Scientists agree - caffeine, aspirin are college students' best friends

Yes, you're drunk and miserable

injections. This suggests that contrary to popular belief, the amount of water topopular belief, the amount of water
consumed the night before doesn't necessarily result in better hydration. "Dehydration is not necessary to induce the headaches," Oshinsky said.

ava a cause [of headaches], I'm just saying that

since been published in the "New Scientist Journal," says the best time to ake your dose of caffeine and aspirin is around four hours after drinking when the acetate levels begin to reac
