Study: College students borrowing more for school

60 percent of graduates borrowed money in '08

A recent Pew research study showed the number of students who borrow money for college is on the rise.

The study, released in November,

showed that as of 2008, 60 percent of graduates had borrowed money, and the average loan was about \$23,000. The study compared these results to graduates in 1996, of which 52 percent had borrowed money and loans totaling an average of \$17,000, adjusted to 2008 dollars in terms of

Leann Drauss, the Wells Fargo ambassador to Texas Tech, said she believed one of the main reasons students ended up taking out loans was because of not knowing about costs other than tuition. She said many parents plan for college but do not understand how much living

expenses will be for the student.

She said students and parents could focus more on being fully prepared, and a loan could be a part of the plan from the start.

"Students need to seek out all options," Drauss said. "Look and see which ones will fit you best."

Of the choices, she said private lenders like Wells Fargo were a good choice because they do not sell their loans to other banks. However, Drauss said there are not too many lenders like this, and they require more from the students taking out the loan.




first-person shooter; as well as many others.

Voters who are at least 70 years old and have their voter registration card would be allowed to vote without a photo ID. The state would be required to waive the fee for a personal ID card if applicant say they need it to vote.

The change would cost the state about \$2 million, according to a Senate bill analysis. That money would pay for training for elections officials and public advertising to announce the change.









Suspect pleads not guilty in deadly Ariz. shooting

the shooting of Rep. Gabrielle Giffords smiled and nodded but didn't speak as he appeared in court Monday and his lawyer provided the 22-year-old's first response to the charges: a plea of not guilty.

In the two weeks since the deadly attack that killed six outside a Tucson. Ariz., grocery store, Jared Loughner's hair — shaved in the mug shot that's become an enduring image of the tragedy — has grown out slightly. The Tucson resident wore an orange prison jumpsuit and glasses, and his wrists were cuffed to a chain around his waist as eight U.S. Marshals kept watch in the packed Phoenix courtroom and gallery above.

Loughner faces federal charges of trying to assassinate Giffords and kill two of her aides. More charges are

Investigators have said Loughner

PHOENIX (AP) — The suspect in was mentally disturbed and acting increasingly erratic in the weeks leading up to the Jan. 8 attack that wounded 13. If Loughner's attorney uses mental competency questions as a defense and is successful, Loughner could be sent to a mental health facility instead of being sentenced to prison or death.

> But his attorney, Judy Clarke, said she wasn't raising issues of competency "at this time" after U.S. District Judge Larry Burns of San Diego asked whether there was any question about her client's ability to understand the case

Giffords was shot in the forehead and spent two weeks in a Tucson hospital before she was flown to Memorial Hermann Texas Medical Center Hospital on Friday. Shortly after her arrival, doctors said she had been given a tube to drain a buildup of brain fluid that has kept her in intensive care.

Hospital spokesman James Camp-

bell said Monday the next update on the Democratic congresswoman's condition would come when they are ready to move Giffords to the rehab hospital.

Loughner likely will face state charges in the attack, and also federal murder charges listed in an earlier criminal complaint for the deaths of Giffords aide Gabe Zimmerman and U.S. District Judge John Roll.

Those are potential death penalty charges, which require a more painstaking process under Justice Department

Prosecutor Wallace Kleindienst estimated that he would know within the next 30 days whether additional federal charges would be filed against Loughner. Kleindienst said prosecutors provided defense lawyers with records taken from Loughner's computer and documents of about 250 interviews made in the case.

The judge did not rule on prosecu-

tors' request to move the federal case back to Tucson so that victims and witnesses do not have to make the four-hour round trip drive to Phoenix to attend court hearings. The case was moved because one of those killed, Roll, was a federal judge.

Clarke said she didn't oppose the request at this time, but questioned where Loughner would be jailed in Tucson if the case were moved.

Clarke has not responded to requests seeking comment. She is one of the top lawyers in the country for defendants facing prominent death penalty cases, having represented clients such "Unabomber" Ted Kaczynski and Olympic bomber Eric Rudolph. She has a reputation for working out plea deals that spare defendants the death penalty, as was the case for Rudolph and Kaczynski.

The judge set a March 9 hearing to consider motions in Loughner's case.

