment of the incoming national administration, growing conflict over the issue seems likely.

One of the latest decisions came Monday in New York where the U.S. Court of Appeals took the "wall of separation" position, holding that students couldn't meet at school on their own to pray.

Involved was a group called Students for Voluntary Prayer at Guilderland High School near Albany, N.Y. They sought to meet in some empty classroom before the start of classes each day to pray.

They maintained that a school

board ruling that they couldn't do it violated their right to religious freedom. Other groups met, it was noted, for various extracurricular secular activities.

But the court held that allowing prayer meetings would give "an improper appearance of official support" for religion. In another decision Monday, the

U.S. Supreme Court struck down a Kentucky law that required the posting of a copy of the Ten Commandments in every public school classroom in the state. The court said an appended nota-

tion saying the Commandments serve as the fundamental legal code of western civilization does not limit the posting of them to a strictly secular purpose

Earlier this month, however, the U.S. Supreme Court, by declining to review a long-standing South Dakota case, allows public schools to observe religious holidays, including Christ-

That case had its origins in 1977 over a kindergarten class in Sioux Falls, S. D., singing such Christmas songs as "O Come All Ye Faithful" and "Silent Night."

Some objecting parents, joined by the American Civil Liberties Union and others, claimed school use of religious holiday music, drama, lterature and symbols violates the

no-establishment clause But school board attorneys maintained that such material does not promote a "religious effect" but is a proper presentation of part of the "cultural and religious heritage" of the nation.

The board developed guidelines for observance both of Jewish and Christian holidays - Christmas, Easter, Passover, Hannukah, among others - each with their store of song and

The high court stand, in refusing to review lower court rejections of challenges to the program, means that students may sing "Away in a Manager" instead of being limited to such songs as "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer."

Cases involving issues similar to those in the three recently decided ones are going through court processes in various parts of the country, with prospects for continuing litigation about it.

Much of the conflict stems from the 1962-63 U.S. Supreme Court decisions outlawing formally sponsored prayer or Bible devotionals in public schools.

### House tentatively OKs Interior, Energy funds

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House Friday gave washington (AP) — The House Friday gave tentative approval to a \$9.5 billion appropriations bill that will fund some operations of the Interior and Energy departments and various other agencies. The House passed the measure on a voice vote, but only after rejecting a compromise on Alaska homesteaders that had been worked out by a House-Senate conference.

Rejection of that compromise sent the bill back to

ie Senate. If the Senate agrees to the House wording, the tentative House approval becomes final and the bill goes to President Carter. If it rejects the House condition, the bill goes back to conferce for more work.

There was no immediate word on what action the ate would take. Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, who ng for the homesteaders language, was out town and unavailable for comment

The potential sticking point deals with 415 Alas-ans whose homes are on federal lands. At issue is

bout 38,000 acres of land.

The Alaska lands bill, now awaiting Carter's signature, gave homesteaders status to native Alaskan addians who lived on land that would be procted by the lands bill but did not mention the on-native Alaskans. Stevens' amendment would extend the homesteaders' protection to the 415 con-native Alaskans as well.

Wang, who came to this country in 1945, has become as much a force in Massachusetts as the textile barons were two centuries ago. If tradition held its course, the city of Lowell - named after textile magnate Francis Cabot Lowell - could be renamed for Wang, who has set up headquarters in the once-failing mill town.

Wang Laboratories Inc. has help revitalize Lowell, employing more than 5,000 workers. The new 14story Wang Tower dominates the landscape, topped by the company name spelled out in the simple computer type used by Wang printers and video display terminals

The company employs 13,000 people worldwide and has factories in Puerto Rico and Ireland. Employment nearly doubled last year.

Wang controls his growing empire from a ground floor office. He is no longer involved in research and development, taking a more active role in growth and planning strategy.

'There is a Wang way of doing things," says one associate. "There is no textbook. A private man who confines interviews strictly to the doings of his company, Wang has donated \$4 million of the \$200 million in company stock he

controls to the Wang Institute of Graduate Studies, a separate non-profit school based at an old seminary in Tyngsboro. He is also actively involved in restoring historic buildings. Lowell was the first industrial planned city in the

United States," Wang said Thursday. "It's only fitting the birthplace of the first industrial revolution should be aided by the second industrial revolu-The son of a Shanghai English teacher, Wang

graduated from Chiao Tung University in 1940 at the age of 20. He received a Ph.D. in applied physics from Harvard after World War II and stayed here after the Communist takeover in China. In 1948, at the age of 28, he developed the magnetic

core, tiny donut-shaped rings of metal that were basic computer components until introduction of microchips in the late 1960s. Wang sold the rights of the invention to IBM.

