There are at least two effective methods of pre-

stake any plant that is tall enough to require support stake any plant hat is tail enough to require suppor transplanting time. This pruning reduces the surface area of the plant, making it more wind resistant. It also invigorates the plant by creating a better balance
between the above- and below-soll portions of the ${ }^{\text {plant. }}$ For For homeowners planning to be away on vacations
