### Lebanon appeals to nations not to join boycott

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — The gov ernment appealed to European nations Friday not to join the U.S. campaign to boycott Beirut airport.

President Amin Gemayel met with American Ambassador Reginald Bartholomew, who delivered a letter from President Reagan, Lebanese radio broadcasts reported. The contents of the letter were not dis-

Lebanon sent a letter to the office of U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar in New York protesting the American boycott effort. U.N. spokesman Joe Sills said the letter did not request a Security Council meeting, but Lebanon reserved the right to call for council action if it was deemed necessary.

Fuad Turk, undersecretary at the Foreign Ministry, called European ambassadors to a 40-minute meeting Friday seeking assurances their countries would not join what Lebanon views as punitive U.S. reprisal against Lebanon, not just the hijack-

Envoys from Britain, the Netherlands, Greece, Italy, Turkey, Finland, France, Sweden and Switzerland attended

Italian Ambassador Antonio Mancini reported later, "We have demanded the Lebanese government emphatically condemn the TWA hijacking.

France already has said Lebanon should arrest the hijackers and put them on trial for killing a U.S. Navy frogman, Robert Stethem, during the hijacking.

CBS Television said the Lebanese government raised the prospect of countering U.S.-led airport boycott with a ban on American ships and airplanes from all Arab nations.

Turk later met with the ambassadors of the East bloc and the Far Eastern envoys.

Perea de Cuellar said Lebanon "considers that the violation of international law by states is more serious than such violations by irregular groups." Thiw was a reference to the Shiite militants who hijacked TWA flight 847 en route from Athens, Greece, to Rome on June 14 and held 39 Americans hostage for 17

Accusing the Reagan administration "regrettable blindness" to the root causes of the hijacking, the letter complained that the U.S. action does not punish the true perpetrators, rather it burdens" all the innocent people of Lebanon.

'Isolating Lebanon and preventing its two national airlines from operating normally cannot have a positive and useful result since such measures amount to a reaction that is out or proportion, in terms of its impact and its magnitude, to the harm caused by the hijacking," the protest letter stated.

At Gemayel's meeting with Bartholomew at the presidential summer palace in Bekfaya, the president stressed his opposition to terrorism and hijacking, according to informed sources.

The sources, who spoke on condition they not be identified, said Gemayel stressed, however, that Lebanon will "confront the American moves aimed at encouraging more countries to ban Beirut airport and its (Lebanon's) airliners.

Hundreds of Midlanders rebuild booths destroyed by windstorm

A violent windstorm swept through Midland Friday evening, destroying many festive booths set up for the weekend's CentennialFest activities, temporarily aborting a baseball game at Angel's Stadium and downing residential power

Hundreds of people viewing the premiere performance of Summer Mummers at Yucca Theater poured into downtown streets to assist stunned boothworkers and begin the arduous job of reconstruction.

Cast members in bright costumes and feather plumes worked side by side with firemen, Centennial Commission leaders and hundreds of others in sifting through the rubble that only moments before were gaily decorated booths.

According to Centennial Execu-

tive Director Robin Jackson, the booths would be ready for the weekend festivities.

'Oh yes,'' she said. "We'll be ready. We'll work through the night.

Barbara Jowell, chairman of the event committee, agreed.

"Even if all we have is a couple of tables and chairs, we'll go

through with it," she said. The booths, according to one entrant, were constructed with special nails that pull out easily for quick disassembly. Gusts of up to 50 mph blasted through the tunnel-like corridors of downtown Midland to level virtually every one of the 130 booths. Red, white and blue banners ripped into shreds were woven among piles of lumber, grill stoves,

One woman was in the middle of the street when it happened "The wind picked up and I went to

retrieve a sign for the booth, when everything got black," said Linda Brown, a dental hygenist, who was setting up the Permian Basin Dental Hygenist Society's booth. Flashing lightning kept photocell-equipped street lights out, making the streets dark.

There was sand blowing in my eyes and I couldn't see anything and by the time I got the sand out there was nothing to see," she said. "It was a real freaky thing."

It was like a tornado came through here," echoed Belinda Patterson, president of the PBDHS. Ms. Patterson was not at the booth when the winds hit.

"At 8 p.m., it was perfect. All the booths were completed and we left for an hour," she said. "When we (another boothworker accompanied her) came back, the entire block was demolished.

#### Texas jobless rate hits 7.2 percent The jobless rate

The figures released Friday by the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics show a rise of .3 percentage point in Texas over the previous month — as well as a dramatic narrowing of the gap between the U.S. and Texas

A year ago, Texas enjoyed a job-less rate of only 4.9 percent while the nationwide rate was 7.2 percent, federal officials said. But only .1 per-centage point separated the two last month when the national rate was

"It's a significant jump," said Nic Santangelo, chief economic analyst for the bureau's Dallas office. Santangelo blamed much of the

increased joblessness in Texas on the combined influence of teenagers seeking summer jobs and a

agers seeking summer jobs and a stagnant state economy.

"Texas is obviously going through a rather stagnant period of growth as a state," Santangelo said.

It was the third consecutive rise in the state's jobless rate, he said, and the fifth increase in the last six months. Nationally, the unemployment rate has risen every month for the past five months.

"What we saw in Texas continued to reflect the slowing pace of the

to reflect the slowing pace of the state's economic activities seen in

the last six months of 1984 and first six months of 1985," Santangelo said. Santangelo said that there is little new in the state's economic picture and litte prospect for quick

The best I can say is when I look at the state of Texas, I would be prone to say there would be little change in the way things are now," he said. "Through the end of the

year I would expect to see a very slow pace of economic growth."