Clinton supports Mexico in 'messy' war on drugs

GUANAJUATO, Mexico (AP) — U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton urged Mexico to stay the course in an admittedly "messy" war against drug cartels, saying Monday that the Obama administration will help with new controls on the flow of American guns across the border.

Clinton gave strong support for Mexican President Felipe Calderon's battle against the country's entrenched drug trafficking organizations. And she offered continued U.S. assistance from policing to improving Mexico's judicial

More than 34,600 people have died in drug-related killings in Mexico in the four years since Calderon launched the offensive against the cartels. The death toll spiked 60 per-

cent last year. Mayors, po-

lice commanders, judges and journalists have been gunned down. Civilians are increasingly being killed and numerous areas remain lawless. The war has only mixed support. Clinton said

there was no alternative to confronting the cartels

"It is messy. It causes lots of terrible things to be on the news," Clinton said after meeting Mexican Foreign Minister Patricia Espinosa in the postcard-perfect central Mexican city of Guanajuato. "The drug traffickers are not going

to give up without a terrible fight. And they do things that are just barbaric like beheading people," added Clinton, who was to meet later Monday with Calderon in Mexico City. "It is meant to intimidate. It is meant to have the public say, 'Just leave them alone and they won't bother me.' But a president cannot do that."

With its cobblestone streets and colonial churches, the setting for Clinton's meeting with Espinoza contrasted sharply with the drug war raging in other parts of the country, particularly along the U.S.-Mexican border and western coast.

The U.S. has provided hundreds of millions of dollars in support and will deliver another half-billion in equipment and training this year. It has helped train thousands of policemen and sent helicopters and other crime-fighting technology.

Clinton has been frank about the shared American responsibility for the drug problem. Stubbornly high U.S. demand drives the trade, and firearms smuggled from the United States are involved in much of the violence, an issue reinforced by a small group of protesters who greeted Clinton's arrival with chants and signs saying "No more U.S. guns."

Toeing a sensitive line meant to address Mexico's concerns while avoiding a fight with firearms supporters in the

> United States, Clinton said the administration "was committed to doing what could be done" to require dealers near the Mexican border to report multiple purchases of high-powered rifles, which have become the weapon of choice for cartels.

The Bureau

of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives asked the White House for the requirement last month, and the move is likely to face stiff opposition from gun rights advocates. Clinton said the bureau should have "additional tools" shortly, but said officials were working to ensure that any regulation "isn't challenged and it is sustainable."

Few hold out hope that the Mexican government can rout the cartels quickly. It faces numerous challenges from sentencing criminals to stamping out corruption in its police ranks.

Clinton previously has compared the fight to Colombia's decades-long battle against drug gangs and compared Mexico's criminal groups to "insurgencies." Harsher critics even have described the country as in some ways resembling a failed state — an assessment that causes Mexican officials to bristle.

520-day flight simulation nears 'landing' on Mars

MOSCOW (AP) — After 233 days in a locked steel capsule, six researchers on a 520-day mock flight to Mars are all feeling strong and ready to "land" on the Red Planet,

the mission director said Friday. The all-male crew of three Russians, a Chinese, a Frenchman and an Italian-Colombian has been inside windowless capsules at a Moscow research center since June. Their mission aims to help real space crews in the future cope with the confinement and stress of interplanetary travel.

The researchers communicate with the outside world via emails and video messages — occasionally delayed to give them the feel of being farther than a few yards (meters) away from mission control. The crew members eat canned food similar to that eaten on the International Space Station and shower only once

None of the men has considered abandoning the mission, although they are free to walk out at any time, mission director and former cosmonaut Boris Morukov told reporters on Friday.

"They are still motivated, but there is a certain fatigue, which is natural," he said.

The six men are due to "land" on Mars on Feb. 12 and spend two days researching the planet. They then begin the monthslong return flight to Earth, expected to be the most

challenging part of the mission. "It will be very tough on the boys because of the monotony," Morukov said. "The fatigue and the thought that the mission is over can be fraught with negative consequences."

The Mars-500 experiment is being conducted by the Moscow-based Institute for Medical and Biological Problems, the European Space Agency and China's space training center.

In an effort to reproduce the conditions of space travel, with exception of weightlessness, the crew has living quarters the size of a bus connected with several other modules for experiments and exercise. A separate built-in imitator of the Red Planet's surface is attached for the mock landing.

