A 31-year-old Midland man injured about 3:24 p.m. Thursday when this back-hoe machine struck a natural-gas line was listed in fair condition this morning in Midland Memorial Hospital, a hospital spokeswoman said. Arrests made in bombing of Kuwaiti cafes

KUWAIT (AP) — A number of suspects have been arrested in the bombing of two crowded seaside cafes in which 11 people died and 89 were injured, a security official said today

Authorities halted outgoing flights at Kuwait airport and coast guard boats patrolled Kuwait's territorial waters in an effort to seal all exits from the Persian Gulf country.

No one claimed responsibility for the Thursday bombings, the latest in a string of terror attacks in this oilrich nation of 1.5 million.

'A number of suspects have been arrested," said the security official, who spoke only on condition he not be identified. "The two time bombs that ripped through the cafes were 25 kilograms (55 pounds) of TNT each, placed by terrorists on the grass under chairs along the playgrounds of the cafes.

Other officials said an unspecified number of Shiite Moslem suspects had been rounded up. There are about 200,000 Shiites in Kuwait, including about 140,000 expatriate workers from Iran, Iraq and Leba-

Kuwait has been the target of terror attacks by Shiites who apparently view it as favoring predominantly Sunni Moslem Iraq in its five-year-old war against Iran. Iran Persian nation not Arab, and is

Sharq seaside cafe in Kuwait city, killing eight people. The second occurred three minutes later at the al-Saliyeh cafe in the densely populated Salmiyeh district six miles away. Three people were killed there, security officials said.

Both cafes were crowded with families enjoying the eve of the Moslem sabbath

Hospital sources said the dead included an Egyptian worker and 10 Kuwaiti nationals. Full identifications were not immediately available.

Security forces sealed the areas around the two blasts and detoured civilian traffic, witnesses said. Police cleared a public park near the al-Sharq cafe, apparently for fear of more explosions.

The playgounds and the cement aisles in the two cafes were littered with torn and burnt limbs, shredded cloaks, shoes and broken water pipes," said one photographer, allowed to visit the site after the bodies had been removed. "Big blood patches covered the cement and walls.

Construction worker Ahmed Osman said of the al-Salmiyeh blast: "I saw children running out of the place with their faces covered with Women screamed and wailed while men were running aimlessly about looking for their children. A witness near the al-Sharq cafe who spoke on condition of anonymity said, "Families on the eve of Friday take their children to public parks and cafes, and whoever planted the bomb in the cafe couldn't have picked a worse time.

TOKYO (AP) - A U.S. Marine helicopter slammed into a hillside on Okinawa island today, killing four crew members who were on a routine training mission, a Marine Corps spokesman said.

The cause of the accident was not known, said spokesman Capt. Dan Trout

It was the second crash of a Japanbased Marine CH-53D "Sea Stallion" helicopter in three months.

A witness reported the helicopter was "roaring and spouting gray smoke" before it exploded in midair and plunged into a hillside, said local police spokesman Masahiro Nakamura

Police rescuers earlier reported finding the charred bodies of three crew members, Nakamura said.

Trout said the four were members of "a rotating squad, which means they have family and relatives in the United States." He declined to name the victims pending notification of their relatives, but said they were

based on the West Coast of the United States.

The helicopter crashed at about 1:15 p.m. (12:15 a.m. EDT) over part of Camp Butler, the main Marine facility on the southern Japanese island

June inflation rate zero, figures show

WASHINGTON (AP) - Moderating energy prices combined with another decline in food costs to keep the wholesale inflation rate for June at zero, the government said today.

That enabled the economy to finish the first six months of the year with an annual wholesale inflation rate of 1.4 percent.

The flat figure for June came after four consecutive months of slight increases in the overall index. fueled mostly by higher energy costs.

Meanwhile, retail sales fell a sharp 0.8 percent in June, the biggest decline in 11 months.

The Commerce Department said retail sales totaled \$113.9 billion in June, compared to \$114.8 billion in May sales. All the figures are seasonally adjusted.

With consumer spending a driving force behind the current economic recovery, the disappointing June sales performance was likely to spur fears about the durability of that recovery.