For the past two years, the Texas economy has suffered from a trade slump linked to the devaluation of Mexican peso, agriculture prob-ns in the Rio Grande Valley and a

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) - A medical panel ruled Friday that two white doctors were guilty of misconduct in treating black leader Steve Biko, whose death in police custody made him a martyr in the struggle against white rule.

One of the physicians was reprimanded and the other received a suspended penalty.

Violence continued in South Africa's black townships. Witnesses

said two people were killed by police gunfire in a township east of Johannesburg during a police roundup of suspected rioters

An inquest after the September 1977 death of Biko, 30-year-old founder of the Black Consciousness Movement, found that he probably succumbed to brain injuries suffered in a scuffle while police were interrogating him in Port Elizabeth. The panel of the South African

at the end of its week-long inquiry that government district surgeons Benjamin Tucker and Ivor Lang failed to provide adequate care for Biko and falsified his medical rec-

Tucker was found guilty of disgraceful professional conduct in allowing the police to move the injured man 750 miles by road, and was barred from practice for three

months. But the sentence was suspended.

Lang received the lesser punish-

Both could have been permanently barred from practicing medi-

#### Odessa police investigate Man still in Ector County murder of man found in lot jail on assault charges

ODESSA - A 25-year-old man remained in the Ector County jail early today in lieu of \$150,000 on three counts involving aggravated sexual assault and two counts of indecency with two children over about a five year period.

The five charges against Michael Paul Blalock, 1312 W. 7th Street, grew out of his arrest April 3 on a charge alleging injury to a 5-year-old child.

Blalock's 25-year-old wife, Nancy Louise, was arrested on two counts of aggravated sexual assault of a child by omission. She was released after posting a total of \$15,000 in bonds

According to Ector County Sheriff Bob Brookshire's Special Task Force on Child Abuse investigators Roy Gladden and Troy Davis, the incidents in which Blalock and his wife are charged involve two girls, ages 8 and 5years-old, and began about five years ago when the oldest girl was about three years old.

Gladden said the charges against Mrs. Blalock were filed because she allegedly had knowledge that the incidents were occurring but did nothing to stop the abuse of the two children. According to Gladden, the

Texas Department of Human Resources has taken custody of the children and placed them in a foster home.

In other action, trustees approved revisions in the 1965-86 MISD calen-dar, designating Saturday, Jan. 18, as a teacher preparation day.



### 'Ghostbusters' spark election fraud scandal

MONTERREY, Mexico (AP) — National Action Party "ghostbus-ters" sparked an election fraud scandal in northern Nuevo Leon state and the ruling party rushed to revise voter registration lists before Sunday's elections.

National action, known as PAN, claims its discovery of "fantasmas," or ghosts, on registration lists proves the ruling Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI, resorts to vote fraud to win elections.

And PAN gubernatorial candidate Fernando Canales Clariond hoped to capitalize on the publicity surrounding the discovery by being the first opposition candidate in the country

to win a governor's seat. In a six-month campaign severely lacking in concrete issues, vote fraud has been the central theme.

Canales, a wealthy 39-year-old businessman and former federal representative, says clean elections are his "passport to victory."

His accusations have forced PRI candidate Jorge Trevino, 49, a federal representative and former head of the regional treasury office, to

defend his party.
"Vote fraud does not exist in Mexico," he said in a recent interview. The PRI, whigh blamed a computer error for the names of nonexistant citizens that appeared on voting lists in Nuevo Leon and several

other states, said corrected versions would be issued before Sunday. Although the PRI has not given a total, the PAN claims the number of fictitious voters totals about 4 million. It says the names were added intentionally so the PRI could bring in outiside voters or simply stuff the ballot boxes.

At stake Sunday are the governorships of seven states, federal representatives throughout the country, some state legislative seats and a few municipal posts.

In Nuevo Leon, eleven federal representatives and 26 state legislators will be elected.

But the spotlight has been on the gubernatorial races in Nuevo Leon and northwestern Sonora, two of the nation's wealthiest states where the PAN has mounted unusually strong campaigns.

CONAKRY, Guinea (AP) — The military government of President Lansana Conte said Friday it foiled an overnight attempt by former Prime Minister Diara Traore to seize power in this impoverished West African nation. the radio station.

Conte, in Lome, Togo, for a summit meeting of the 16-member Economic Community of West African States, returned home Friday afternoon to a triumphal welcome by tens of thousands of cheering people who lined the 10-mile route from the airport to downtown Conakry.

"Long live Conte," "Down with Traore," many shouted. Radio Conakry, which the rebels

had initially seized, said later that the government was in full control throughout the country and troops were conducting a house-to-house search in the capital for Traore and his accomplices.

Military sources, who spoke with the condition that they not be iden-tified, said Traore, 50, had been arrested in a house in the capital. Traore, most recently minister of state for education, helped Conte seize power in April 1984.

The sources said several high ranking officials also had been seized, including Lancime Keita, former permanent secretary of the ruling Military Committee for National Recovery; Mamadou Mayo, youth minister; Bakary Sako, governor of western Dubreka province, and Kieba Oumar, the governor of Boke, another province in western Guinea that borders the Atlantic.

The coup attempt began late Thursday when Diara Traore announced on Radio Conakry that he had taken power to end "15 months of total disappointment" with Conte's regime. He charged Conte with a "lust for personal power" and said he failed to promote economic development.

