Hance said the Quality Service Awards, which for 14 years have recognized "outstanding service," serve the purpose of heightening the morale of the entire Tech staff.

Kerry Billingsley, managing director of Quality Service and Professional Development, said the ceremony is intended to recognize and reward individual and team efforts by supporting Tech's SERVICEplus philosophy — Tech's full-time dedication to providing quality service

in a caring and friendly environment.

To be nominated for an award, she said, an individual must meet certain employment qualifications at Tech.

If those qualifications are met, Billingsley said, a committee - called the Selection Committee — judges all nominees based on two criteria: Customer Focus and Going the Extra Mile.

The top-ranked nominee, she said, is usually awarded the Chancellor's Award of Excel-

Dan Burns, associate director of the United Spirit Arena, received the award this year and said he was proud to accept it on behalf of the entire staff of the United Spirit Arena.

Tech to impound illegally parked bicycles

The Texas Tech Bicycle Coordinating Committee will begin to impound bicycles illegally parked on campus as the semester draws to a close.

Craig Cotton, supervisor of Transportation Demand, said in the past the department has not done much with the bicycles that are illegally parked. Now that bikes on campus are of interest to students, a rule has been implemented so bicycles not chained to a rack will be cut loose, he said.

"We formed the Bicycle Coordinating Committee to have a central decisionmaking group on what to do with bikes on campus," Cotton said. "We have a couple

of students on the committee, SGA, university police, faculty and staff members on the committee, and they have all come up with a new bike rack design to where you don't have to pick your bike up and put it over the rack like you presently do."

The first 25 units of the new bicycle rack design, designed by Cotton and the Grounds Maintenance Department, are in production, Cotton said.

Dee Jay Wilde, a senior agricultural and applied economics major from Wall, said the committee comes together to decide what the campus bicycle plan should be, including what priorities to put first with the funding available.

"Anything we do, we want to make it safe for students," said Wilde, a member of the committee. "Next come bike racks

and shared bike paths."

Cotton said students will be fined a \$40 impound fee and a \$10 ticket that goes along with cutting the bikes off; those rules always have been in place but haven't been enforced.

The impounding of bicycles illegally parked will better serve visually disabled students on campus, Cotton said.

"(The Americans with Disabilities Act) requires all buildings to allow access to any disabled person," he said. "There is the risk of being in compliance with ADA laws."

In addition to helping disabled students, the enforcing bicycle parking rules helps the grounds department as well.

Ukraine to give up nuke material; boost for summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama optimistically opened a 47-nation nuclear summit Monday, boosted by Ukraine's announcement that it will give up its weapons-grade uranium. More sobering: The White House counterterror chief warned that al-Qaida is vigorously pursuing ingredients and expertise for a bomb.

At the same time, Obama and Chinese President Hu Jintao sought agreement on potential sanctions to discourage Iran's efforts to come up with its own nuclear weapon.

Ukraine's decision dovetailed with Obama's goal of securing all vulnerable nuclear materials

worldwide within four years — an objective that the White House hopes will be endorsed by all summit countries at a closing session Tuesday, even if the means to accomplish it are unclear. The fear is that terrorists or a nation other than the major nuclear powers could obtain crucial ingredients and inflict horrendous damage.


Before formally opening the summit with a reception and working dinner, Obama held a series of one-on-one meetings with leaders from China, Jordan, Ukraine, Armenia and Malaysia. Presidential aides billed the summit as the largest gathering of world leaders hosted by an American president since the 1945 conference in San Francisco that founded the United Nations.

In a brief exchange with reporters at the White House, Obama said of the summit: "It's impressive. I think it's an indication of how deeply concerned everybody should be with the possibilities of nuclear traffic, and I think at the end of this we're going to see some very specific, concrete actions that each nation is taking that will make the world a little bit safer."

The talks are a centerpiece of Obama's broader agenda for ridding the world of nuclear weapons, a long-term process that he says should include gradual disarmament by the nuclear powers, stronger steps to head off a nuclear arms race and more urgent action to lock down tons of plutonium and highly enriched uranium that are the key building blocks of atomic weapons.

Judge Sidney Thomas on Supreme Court list

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama's candidates for the Supreme Court include a new name, federal appeals court Judge Sidney Thomas of Montana, and at least six others who were contenders when Obama chose his first high court nominee last year, The Associated Press has learned.

Among the others under con-Chief Justice Leah Ward Sears, federal appeals court judges Diane Wood and Merrick Garland, Solicitor General Elena Kagan, Michigan Gov. Jennifer Granholm and Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano.

The president is seriously reviewing about 10 people as a potential nominee to replace Justice John Paul Stevens, who is retiring

Seven of those names are now confirmed to the AP by the administration.

Landslide derails train in northern Italy, 9 dead

ROME (AP) — A mass of mud and water slammed into a small commuter train traveling in the Italian Alps Monday, knocking the front car into a ditch and killing nine people aboard, officials said.

A Bolzano province official, Francesca De Carlini, said the two-car train, filled with local commuters and students, was passing by at the exact moment that a large irrigation pipe on investigation into the cause, but the higher elevation burst.

"A mass of mud and water knocked down the first car into the ditch," she said. "All of the dead were in the first car, which was pulled down into the ditch," De Carlini said by telephone.

