The money was divided equally, with \$100 going to each to help them during their "trying times they are experiencing."

**Youth Corps Jobs
 Available Here Soon**

Approximately 10 youth will be hired this summer at the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge for the summer Youth Conservation Corps, as was the case in 1983. Rodney Krey of the Refuge told the Journal this week that applications for the YCC jobs would be available after March 26 and that the approximate starting date for the YCC would be the first week in June. The ten young men and women who work at the refuge each year are taught a number of skills and enjoy the fun of each other's company under the supervision of a trained group leaders.
 A limited number of unique summer employment opportunities are offered to teenagers across the country by the two Interior Department agencies. The work opportunities are all part of the YCC program, open to young adults 15 through 18 years of age.
 The nearly 4,000 opportunities offered by the National Park Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service range from building roads and trails and repairing damages to parks and recreation sites, to helping wildlife researchers on national wildlife refuges.
 The YCC program is administered by the U.S. department of the Interior, of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and State governments across the country. Teenagers participating in the program accomplish
 conservation work on public lands and have the opportunity to gain a unique understanding of the environment, wildlife and natural resources during the eight week employment period. Participants work 40 hours a week and are paid the minimum wage.

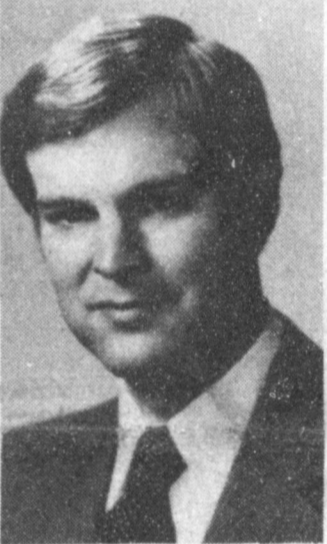

**Red Cross
 Aids Family
 After Fire**

In the aftermath of a tragic fire in Muleshoe last Sunday night and early Monday morning which claimed the lives of two local residents, several financial arrangements were made early this week to aid the survivors.
 Sgt. Wayne Holmes made arrangements to contact the district office of the American Red Cross in Lubbock. On Tuesday morning, Walter A Ahrens, executive director came to Muleshoe to see what the Red Cross could do to help.
 As a result, the Red Cross representative set up an account with the C.R. Anthony Co. to help replace clothing lost by the surviving members of the family, and also made arrangements to pay for the portion of the funeral bill for Richard and John Cervantez which was not covered by insurance.
 Sgt. Holmes praised the quick action of the Lubbock Chapter of the American Red Cross and for their positive response which helped a family devastated by losing the two family members, their home, clothing, furniture, and their vehicle.
 "I contacted Larry Rasco, a local EMT, who has an affiliation with the Red Cross and it didn't take long to get things underway," said the Muleshoe City Police Sergeant. "The Red Cross has really come through in a big way and in a hurry to help the Cervantez family."
 Also, according to the Sergeant, Red Cross emergency medical training and CPR training will be getting underway in Muleshoe very shortly.

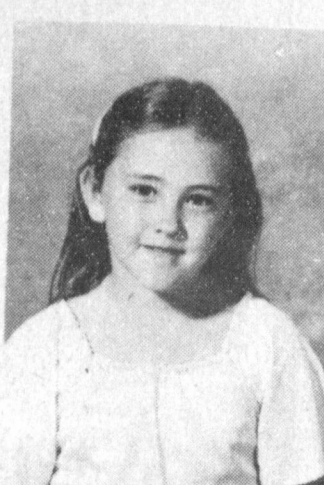

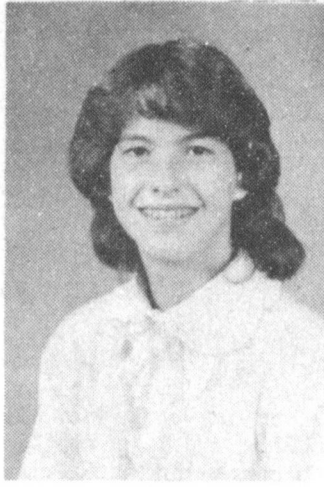

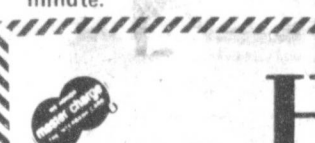

Officials Honor Older Workers

State and local officials, older workers, and employment program administrators gathered at a luncheon March 7 at the Hill Country Senior Complex in Dripping Springs to launch Older Worker Week activities in Texas.