### FAO: Rain has helped situation in parts of Africa

NAIROBI, Kenya — The United Nations Food and Agricultural Orga-nization said here Friday that rain in wide areas of Africa had helped improve the food situation but that logistical problems remained in getting aid to the needey.

The FAO report said the drought had been broken in eight of 21 affected countries. "The food supply position is back to normal" in Burundi, Kenya, Lesotho, Morocco, Rwanda, Tanzania, Zambia, and Zimbabwe, the report said.

In Ethiopia, Sudan, Mali, Niger and Chad, however, "the already critical food supply situation has deteriorated further" in the lean season up to the next harvest, the report said.


The most serious outstanding challenge for the international community and the governments of the affected countries in the coming weeks must be to overcome the ogistic constraints which are causing port congestion and preventing food aid already pledged from reaching the needy populations in time to prevent further human suffering and loss of lives," the report

It called for new initiatives "as a matter of extreme urgency" for helping the affected countries. Botswana, now in its fourth straight drought year, along with Angola and Mozambique, which also were suffering "civil strife and lack of inputs," would all continue to require "exceptional food imports."



#### Zimbabwe's ruling party

ruling party was heading for a land-slide victory Friday as early returns showed it far head of the opposition in Zimbabwe's first parliamentary elections since independence in

Among those elected for another term was Prime Minister Robert Mugabe, who heads the Zimbabwe African National Union — ZANU. He has said he will interpret a vic-tory for his socialist party as a man-date to transform this nation into a one-party state.

With final results expected over the weekend, ZANU has captured 46 of 51 districts in which the vote has been tabulated, election board officials said. There was balloting in 79

But Mugabe failed to win the votes of the minority Ndebele people in southern Matabeleland province, where opposition leader Joshua Nkomo's party won all five of the seats announced late Friday

night.
The province has been stained by

continual bloodshed during the past 24 years as rebels sympathetic to Nkomo have clashed with government troops. Thousands have died in

the violence. More than three million black citizens voted from Monday through Thursday for 79 seats designated for blacks in the 100-member National Assembly.

#### Conservatives lose district

LONDON (AP) — The governing Conservative Party lost a key Welsh district and finished a poor third in a special parliamentary election, according to results announced Fri-

day.

The centrist alliance was victorious and the socialist Labor Party made a strong showing in second

The election Thursday was regarded as an important popularity test for Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher midway through her second five-year term.

The Social Democratic-Liberal Party alliance of centrists overturned a Conservative majority to take the sprawling rural district of Brecon and Radnor just 559 votes ahead of the main opposition Labor

Conservative Christopher Butler, a former Thatcher political aide, polled 10,631 votes — well behind Liberal Richard Livsey, 50, a local agricultural lecturer, with 13,753 votes, and Laborite runner-up Richard Willey, 13,194.

#### El Salvador creates panel

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) - The National Assembly has created a special commission to investigate political crimes. It will be controlled by President Jose Napoleon Duarte and financed by the United States.

The vote in the assembly Thursday was on party lines. Duarte's 33 Christian Democrats supported the proposal and the other 27 members, most of them from right-wing parties, opposed it.

Antonio Guevara Lacayo, president of the assembly, said the estimated \$11 million needed to operate the commission would come from the U.S. Agency for International Development.

The commission will include representatives of the Justice and Interior ministries, a member from the Public Security Ministry and a personal represenative of Duarte.

Tass carried the text of the Soviet leader's reply to the Union of Concerned Scientists, a group of U.S. scientists and scholars that asked both him and President Reagan to reaffirm their commitment to the treaty and agree to ban space weapons.







The toll of brush and forest fires reached 200,000 acres over nine Western states Friday, but California crews fighting a 78,000-acre blaze that threatened communities benefited from fog, cooler temperatures and less wind.

Firefighters were close to taming the blaze near Ojai, Calif., but other fires continued burning out of control in California, Idaho, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico. Oregon, Washington and Wyoming. Nearly 5,000 firefighters from across the nation were on fire lines.

California Gov. George Deukmejian on Friday asked President Reagan to declare federal disaster areas in the city of Los Angeles and in San Diego County, where fires have inflicted an estimated \$23.6 million

A disaster declaration would allow

residents to apply for federal aid. Deukmajian also offered a \$10,000 reward for information leading to the arrest of those responsible for a blaze in the Baldwin Hills section of Los Angeles, which killed three people Tuesday. Authorities believe the fire was set.

Fourth of July fireworks touched off only a few scattered blazes in tinder-dry California and all were Friday when overnight humidity quickly controlled.

"The higher humidity and lower temperature is boosting morale out on the lines. They've been faced with 100-degree temperatures for several days," said U.S. Forest Ser-vice spokesman Pete Libby.

But the early morning ground fog hampered water-dropping aircraft from reaching flames. "It's pretty hard to fly close to the ground when you can't see," Libby said.

The Ojai fire in the Los Padres National Forest was still less than five miles north of Carpinteria, a coastal town 12 miles east of Santa Barbara and 40 miles east of President Reagan's ranch. But it was moving sluggishly and was 45 per-cent contained, Libby said.

Crews from Arkansas and Michigan were called in, with firefighting costs put at \$1.4 million since Mon-

### Firecracker injury reports spur talk of ban

WASHINGTON (AP) - As traditional as July Fourth fireworks, dayafter reports of firecracker injuries spread Friday as doctors who try to repair the damage sought greater awareness of dangers involved and perhaps a national ban.

