

# University Print and Design Solutions to close

A Texas Tech department will be closing its doors this summer after about 76 years of service to the campus, according to a Tech news release.

The space used by University Print and Design Solutions, formerly University Printing Services, will be transformed into a research facility as Tech continues to expand its research and academic mission, according to the release.

University Print and Design employees will no longer be employed by the university, said Director Randy Smith, but Tech officials offered "liberal" severance packages and will attempt to fill vacant positions in the university with those from the department.

Smith said he had no voice in the closing of the facility, but he is not bitter toward the administration.

"I'm disappointed, especially for the 31 other people that work here," he said.

Although he plans on retiring when the department closes, Smith said, others aren't so lucky and will have to start over, some of them after being at the university for a number of years.

Because of plenty of advance notice and help with the soon-to-be former employhandled the situation better.

Offers to employees to stay at Tech are not guaranteed, Smith said, but the Office of Enrollment Management and Student Affairs will be doing its best to either rehire employees or send them off with more training on how to find a new job through job counseling.

Bill Mills, a 19-year employee with the department, said he found out last Friday the department was shutting down.

"It's kinda funny, you know? You're staying here for the retirement and two-and-aees, he said the university could not have half years before you get it, it's closing," said Mills, the lead operator of the press.

Although he has no bitter feelings

disappointed he had to lose his job for top university officials to continue the Tier One push.

He said he hopes to get another job somewhere else at the university and otherwise will utilize job counseling Tech will offer in trying to find another job.

Jan Childress, associate vice president for Student Affairs and External Relations, the office that presides over University Print and Design Solutions, said the department has done a "wonderful job over the years," and that she is saddened it had to be cut.

"The need for research at the university is great and they needed the space to make that research work," she said.

Sally Post, director of Communications and Marketing at the university, said the university is going to convert the building, which is next to the Physical Plant, but she

does not know what specific types of research will be hosted in the building.

The decision to convert it was based on Tech's strategic priorities and the need for more research, she said.

Individual departments now will have to find alternatives off campus for printing

University Print and Design Solutions was created in 1934 as Texas Tech Press, in which it coordinated with the Tech journalism program, and financed its first facility and equipment with a bond issue. In the early 1960s, the organization sold its building to the university and built a

The department is comprised of several different services, including PrinTech, CopyTech and the Bulk Mail Center.

# Tech track shines at Texas Relays

In one of the most impressive performances at the 83rd annual Texas Relays, the Texas Tech women's distance medley relay team won its third title in

Purity Biwott, Gladys Kipsang, Jonisha Boleware and Caroline Karunde won the race with a time of 11 minutes 14.64 seconds. Their time was more than five seconds faster than second-place finisher Kansas.

Tech coach Wes Kittley said his team's ability to compete on such a big stage early in the season should prepare it for meets later this season.

"I think it was a great experience," he said. "We had some great things happen and I think we are going to start getting better, and getting better times and marks as the season moves on."

At one of the most prestigious track events in the nation, the Red Raiders brought home some impressive earlyseason marks including the men's 400-meter hurdles.

Junior Bryce Brown finished second in the university division with a time of 49.83 seconds. Brown finished behind defending national champion Jeshua Anderson from Washington State by 0.06 seconds.

Senior Zach Plinario, an All American in the men's 4x400m relay team in the 2010 indoor national championships, also made the finals and finished seventh. Winning the 400m hurdles in the invitational division was sophomore Jamele Mason.

Sophomore runner Terra Evans was competing at her first Texas Relays and said she liked the amount of competition she saw and it was good to see that early on in the season.


Next up for the Red Raiders is the Texas Tech Invitational on Saturday.

# US plans broader nuclear arms talks with Russians

Obama administration is poised to adopt a new policy potentially restricting the nation's use of nuclear arms, U.S. officials said, and hopes to persuade Russia to agree to mutual cuts in nuclear arsenals that go beyond the arms treaty both sides will sign this week.

A policy review, expected to be released Tuesday, is likely to include language reducing U.S. reliance on nuclear weapons for its national defense. That reflects President Barack Obama's pledge to move toward a nuclear free world, and could strengthen U.S. arguments that other countries should either reduce stockpiles of nuclear weapons or forego developing them.

The White House also planned

WASHINGTON (AP) — The to urge Russia to adopt first-ever respond to nuclear attack. That weapons play a key role in Russia's limits on shorter-range, less powerful nuclear weapons, an arena in which Russia holds an advantage, said officials who spoke on condition of anonymity because the policy review has not been released.

These officials said the administration's new policy would stop short of renouncing the use of nuclear weapons except in retaliation to atomic attack, as some activists have advocated. But it would describe the weapons' purpose as "primarily" or "fundamentally" to deter or respond to a nuclear

Officials said the document was expected to move toward a policy that says the "sole purpose" of nuclear weapons is to deter or

wording would rule out the use of such weapons to respond to an attack by conventional, biological or chemical weapons. Previous U.S. policy was more ambiguous.

