get all of that states electors, so the electoral college rules." Some states, such as Maine and Nebraska, split their electoral votes, which requires a legisla tive act and is usually done for partisan reasons. In those states,

rare, for the elector to cast his or rare, for the elector to cast his or
her personal vote, rather than the popular vote winner in their state "Electors are not necessar ily bound by the party that they serve, they can cast their vote anyway, Patterson said. "That was really the original idea, that
they would just go cast their bal lots for who they thought wa the best person on the ticket." As a citizen, Patterson said,
popular votes matter to each indi vidual state, which should effect electoral votes, therefore deter
mining who wins the election "One state can change the entire Electoral College," Patterson said. The number of representative and senators in a particular state determines the number of elec toral votes given to each state Even though every state elec tor casts an official ballot in said, the president is known be-
fore the electoral votes are cast.
"Those electors who will actually cast the ballot are usually a party terson said "so the Repate" Pat governor of Texas will pick cer ain people that he prefers to have going in casting those ballots. Although there have been elec fions where there are excep tions, Patterson said, the ma
jority of states for the major jority of states for the major-
ity of the history of the country have given all of the elector al votes to whoever wins the popular vote within the state Patterson said he believes if voters understand the way the ystem was designed and works actions to the minority can didate winning the election. "If it's a landslide, if somebody is more popular than the other, Patterson said, "then the popu lar vote as well as the Electora College is going to reflect that. On the other hand, Patterso
said, if a race is close like this year's election, who wins th election is going to depend on the states. Since some states are more populous than others even if a candidate dominates he smaller states' Electoral Col
lege, larger states with mor elece, larger states with mores can change the race, which is why candidates are swarming the swing state in the last days of the election. According to Rasmussen Reports 2012 Electoral College Score board, electoral votes are 172