Dr. R. Sloane Wilson, a Little Rock, Ark., ophthalmologist, commenting during a break in a day of surgery on several accident victims, said: "When children lose their eyes it's a tragedy, and most of them simply aren't aware of the risk."

Wilson said he doubted a federal ban would be forthcoming. But he has begun a national survey on behalf of the American Academy of Ophthalmology, hoping to get a better idea of just how many injuries fireworks do cause and whether there is much difference between states that do and don't have laws limiting or banning sales and use.

cal groups now put the yearly injury toll at between 14,000 and 20,000, many of them around the Fourth of

Dr. Joe Greensher, a Long Island, N.Y., pediatrician who is head of an accident prevention committee of the American Academy of Pediatrics, said, "There should be federal involvement," including a ban on general use of all but the smallest ireworks.







#### Doctors 'quite shocked' at heart-lung patient's death

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Doctors were "quite shocked" Friday when a 12-year-old girl who had become the nation's youngest heart-lung trans-plant died after the heart she had for two days stopped functioning, a hospital official said.

Transplant surgeons, who have performed 25 such double transplants, called the death of Mary Grantz "the most dramatic failure in the transplanted heart-lung (program) that they've ever seen," said Children's Hospital spokesman Dick

The surgeons, Dr. Bartley Griffith and Dr. Robert Hardesty, had been very pleased with her progress, and then there was this dramatic turnaround," he said.

"The surgeons involved were quite shocked. They thought things were sailing along at a great rate

until hours ago," he said.
The girl, from Farrell in Mercer County, died at 10 a.m. in the hospital's intensive care unit, Riebling said. He said further details were being withheld at the family's request.

Mary underwent about eight hours of transplant surgery early Wednesday. She was given organs from an unidentified 9-year-old boy from Dallas who died after falling off the rear of a motorcycle.

#### Gas kills two in motel

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Carbon monoxide from a gas water heater seeped into ground floor rooms at a motel Friday, killing two people and injuring 18, authorities said.

Some of the victims were unconscious when pulled from the building by firefighters, said Assistant Las Vegas Fire Chief Richard Gammon. Five of the injured were listed

in serious condition at three local

The bodies were found in adjoining rooms where the highest con-centration of carbon monoxide was found, on the bottom floor of the two-story Crest Motel near the malfunctioning heater, Gammon said.

The two dead people were men, but their identities were not immediately released.

A couple staying at the motel said they were moved from room 137, where one of the dead people was found, two days earlier after becoming sick.



### Authorities continue manhunt for kidnapper who fled jail

CLEBURNE (AP) — Authorities from six Texas counties continued a manhunt Friday for a convicted kidnapper who scaled an eight-foot fence and crawled shirtless through barbed wire to escape.

James Wesley Foote, 34, sentenced to life in prison for the Jan. 11 kidnapping of 13-year-old Amy McNiel of Alvarado, fled the Johnson County Jail on Thursday.

"He was bound to have some scratches on him," said Malcom Southerland, chief deputy sheriff for Johnson County.

He said Foote, clad in orange prison trousers, no shirt and soft shoes, climbed over the fence about 2 p.m. as he and about 50 other inmates were in the jail's exercise

Southerland said the guard was unable to stop Foote. Deputies on horseback with blood-

On Friday, authorites from Ellis, Tarrant, Bosque, Hill and Somervell counties were helping out in the search for Foote, Southerland said. He also said the National Crime

Information Center had been informed of the escape. Southerland said the sheriff's department had received several calls from people who thought they had spotted Foote, but none had turned out to be the escaped pris-

Foote had been brought to the Johnson County Jail from a Texas Department of Corrections unit for questioning in a robbery, Southerland said.

Southerland said Foote, who was sentenced to life imprisonment on

hounds failed to pick up the escaped convict's trail and by about 8:30 p.m. March 28, was not armed when he escaped, but he is considered to be escaped, but he is considered to be dangerous.

Foote, of Arlington, and Michael Lynn Mills of Dallas, 28, were convicted March 27 of aggravated kidnapping in the abduction of Miss McNiel. The kidnappers demanded a \$100,000 ransom from her businessman father. The girl was rescued 21/2 days later after a highspeed shootout.

Mills was also sentenced to life. The McNiel family had left the state on a vacation before Foote made his escape, Southerland said. He would not disclose where the family had gone or when they would return home.

At the trial, Miss McNiel described how Foote pushed her up against the back window of a car during a running gun battle with authorities.





Known as the best returner of serve in tennis, Connors was repeatedly caught flat-footed by the booming serves of Kevin Curren in their semifinal match at

Wimbledon. And when it was over, Curren had an easy 6-2, 6-2, 6-1 victory and a berth in Sunday's final at this prestigious grass court tour-

He did it with his serving and with his game plan, one taken right out of the Arthur Ashe book on how to play Connors.

In 1975, when a young Connors was stomping everyone in his path, Ashe used a backhand slice, which keeps the ball low to the ground after it bounces, to Connors' forehand. Ashe also hit the ball short - the perfect ball for an attacking player such as Con-

But what should have been to his advantage turned into his disadvantage as Connors repeatedly drilled the forehand approach shot into the net, self-destructing.

Everyone took notice, and before Connors could get untracked, a young right-hander, Bjorn Borg, came out of Sweden to create the "Borg Era."

