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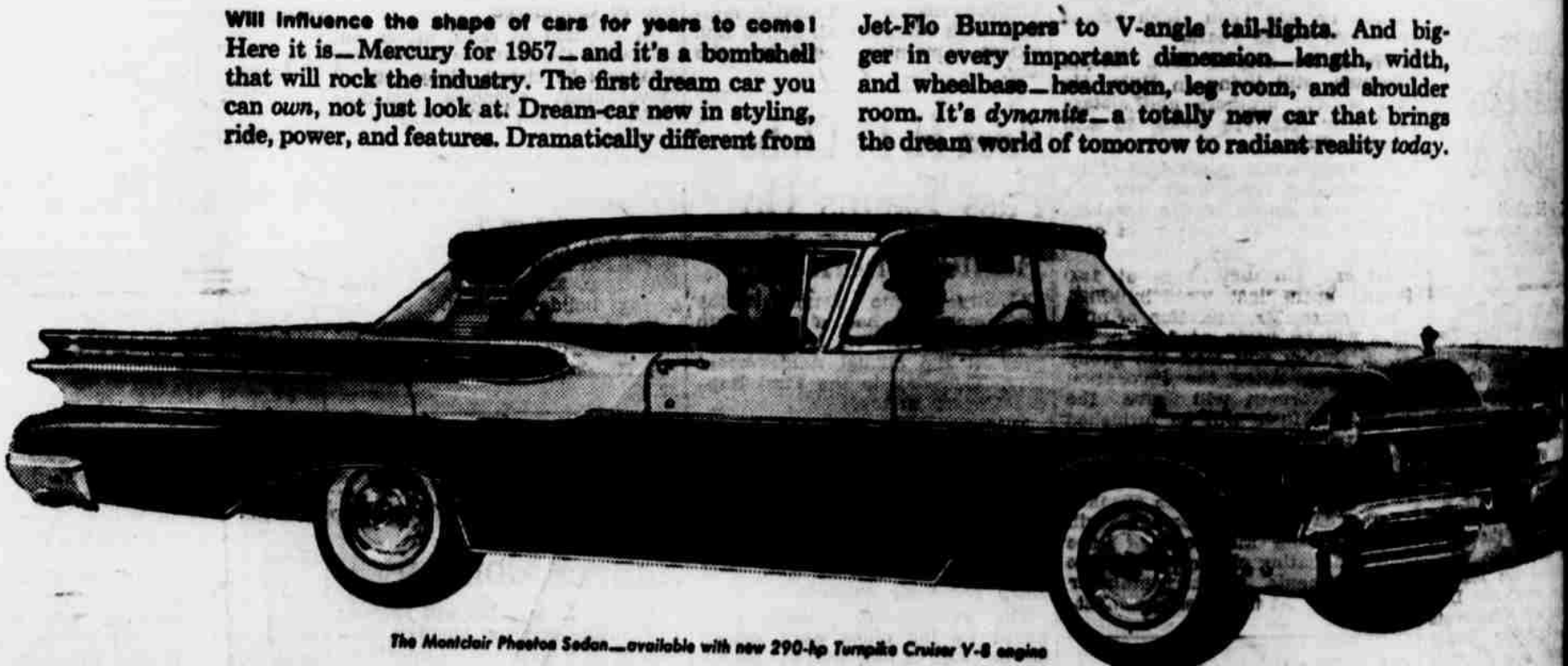

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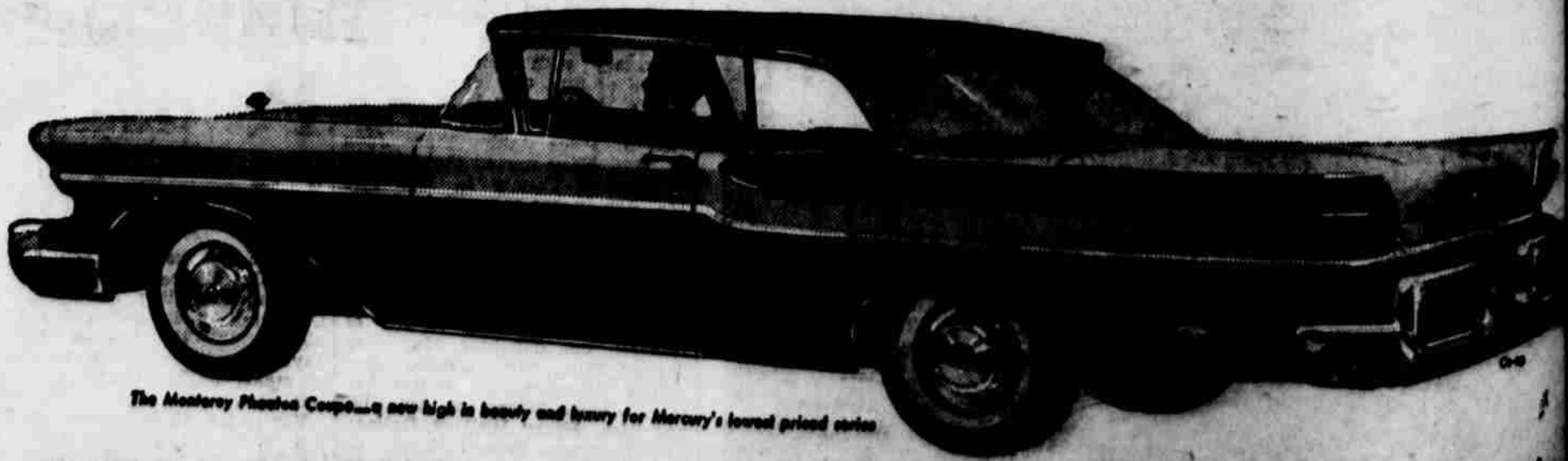

Haskell voters approved each of the eight amendments submitted in the General Election, although the total vote on the changes in the Constitution was far below the balloting for Governor and for President. Only exception was Amend-

ment No. 4, for teacher's retirement on which 2407 voted for and 457 against, for a total of 2,864.
2. Tax reallocation—1452 for, 930 against.
3. Allow more freedom for college fund investment—1409 for, 637 against.
4. Teacher's retirement—2407

for, 457 against.
5. Veteran land fund—1760 for, 661 against.
6. Oath of office—1530 for, 615 against.
7. Changes in lunacy trial proceedings—1899 for, 482 against.
8. Denial of bail on two felony convictions—1672 for, 633 against.

Edgar, Commissioner of Education gave a report on the four State-wide studies made on Social Studies Program, High School Graduation Requirements for Accredited Schools, the Intermediate Unit and the Effective Use of School Properties and Instructional Personnel. Dr. Edgar asked teachers to keep alert and informed on legislation concerning the Intermediate Unit, Adult Vocational Program, and the Vocational Education Program. He stated that several recommendations will be presented to the Legislature.

One study group gave an excellent discussion on how we can meet the needs of the gifted and talented students. It was stated that these students have been too long neglected, that our curriculum must be enriched to provide more for the gifted pupils in our schools.

One outstanding educator stated that there was a definite trend for a testing program, and the grouping of children according to their ability. The majority of the teachers felt that much better work could be done and the children would make greater progress if they work with children of the same ability.

Recommendations were made for the revision of the Arithmetic Program, Science Program, and the Social Studies Program. Schools are urged to give more time to Foreign Languages.

The purpose of the conference was to work for an enriched program for the children of Texas schools.
