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# Shifting sands 

## Ocracoke <br> Island, whose residents' speech, mannerisms and customs are a throwback to 18th century Britain, is threatened by the changing times.

ferryboat leaves the dock and heads toward the mainland," sighed Annie Lou Gaskins, 53. She stood on the stern of the North Carolina state ferry with her husband Earl, 55 , as the boat began its voyage across Pamlico Sound. Both their families have lived on 16-mile-long, $1-2$ to 2 -mile-wide
Ocracoke Island since the 1700 s .
They are descendants of British immigrants on their way to the Col immigrants on their way to the Col-
onies who shipwrecked on Ocraonies who shipwrecked on Ocra mannerisms and customs are a throwback to 18 th-century Britain. Annie Lou and Earl Gaskins boarded the ferry with other Ocracokers for the two-hour, 15 -minute, 23 -mile sail from their Outer Banks home to spend the day shopping in Beuafort.
From Carova on the Virginia line to Calabash at the South Caroline border a narrow band of sandy isstretches along the entire length of North Carolina's 320 -mile coast. Averaging only 20 feet above sea level, some of the islands are as close as 200 yards from the mainand. Others like Hattras, are as far as 30 miles out to sea. The islands average a half mile to a mile in width.
DRAMATIC CHANGE has come to the North Carolina islands in the last few decades. Through World War II, Outer Bankers for the most part were isolated and cut Islanders seldom, if America. the mainland. They lived in tin remote villages. Outer Banker fished. They manned Coast Guard lighthouses and Coast Guard search-and-rescue stations dotting the long narrow island chain, like famed candy-cane-striped Cape 1870), at 208 feet, tallest in the United States, and Chicamacomico Lifesaving Station at Rodanthe, dating back to 1874.
After World War II islanders began building roads; prior to that

Several islands are now solid condos, mile after mile of stilted (for hurricane protection), unpainted beach homes. A 125 -mile stretch, however, has been spared and set aside as two national seashores. Cape Hatteras National Seashore, 70 miles long, was dedicated in 1958; 55-mile-long Cape Lookout was established as America's bicenWennial national seashore in 1976. Within Cape Hatteras National Seashore are eight old Outer Banks fishing villages including Ocracoke, population 626, where most resiEarl Gaskins - trace their ances-
try on the island to a time earlier than the Revolutionary War.

ISOLATED POCKETS of old-line Outer Bankers with their quaint Elizabethan speech can stil be found in a number of fishing villages on other islands up and down the North Carolina coast. "Our forefathers were yeoman class people, the lower class who escaped from England to seek a better life in the Colonies," explained Walter C. # Superstar of the links 



At age 28 Patty Sheehan has become the youngest professional golfer to win $\$ 1$ million in official prize money.

chomping big bites out of an apple, Patty Sheehan strides onto the eleventh green at the lush Springs, Calif. Under a broiling sun, Ms. Sheehan, golf's newest superstar, has just birdied the sixth, seventh eighth and tenth holes during the first round of the $\$ 400,000$ Nabisco Dinah Shore Invitational, one of the four major events on the women's pro golf tour. She slithers in a 30 -foot putt for another birdie, grins and shoots a clenched fist skyward. The heat is on.
When she's on top of her game, Ms. Sheehan is the smiling assassin of the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA). In just her fifth year on the tour, the 28 -year-old Sheehan recently became the youngest player to earn over \$1 million in official prize money. In 1983, she was the LPGA player of the year.
In 1984 Ms. Sheehan won her second straight LPGA Championship, another of the four major tour events; she also captured the Vare Trophy for lowest scoring average in the LPGA Championship and the McDonald's Classic. in te LPaA Championship and the McDonald's Classic. by playing golf. When founded in 1950, the LPGA tour had
little more prestige - and less money - than a trav eling carnival. "We practically had to beg people to turn professional," said retired pro Betty Rawls. JoAnne "Bis Mama" Carner, one of the giants of the sport, joined the tour in 1970.
She says that players in the early days "couldn't ear enough money to get out of town." Several of them would stay in older hotel rooms with a kitchen, alternating cooking chores
The explosive growth of the LPGA is one of the great success stories in sport. In the late 1970 s and early
1980s, media superstars Nancy Lopez and propelled the LPGA into national prominence. As a 21 year-old rookie, Ms. Lopez won a remarkable eight tourna ments in 1978 and captured the attention of the sports world with her sunny personality.
Ms. Stephenson gave the tour both sex appeal and head line-making controversy in the early 1980s, posing for pinups and risque fashion layouts. In 1983, the year she won the U.S. Open, Playboy labeled Ms. Stephenson "the sexiest woman athlete in professional sports.'
Stars such as Ms. Lopez and Ms. Stephenson, plus shrewd promotion, corporate sponsorship and the fitness tive - for women to be "jocks," have turned the tour into a glamorous road show.

Prize money soared from $\$ 1.2$ million in 1975 to over $\$ 9$ million in 1985; hordes of college golfers, spawned by Title IX athletic programs, now compete in rugged qualifying tournaments just for the right to tee it up with the pros.