Borg has long since retired and Connors remains one of the top players in the world, seeded third at this year's Wimbledon. But Curren resurrected Ashe's weapon of hitting slices to the forehand, then added a touch of his own - hitting it deep, keeping Connors pinned to the base-

And there were those thunderous serves.

Before the match began, a severe thunderstorm, laced with lightning, whipped across the All England Club, delaying the start

But Curren's opponent won't be determined until Saturday intermittent thunderstorms finally forced the postponement of the other semifinal between unseeded West German prodigy Boris Becker and Anders Jarryd of Sweden with the match tied 1-1 in the third set after they had split the first two.

Curren, a native South African who became an American citizen earlier this year, upset defending champion and top seed John McEnroe in straight sets in the quarterfinals. He demolished Connors, the top seed left in the tournament, 6-2, 6-2, 6-1.

The Becker-Jarryd match will be resumed at noon today (7 a.m. CDT) followed the women's championship match between the two co-No. 1 seeds — Martina Navratilova, seeking her fourth straight title here, and Chris Evert Lloyd.

Play was delayed Friday by two storms, the first of which struck 20 minutes before Connors and Curren were to take to the court.

It sent torrents of water cascading down the steps and off the roof at Centre Court. Lightning struck three trees in the immediate area, including one that was sent sprawling across the far reaches of the grounds at the All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club.

When the match started, an hour and a half late, it was Curren's turn to provide the thunder, as he blasted 17 aces past the 32-

It was almost a rerun of two years ago when Curren shocked Connors in a fourth-round match with 33 aces. "He was 16 short today," Connors said.

### Wimbledon lures Twilight People WIMBLEDON, England (AP) - concentration while we're watching They arrive at night, bed down in matches. But it's well worth it."

warm sleeping bags under the moonlight and wait patiently until daybreak.

They are the Twilight People, and every year scores of them camp out on the sidewalks outside the grounds of the staid All England awn Tennis Club, home of the Wimbledon tennis championships, ready to be first in line the following

day for unreserved seats. "I've been coming here since 1967," said van driver John Icke, 45, tucked up peacefully inside a quilted sleeping bag but otherwise open to the elements.

"I wouldn't do it for any other sport, I'm only interested in Wimbledon.

Icke travels to Wimbledon every year from his home several hundred miles away in the English midlands county of Worcestershire. Alongside him outside the hallowed grounds of the club was policeman John Riggs, and his wife Anne, who journeyed here from Plymouth in the far

southwest of England. 'We could probably have a holiday abroad for what it costs us to come here in terms of tickets and car park fees," Riggs said.

But we've met a lot of good buddies in the six years we've been coming here. Sure, we don't get much sleep at night and sometimes lose

Riggs said one year, he and his wife came to Wimbledon during the daytime and joined the endless queues of people stretching in a wide arc round the entrance gates.

We got in the back row of one of the center court stands and could hardly see a thing. And that after four hours queueing. That's much more painful than spending the night out here.'

Rain — and there has been plenty of it this year at Wimbledon - is no problem. To protect themselves, the Twilight People bring rolls of plastic sheeting which sometimes resemble transparent tents.

Three American students, all from Nashville, Tenn., and vacationing in Europe, came to Wimbledon just to soak up the atmosphere outside and

take some pictures. They had no advance tickets but heard about the Twilight People and the following night joined them. When the gates opened the next morning, the students were among

the first tennis fans in line. A lot of Americans come to England and see the same things — the Tower of London, Buckingham Palace and Windsor Castle," said 19year-old Kevin Heifner, a student at

Ouachita Baptist College, Ark. "Those that do come to Wimbledon usually have a lot of money.'

### Baseball talks fruitless again

NEW YORK (AP) - Representatives of owners and players held another fruitless bargaining session Friday in an attempt to avert a baseball strike and the head of the players' union said he hoped the two sides would get into "substantive ne-

gotiations" next week.

Although MacPhail said there are "no silver linings," he also said the two sides have "agreed to meet pretty much on a day-by-day basis" be-

They're trying to disparage our figures as much as they can. Obviously, they want to make it look like there's no problem."

Although there was nothing but pessimism from the players, Mac-Phail said he was still optimistic over

chances of reaching an agreement. "I continue to think that somehow we'll work our way through this thing," he said. "Hopefully, there's enough sense on both sides not to permit a strike to happen. There's enough money there to allow the clubs to stand on their feet and still let the players be well-paid."

Fehr said he told the PRC that the Players Association hoped to have the reports from its accountants by July 15 and possibly by the end of next week. The association's executive board is scheduled to meet July 15, the day before the All-Star Game, to set a date for a strike.

"We provided them with several charts indicating how the (owners') figures turn out at the end if you look at them slightly differently," Fehr said of Friday's session. "This meeting was basically to fill them in on what our accountants have done. Next week, and I hope on a very intensive basis, we'll begin to review the information on a club-by-club

FEHR SAID the players' accountants eliminated what he called 'non-cash expenses' from the owners' figures and came up with numbers of their own showing that "the ostensible \$36.5 million loss became a positive figure of \$9 million-\$10

million." Fehr conceded that the loss reported by the owners was "an industry-wide figure" supplied by the PRC, "which is not to say there are not ballclubs doing poorer than others or better than others. We'll continue to bargain, we'll go through the figures and we'll do our damndest to reach an agreement as soon as possible.

He indicated that the players probably would not elect to strike the All-Star Game, saying, "If the players play, it will be a gift for the owners, who receive almost all of the gate receipts and TV money. If they play, it will be for no reason other than they don't want to deprive the fans of the game.'



