John Casias found his calling when John Casias found his calling when
he joined a Texas church group that came to preach the Gospel in the
little Mexican town of El Cercado little Mexican tow
in the early 1980s.
He later wrote that he saved nine souls, but worried how the villagers
would grow without a would grow without a teacher. By the
time he returned to Texas, he knew time he returned to Texas, he knew
his future would he as a missionery his future would be as a missionary.
When he told his wife, Wanda, she When he told his wife, Wanda, she
asked only what they would take and when they would leave.
"We were called to Mexico", son John Casias said his mother told him.
"These are our people." These are our people."
The bodies of John and Wanda Casias came one last time Thursday to the church they began, the Primera Iglesia Bautista Fundamental Independiente, in the violence-
plagued region of northern Mexico,

College of Education receives grant for outreach program among students

HOUSTON (AP)-Jailed Texas financier R. Allen Stanford's extreme measures tohide his Caribbean banks oath with a top regulator, the man who was in charge of the tycoon's books told jurors Thursday.
James M. Davis, the former chief
financial officer for Stanford financial officer for Stanford's companies, testified the financier came to an agreement with he official responsible
for reviewing his bank on the island nation of Antigua where that person, Leroy King, would not dig too deeply into the institution's operations. Prosecutors allege Stanford masterminded a fraud in which he bilked investors out of more than $\$ 7$ billion in a mas-
sive Ponzi scheme centered on the sive Ponzil scheme centered on the
sales of certificates of deposit, or CDs, from the bank.
"Mr. Stanford said they (he and King) actually cut themselves and had a blood oath," a frail-looking Davis, 63 , said.
Davis said Stanford made regular
cash payments of "hush cash payments of "hush money" to
King and another regulator "for them King and another regulator "for them
to look the other way." He also testified the financier loaned the Antiguan government about $\$ 40$ million, which was never repaid.
Authorities allege Stanford used depositors' money to fund his busi-
nesses and his lavish billionaire lifenesses and his lavish billionaire life-
style and pay bribes to regulators and style and pay bribes to regulators and
auditors. They also allege he lied to depositors by telling them their funds depositors by telling them the

whose financial empire, headquartered

suggested Davis, who worked 21 years for Stanford, is behind the fraud. Stanford is on trial for 14 counts, including mail and wire fraud, and faces up to 20 years in prison if convicted. King was also indicted and is
awaiting extradition to the U.S. Three awaiting extradition to the U.S. Three other ex-Stanford comare also charged and await trial in September.
Davis said Stanford ran his busi-
ness empire through a mix of flattery ness empire through a mix of flattery and fear, describing his management style as charismatic but also dictato-
rial. ${ }^{\text {rial. }}$ Davis, the prosecution's star wit-
ness, told jurors Stanford laughed about the alleged fraud at the bank. Davis said he would often mimic in front of Stanford being handcuffed and having his legs shackled as a reference to being arrested. say, 'Well that's OK. ... I didn't know what was going on and IIII just blame it all on you,", said Davis, as Stanford looked on and shook his head. Davis pleaded guilty in 2009 to three counts: conspiracy to commit mail, wire and securities fraud; mail
fraud; and conspiracy to obstruct a fraud; and conspiracy to obstruct a
Securities and Exchange Commission investigation. The plea is part of a deal Davis made with the Justice Department in exchange for a possible

mester in 1973, said he realized the mester in was a fraud after he was asked to help lie to a potential investor that
the bank had insurance. Davis told the bank had insurance. Davis told

losses. He said Stanford referred to the insurance company as a "marketing device."
.Davis testified that in August 1991, he was asked by Stanford to fly to the insurance company's London office, which was actually a 10 -foot square cubicle, and fax a letter to a
potential investor confirming the potential investor
bank had insurance.

asked Davis why, after realizing there was fraud, he continued working for the financier.
"I wanted to please Mr. Stanford.

Dallas area 1st in Texas to emerge from drought

## HOUSTON (AP) - The rain that

 started trickling into Texas in the fall may finally be making a dent in Dallas,but the rest of the massive state is still but the rest of the massive state isstill a
long way off from being out of historic drought, and climate experts are warning against any premature partying. "It's still a very tenuous situation," said National Weather Service meteorologist Victor Murphy. "Water concerns are a high priority. If we have a dry spring and a hot sumn"
a very perilous situation."
The good news comes from the U.S. Drought Monitor map, a weekly analysis of dryness in the country. It indicated Thursday that the DallasFort Worth region and a swath of
North Texas stretching North Texas stretching to the state's
border with Oklahoma and Arkansas are officially out of drought for the first time since July. As a result, about 6.4 million people in the nation's fourth most-populous urban area will enjoy fuller lakes and greener trees. But this makes up less than 5 percent of Texas, and the downside is
that the same data shows that parts of that the same data shows that parts of
the state still in severe or exceptional
drought has actually increased in the
past week by 2 percent to 27.36 percent. In addition, almost 60 percent of the state
drought.
The whale s so big you can't talk about the whole state in generalized terms," said Brian Fuchs, a climatologist with Center who helps draft Mitigation you go into summer again the map. "As areas are still very prone because of the damage that's been done." The Drought Monitor is a map that braska's National Drought Mitigation Center in cooperation with the U.S. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and several other
agencies. Meteorologists and climate agencies. Meteorologists and climate experts look at everything from rainfall
to soil saturation to create the map, and sometimes look at information dating back months and years, Fuchs said. The trend in Dallas is encouraging, he said, but he noted North Texas was the last area of the state to fall into drought, so recovery was easier.
"Does it help? Yes, it does. But

 The drought in Texas, parts o Oklahoma, Arkansas, New Mexico and Louisiana began about ayear ago, andsome areas have been getting less than half the normal amount of rainfall. For Texas, the situation has been especially dire because of its size. The state makes up nearly 7 percent of the land mass of the Lower 48, and the drought's severity has impacted
everything from cartle numbers to everything from cattle numbers to
bird migration and the health of the Gulf of Mexico. Ranchers have culled their herds, likely driving up future beef prices, while a devastated hay crop in the south has caused hay prices to spike.
The drought's impact will be felt for years, Fuchs said. In Texas, for
example, ranchers reduced their herd size by an average of 38 percent - or between 600,000 to 800,000 head of cattle - causing a 12 percent to 16 percent drop in the nation's supply.