The Obama administration plans to urge Russia to return to the bargaining table following Senate ratification of the new START arms reduction treaty, to be signed by Obama and Russian President Dmitry Medvedev in Prague on Thursday.

The White House hopes to overcome Russia's expressed reluctance to move beyond START, especially if it means cutting Moscow's arsenal of tactical, or short-range nuclear

These so-called theater nuclear


overall defense strategy and are regarded in Moscow as an important bargaining chip on security issues.

The timing of a planned U.S. push for new, broader arms talks with Russia is uncertain. But officials said the proposal would only come after U.S. and Russian legislative approval of the new START pact, which isn't expected until the end of this year.

The Russian parliament is almost certain to sign off on any deal negotiated by the Kremlin, but the U.S. Senate's ratification of the new START treaty is far from a sure thing.

Obama is hosting dozens of world leaders in a nuclear security summit in Washington next week.



# In social dealings, being older is being wiser

WASHINGTON (AP) — It turns out grandma was right: Listen to your elders. New research indicates they are indeed wise — in knowing how to deal with conflicts and accepting life's uncertainties and change.

It isn't a question of how many facts someone knows, or being able to operate a TV remote, but rather how to handle disagreements — social wisdom.

And researchers led by Richard E. Nisbett of the University of Michigan found that older people were more likely than younger or middle-aged ones to recognize that values differ, to acknowledge uncertainties, to accept acknowledge others' points of view.

"Age effects on wisdom hold at every level of social class, education, and IQ," they report in Tuesday's edition of Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

In modern America, older people generally don't have greater knowledge about computers and other technology, Nisbett acknowledged, "but our results do indicate that the elderly have some advantages for analysis of social

"I hope our results will encourage people to assume that older people may have something to contribute

that things change over time and to for thinking about social problems," Nisbett said.

> In one part of the study the researchers recruited 247 people in Michigan, divided into groups aged 25-to-40, 41-to-59 and 60 plus.

> Participants were given fictitious reports about conflict between groups in a foreign country and asked what they thought the outcome would be.

For example, one of the reports said that because of the economic growth of Tajikistan, many people from Kyrgyzstan moved to that country. While Kyrgyz people tried to preserve their customs, Tajiks wanted them to assimilate fully and abandon their customs.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) -A teenage girl who converted to Christianity and ran away from home is being blocked by her Muslim parents from fighting the possibility of deportation, her attorney told a judge Monday in an ongoing custody

Rifqa Bary, 17, who fled home last year and stayed with a Florida minister whom she met on Facebook, is an illegal immigrant and does not want to be returned to her native Sri Lanka because she fears being harmed or killed by Muslim extremists.

Her attorney, Angela Lloyd, asked a judge to sign an order stating that reunification with her parents is not possible by her 18th birthday in August.



# Apple sells more than 300,000 iPads

SEATTLE (AP) — Apple Inc. said Monday that it delivered more than 300,000 iPads on its opening day, meeting expectations of some analysts while underscoring the challenges the company still faces marketing the device beyond early adopters.

The total seemed modest given the weeks of hype about the revolutionary nature of Apple's new touch-screen tablet device. Furthermore, the figures included pre-orders that were picked up or delivered Saturday and iPads sent to retail stores such as Best Buy but not necessarily purchased. Apple did not say how many went to such stores.

Assuming most of the 300,000 iPads ended up in the hands of consumers Saturday, though, the figure is in line with the number of iPhones that Apple sold when the smart phone made its debut in June 2007. Apple didn't launched, it was also somewhat of a sales to top \$20 billion this year, eight

publicize first-day sales at the time, disappointment," Wu wrote. "But as times his forecast of \$2.5 billion for but later earnings reports indicated the company sold about 270,000 iPhones during the first two days the gadget was available.

Apple sold 1.1 million more iPhones over the next three months. The volume has only increased as Apple has released new versions of the phone in a growing number of countries and software developers have created add-on programs, or "apps," that do everything from online banking to mapping bike rides using GPS. In the most recent quarter, Apple sold 8.7 million iPhones.

Kaufman Bros. analyst Shaw Wu wrote in a note to investors Monday that he believes a similar pattern will

unfold for the iPad. "When the iPhone was first the iPhone got more refined, with more apps, better software, not to mention better prices," then sales picked up.

Wu had estimated the iPad's sales at 250,000 to 300,000 for the weekend. In the research note, the analyst wrote that manufacturers said Apple was telling them to get ready to ship 10 million iPads in the first 12 months, twice as many as previously expected.

With the iPad in its early days, the iPhone will continue as Apple's star product this year, Broadpoint Amtech analyst Brian Marshall said in a note to investors Monday. Marshall had predicted Apple would sell 525,000 iPads over the Easter weekend, despite some stores being closed for the holiday.

