Study: Chocolate could reduce heart risk

Bunny might lower your chances of having a heart problem. Accord ing to a new study, small doses of chocolate every day could decrease your risk of having a heart attack

German researchers followe nearly 20,000 people over eight years, sending them several questionnaires about their diet and exercise habits. They found people who had an average of six grams of chocolate cer day - or about one square of a
chocolate bar - had a 39 percent lower risk of either a heart attack or stroke. The study is scheduled to be published Wednesday