National Archives: historian tampered with Lincoln pardon

National Archives says a longtime Abraham Lincoln researcher has been caught telling a big lie about Honest Abe.

The Archives said Monday that historian Thomas P. Lowry, 78, of Woodbridge, has acknowledged that he used a fountain pen with special ink to change the date on a presidential pardon issued by Lincoln to a military deserter, making it appear that Lowry had uncovered a document of historical significance.

Specifically, Lowry changed the date of the pardon from April 14, 1864 to April 14, 1865. The Archive said the change made it look as if Lowry had discovered a document that was perhaps Lincoln's final official act before he was assassinated that evening at Ford's Theatre.


Lowry's purported discovery was hailed by historians when he came forward in 1998. At the time, a

McLEAN, Va. (AP) — The Civil War expert with the Archives said Lowry had made "a unique and substantial contribution to Lincoln research and to the study of the Civil

> The National Archives gave the document prominent display, putting it on tour along with other important Lincoln documents.

> But for several years, archivist Thomas Plante had been troubled by the document. The '5' appeared to be darker than the rest of the document and was perhaps covering another number. Plante then checked the document against an authoritative collection of Lincoln's writings, which showed the pardon of a Union Army deserter named Patrick Murphy had occurred in 1864. At that point, Plante took his concerns to the Archives' Office of Inspector General, where an investigator shared Plante's

The Archives said it then contacted Lowry to try and determine what happened.

Beck should accept Stewart's invitation to 'The Daily Show'

Tt's no secret that two of my favorite things to do are to watch "The Daily Show with Jon Stewart" and to make conservative radio and television personalities look like idiots. But if there was anything I liked more than that, it would have to be watching Stewart make conservative media icons look like idiots.

So you can imagine my amusement when Stewart openly challenged Glenn Beck, one of the most well-known television and radio hosts on Fox News, to be a guest on his show the day after Stewart invited Tea Party icon Sarah Palin to appear on "The Daily Show."

He even attempted to sweeten the deal by offering Mr. Beck a five-pronged chalk holder, saying, "Imagine: You could get five people connected to George Soros!" a reference to Glenn Beck's obsession with the "puppet master" billionaire's "attempt to take over the world."

This was a response to Beck mentioning Stewart in an interview on "The Today Show" regarding Beck's new book "The 7: Seven Wonders That Will Change Your Life." Beck was promoting his book, which he referred to as "defeat anger and find compassion," when "The Today Show" host Meredith Vieira asked about the angry and violent tone Beck uses on his show.

She also asked whether he regretted saying that he was going to "poison Nancy Pelosi and beat [Democratic] Congressman Charlie Rangel to death with a shovel." In the spirit of his new book, Beck replied to Vieira's question by saying, "Anything that I said in jokes, no. Ask Jon Stewart; ask the Simpsons."

After brainstorming several humorous titles for the new segment, including "Come on Jon Stewart" and "Drop a Load on Jon Stewart," Stewart finally settled on "Two Established Television Personalities Penetrate Each Other While People Watch." The invitation even sparked a sizable response on Facebook, with several pages in support of Beck appearing on the show.

Now, the chances that Beck will actually take Stewart up on his offer



are, frankly, slim to none. There is no way that Beck will make like fellow Fox News pundit Bill O'Reilly and appear on television with any of his detractors, especially Jon Stewart.

This only goes to further show that Beck has absolutely no credibility as a radio/television host. In an interview he did with CBS host Katie Couric on Sept. 28, 2009, he could not explain one of his own unfounded and outlandish remarks about Pres. Barack Obama having "a deep-seated hatred of white culture." When asked about what he meant by "white culture," he simply said, "Uh ... I don't know."

Honestly, with a response like that, I can't say I'm surprised Beck is unwilling to appear on "The Daily Show." Jon Stewart would make him look like an even bigger fool than he does by himself. How Beck has as big and loyal a following as he does is a complete mystery to me. Even Bill O'Reilly helped Stewart make fun of Glenn Beck in an interview on the show on Sept. 27, 2010.

So it finally seems that in the long run, Beck's shock-jock tactics have ultimately worked against him. His repeated behavior of making outlandish and unfounded claims has, in the end, made him look like the complete fool he is.