Wang Laboratories began in 1951, a one-man operation above an electrical fixtures store in a rundown section of Boston. There Wang build custom-made computer systems for factories and offices. These were mostly one-of-a-kind, special orders. Best known: the computerized scoreboard for New York's

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In 1964 Wang's company took off with development f the first desk-top calculator. Sales soared from \$1.62 million to \$32 million in only eight years.

Wang, a small man with an affinity for bow ties, raised eyebrows five years ago when he predicted sales would hit \$1 billion by 1986.

Wang was wrong; the company is expected to hit \$1 billion in fiscal 1981, well ahead of his prediction. The firm, after two straight years of 70 percent growth, closed out fiscal 1980 with \$543 million in

Wang now names IBM as his chief competitor. Part of the company's success was Wang's insistence on establishing his own sales and service staff the result of a sour deal with another firm to sell and repair equipment he manufactured. Today, Wang's direct sales staff is considered one of the best in the business.

Innovation kept the company at the head of the computer pack. The company was one of the first to market business information systems — the marriage of small computers with word processing equipment that's streamlining office operations by eliminating paperwork.

In a way, Wang has traveled full circle. In April he returned to mainland China to negotiate plans for a production plant in Nanjing.

### Chinese soldiers defect to Korea

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Two Chinese soldiers defected to South Korea aboard a small boat, South Korean government sources said today.

They said that the two arrived Wednesday at Mallipo, a Korean swimming resort on the Yellow Sea about 70 miles south of Seoul.

They were the first known Chinese soldiers to defect to South Korea since the end of the Koean war

The sources declined to identify the two, now under protection of Korean authorities, but said they defected because they did not want to live under

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### South Korean officials to reopen investigation

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korean officials have decided to reopen their investigation into the cause of the crash of a Korean Airlines jumbo jet in which 15 people including the pilot died at Kimpo Airport here.

Korean investigators said they may have been too hasty in blaming the pilot, Yang Chan-mo, for the accident, which occurred Wednesday when the Boeing 747 landed just short of the runway in fog and burst into flames. The plane was carrying 206 passengers and 20 crew members on a

Officials decided they needed more data before making a final determination, and some witnesses claimed Yang and five other crew members died because they refused to leave the plane until all the passengers were

Local newspapers praised the dead crew members for gallantry and unselfishness, and South Korean President Chun Doo-hwan described Yang as a man who carried out his duty at the sacrifice of his own life.



### Doc charged for using Phillies in drug case

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — State drug agents charged a Reading, Pa., doctor on Friday with using the names of five players on the Philadelphia Phillies to illegally prescribe

Dr. Patrick Mazza, 56, was accused of prescribing amphetamines by using the names of Steve Carlton, Greg Luzinski and his wife Jean, Pete Rose, Randy Lerch, Larry Christenson, former player Tim McCarver and Sheena Bowa, wife of Larry Bowa. None of the players and wives was charged, said Attorney General Harvey Bartle III.

"There is no evidence indicating any participation by the players in the illegal conduct," said state Justice Department spokesman Stephan Ro-

The players and the wives told state investigators that they never were treated by Mazza and never received the prescriptions that he allegedly wrote, Bartle said in a statement.

The drug story first emerged last summer, when the Phillies were battling for the National League baseball pennant. The Trenton, N.J., Times said in a copyright story that state narcotics officials wanted to question some Phillies and members of their Reading farm club concerning al-

### Niatross seeks \$2 million mark

TORONTO (AP) - Niatross, the most successful horse in North American harness racing history, has two dates in Ontario next month in an attempt to become the first \$2-million standardbred.

The 3-year-old pacer, who has won 34 of 36 races and \$1.88 million during its two-year career, will race at Windsor Raceway on Dec.7 and Greenwood Raceway here on Dec.13.

"People from Greenwood and Windsor are flying out and all we have to do is settle on the terms," trainer-driver Clint Galbraith said in a telephone interview Thursday from Los Angeles.

"He was playing better than Dan Pastorini during the exhibition sea-son. Pastorini told me that. Dan said that if the Raiders had not traded Ken Stabler to Houston for Pastorini, Plunkett would have been playing.'

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

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
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### Sugar out for revenge

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Sugar Ray Leonard turned street fighter in his sparring sessions Friday and promised he'd be as rough as necessary when he meets Roberto Duran for the World Boxing Council welterweight championship next Tuesday

night.
"This time around, I'll give back what I receive," said Leonard, after he practiced bully tactics on sparring mate Dale Staley. "I'll do whatever's done to me."

