Although packaged alcohol became available in the city of Lubbock on Wednesday, local authorities said they do not expect crime to rise as a result of the closer availability.

Residents now can buy beer and wine at local convenience and grocery stores as opposed to going to The Strip, which is about 15 minutes away from the Texas Tech cam-

In a previous interview with The Daily Toreador, Lauran Collins, one of the protestors of alcohol sales in Lub-

bock, said she was afraid Lubbock would see an increase in crime.

Col. Gordon Hoffman, deputy chief of the Tech Police Department, said the department is not changing the way it runs patrol in response to the sale of alcohol.

"From our perspective, I don't anticipate any more problems than we have right now," he said. "The kids who were getting it before will still get it now, it's just more convenient."

Tech, Houston renew Southwest Conference rivalry

For Texas Tech coach Mike Leach, it's up in the air whether a bye week helps or hinders a team with a relatively high level of momentum.

comfortably answer their thoughts on bye weeks, you know what I mean?" said Leach, whose then-No. 2 Red Raiders lost at Oklahoma after a bye week in 2008. "Later in the year, you like them because you're fatigued and it helps you recover and heal up a little bit.

No. 17 Houston is about to find out just how dicey it is. The Cougars are ranked for the first time since 1991 after defeating then-No. 5 Oklahoma State in Stillwater, Okla., on Sept. 12, and they face yet another Big 12 Conference team in Tech at 8:15 p.m. on Saturday at Robertson Stadium in Houston.

The teams haven't played each other since 1995, when they both were members of the former Southwest Conference.

Fourteen years later, the meeting is an anticipated shootout between two high-powered offenses. The game is sold out and on national television (ESPN2 and www.ESPN360.com). But just how much is a team affected by unfamiliar approval?

This early in the season, Tech guard Brandon Carter said he believes the impact will be minimal, and he wouldn't have it any other way because he wants the Cougars "at their best."

"I think at times bye weeks can be very good, and at times they can be detrimental," he said.

Houston quarterback Case Keenum said last "I don't know very many coaches that can week was not seen as an "off week." Everything from watching film, attending meetings and practicing hard was repeated just like any other

> "Any team can beat any team on any given Saturday," he said.

That theory almost applied to last week's game between Tech and No. 2 Texas. The Red Raiders were within a touchdown in the fourth quarter before the Longhorns pulled away.

Houston coach Kevin Sumlin said he was hoping he didn't have to watch Tech quarterback Taylor Potts — who has thrown for 400 yards in his first three starts — bounce back after big hits, show off his cannon arm and keep his team in the game despite a state-record crowd.

But he also became aware of what Tech's defense can do, which has been a pleasant surprise

Allowing just 268 yards per game, Tech is 22nd in the nation in total defense and fourth nationally in tackles for loss with 28 — impressive considering it had 55 in all of 2008.



Tech Marketing Association receives scholarship money

The Texas Tech Marketing Association sold more than 6,000 tickets to the Jeff Dunham comedy event earlier this month and received scholarships totaling \$1,000 in return for its hard work.

Jaime Resendiz, president of the Tech Marketing Association, said his group has been working on the project since April when Cindy Harper, associate director of the United Spirit Arena,

Resendiz said the idea attracted his group because of the real-world experience students could gain and the possibility of winning scholarships.

The TMA was given a marketing budget of \$20,000 by the ACTS Scholarship, which they used to purchase advertisements on local television and in the event. radio stations and run advertisements

The ACTS Scholarship program, created by Barbara Hubbard in 1968, has allowed for marketing students from around the nation to receive hands-on experience through promoting concerts and events on their respective campuses for the past 40 years. The program also gives students the chance to win scholarships for selling more tickets.

fired canisters of pepper spray and smoke at marchers protesting the Group of 20 summit Thursday after anarchists responded to calls to disperse by rolling trash bins and throwing rocks.

The clashes began after hundreds of protesters, many advocating against capitalism, tried to march from an outlying neighborhood toward the convention center where the summit is being held.

The protesters banged on drums and chanted "Ain't no power like

The marchers included small groups of self-described anarchists, some wearing dark clothes and bandanas and carrying black flags. Others wore helmets and safety goggles.

One banner read, "No borders, President Barack Obama and first no banks," another, "No hope in lady Michelle Obama arrived for a capitalism." A few minutes into meeting with leaders of the world's the march, protesters unfurled a large banner reading "NO BAIL-OUT NO CAPITALISM" with an encircled "A," a recognized sign of anarchists.

The marchers did not have a permit and, after a few blocks, police declared it an unlawful assembly. They played an announcement over a loudspeaker ordering people to leave and then police in riot gear moved in to break it up. Authorities also used a crowd-control device that emits a deafening siren-like noise, making it uncomfortable for protesters to remain in the area.

Protesters split into smaller groups. Some rolled large metal trash bins toward police, and a man in a black hooded sweat shirt threw rocks at a police car, breaking the front windshield. Protesters broke windows in a few businesses, including a bank branch, a Boston Market restaurant and a BMW dealership.

Officers fired pepper spray and smoke at the protesters and set off a flash-bang grenade. Some of those exposed to the pepper spray coughed and complained that their eyes were watering and stinging.



MARFA, Texas (AP) — Actor Randy Quaid and his wife have been arrested in West Texas for allegedly skipping out on a \$10,000 California hotel bill.

Quaid and his wife, Evi, were taken into custody Thursday afternoon, according to Santa Barbara County sheriff's officials, who said authorities in West Texas informed them of the arrest. A statement from the California agency said it was told by the Presidio County Sheriff's Department that Evi Quaid was restrained after a brief struggle.

Presidio County Sheriff Danny Dominguez declined to respond to questions from The Associated Press.



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Llano Idea brings Lubbock music scene to cyberspace



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



Huge hoard of Anglo-Saxon treasure uncovered in UK The treasure trove includes in-

LONDON (AP) — It's an unprecedented find that could revolutionize ideas about medieval England's Germanic rulers: An amateur treasure-hunter searching a farmer's field with a metal detector unearthed a huge collection of Anglo-Saxon gold and silver artifacts.

The discovery sent a thrill through Britain's archaeological community, which said Thursday that it offers new insight into the world of the Anglo-Saxons, who ruled England from the fifth century until the 1066 Norman invasion and whose cultural influence is still felt throughout the English-speaking world.

"This is just a fantastic find completely out of the blue," Roger Bland, who managed the cache's excavation, told The Associated Press. "It will make us rethink the Dark Ages."

The Anglo-Saxons were a group of Germanic tribes who invaded

England starting in the wake of the collapse of the Roman Empire. Their artisans made striking objects out of gold and enamel, and their language, Old English, is a precursor of modern

The cache of gold and silver pieces was discovered in what was once Mercia, one of five main Anglo-Saxon kingdoms, and is thought to date to between 675 and 725.