I think when it's all said and done, there is really one reason why he should accept Stewart's invitation: So that his true incompetence can be fully exposed to 1.5 million nightly viewers, even if it is on Comedy Central. However, only time will tell if the hero of so many misinformed conservatives will be man enough to accept Stewart's

lassified reports from our embassies are the oil of U.S. diplomacy, enabling our government to make informed decisions on events around the world. Beyond that, some of the most heinous regimes in the worldsuch as Robert Mugabe's in Zimbabwe-are using the information gleaned from WikiLeaks to discredit potential opposition figures. (Mugabe's governmentcontrolled media is highlighting certain character flaws in his main rival, Morgan Tsvangarai, which were discussed in some of the classified reporting.) So that is ethics issue No. 1.

The second ethical aspect concerns those who have made the information available outside classified channels. Motivation for an action is impossible to know for sure aside from the person involved. But even if the motivation of the soldier alleged

to have downloaded the 250,000 cables was the purest, transcending, narrow national interests to some higher calling, he broke his oath. Every member of the military, prior to starting duty, takes the following oath (and they know they will be taking this when they first sign on):

"I, ____, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; and that I will obey the orders of the president of the United States and the orders of the officers appointed over me, according to regulations and the Uniform Code of Military Justice. So help me God."

I know from my own familiarity with U.S. government regulations that downloading classified information and then disclosing it in an unauthorized manner breaks that oath—and that is unethical.

As far as WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange is concerned, the law is murkier concerning receiving classified information, and, since he is Australian and physically outside the U.S., there is a question as to what government may have jurisdiction.

Even if Assange personally detests the U.S., there is still an ethical issue about publicizing information that could potentially bring great harm to those who believed that their conversations would remain secure. How would you weigh the benefits of "transparency" against the real harm to real people that will result when classified information is released?

I have to confess that I'm closely following the documents that are being released to see whether any I wrote show up; at least I will know which of my writings ends up in the public domain and who could end up greatly upset by them.

I also have a certain satisfaction that the American public is learning that diplomats do more than attend fancy cocktail parties and drink Champagne, and that our analysis and forecasting tends to be right on, providing our top government officials with the information that they need to lead our country in an ever more dangerous world.

The infamous hacker George Hotz, a.k.a. "Geohot," has been sued by Sony of America for publishing tools and information which can be utilized to "jailbreak" (override the software limitations of) the PlayStation 3 video game console. Sony alleges that Hotz' tools, by enabling gamers to play illegally copied games, encourage copyright infringement in violation of the Digital Millennium Copyright Act. Hotz' case reflects a very hotly debated question in the courts today: Who really owns a PS3? The after-market modifi-

cation of electronic devices is not new to Sony or other electronic device manufacturers. Sony first experienced console modification with the original PlayStation, as some gamers would modify the console's hardware in order to play illegally copied games burned on rewritable CDs. Not long after, Microsoft's Xbox console became a popular target of modification due to a game save vulnerability which allowed gamers to pirate and modify games. Today, virtually every company creating electronic devices has to worry about some form of end-user modification: Hotz is also responsible for "jailbreaking" Apple's iPhone, which allows the phone to use different cell phone networks and Appleprohibited applications. 17 United States Code

The Library of Congress provided an exemption to this statute for hackers like Hotz in 2010, after Apple sought to sue those who "jailbroke" their iPhones. Companies like Sony would argue that parts of the device — the built-in limitations and code in particular — are still the property of the manufacturer and are thus illegal to tamper with. As such, the consumer is more like a licensee, who may enjoy a device only in the manner prescribed by the manufacturer.

cases, modified devices can have a detrimental effect on the quality of provided services. "Jailbroken" iPhones enable network tools that have the potential to heavily tax AT&T networks, seriously harming other consumers' iPhone capabilities. Modifications to the Xbox allowed gamers to easily cheat at popular online games, harming legitimate online com-The difference in these "scopes petition. Theoretically, some of ownership" means quite a bit form of post-purchase control is necessary to ensure all consumers can enjoy their products as originally developed — the debate, of course, is over how much control is really necessary.