Food prices, which have been falling steadily since December, were down only 0.1 percent last month because of higher prices for beef and veal and fresh fruits and vegeta-

But the energy component fell 2 percent in June after a 3.4 percent increase in May and a 5.8 percent jump in April. Analysts had been saying that those big April and May fuel price increases would taper off as lower world crude oil prices filtered through the economy. But the 2 percent drop last month was larger than expected.

Wholesale prices overall were up 0.2 percent in May and 0.3 percent in

April. The 1.4 percent inflation rate for the first half of the year compares to a 2.8 percent increase in the comparable period for 1984. But wholesale prices rose at an annual rate of only 0.6 percent in the second half of 1984

Most analysts had been projecting at least some increase in the June

inflation rate.

Fresh fruit prices shot up 4.7 percent last month after declines of 4.5 percent in May and 4.7 percent in April. Fresh vegetable prices were up 5.6 percent last month after a 14.3 percent decline the previous month. Beef and veal prices rose 2.8 percent in June after falling 3 percent in May and 5.6 percent in April.

Gasoline prices inched up 0.4 percent in June after a 3.8 percent increase in May and a 9.5 percent jump in April.

Prices for consumer goods other than foods and energy increased 0.4 percent in June after a 0.1 percent increase in May.

Overall, the wholesale price index for June was 1.1 percent below June 1984. Food prices, which fell at a 5.7 percent annual rate the first half of 1985, were 0.8 percent lower last month than a year earlier and energy costs were 3 percent lower than June 1984.

Prescription drug prices fell 1 percent last month after rising 2.3 percent in May.

Shoe prices rose 1.5 percent last month after two consecutive months of decline

All the prices were adjusted for normal seasonal variations

The Labor Department's Producer Price Index for June stood at 294.0, meaning that goods and services costing \$10 at the wholesale level in 1967 cost \$29.40 last month.

City park planned near new YMCA

Advised to "give the park your best thought; come up with some-thing innovative," a group of citi-zens from various organizations in south and east Midland will work out a request to develop Tolbert Park adjacent to a new \$1.3 million YMCA.

The group of about 20 persons met Thursday night at Kerr Cen-ter with Mayor G. Thane Akins, council members Oralia Corrales and David Godfrey, City Manager James Brown and Parks and Rec-reation Assistant Director Em Carnett about proposals to develop the park and construct a community building on the land bordered by Batternet and Hem

By the end of the one-hour session, the mayor suggested the group focus on planning the park and requesting federal funds for assistance in addition to deciding how much the neighborhood could contribute in money or

JAMES BRADFORD, a 28-year native of Midland who organized the meeting, said they originally the meeting, said they originally wanted Hogan Park swimming pool repaired and re-opened. Ms. Corrales requested the city staff look at the pool and was given an estimate of \$900,000 to re-open it. "Talking to some people who know about this matter, they said the \$900,000 was a modest amount if we want a first-class pool," Bradford told the group.

TWA hijackers to be prosecuted BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - The state radio today said the govern-ment has ordered three men prose-cuted in the hijacking of TWA Flight 847, and publicly identified the reputed sky pirates for the first

One American was shot dead and

One American was shot dead and 39 passengers and crewmembers held hostage for 17 days after the hijacking of the TWA jet. In its 11 a.m. news broadcast, gov-ernment-owned Lebanese radio said the names of the three men had been "referred to the competent judicial authorities" in the Mt Leba-non part of Beirut, which includes the international airport. The news item was dropped with-out explanation from further broad-casts. Government sources, who insisted on anonymity, and this was

done because of instructions "from above.

State radio named the hijackers as Ali Atwi, Ali Younis and Ahmed Gharibeh, but said it had no further information about them or about an unspecified number of "other" accomplice

> The radio said nothing about their being in custody, or whether war-rants for them had been issued in the June 14 hijscking. An earlier account incorrectly

listed one name as Gharbieh

"The names were referred as a prelude to prosecuting them and to take adequate legal procedures against them," the radio said, with-Maurice Khawam,

al of Mt. Lebanon county, told

reporters in Christian east Beirut after a meeting with President Amin Gemayel on Wednesday that his office "will move against the TWA hijackers."

Vice President George Bush could vice President George Bish could not confirm the radio report, but said in Washington in an interview on ABC-TV's "Good Morning America" that U.S. officials were "somewhat optimistic" on the chances of arresting the hijackers.

"There appears to be now in Lebs-non, even though the government is separated, an effort to do more about securing the airport," Bush said. "I think they want to do that and to apprehend these people."