### Pepper Rodgers proves right salt for Showboats

NEW YORK — Coach Pepper Rodgers of the Memphis Showboats does not regard football's importance as life and death, a characteristic that is uncommon in his profession. Thus Rodgers is not always taken seriously, an attitude that may be in his His team will play the Oakland Invaders today at

Memphis in a United States Football League semifi-nal playoff game. If the Showboats win, they will meet the winner of Sunday's game between the Baltimore Stars and the Stallions in Birmingham, Ala. in the championship at Giants Stadium on July 14.

Rodgers said, in a telephone interview Thursday, that he had been playing a tape of the song "New York, New York" in the locker room this week, and that he was not doing much coaching.

"You've got to plant a seed," said Rodgers. "This will be a players' ball game. They're playing for big, big prestige, the things that go with being on a championship team. Other games may be coaches'

games. But when you get down to a big one you don't fire up the players. You leave 'em alone."

An expansion team a season ago that lost 11 of 18 games, the Showboats remained hidden in the standing for the first two months of this season. Then the team began to win consistently, finishing on top in 10 of its last 12 games. It is being taken seriously and so is its coach.

"I don't have any ego problems," said Rodgers, now 53 years old. "They have been trying to batter my ego for a long time and never succeeded. I've always had a nice time coaching football, and I'm sure I'll continue. It's fun.

"I told the players that win, lose or draw on Saturday, they got us here and they have one more chance to get us there, to the championship.

It is been a while since Rodgers coached a champi onship team. His last one was at Kansas, the Big until 1979 when he was, in his word, "fired."

Eight Conference champion in 1968.

"Bobby Douglass was my quarterback," he re-called. "John Riggins my fullback; Larry Brown at offensive tackle, and John Zook defensive tackle." All became distinguished players in the National Football League. Riggins and Brown are still active. Rodgers then coached at UCLA, from 1971 through 1973, and at his alma mater, Georgia Tech, After that he hung around Atlanta, his home city,

wrote his autobiography entitled, "Fourth and Long Gone," tried some television commentary, and felt sorry for himself until the Showboats hired him. The team nickname fits the coach. Before Mem-

phis met the Generals last April, Rodgers wore a jersey with Doug Flutie's No. 22 and took the role of Flutie in drills for the defense. Rodgers was an accomplished small quarterback in college,

He also wore a tuxedo on the team plane enroute to the second game against the Generals, suggesting that the Showboats were going north to play the fancy and rich Generals. They lost, nevertheless.

On another plane trip to a game, when the team

was down after losing three in a row, he wore his old Air Force pilot's helmet and joked. "But he's no clown," Steve Hammond, a Memphis linebacker, said. "He's a good coach who likes to have some fun. That's all."

Rodgers made two coaching decisions during the season that turned his team around. One was major.

After they were formed, the Showboats signed at considerable expense Walter Lewis, who had been an exciting option quarterback at Alabama. But after nine games this season, Lewis, a better runner than a passer, was replaced by Mike Kelley, a pro-style dropback passer from Georgia Tech. With Kelley, the offense sustained drives and scored points.

The second decision was to move Reggie White, a huge but quick defensive lineman from Tennessee, from end to nose tackle, where White became a disruptive force. It was White, weighing 305 pounds, who squashed Flutie last June 1, resulting in a broken collarbone that ended his season and, ultimately, stopped the Generals themselves.

CLEVELAND (AP) - Neither one wants to call it a feud, but there is no mutual admiration society with Bobby Rahal and Mario Andretti as members.

Last Sunday in the U.S. Grand Prix Indy-car event at the Meadowlands in New Jersey, Rahal crashed into the back of Andretti's car as the two were running first and second. It knocked them both out of the race.

Rahal claimed that Andretti appeared to miss a shift and slowed suddenly, while Andretti, reacting angrily, said he was under braking and that Rahal should get his eyes checked.

It was the second time that Rahal has struck Andretti from behind this season. The first time came several weeks earlier in an International Race of Champions event at Lexington, Ohio, when Rahal struck Andretti and spun him out as he attempted to pass for first place. Rahal went on to win that event.

The two drivers, in town for Sunday's Budweiser Cleveland Grand Prix, had an angry exchange of words Friday morning before taking part in a motorcade through downtown.





GREENVILLE, Texas - The sounds of guitars and a fiddle carry through the glass doors and into the night air. By 7:15 scarcely an empty parking space remains in the lot at

Wright Park Community Center. Inside, couples fill the dance floor as the band plays "Have I Told You Lately That I Love You?" followed by an upbeat version of "Kansas City." 

Some years ago the head of one of the largest corporations in this coun-try made an appointment to see me. I had often heard about this man or read of his activities but had never met him. When he came, I at once sensed the force of his personality. I realized that no one could have attained his top status in the business world without high-grade mental capacity and lots of talent.

But Mr. X was very shaken and showed symptoms of nervous breakdown. He explained that this doctor ascribed his deteriorating emotional and physical condition to pressure

In this interview he told me that he had read one of my books and he came up with a unique suggestion.
"When I do not feel up to par physically, I consult my doctor and he gives me a prescription. So now that I am in a bad way emotionally why can't I come to you as a mental and spiritual doctor? Please write me a prescription. I have faith in you and promise I will follow it."