> So who really owns a PS3 or other privately purchased electronic devices? That question may soon be answered by the courts. A remarkably similar World of Warcraft-related tampering case may be appealed all the way to the Supreme Court, as federal courts currently disagree regarding whether or not a copyright owner can sue when a consumer circumvents copyright protection without infringing copyright law. Even with such a case, the battle between consumer autonomy and copyright protection rages on, and it will take much more time, litigation and legislation in order to fully answer questions regarding scopes of ownership. Nevertheless, for the time being, some things are certain: hackers like Hotz will continue to do new and innovative things with technology that toe the line of legality, and electronic device manufacturers will constantly be seeking new methods to protect their proprietary interests in the ever-changing world of electronic devices.

What the NFL could teach America

The worst recession since 1929 shattered American confidence in our economy and in our government. Global stock exchanges crashed, and the whole world lost its savings in the wreckage. Wall Street and Detroit teetered on the edge of insolvency, and Washington, when it finally realized the scale of a problem that had been brewing for years, reacted in panic.

As we attempt to reshape our politics and our badly sputtering economy, a good place to start looking for models would be a business most Americans—Tea Partiers and Marxists alike—consider a crucial part of our national identity: football. Despite the poor corporate climate, the National Football League continues to attract fans, rake in profits, and dominate the television market. Why? Because the NFL puts out a good product—entertaining games between well-matched teams—that people will pay to watch. Perhaps economists and policy-makers should take notice. After all, if there's anything more American than football, then by golly, it's got to be capitalism. But the methods behind the success of the NFL might surprise many of its most loyal fans, given how loudly we proclaim our collective love of free markets and our corresponding disdain for their ever-encroaching enemy: European-style socialism.

By American standards, our football league is Red to the core: The league office sets a limit on how much each team can spend on its players and fines them heavily if they fail to comply. It divvies up the revenue from its gigantic television contracts equally between every team. It allows the visiting team to collect forty percent of the ticket sales at away games. All these regulations are explicitly de-

signed to help teams from small-markets, like the Green Bay Packers, win Super Bowls alongside big-city rivals like New

What's going on here? Doesn't it seem deeply un-American that the richest teams are forced to cap their spending? It's their money; they earned it. Let them do what they want with it, not force them to give it away to less successful teams! How can Budweiser and General Motors, companies whose marketing departments make explicit the connection between owning their products and being a patriot, use this competition to hawk their beer and trucks? Why do we cheer wildly when our favorite team wins a league run like a European welfare state but lose our tempers about common-sense regulations on healthcare, pollution, and Wall Street? It seems like a glaring contradiction in our national psyche: We love our football league but hate the sensible policies that have made it so profitable.

Well, maybe it's possible that the NFL isn't so far to the left. I mean, imagine: If our favorite sport is run by little Lenins and imitation Trotskies, what must European football be like?

In Europe, teams are allowed to spend whatever they want. There are no salary caps and revenues are not shared equally. And so, unlike the NFL and even Major League Baseball, where all but the most poorly-run teams have a shot at the championship each season, in Europe, the same three or four soccer clubs win the league trophy year after year. In England, for example, just three teams-Manchester United, Arsenal and Chelsea—have lifted seventeen of the last eighteen English Premier League titles. Pretty boring compared to America. In the same time span, twelve teams have won the Super Bowl, and eleven have captured the World Series.








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Packers fans spending thousands for Super Bowl

Bay Packers made it to the Super Bowl and fans aren't wasting any time making up for it.

The buying frenzy started right after the Packers beat the Bears 21-14 for the NFC championship Sunday night. Stores were already selling championship merchandise, and people were scrambling to buy T-shirts, hats and sweat shirts as well as calling travel agencies and ticket sellers for Super Bowl tickets.

"It's like Christmas, like the day after Thanksgiving almost is how the sales have been," said Melissa Babcock, department manager at Sports Authority in

suburban Milwaukee. "İt's crazy." That's because it is like Christmas for Packers fans. The last time the Packers went to

been 13 years since the Green they lost to the Denver Broncos. The Packers won Super Bowls in 1967, 1968 and 1997

> Babcock said within two hours of the Packers winning, they were nearly sold out of all championship merchandise. Josh Anderson, manager of Ticket King near Lambeau Field in Green Bay, said they also worked after the game and sold about a dozen Super Bowl tickets right off the bat. They sold another three or four dozen by late Mon-

day morning. The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection warned Packers if he doesn't have tickets with fans of bogus Super Bowl ticket offers and encouraged them to buy from businesses or people

they trust. One fan looking for tickets

O'Neill, who is known as St. Vince because he wears a green bishop's costume and miter, with former coach Vince Lombardi's face on it, to Packers games.