Leonard fought on the ropes, driven there by Staley, who held the top strand with one hand and often led with his head. Occasionally, the two fighters flung each other around the ring like wrestiers instead of boxers.

LEONARD'S camp has accused Duran of holding and hitting and using his head for in-fighting. "I can do the same things," the ex-champion said. "I learned how to be rough as a kid. I was able to protect myself in the streets. I'll just revert to street tactics."

Leonard said there is a genuine dislike between himself and Duran, who took the crown from him last June 20 in Montreal.

"I dislike the way he is," Leonard said. "He walks like he owns the world. He wants to intimidate you. He wants you to kneel. When he raises his hand, he wants you to bow.'



### Superfund may pass this session

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bipartisan group of Senate leaders is trying to draft a compromise "superfund" hill that would allow action this year to confront the threat toxic chemical wastes pose to the environment.

The group was to gather late this morning in the office of Sen. Jennings Randolph, D-W.Va., chairman of the Senate Environment Committee. Senate Majority Leader Robert C.

Byrd said negotiators, who first met

Thursday afternoon, needed "several hours" more to work out a compro-"We'll know tomorrow afternoon whether we'll have a bill," Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., one of the negotia-

tors, told reporters late Thursday. "There was strong agreement among everyone that there are a lot of sites that have to be cleaned up. Everyone wants a cleanup," Bradley

said of Thursday's sessions. But he said a "whole range of issues" are yet to be decided, including the scope of the fund and provisions defining chemical companies' liability in contamination cases.

Senate Minority Leader Howard Baker predicted, however, that negotiators could arrive at a compro-

"I believe that enough progress has been made to predict that there will be a successful outcome," Baker

There was some indication Thursday that President-elect Ronald Reagan may be encouraging Senate Republicans to act on a bill this year. Some have speculated that Reagan would be better off having the controversial issue behind him when he takes office Jan. 20.


Asked about the speculation, Baker told a reporter: "I think that's true." He then smiled and added, "One might even infer that's one reason I changed my mind" on action this year. Baker had favored putting the matter off until the next Congress.

Whatever the final form of the compromise bill, it would set up a multibillion-dollar fund to clean up abandoned waste sites that are leaking dangerous chemicals into the environment, such as New York's Love Canal. Part of the money would come from general tax dollars and part from new taxes on the chemical industry.

Few of the details of the fund have

been publicly settled The House has approved three funds dealing with different parts of the problem and totalling \$1.95 billion, with 84 percent of the total coming from taxes on the oil and chemical







### FBI still trying to snare Omega

UNION CITY, N.J. (AP) - In his last days, when Eulalio Negrin told anyone who'd listen that the secret, anti-Castro group - Omega 7 planned to murder him, no one

Omega 7, it seems, is a band of heroes to many of Negrin's former neighbors. "The people feel happy when they hear about Omega 7,' explained anti-Castro organizer Pedro Hernandez.

The slaying of Negrin, a Castro sympathizer, last November was among 25 terrorist acts for which Omega 7 has claimed responsibility over the last four years. But there was little outcry among the Cuban exiles who crowded into this north Jersey city during the 1960s.

Law enforcement authorities say this attitude is a key reason they are unable to convict suspected members of Omega 7, which they believe is headquartered here.

"There are a hell of a lot of Cubans who are not bomb throwers or murderers who feel the same way Omega 7 does," said James Hoffman, who supervises FBI investigations of the group in New Jersey. "Maybe, deep down, there may be a lot of sympathy for what they believe in.'

Hernandez, stressing he has no knowledge of Omega 7 but acknowledging his records were subpoenaed by a New York federal grand jury investigating the group, explained the bombings as "people taking justice in their own hands.

THE REASON, HE said, is that the United States has reneged on its promise to help fight President Fidel Castro ever since Cuban exiles were stranded during the Bay of Pigs inva-

"I saw what happened," Hernandez said. "You have a lot of reasons for bombing or killing. I don't say I'm part of that. I don't approve of that. But it's for a reason. Law enforcement officials say they

have no clear picture of Omega 7 because the community makes it difficult to infiltrate the group. Some speculate it is a tightly-knit

seven-member clan, but Hoffman said, "I have not seen any definitive answer as to who Omega 7 is.' His descriptions range from "misguided patriots" avowed to overthrow communism in Cuba to fanatical

criminals in a "highly selective, secretive group." Authorities say some were trained by the CIA 20 years ago when the United States encouraged the anti-Castro movement. The Cuban government has criticized the United States for laxity in

prosecuting Omega 7, but anti-Castro activists complain the FBI intensifies its investigation only when the country is trying for better relations with Castro. Some say they hope the situation will change when Ronald Reagan becomes president.