She discounted earlier media re-



MTV-featured musician performs at SUB

When Zack Nichols was a young boy, his dad handed him a guitar. He hasn't put it down since.

Nichols performed at the Student Union Building courtyard Monday afternoon as a part of TAB's daytime events. Nichols is an acoustic performer from Los Angeles. His song "Dust in June" was featured on MTV's "The Real World."

Erin Rinderknecht, TAB's daytime coordinator and a sophomore communication disorders major from Taylor, said they saw Nichols at a convention and decided he would be a good performer to have come to campus.

"(Nichols) was at the National Association of Campus Activities convention in Arlington, and we really liked his sound," she said. "So, the daytime committee voted on having him, and we all thought it would be a good idea."

Nichols performed from noon to 1 p.m., which is usually a peak class time for students, but Rinderknecht said the turnout was small considering

the time frame.

"We really just wanted the students to have someone here during the lunch hour," she said. "It's for them to be able to enjoy the music and relax on their way to, or in between classes."

Nichols, who had never been to Lubbock before, said his visit to Tech turned into a mini-tour. He is off to San Antonio to play at UTSA on Tuesday. Nichols recently changed up his venues. He performed primarily on the club and bar scene, and he has now decided to play primarily on college campuses.

"When you play at a bar, the meaning of your music can sometimes get lost because of the environment," he said. "But playing for students, they seem to appreciate it more, and the show comes across better."

Nichols said he got into music

After working for eight months, Texas Tech's Ad Team will head to Amarillo on Wednesday to compete at the National Student Advertising Competition' district level.

Each year, more than 150 collegiate teams compete in NSAC.

Shannon Bichard, Ad Team's adviser, said District 10, the district in which Tech will compete, was so large this year it was broken up into two smaller districts. Tech will compete against six other college teams from around Texas and Oklahoma.

The first-place team in each district will compete at nationals in Orlando from June 10 to June 12. Last year, Tech's Ad Team advanced to nationals in Washington, D.C., where it placed sixth overall.

This year, every team was given a case study in September that included information about the client, State Farm Insurance, a mock budget

advertising campaign — to increase auto insurance in the target market of people ages 18 to 25.







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Pujols powers Cardinals past Astros at home

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Albert Pujols homered and drove in four runs, leading Adam Wainwright and the St. Louis Cardinals over winless Houston 5-0 Monday in their home opener and dropping the Astros to 0-7.

New batting coach Mark McGwire drew one of the biggest cheers during the home game since retiring after the 2001 season. The Cardinals have scored five or more runs in all but one of their first

Pujols hit an RBI single and a threerun homer and Ryan Ludwick went 4 for 4. Wainwright (2-0) pitched eight scoreless innings and added his first career pickoff.

The Astros are off to their worst since opening 0-9 in 1983. They've been shut out three times while facing pregame introductions before his first a string of aces — Tim Lincecum, Matt Cain, Roy Halladay and Wainwright already — and have scored a major league-low 13 runs.

Pujols got more than even with

Wandy Rodriguez (0-2), one of the few pitchers who had given him fits. The three-time NL MVP got hits in his first-two at-bats against the Houston left-hander, and walked in the fifth to load the bases.

Pujols entered just 5 for 31 with no homers and only one RBI against Rodriguez, his most anemic numbers against a left-hander with a minimum of 20 at-bats.

The Cardinals certainly got a boost from the pregame pomp of the traditional introductory motorcade, including an appearance by 89-year-old Hall of Famer Stan Musial and a crowd of 46,918 largest at 5-year-old Busch Stadium.

Pujols is .438 (12 for 32) with three homers and 14 RBIs in 10 home openers.

Ludwick added an RBI triple in the seventh when the ball dislodged from center fielder Michael Bourn's glove when he slammed into the wall. That was plenty for Wainwright, who gave up six hits and struck out seven.



Roethlisberger happy to move forward

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback Ben Roethlisberger is "happy" to put sexual assault allegations in Georgia behind him and knows he must work to regain the trust of his teammates and the team's large fan base.


Roethlisberger, reading a statement for 74 seconds on Monday night but not taking questions from reporters, said Georgia prosecutors reached the right conclusion by deciding not to charge him in the case.

"I'd like to begin by expressing gratitude to the thorough investigation process in Georgia," Roethlisberger said. "The prosecutor's decision not to bring charges, I know without a doubt, is the right conclusion. I don't intend to discuss any details related to the events of Georgia. I'm happy to put this behind me and move forward."

The two-time Super Bowl winner plans to resume working out shortly with his teammates, but did not say when. Roethlisberger, wearing a red sports shirt and light-colored slacks, made his comments from a podium in the Steelers' locker room, not far from his own locker.

"I am excited to get back to work with my teammates, and I'm more determined than ever to have a great season," he said.

Roethlisberger did not discuss his upcoming meeting with NFL commissioner Roger Goodell or any possible punishment that might be brought against him by the league or the team for violating the players' conduct code. Roethlisberger also is contesting a civil suit in Nevada brought by a woman who is accusing him of assaulting her in a Lake Tahoe hotel in 2008.



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
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Solid return, uncertain future for Woods Lady Raiders gaining

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
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
