Water conservation efforts successful on campus

In the fall 2008 semester, Texas Tech administrators eliminated meal trays in the Hulen/Clem
ent Dining Hall in an ent Dining Hall in an attempt to
conserve water and cut down on conserve wate
chemical use.
Almost a year later, James Kainer, hospitality services unit manager, said the university saved thousands of gallons of water and
hundreds of liters of hundreds of liters of chemicals by
discontinuing use of the trays. discontinuing use of the trays.
"Speaking for hospitality, spe "fically," he said, "weveve done a lo of work toward water conservation. That's something of importance to West Texas because it's something we don't have a lot of." Inside the Hulen/Clement
Dining Hall, he said, the effort yielded a decrease in resources yielded a decrease in resources
used, logging in 300 fewer bottles of chemicals and 8,000 fewer gallons of water from August to February, compared to past rates.

Mexico remittances plunge in record fall
MEXICO CITY (AP) Miving abroad plunged in April by more than 18 percent compared the biggest monthly decline on ecord, the central bank sai April remittances fell to $\$ 1.78$ billion from $\$ 2.19$ billion cording to the bank. It said the U.S. recession has hurt migrants in the United States, while fewer Mexicans are heading nort because of a lack of jobs and tion. Year-to-year remittance fig-
ures started dropping last year for the first time since the bank started tracking the money in 1996.
Mexico's second largest legal source of foreign income after oil, to $\$ 25$ billion in 2008 compared to $\$ 26$ billion in 2007 . Remittances for the first four months of 2009 have dropped more than 8 percent to $\$ 7.2$ billion from $\$ 7.9$ billion for th
same period last year.