LONDON (AP) — Royalty will open it, a Who's Who of pop stars will take part in it and perhaps a billion television viewers will watch as a 16-hour trans-Atlantic rock concert is beamed worldwide Saturday to aid African famine victims.

The concert, called Live Aid and staged in stadiums linked by satellite 3,000 miles apart in London and Philadelphia, will be beamed live to at least 88 countries, organizers say. Almost every other nation will get tapes either relayed or sent by diplomatic pouch.

China turned down an offered satellite feed and South Africa is barred because of its racial policies. But the Soviet Union's state TV network will receive the transmission — and perhaps screen part of it — as will a clutch of other East bloc nations.

And a performance by a Soviet group, Autograph, will be slotted live from Moscow alongside num-bers by the rich and famous of Western pop music, from Paul McCartney to U2, said Bernard Doherty, spokesman for the British promot-

Australia also is taking part with a concert of 16 bands scheduled to be taped tonight at the Sydney Entertainment Center and fed into the live shows Saturday morning. There also will be live feeds from Japan, The Netherlands and West Germany

Billed as the greatest rock concert of all time, Live Aid was conceived by Irish singer Bob Geldof, the 32year-old leader of the Boomtown Rats, after he watched TV film last October of the starving and dying in drought-ravaged Ethiopia.

The alternative he proposed was to develop Tolbert Park adjacent to the new YMCA facility planned on that tract and to build a community center.

Ms. Corrales said the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce Task Force met Monday night and also supported the proposal. "One of the main concerns they said would be preventive types of pro-grams for kids. We work now with PDAP and other drug programs, but it's after the fact. These programs would be before. It would also be a place where young mothers could take their kids and provide something for the kids who are going to be our future," she said.

The mayor said the location for such a proposal was appropriate, 'much more so than Hogan Park. I think it would serve more people." But he cautioned that the YMCA is a separate entity from the city and the council has no control over it. "We have no say over their programs," he said.

Charlie Johnson with the Black Advisory Council said the YMCA was planning a multi-purpose room at its facility, and that might eliminate the need for a separate community center.

The YMCA, he said, is planning to build a facility that would include an indoor swimming pool for year-round use, basketball and handball courts, women's and men's dressing rooms, offices and a day nursery. "It's more significant to me if

the neighborhood comes in and says 'We've raised X amount of dollars. Now you match it' or we're willing to do X amount of well and that they want to give some of it back. Maybe they just want to help.

The video will be slotted into the concert.

Phil Collins will be the only artist to perform at both the London and Philadelphia concerts, whisking to the United States aboard a Concorde flight after the Wembley concert to perform live at JFK.

Each group will perform for about 20 minutes, interspersed with appeals or donations and addresses and telephone numbers of where to send or pledge money.

In the United States, the ABC network will telecast three hours of the show starting at 8 p.m. EDT, and the U.S. cable channel MTV will carry the whole show live.

The British Broadcasting Corp., which is organizing coverage of the Wembley concert with nine satellites and will carry the entire show live on TV or radio, estimates the concert will be available to 85 per-cent of the world's 600 million TV sets.

Poorer nations will get the entire transmission free, while richer ones are being charged \$33,000.

The London and Philadelphia concerts, running simultaneously for eight hours, will include live satellite segments from each other, shown on huge screens in each stadium.

Said Geldof: "Seventy percent of the greatest artists of the last 20 years play live the songs they made famous...that's the ultimate they can give and do it on global terms."

70 or more years. El Puma Nite Club, as it is known today, has a long history dating back to the days when cars and paved streets were rare.

Although El Puma now stands at the busy intersection of New Laredo Highway and S. Zarzamora, it originally stood isolated amid Texas woods and prairie. Even from a distance, accordion music could be heard echoing through the country-

Official has licenses from all 50 states

GRAND PRAIRIE (AP) - When customers offered their old, out-ofstate license plates, Dallas County Tax Office branch manager Jim Sanders decided to start a collection of them.

"The customers enjoy looking at it," he said. "They just say hey, I like that board.' They comment on the colors and designs." Best of all, however, he said, "It

takes their minds off paying taxes. Two boards that cover most of the south wall are home to 86 out-ofstate, foreign, and antique license plates collected by Sanders in the past four or five years.