It came out that he had become terrified of making decisions facing him almost daily as president and chief executive officer of this huge

corporation. Previously he had been keen minded and quick and accurately decisive. In some way the pressure under which he had bro-ken nervously had resulted in a mind-gripping fear which manifested itself in self-doubt which made him afraid that he would decide problems erroneously. As a result, he had become timorous and indecisive. Aides being forced to cover for him had protected his position thus far but he said, "I know I can't get away with my inability to deal with problems

much longer." Well, Mr. X," I said, "I believe

that if you add a deep mental peace to your mind your drive will be enhanced and confidence in your judgements will be restored." I quoted from the poet Edwin Markham: "At the heart of the cyclone tearing the sky is a place of central calm." That is to say the cyclone or elemental power draws its force from a calm center." had written this "prescription." "I'll follow it." And he did regularly and completely. And presently he was his old self again.

A long time later the head of a big soft drink company said, "Thank you for pulling me out of a mental funk." When I expressed surprise he pulled a paper from his wallet. I was astonished for it was the prescrip-tion I'd given Mr. X. "He passed copies of that around among his friends and it works." It might even work for you.







### Maine summer residents, town, state battle over public rights to beach

WELLS, Maine (AP) — There's no boardwalk at Moody Beach — no roller coasters, hot dog stands or amusement piers. There's only sand and surf.

Moody Beach is also Bob Kirk's backyard. If it were up to him, he'd exclude the public.
"In the summer, it's wall-to-wall people out there," said Kirk, 61, who retired to the Atlantic shore in

Wells township after a career as an executive with AT&T, mostly in New Jersey.

All that he and his beachfront neighbors want is

peace and quiet, Kirk said. A group of more than 50 seaside property owners has gone to court, hoping to have the beach declared off limits to the public.

The Maine attorney general's office, the town of Wells, the Natural Resources Council of Maine and the Conservation Law Foundation in Massachusetts are taking Kirk's complaint seriously. All have become parties in the suit. All maintain the public has had a right to enjoy the seashore since Colonial times, even when the seashore happens to be pri-

Maine Attorney General James E. Tierney agreed that Moody Beach, a mile-long strip about 25 miles north of the New Hampshire state line, attracts its share of summer crowds.

But, he added, "People stay in Maine and move to Maine because of the openness of our state. This is what Maine is all about.

Tierney said he's concerned that a decision in favor of the landowners would become a precedentsetting barrier to public access in shorefront areas throughout the country.

The issue is particularly serious in Maine. The state's craggy coastline has become one of the Northeast's premier tourist attractions, but the glaciers that carved out the numerous coves and harbors left only 35 miles of sandy beach. Only seven miles of that are publicly owned.

The legal arguments center on the Colonial Ordinance of 1641, a holdover from the days when Maine was part of Massachusetts, and Massachusetts was part of the British Empire.

The Moody Beach landowners claim the Colonial Ordinance granted private landowners title to the beachfront, reserving for the public only the right to engage in "fishing, fowling or navigation.

In most states, some public access to the beach is guaranteed because the "intertidal zone" - land that is covered at high tide but exposed when the tide is out — is not considered private property. At Moody Beach, the landowners argue that the Colonial Ordinance grants them the right to the entire beach, all the way to the low-water mark.

The defendants in the case, which include the state and the Wells Board of Selectmen, maintain that England intended no such thing, but created the ordinance to promote the development of

The residents argue that things have changed. They say that tourists have started arriving by the busload, and that the town of about 9,000 has started to encourage use of the private beach by stationing lifeguards in the area.

Wells Town Manager Fred Breslin said Wells officials have tried to cooperate with the Moody Beach residents to control the beach area. He said local officials persuaded area campgrounds and hotels to stop depositing guests by the busload.

And, he added, police patrols have been increased in the summertime.

The legal suit has pitted the Moody Beach landowners, many of whom are summer residents who pay taxes but have no vote in town affairs, against other area residents, who don't own beachfront

The Moody Beach landowners are "ungrateful and stupid," said Michael Lubarsky, a maintenance

man at the Mid Way Motel on nearby Route 1. "Any beach you go on there are a few rowdies."

Across the highway, Lucien Dion is worried about the future of the motel and campground he owns. "If the beach is gone, the town is gone," he said.
"Nobody comes here to look at the mountains."

CHICAGO (AP) - Mayor Harold Washington and others read aloud in downtown Chicago on Friday to begin a 24-hour "read-a-thon" promoting literacy among passersby more accustomed to hearing rum-bling traffic than lyrical poetry.

Washington drew cheers and applause from a crowd of about 100 children and adults as he read and explained poems by Gwendolyn Brooks, the Pulitzer-prize winning poet laureate of Illinois.

"Do you know what the mayor does for a living?" he joked afterward with a group of youngsters seated on the grass at Grant Park, across from Chicago's Loop district. "This!"

Wally Amos, national spokesman for the Literwally Amos, national spokesman for the Literacy Volunteers of America, one of the sponsors of the event, said its purpose is to draw attention to "the 27 million adults throughout the nation who are functionally illiterate. They read below a fifthgrade level. They can't read street signs, can't function."

Amos began the read-a-thon with Dr. Seuss' "The Cat in the Hat," drawing laughter and cheers from youngsters, about 40 of whom had come from Beacon Rockwell Community Center on the West Side. "I think it will arouse kids' interest in picking up a

book," said Darrell Banks, 34, who accompanied the children from the center. "And it gives them the opportunity to see the mayor of Chicago. It should give them some kind of initiative." "If we just make up our minds that we're going to serve each other and help each other, we can solve

the problem of illiteracy," said Amos, a high-school dropout who got a high school equivalency degree in the Air Force and went on to business school. The 49-year-old founder and chairman of the Los

Angeles-based Famous Amos Chocolate Chip Cookie Corp. has been national spokesman for Lit-eracy Volunteers of America since 1979. "When I got involved, there were no events to promote literacy, and you hardly ever heard about the problem of illiteracy," said Amos, who has marched in Philadelphia playing a kazoo to draw

attention to the cause. Volunteers were scheduled to take turns reading aloud at an open-air podium through the night, working in half-hour shifts until mid-day Saturday.