Governor Mark White, in a proclamation designating this week as Older Worker Week in the state, said that the "citizens of Texas strongly affirm the value of hard work and the right of people of all ages to make productive contributions to society."

"This right," the governor continued, "has found positive expression through organizations such as the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb and Senior Texans Employment Programs." The two programs currently employ about 2,000 of the state's 3,000 older workers whose jobs are funded through the Title V Senior Community Service Employment Program.

Participants are 55 or older and must meet income guidelines. They work part time for schools, libraries, senior centers, and municipalities, providing services that would not otherwise be available.

Older Worker Week is an annual event designed to spotlight the assets of older workers, who actually have fewer job-related accidents than their younger counterparts, and who are much more likely to have perfect attendance records. Many large corporations, Union Carbide and Bankers Life among them, are actively recruiting older employees.

"We are extremely proud of Governor White's recognition of the state's older workers," said Mike Moeller, President of Texas Farmers Union (TFU). "Hiring the experienced is good business--chronological age should be the least important measure of a person's true value when being considered for employment."

One of the state's Title V workers is 95-year-old Joe Judie, Jr., who lives and works in Falls County. Much of his work is done outside and includes painting and weatherization.

Judie is a "retired" farmer, and his application for the Title V program listed his previous occupation as "Farmer--80 years." No one on the program is likely to have as much experience, or a greater desire to work.

"Joe Judie is an outstanding example of the enduring contributions that older persons can make to this state," said TFU President Moeller. "These people believe in work, they were raised on work, and they'll do a day's work for a day's pay. It is fitting that the older workers of Texas be recognized for their contributions to society."

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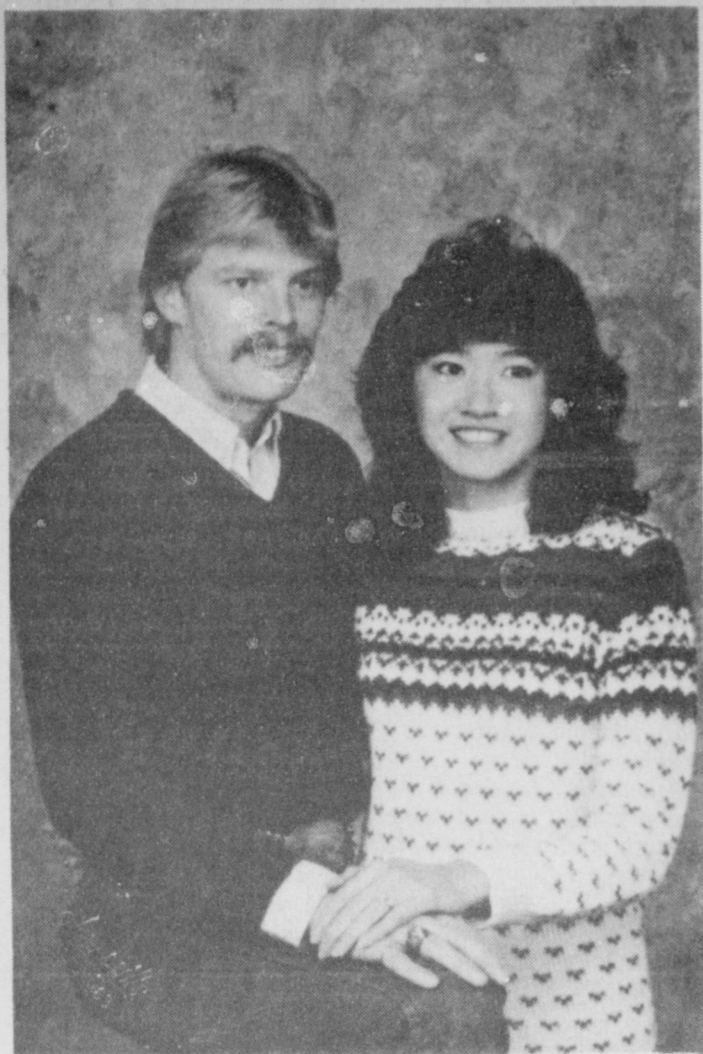
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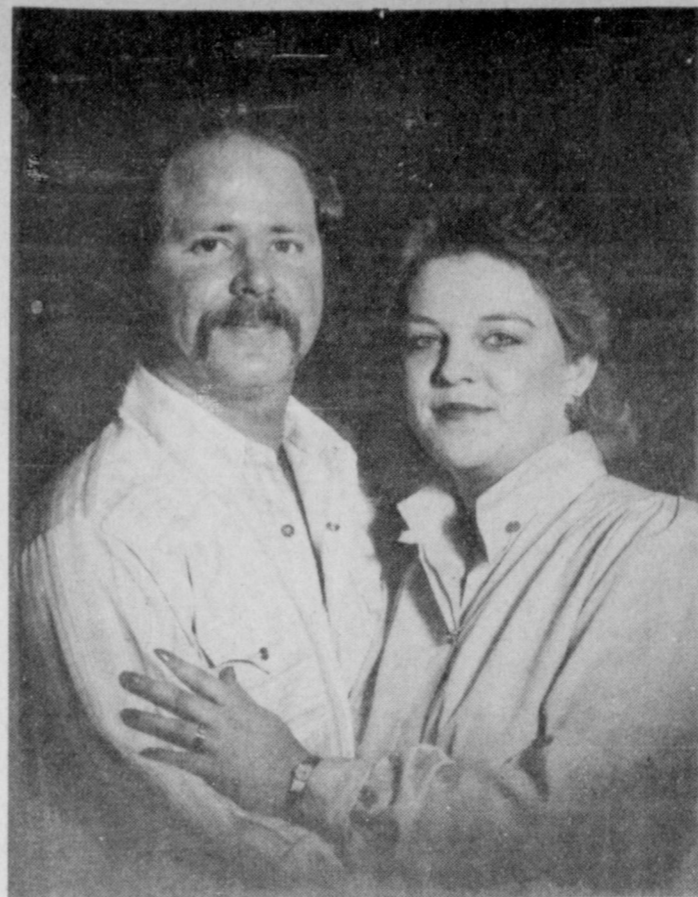