Steelers embrace underdog status in Super Bowl despite six titles

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The mighty Pittsburgh Steelers, equipped with a record six Super Bowl titles, a 14-4 record, the No. 2 AFC seed and a veteran roster on the verge of three championships in the past six seasons, are underdogs for Super Bowl

XLV. Really?

Don't worry. It's not you. It doesn't make much sense to the Steelers, either.

But here Pittsburgh is, fresh off its 24-19 win over the New York Jets in the AFC Championship Sunday night, installed by the Las Vegas oddsmakers as about a three-point underdog against Green Bay (13-6), the NFC's No. 6 seed.

"I kind of don't understand what everybody sees that we don't see," Steelers defensive back Ike Taylor said.

For a team that wasn't picked by many to win its division, told it would get off to a rocky start without its suspended quarterback for the first four games and fought through it all to get to the franchise's record-tying eighth Super Bowl, being the underdog is a role the Steelers are eager to embrace.

"I think we do our best when we're underdogs," Steelers defensive lineman Chris

Hoke said. "People were talking at the beginning of the season, how we were going to go 6-10 or 7-9. And how two years ago, when we went to the Super Bowl in '08, we had the toughest schedule in NFL history, 'Are they going to be able to make it out of this schedule?"

"I think when you put our backs against the wall, when you tell us that we're an underdog and we can't do something, that's when we fight and we're at our best."

Maybe Hoke is on to something. The franchise's most recent run of championships began when it slipped into the playoffs as a No. 6 seed, upset three teams with better records on the road and beat the NFC's top seed, Seattle, 21-10, in Super Bowl XL, on Feb. 5, 2006.

Nineteen players from that team are on this roster in a season in which it played its first four games with a third-, and then a fourth-string quarterback.

Ben Roethlisberger was suspended by the league until Week 5, and backup Byron Leftwich sustained a knee sprain during the preseason. That meant Dennis Dixon and Charlie Batch quarterbacked the Steelers to a surprising 3-1 start. Four months later, they're packing their bags for Dallas.

"We like to go into every game as underdogs," receiver Mike Wallace said.

Taylor's eyes — it's wishful thinking on the part of Pittsburgh critics. "I feel like, deep down, in

the back of people's heads, they really don't want us to win," Taylor said. "People don't like successful people. Just the tradition we have here, the success we have here, I just feel that a lot of people don't want us to succeed. They're getting tired of seeing the same people over and over again. I guess they want to see somebody new.

'Until that happens, I'm just glad to be a Pittsburgh Steeler."

And why not? Taylor was drafted by a team that has advanced to the AFC championship game in half of his eight seasons. Add that run to the lore of the Steel Curtain teams of the 1970s — a unit that won four Super Bowls in six years, becoming the first true dynasty in the Super Bowl era — and the Steelers have quite the tradition for a bunch of underdogs.

"You come here and see the pictures on the wall," Hoke said. "Joe Greene and all those great guys on defense. Terry Bradshaw on offense, Franco Harris, there's too many to name. You know there's a standard here, and you know that winning is an expectation. You're not hoping to win — you're expecting to win here."

The Steelers maintain they're But maybe — at least in not yet considering their legacy and how, with another title, they would pull to within one of their franchise ancestors of 30 years ago.

> Sounds as if they've adopted the mantra of their perpetually composed head coach. Only 38, Mike Tomlin can win his second Super Bowl in only his fourth

Tomlin faced the tough task of winning over his players when he was hired as somewhat of an unknown 34-year-old after the 2006 season. He had to replace the popular Bill Cowher, too, which was not easy.

If Pittsburgh beats the Packers in two weeks at Cowboys Stadium, though, Tomlin will have doubled Cowher's one Super Bowl title in less than one-third of the time.

"Going into training camp, we knew the odds were stacked against us a little bit in that first month without Ben," Hoke said. "But (Tomlin) kept us focused, kept that chip on our shoulder when people were counting us out a little bit. I think we played with a chip on our shoulder the first four weeks. And to be able to go 3-1 those first four games, knowing that we had Ben coming back, we put ourselves in a good position to be where we are now."



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Patriots' Brady unanimous AP NFL All-Pro selection

unanimous. And Tom Brady has outdone even himself.

