The Texas Tech Police Department documented the discovery of hate group fliers from the Ku Klux Klan on April 12 in the C-12 parking lot, and a member of the Lubbock KKK confirmed the fliers are not a prank.

Sgt. Bill Casey, with the Lubbock Police Department in the neighborhood service unit, said at first he thought the flier might be a prank.

"I've been a policeman over here for 30 years, and I've never seen any type of Ku Klux Klan activity," he said. "Not to say they're not here, but they've never come out and pushed things. We know that they exist in certain parts of Texas."

prank. The Imperial Kleagle for the Traditional **Christian Knights** of the Ku Klux Klan, who lives in Lubbock, goes by the alias "Cowboy Outlaw" for security reasons.

Klan four years ago and was the first KKK member in Lubbock at that time, but the Klan has since grown through recruitment.

As the Imperial Kleagle, he said he is the head recruiter of the Traditional Christian Knights for the whole United States.

Cowboy said he was involved with another white supremacist group from 1989 until 2004, when he left that organization to join the Traditional Christian Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

"I left them because of the nature of the offenses that they do," he said. "They're not very Christian, let's put it that way.'

He said he joined the Ku Klux Klan because it is a Christian organization.



#### Israel halts east Jerusalem building

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel's prime Joe Biden last month. minister has effectively frozen new Jewish construction in east Jerusalem, municipal officials said Monday, reflecting the need to mend a serious rift with the U.S. and get Mideast peace talks back on track.

The move comes despite Benjamin Netanyahu's repeated assertion he would never halt construction in east Jerusalem and risks angering hard-liners in his government. One lawmaker from Netanyahu's Likud Party warned the governing coalition could collapse over the issue.

Still, the de facto freeze appeared to offer the promise of reviving peace efforts derailed after Israel announced plans for a major Jewish housing development during a visit by Vice President Obama's envoy as go-between.

That set off the worst diplomatic dispute between the U.S. and Israel in decades — and prompted the Palestinians to call off a new round of U.S.-brokered peace talks.

The quiet halting of east Jerusalem housing approvals coincides with signs that those talks are now about to start - and could help explain recent U.S. statements stressing America's close ties to Israel

Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas signaled Monday he was ready to start indirect talks with Israel after weeks of hesitation. Washington has stepped up efforts in recent days to coax Abbas to agree to the talks, with President Barack

Kristin Clarke, a Tech graduate from Arlington, was in Reifman's class for the study.

She said in a research methods class, it's easier to take things hands on and many students took advantage of that opportunity.

'We asked them questions that we would think is basic information, but they are really private things for some people, especially people that are in this situation," Clarke said. "They don't want you to know about these things in their lives. It's a touchy thing; you have to be really careful."

Solis-Jackson said the Tech students didn't understand how the people receiving help from the food bank were unable to buy something as essential as food.

The study found 52 percent of the people interviewed in the South Plains area had to choose between buying food or medicine.

"It opened the students' eyes tremendously for them to talk to these clients," Solis-Jackson said. 'They start appreciating what they have and how easy their lives are. The study was a good thing for them and a good thing for us because we are able to figure out how hungry Lubbock is."

Clarke said the study helped her better appreciate the things she has.

"We all have problems, but some of the things that we live with are nothing compared to the real life situations that we haven't been exposed to," she said. »»katherine.rowe@ttu.edu

"No one joins the Ku Klux Klan that doesn't hate," he said. "They all hate.

"Basically when you run with the Klan, you're going to pick up their hate and you're going to pick up their violence. And so I warn people to stay away from these organizations."

Ouch said she does not see the Ku Klux Klan as a threat to Tech students or to the Gay-Straight Alliance.

"Their agenda is completely warped," she said. "Their idea of white supremacy is unrealistic, their idea of eliminating all homosexuals is Hilter-like, and their appeal to the public will be minimal at best.

Roethlisberger says he won't appeal suspension

PITTSBURGH (AP) - A chastened Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback Ben Roethlisberger accepted his sixgame suspension for violating the NFL's personal conduct policy Monday and promised to "comply with what is asked of me - and more."

In his first comments since the NFL handed down the penalty last week, Roethlisberger apologized to his teammates and fans for his behavior last month in a Georgia bar, where a 20-year-old college student accused him of sexual assault.