The iPad is "off to a fantastic start," he wrote, but he still expects iPhone the iPad.

The same hoopla that drew eager shoppers to long lines outside of Apple stores swept away a few analysts, too. Piper Jaffray analyst Gene Munster published a research note early Monday boosting his initial forecast for firstday sales to 600,000 to 700,000 — only to quickly follow with a second note admitting he'd jumped the gun.

"We were overly optimistic," he wrote. Munster's original forecast was for 200,000 to 300,000 iPads to be sold on Saturday.

However, Munster wrote that he still expects Apple to sell 1.3 million iPads in the current quarter.

Apple devotees were willing to queue up across the country to be among the first to own an iPad, even if they weren't exactly sure what they'd

# Judge settles key issues in Hopper divorce case

## Paper's April Fool's UFOs spark panic

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — A Jordanian newspaper's April Fool's Day report chronicling a late-night visit by 10-foot-tall aliens in flying saucers sparked public panic and almost led to the town's emergency evacuation, officials said Monday.

The Al Ghad newspaper published a front-page article April 1 about the fake UFO landing near the desert town of Jafr, some 185 miles (300 kilometers) from the capital, Amman. The report said the UFOs lit up the whole town, interrupted communications and sent fearful residents streaming into the streets.

Jafr's mayor, Mohammed Mleihan, got caught up in the paper's prank and said he sent security authorities in search of the aliens.

"Students didn't go to school, their parents were frightened and I almost evacuated the town's 13,000 residents," Mleihan told The Associated Press. "People were scared that aliens would attack them."

A Jordanian security official, speaking on condition of anonymity in order to discuss security issues, said an emergency plan was almost enacted in Jafr.

Mleihan said he may sue the daily for its "big lie," but added that the paper had called to apologize for the inconvenience caused by the joke.

Al Ghad's managing editor, Moussa Barhoumeh, tried to defuse the situation, saying the report has been "blown out of

"We meant to entertain, not scare people," he said.



By the time August gets here, senior quarterbacks Taylor Potts and Steven Sheffield will start fresh, like it's the first day of spring.

It's already been announced that Sheffield will miss the rest of spring practice after re-injuring his left foot in practice March 29. On top of that, Potts suffered a cut on his right hand Wednesday after hitting his hand on another player's helmet.

But Potts' cut turned out to be a little deeper.

right hand operated on today to re-attach ligaments that may be loose or completely detached. Tuberville said Potts will miss about eight weeks, about the same time Sheffield is expected to be out.

"They don't want to take any chances so they'll operate on him (today) and he'll have the bandages

up for at least three or four weeks, but won't be able to throw for eight weeks," Tuberville said of doctors' evaluation after practice Monday. "So that's going to set him back a little bit.

"I thought Potts was going to get a little bit of edge on Sheffield. It didn't take long for him to even up with him."

Tuberville said the two quarterbacks lack of conditioning time through their injuries is what is most unfortunate. Potts was at practice Monday, wearing a bandage on his right hand, but still around his fellow quarterbacks.



It finally happened when No. 13 Tech (17-2, 0-1 in Big 12) fell to No. 5 Texas (19-2, 3-0) on Saturday at the McLeod Tennis Center in a close one, 4-3. The loss snaps Tech's 15-match winning streak.

"Well this one stings — it's a tough one, because we were so close we had so many opportunities," Tech coach Tim Siegel said. "Overall I'm really proud of our team, we fed off the tremendous crowd. I can't say enough. We took the No. 5 team to the very end and we've had some go our way. We finally had one that went against us."

The Red Raiders' struggles in doubles play continued as Tech only won one of the three doubles matches. This is the second match in a row Tech has lost the doubles point to begin the match.

In the No. 1 and No. 2 spots the Red Raiders dropped both of the matches 8-5. Tech's only unranked doubles team came through when freshman Vitor Manzini and junior David Gonzalez defeated Texas' No. 56 doubles pair Daniel Whitehead and Jean Anderson 9-8.

Texas had taken the early lead, but in singles, fans saw two Top-10 singles players face off. No. 6 sophomore Raony Carvalho faced No. 10 Dimitar Kutrovsky, both of whom have earned the Big 12 Player of the Week honors already this season. This match did not live up to its hype as Kutrovsky defeated Carvalho in straight-sets 6-4, 6-0.

No. 72 sophomore Gonzalo Escobar cut into the Texas lead with his victory against No. 18 Ed Corrie in straight sets 6-3, 6-4. Then in the No. 3 spot sophomore Rafael Garcia came back to get the win against No. 82 Kellen Damico 3-6, 6-3, 6-3.

But Tech fell in the No. 4 and No. 5 spots to give the Longhorns the vic-

"I think we are as good or better than them," Garcia said. "Today they did better than we did, but again we didn't play our best in doubles and that's something that has been helping us so much."






