Local Highway Department Employees Establish 12-Year Safety Record

riod of 12 years without loss of time accident was established last week by the 15-member Hankell County maintenance crew of the Texas Highway Department.

The safety record of the Hankell County highway department crew extends from February. 1945, and during that period as employee of the department has lost as much as one hours time as a result of personal injury while on the job.

Recognition of the outstanding safety record of the Haskell County crew was given by Fred Wright of Abilene, chief district accountant with the Highway Department, and his assistant, J. D. Richardson. They came to Haskell last weekend to person-

sources Committee of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce and a similar group from the Haskell Jaycees were given a report of the recent meeting of the City Council with Stamford officials, Tuesday night at the regular session of the Council.

Mayor J. E. Walling reported that Stamford would sell Haskell water from Lake Stamford at 5 cents per thousand gallons at the

Lenthy discussion failed to develop a definite figure or rate per 1,000 gallons for water from Lake Stamford delivered to Haskell mains. Mayor Walling quoted a tentative estimate of an Abilene engineer of 24.1 cents per 1,000 based on use of 500,000 gallons daily. He explained, however, that this did not include the 5 cents charge by Stamford. An estimate prepared by City Secretary T. J. Arbuckle, indicated a cost of 27 cents per 1,000 delivered to the city's distribution system. It was based on a bond issue of \$550,000 to mature in 30 years at a total cost of \$880,000. Amount necessary to retire bonds and interest would

be \$29,600. The C. of C. committee and citizens group has recommended development of the North Central Texas Water Authority by Haskell and six neighboring towns to secure municipal water. The Fort Worth engineering firm of Freeze & Nichols estimate this project would furnish Haskell filtered water at a cost of 25 cents per 1,000 gallons at the city gates. Increased consumption could lower this rate in time, they estimate.

After hearing the report fre Chapman, chairman of the C. of C. group, told the Council his committee thought the Water Authority plan the best solution to

the problem.

The Jaycee group present also told the Council they were in full accord with the Water Resources Committee and citizens group Gerald Smith, spokesman, pointed out that Haskell should work with the six neighboring towns in a mutual solution of the municipal water problem.