The Texas Department of Public Safety said Greg Hankins and Andy James Taylor, both 16, of Belton perished in a crash on Farm Road 1741 about 11/2 miles south of Temple

A third occupant of the car, John Mohr, 16, of Temple underwent surgery at a Temple hospital, where he was reported in serious condition with undisclosed injuries.

### Hostages subjected to anti-Israel propaganda

The American hijack hostages were continually fed anti-Israeli propaganda during their 17 days as captives, and were awakened every two hours for several nights and shown films of Lebanese suffering, two former hostages said Friday.

The thrust of the indoctrination was Israel, Israel," Peter Hill said in Chicago. "That was the root of the problem (in the eyes of the hijackers)

The indoctrination by the Shiite Moslems who held the 39 Americans in Beirut, Lebanon, prompted "some anti-Semitic remarks on the part of the hostages," and some inappropriate sympathy for the hijackers, who demanded that Israel Shiite prisoners, said Hill.

At a news conference in Hutchinson, Kan., former hostage Bob Peel Jr. said he assumed the sleep deprivation and the showing of the

### Supermarkets stop selling watermelons

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Supermarkets stopped selling watermelons Friday as an investigation into pesticide-tainted melons that sickened at least 72 people in four states and Canada focused on growers in two California counties.

Watermelon sellers complained they would lose hundreds of thousands of dollars during their most profitable time of year - the July Fourth holiday weekend.

All watermelons were recalled at state order Thursday in California and Friday in Oregon, and Alaska officials Friday ordered all California melons off store shelves.

Officials in Washington on Thursday warned grocers not to sell watermelons, and in the Canadian province of British Columbia, food retailers and distributors on Friday were voluntarily removing from stock all California and Arizonagrown watermelous.

At least 72 people had fallen ill in the four states and British Columbia, 34 of them in California, said Kenneth Kizer, director of California's Department of Heath Services.

Kizer said Oregon health officials told him new cases were reported Friday in Idaho. But Idaho health officials knew of no cases in their state. Kizer said he did not know how widespread the

problem was in the rest of the country. 'At this time, it's only California grown melons" that have been blamed for the illnesses, said Tom Hall, senior pesticide use specialist with California's Department of Food and Agriculture. He said it was not immediately clear how far

the melons had been dispersed by shippers. Washington state officials said they were investigating four possible sources of watermelons sold in that state — Phoenix and Yuma, Ariz., and Bakersfield and El Centro, Calif.

Traces of the pesticide aldicarb sulphoxide were found in melons on the vine at two Kern County growers, Kizer said. Officials are now "looking at basically all the

growers and distributors in Kern County and in Riverside County. Those are the two areas that are harvesting and distributing watermelons

Kizer, speaking by telephone from Sacramento, said the pesticide is not meant to be used on watermelons.

"All the people have recovered as far as we know. There haven't been any deaths," he said. 'A couple of the individuals had actually serious heart rhythm disturbances." Death from the poisoning is "unlikely - but it

is possible," said Kizer, who recommended prosecuting growers if they knowingly used the forbidden pesticide on watermelons. 'We're getting lots of reports of pesticide ill-

ness from a lot of people throughout the county,' said Susan Strong, a specialist with the Kern County Health Department.

'It's not one group of people, and it appears the melons were purchased at different places. The phones are ringing off the hook," she said.

### U.S. wants Mexico to limit emissions at copper smelter

WASHINGTON (AP) — Now that it has agreed with Canada to a joint study of acid rain, the Reagan administration is trying to get Mexico to limit sulfur dioxide emissions from a new copper smelter near the border.

The center of focus is Nacozari, Mexico, the site of a huge new copper smelting plant that a Library of Congress study says will, when it opens, be the largest source of sulfur dioxide emissions in North America.

The study by the library's Congressional Research Service says the sulfur dioxide, a component of acid rain, will harm air quality in New Mexico and Arizona and could hinder future economic development there by making the air too dirty to allow new or expanded U.S. manufacturing facilities.

But in what Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., describes as the first official statement of its kind, the State Department says it will press Mexico to require installation of anti-pollution equipment at the smelter before its scheduled opening in mid-1986.

The commitment came in a June 27 letter to Waxman, chairman of the House Energy and Commerce health subcommittee, from William L. Ball III, assistant secretary for legislative and intergovernmental affairs.

Ball wrote that the Mexican government has indicated it is developing emissions standards for the Nacozari plant, which will emit an estimated 460,000 tons of sulfur dioxide a year.

The continent's largest source of sulfur dioxide is a power plant in Gavin, Ohio, which releases

some 376,000 tons a year, according to the study.
"The U.S. will also seek a commitment from Mexico to require installation of continuous emission controls by start-up of the smelter," Ball told Waxman, who has been critical about U.S. response to the situation.

Ball also said the issue will be discussed by a bilateral environmental working group this month and "in the near future" by Secretary of State George P. Shultz and Mexico's Foreign Secretary Bernardo Sepulveda.