Farmers Can Lick Soil Erosion

Soil erosion by both wind and water is a major problem in Texas and is continually aggravated by some current farming practices and economics.

"The economics of modern farming, larger equipment, high interest rates and careless conservation attitudes have all led to excessive soil erosion in recent years," says Dr. B.L. Harris, soils specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Many farmers are faced with a tough choice--practicing conservation or economics--with the result being biased towards economics out of a basic sense of survival, notes the specialist.

"Farmers generally can't afford to practice all needed conservation methods. Many are in extreme financial straits, so economics determine to a great extent what they can or cannot do, regardless of the recommended conservation practices," says Harris.

Farmers now use larger equipment and cultivate more, leading to increased erosion. Few maintain or install new terraces because of economics.

Absentee landlords are also a factor in soil erosion, notes Harris. Farmers leasing cropland often cannot afford soil conservation practices. And, unless a lease has a long-term agreement, he has no guarantee that he will obtain

adequate benefit from soil conservation work.

"Improving land management practices is the key to solving soil erosion problems," believes Harris. "If farmers believe they must continue to farm erosive land, they should follow farming practices that help cut down on erosion."

Contouring and terracing can cut erosion losses in half. Leaving crop residue on the ground can reduce erosion by another 40 percent. Conservation tillage and double cropping also help. Some farmers shy away from these practices because of the costs involved, notes the specialist.

"The best solution is to use each acre for what it is best adapted to produce," Harris emphasizes. "Soil erosion has increased in areas where more sloping pasture land is now used to grow crops. Returning such land to its original state would benefit all concerned. It would be a way to slow the process of erosion, rebuild the topsoil, and save the land for future use."

Local soil and water con-

servation districts and conservationists with the Soil Conservation Service can provide excellent advice on

erosion control and technical expertise for installing practices, says the specialist. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service provides some "cost-share" funds for selected conservation practices, and the Farmers

Home Administration provides loans to assist with conservation programs.

All of these agencies and more work together to assist landowners and users to protect their basic resources while they reap realistic profits from their production operations. Harris encourages farmers and ranchers to make extensive use of assistance from these state and federal agencies.

"Conservation must first be a well-ingrained attitude in landowners before any long-term improvement in soil resources occurs," contends Harris. "All users of land are encouraged to give serious thought to the quality and condition of lands they will leave to future generations."

If you move after filling your federal income tax return and you are expecting a refund, notify the post office serving your old address as soon as possible, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The IRS Service Center where your return was filed should also be notified in writing of the address change. This will help the IRS to forward any tax refund to the new address as soon as possible. When informing the IRS of your address change, your Social Security number must be included in the correspondence.