IN TELEPHONE CALLS, Omega 7 has claimed responsibility for the slaying in New York City last September of Cuban embassy attache Feliz Garcia and three bombings - of the Cuban Mission to the United Nations. a Union City medicine exporting business and a Soviet ship.

Although some of those suspected by the FBI in connection with Omega 7 are semi-public figures in the city, the agency's squad of eight investigators finds inside information hard to

Now the FBI is trying a new tactic. a novel application of the Racketeering Influenced and Corrupt Organization (RICO) Act which normally is used to combat organized crime.

Portraying Omega 7 as a racketeering ring casts it in a far different role than the freedom-fighting stance its members take in secret leaflets and anonymous phone calls, say FBI officials.

FBI sources say it would be easier to prosecute a suspected Omega 7 terrorist on RICO charges of conspiracy and extortion of money from local businessmen than to find a bombing culprit guilty.

'We don't want a war. We don't have a problem with them (the FBI)," said Ignacio Novo, who faces a second trial in connection with the 1976 assassinations in Washington. D.C., of leftist Chilean diplomat Orlando Letelier and his aide. Ronni

Novo, charged with lying to a grand jury investigating the slayings and with trying to cover up the alleged involvement of other Cubans, belongs to an organization called the Cuban Nationalist Movement. He says it is not Omega 7.

### 2,000 protest KKK acquittal

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - Police reported no arrests and no injuries as more than 2,000 people marched in three cities to protest the acquittals of six Ku Klux Klansmen and American Nazis charged in the shooting deaths of five communist sympathizers. 'A whole lot of folks didn't think

you ha the courage to walk down that street today," the Rev. Leon White, state chairmaj of theCommission for Racial Justice of the United Church of Christ, told demonstrators here Thursday.

"But I say this to the Klan and the Nazis: black people are not going to allow you to intimidate them.

The six Klansmen and azs were acquitted Monday by an all-white jury in the slayings of five demonstrators at an anti-Klan rally in Greensboro on Nov. 3, 1979. The slain protesters were associated with the Communist Workers Party.

U.S. Attorney H.M. 'Mickey" Michaux was meeting here today with Dan Rinzel, chief of the criminal section of the Civil Rights Ditision of the U.Q. Justice Department, to discuss possible federal civil rights prosecutions in dhe shootings.

"OUR PROBLEM IS against communism," said Novo. "If you step on my toes, I'm going to hit you on the head. And that's not a threat. That's human nature.'

Law enforcement sources speculate Omega 7 gets financing from sympa-thetic businessmen and possibly from drug-trafficking.

But the group's strength is in tacit community support, authorities say.

### Red tape, zoning are key factors in housing shortage

WASHINGTON (AP) a home. - A government-supported commission says up of governors, mayors, ment Choices for the bureaucratic red tape and exclusionary zoning are key factors in the looming housing shortage, and the panel is recommending a series of changes to remedy the situation

The panel, backed by the Department of Housing and Urban Development, said Thursday that federal regulations, as well as state and local laws, such as unnecessary building codes, create "delay, uncertainty and complexity" for builders and home-

Among the panel's concerns was that serious social problems could be triggered by a severe housing short-

The 37-member bipartisan commission recommended removal of both rent controls and prohibitions against condominium conversions, and the passage of zoning laws that would allow increased housing density and permit single-family homeowners to rent rooms to help pay for rising housing costs.

Among the panel's other suggestions was the creation of tax-free savings accounts for people who cannot afford down payments on a home. The money could be used only to purchase

"The population feels that these people are doing nothing wrong," said one investigator who asked not to be identified.

And the threat of jail may not be a deterrent, Hernandez said.

"A U.S. prison is nice," he said. "You have hamburgers and every-thing. It's not a communist jail. Nobody's afraid to go to jail; you're a hero ... in the Cuban community. You go to jail for dreams or freedom.

