medical training course during medical train
spring break. The OPC is working with the

hours of in-classroom work that will teach them how to handle situations they may face in the wilderness. These classroom sessions will teach the group about the human body and what to do when a way to get outside help. "It will cover everything from bleeding to lots of field-type medicines," said Cameron Cox, an OPC coordinator.
Along with the classroom work, he students will take part of various scenarios for an "experimental edu-
cation" to put their new knowledge to work. This method will teach the group by making them actually put the lessons into practice, ox said.
"Sometime during the day we're supposed to fall over and have a

said Molly Daniel, a sophomore communication studies major from Coppell. "I's's a bunch of hands-on stuff, so it's not just a teacher teach-

anything that could happen in real anything that could happen in real
life - even tearing their clothes life - even tearing their clothes
to fulfill a task. During each of the scenarios, different problems will arise, forcing the group to figure
out how to fix the situation with out how to fix the situation with what they have with them. Because they won't have splints, bandages or other medical necessities with
them, fabric sometimes can be used for these purposes.
"Sometimes you have to cut your
clothes to get to the problem, clothes to get to the problem, so we're supposed to bring old crappy clothes that we don't care about so
they can cut them off of us (if hey they can cut them off of us (if they
need to)," Daniel said. "During
simulations, they need to do what

Nomar Garciaparara finally got a friendly farewell from the Red Sox.

The rookie of the year, batting champion and All-Star whose trade began a bitter back-and-forth in Boston and, for Garciapara, an inglorious slide into ir-
relevance, signed a ceremonial one-day relevance, signed a ceremonial one-day
contract with the RedSox on Wednesday contract with the Red Sox on Wednesday
for the purpose of retiring in the uniform of his original team.
"From the first day I had the thrill of puttingon a Red Sox uniform and playing in front of all the great fans at Fenway Park, Ihave felt at home in Boston," Gar-
ciaparasa sid in a starement thatbelied the ciapara said in astatement that belied the
ugliness hat accompanied his departure. ugliness that accompanied his departure.
"While had the privilege of playing with other legendary teams, Ialways saw myself retiring in a Red Sox uniform."
Garciaparra announced he's leav-
ing baseball at 36 to become an ESPN
analyst, ending a 14 -year career in which
he was a six-time All-Star and two-time batting champion. But the career that
started with the 1997 AL Rookie of the Year award began to crumble when the
Red Sox tried to acquire Alex Rodigez Red Sox tried to acquire Alex Rodriguez after the 2003 season - a deal that probably would have forced them to trade Garciapara.
Although Although the Rodriguez deal fell