The record-setting Patriots quarterback is the leading votegetter for The Associated Press 2010 NFL All-Pro Team, the seventh straight year at least one player has gotten every vote. Three years ago, when Brady set the league record for touchdown passes, he missed by a half-vote of being unanimous, sharing a ballot with Brett Favre.

As usual, Brady prefers to deflect praise to the rest of the Patriots, who went 14-2 this season before losing in the playoffs to the Jets.

"I've been here for a while, so I've seen our offense evolve," Brady said. "We do some different things now than we've done in the past. Ultimately we're still trying to do the same thing, which is be productive and win games."

Brady won those 14 games as the league's leading passer, and he went a record 335 attempts without an interception. Overall, he threw for 36 touchdowns and had just four picks.

Brady is one of three New England players selected to the squad by a nationwide panel of 50 media members who regularly cover the NFL. He is joined by guard Logan Mankins and inside linebacker Jerod Mayo.

Red Raider softball introduces new McHaney Memorial Classic

Texas Tech Athletics and softball coach Shanon Hays announced the creation of the Jeannine McHaney Memorial Classic on Monday, honoring one of the more important figures in Tech women's athletics history.

The inaugural Jeannine McHaney Memorial Classic is set to begin Feb. 25 and conclude Feb. 27, with Northern Illinois, St. John's and Wichita State joining Tech to round out the four-team, three-day event at Rocky Johnson Field.

"This is an exciting opportunity for both our softball program and the entire athletics department because we get to honor such an outstanding individual," Hays said in a news release.

McHaney got her start with the Tech faculty in 1966 as a physical education professor and served as the school's director for women's intramural sports. Additionally, McHaney became

the first coach in Tech volleyball 1975, until the men's and women's history and served as the head coach for nine years.

But McHaney wasn't just the first head coach in Tech volleyball history — she also became the first, and only, athletics director for the Tech Women's Athletics Department in departments combined.

Her actions as athletics director included the hiring of former Lady Raiders head coach Marsha Sharp, who led Tech women's basketball to a national championship in the

McHaney was honored for her services to Tech when she became the first woman to be inducted into the Tech Athletic Hall of Honor. After battling cancer, McHaney died in 1994.

Lady Raider assistant coach blossoms at Tech after successful playing career

During the past decade, Texas Tech women's basketball assistant coach Shereka Wright has done it all as a player.

But now the former WNBA player is making a name for herself in coaching with the help of her former head coach, and current colleague.

Tech coach Kristy Curry coached Wright when the two were at Purdue, before Curry took the reins of the Lady Raider program in 2006.

Wright said being a player under Curry has helped her become a good assistant coach because she knows Curry's expectations.

"It was very easy for me to transition over just because I played for her," she said. "I understood the philosophy that she was looking for. I understood the type of players that she wanted in her system, and I understand what she wants from her players. Those things also helped me transition into this."

On May 21 in San Antonio, Wright will add another accomplishment to her already impressive résumé, as she will be inducted into the Texas High School Basketball Hall of Fame.

Wright attended Copperas Cove High School and graduated in 2000. During her senior year she was named the Gatorade, USA Today and WBCA Player of the Year after a 3,269-point career.

"It's a great honor," Wright said about being inducted. "When you talk about basketball in Texas, it's tremendous. You think about the people that went in before you. So

to be recognized in a state so big is a great accomplishment."

Wright mirrored her high school success at Purdue during her fouryear career, being named to the All-Big Ten first team three consecutive times. She also was a finalist for the Naismith Award, Wooden Award and the Wade Trophy. During her senior year she was named to the Wooden Award team as well.

In all four years, the Boilermakers made NCAA tournament appearances, and made it to the National Championship game in 2001, falling to Notre Dame. The championship run was during Wright's freshman campaign, and she was named to the NCAA Final-Four All-Tournament

With all of the success Wright had while at Purdue, Tech senior forward Teena Wickett said it is definitely seen in her coaching.

"I think she's a real good coach, she knows a lot about the game," she said. "By her being a player at Purdue, she was an outstanding player, and I think that carries over as a coach. So she knows a lot about the game. She has a lot of knowledge."

After concluding her collegiate career and earning a degree in health and fitness, Wright took her talents to the WNBA.

The first two years Wright was a part of the Phoenix Mercury, be-