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
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
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

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### Four years in jail haven't changed her

EDITOR'S NOTE John Roderick, former chief of The Associated Press bureau in Peking and AP's long-time China-watcher, knew Jiang Qing in the communist cave capital of Yenan in the 1940s. He last met her in

TOKYO (AP) - Jiang Qing, leader of the "Gang of Four," has been compared to China's ruthless last empress dowager, Tzu Hsi. Both were stubborn, willful and cruel, but capable of charm when it suited their

Seen on television, Chairman Mao Tse-tung's 67-year-old wiyow bore herself with her usual air of self-assurance when she entered the courtroom in Peking Thursday before a picked audience of 880.

In contrast to the nine male defendants, hers was a dramatic, even electrifying presence. The men shambled in, subdued and dazed-looking,

but she held her head high and her body erect. The six minutes of TV coverage contradicted recurrent reports that Jiang Qing had lost her reason and her hair and had been reduced to a

scrawny skeleton during four years in detention. Wearing dark-rimmed glasses as usual, her thick black hair combed neatly back, she looked very much as she did when President Ford and

American correspondents met her in 1975 in Peking. Her accusers reported a week ago she refused to confess to the crimes charged to her. She did not appear Thursday to have altered her stubborn attitude, though Chinese reporters attending the trial session reported

Born in abject poverty, she was kidnapped as a child and forced into a theatrical troupe. Moving to Shanghai as a young woman, she became an actress in left-wing productions. One of her many lovers introduced her to

Mao met her in the late 1930s in Yenan and was captivated by her good looks and intelligence. The party's elders resisted his marriage and made her promise she would never take part in party affairs. Mao divorced his third wife, then in a Moscow hospital, and had a child by Jiang Qing.

She kept her vow to stay away from politics for 25 years, until the start of the Cultural Revolution in 1966. In the next 10 years, until Mao's death in 1976 and her arrest, the forces she and the late Defense Minister Lin Piao directed were said to have persecuted several hundred million Chinese, bringing the nation to the brink of economic and political ruin.

Those who have put her and her nine associates on trial are survivors of that tumultuous period. Some also were the targets of Jiang Qing's passion for revenge. During the 1930s, she was snubbed by communist cultural arbiters and leaders of the Peking Opera. She paid off old scores,

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### Bank regulators split on support for moratorium on bank mergers

WASHINGTON (AP) - Federal banking regulators split Friday over whether Congress should approve a moratorium on commercial banks and holding companies taking over savings and loan institutions.

Jay Janis, chairman of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, testified before the Senate Banking committee in favor of the moratorium. It was opposed by Lyle E. Gramley, a governor of the Federal Reserve Board, and by Comptroller of the Currency John

The moratorium measure has passed the Senate, but the House has not taken any action and prospects are uncertain in the lame-duck session scheduled to conclude Dec. 5.

Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., chief sponsor of the moratorium, presided at Friday's hearing, his last as chairman of the Senate Banking Committee. Sen. Jake Garn, R-Utah, who will take over the panel when Republicans assume control of the Senate in January, is co-sponsoring the measure.

Garn said "even if the House doesn't pass the moratorium, we've succeeded in getting everyone's at-

The only exception to the moratorium would be a takeover aimed at salvaging a thrift institution that is threatened with insolvency.

Janis, in stating his support of the moratorium, said, "We strongly be-lieve it is in the public interest to prevent commercial bank penetra-tion of the thrift industry." He said takeovers would decrease competition and could threaten the home mortgage market, the speciality of the savings and loan institutions.

Janis said the thrift institutions have 81 percent of their assets in mortgages, compared with 18 percent for commercial banks.

### Prime lending rate at percent

NEW YORK (AP) - A 17 percent prime lending rate spread through most of the U.S. banking system Friday amid moves by the Federal Reserve to restrain credit growth and ward off a new wave of inflation.

The increase was the second since Monday, when the rate that topranked businesses pay on loans rose three-quarters of a point to 16.25 percent nationwide.

Rates on consumer loans and home mortgages are not tied to the prime, which is nearing its 20 percent record high of last April after slipping as low as 10.75 percent in July.

But analysts said a steady tightening of credit, which started last summer, is expected to boost the price and cut the availability of loans for

housing, autos and consumer goods. While that tightening may result in less-rapidly rising prices, analysts said it also may push the economy into a new slowdown just as a recovery from this year's recession gains

momentum The move to 17 percent — the highest prime rate since mid-May - was sparked Thursday afternoon by Continental Illinois National Bank & Trust Co. in Chicago. On Friday, most others followed the lead set by that bank, the nation's seventh largest.

Citibank, the second-largest bank in the country, failed to go all the way to 17 percent, however, raising its prime lending rate to 16.75 percent. John Maloney, a spokesman for Citibank here, said the bank's action reflected "our market judgment." He would not elaborate.

The increases in the prime rate reflected a sharp increase in the cost of funds banks themselves borrow. Dealers said federal funds, overnight loans of excess cash among commercial banks, traded as high as 17.875 percent Friday, up from 12.5 percent in late October and 9.5 percent last The federal funds rate is one of

### Spot market oil prices hurt by continuing Iran-Iraq war

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — The loss oil from Iraq and Iran because of the Persian Gulf war has pushed up spot market prices and tightened world markets, but experts said Friday both countries are resuming exports.

**Industry sources in Beirut said Iraq** is pumping oil through its 700,000 barrel-a-day capacity Turkish pipeline and Iran is loading oil at its 200,000-a-day facility at Lavan Island

in the gulf. They said Iraq is believed to be pumping well below the limit of the pipeline, blown up by anti-Iraqi guerrillas after the war broke out Sept. 22, and Iran is believed to be pumping about 150,000 barrels a day through

They said tankers also have been loading at the Kharg Island facility, Iran's largest, but details were not

Iraqi fighter jets have carried out air attacks on Kharg Island, but both nations' bombing raids on oil targets have slackened in recent weeks.

Before the war, Iraq was producing about 3.5 million barrels a day and exporting about 3.2 million. Iran was pumping about 1.5 million barrels from its rich oilfields and exporting about 500,000 barrels.

"The war has pushed up spot market prices about 25 percent, and turned the surplus on world markets into a deficit," said one well-informed

industry source. He described the spot markets as 'very tight" and said that spot market prices, about \$30 a barrel for light Arabian crude before the war, are now \$41-\$42 on European markets.

He said the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries was sticking with its official celling of \$32 a barrel for light Arabian, but had resumed surcharges for certain grades.
"If the war lasts too long, the offi-

cial prices will have to increase," he

Before the war, production was outpacing demand of non-communist nations by about 2.7 million barrels a day, prompting such OPEC hawks as Libya and Algeria to press Saudi Arabia to cut its above normal production level of 9.5 million barrels a day.

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### Drab, gray journal oldest and best

BOSTON (AP) — This week's discovery concerns a benefit of taking female sex hormones. Last week, it was a way to stop the pain of sickle cell anemia. So it goes each Thursday as the latest news of sickness and disease unfolds in the New England Journal of Medicine.

The weekly magazine, written by doctors for doctors, reveals the best, the latest, the most important medical research at hospitals and universities in the United States and Canada.

United States and Canada.

When medical researchers fantasize about making their big breakthroughs, they dream of telling the world about it in the drab, gray pages of the New England Journal. For this is the world's oldest medical journal, its most widely read and, many contend, its finest.

"You can count on the fingers of one hand the journals that cover the entire spectrum of medicine," said Dr. Dennis Slone, director of the Drug Epidemiology Unit at Boston University Medical School. "No others carry the authority and weight and have the widespread coverage and readership that the New England Journal has."

A GOOD MEDICAL library subscribes to 5,000 medical journals, but most specialize in narrow areas of human misery — diseases of the feet, for instance,

But the New England Journal - like its chief U.S. competition, the Journal of the American Medical Association, and the British journal, Lancet — prints anything the average physician should know about. This ranges from experiments with new kinds of drugs to the debate over national health insurance.

This week's issue is typical. A study shows that women who take estrogen uring menopause have stronger bones and fewer fractures. There is a report of a better treatment for cancer of the pancreas, a reason why some people suffer wheezing bouts during virus infections, an argument for reducing the number of surgeons and a letter urging doctors to consider the heft of safety pins and Band-Alds when they weigh babies.

Plus five more articles, an editorial, another "sounding board" opinion on bedside rounds, seven book reviews and 21 more letters picking apart earlier studies and offering sundry observations on the art of healing.

Each year, the journal receives about 3,500 offerings. It publishes about 12 percent, paying contributors nothing. The reward of one's words appearing in the New England Journal is recognition, prestige and a generous boost to the

"It's so widely read that your findings are likely to be noticed and taken seriously," said Dr. Noel Weiss, who directed this week's estrogen study at the University of Washington.

THE JOURNAL HAS BEEN around since 1812, but its influence has grown with its circulation in the past two decades.

"In 1966, our circulation hit 100,000, and we figured we had saturated the market and weren't going to grow anymore," said William Paige, manager of subscriber service. "We broke 200,000 at the beginning of this year, and we hope to be up to 210,000 by the end of 1980." The journal is sold by subscription only.