"This is the license plate office," Sanders said. "I said, Why don't I get a collection from all the states'? Customers have come in from out of state. They would ask us 'Do you need our plates?' So, I started asking for their plates."

Customers are not required to turn in their old plates. The collection includes one plate from every state in the nation, the District of Columbia and eight

antique Texas plates dating back to 1929 Foreign tags include New Guinea, Iceland, Tunisia, Germany, Mexico, Canada, South America, Guam and Okinawa. Sanders has never calculated a dollar value on his collection. His favorite is a white Northwest Territories (Canada) tag outlined in red that is in the shape of a bear on all fours. He has one for each of his other offices in Duncanville and

Lancaster and plans to give one to the Tarrant County Tax Office in Arlington, because it doesn't have one vet When he first started gathering

the license plates, Sanders did not have all of the states represented on his board, so he would label the empty spots. People responded to the blanks

side around the small wooden struc-ture. It was one of the first public conjunto dance sites; a rural dance site, close to that class of people who originated conjunto music: the Mexican "campesinos" - agricultural laborers.

All conjunto hall of fame mem-All conjunto hall of fame mem-bers share not only the music but the life experience of having toiled in the sun, picking anything from cotton to sugar beets. Those working class rural origins are still evident among today's clientele at El Puma, both in terms of attire and in conduct.

During the Great Depression and war years a "kermes" was regularly held around El Puma. These outdoor fairs celebrating religious events featured food booths and refresh-

ments, along with all-night music ments, along with all-night music and dancing. Bygone days came to life in the stories told by the origi-nal owner, who died not too long ago at age 90. For several decades after its founding, the establishment carried his name: "Medrano's." In his lifetime, Medrano witnessed the earnid urban growth which uith rapid urban growth which ultimately surrounded his once rural establishment. What is more, he saw the gradual migration of conjunto music into urban centers such as

San Antonio. Today's Puma still has a country feel to it; nothing fancy, a wooden dance floor, wooden walls and ceil-ing painted a bright yellow. That antique wooden interior provides the music with a remarkable acous-tic resonance. The name "El Puma"

(the cougar) stems from its present owner, Jose Luis "El Puma" Romero. His conjunto, the house band, also carries the name "Los Puma

The black wildcat has come to be the club's symbol. Two striking murals by Ernest Montoya depicting black wildcats in their natural habi-tat decorate the locale. One of those wildcat murals looms above the entrance. Covering the wall behind the bandstand is another huge black cat which peers past the musicians, at the dancing couple. Jose Luis "El Puma" Romero bears a resemblance to the sleek,

dark animal. He dresses in black, has dark eyes and a black moustache. A black Stetson casts a dark shadow over his handsome facial features.

His accordion style is almost effort-less. Los Pumas performs an

A native of the southern Mexican state of Colima, Romero is heir to a family tradition of music. His maternal great-grandfather played the Mexican harp and other instruments. He speaks fondly of his 82-year-old grandmother who sings and plays the guitar.


The repertoire of Conjunto Los Pumas leans heavily toward "rancheras" and "corridos," two different kinds of Mexican narrative ballads. Corridos often relate historical events; they comprise the richest source of Mexican-American histori-cal knowledge. Passed on from generation to generation, corridos are a living sung heritage that reinforce collective identity and memory

impressive number of corridos. "I go by what the people like," comments Romero. Between songs, patrons approach the bandstand and make requests drawn from the vast store-house of norteno music. In keeping with custom, every effort is made to honor the patron's requests.

Conjunto music is a musical expression "sin fronteras," without borders. It thrives in Northern and Central Mexico as well as Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and California. Yet from region to region there are differences in sound. The brand of conjunto played at El Puma is more closely akin to the Mexican norteno tradition. But groups with the tejano style may also be heard there.

Rancher doesn't let his stock buffalo him

CANUTILLO, Texas (AP) — Bill Crossland has been a buffalo buff for more 20 years - but living in the city meant all he could do was read about them.

Then he bought a small farm in Canutillo, a few miles northwest of El Paso. That was 10 years ago. Now Crossland finally has his buffalo -11 to be exact.

At first, the El Paso area's only buffalo rancher thought the bison business was going to be more profitable than owning beef cattle.

Now he's not so sure - it costs him about \$600 a month for grain and hay. And the average market price for a 2-year-old animal is about \$850. So Crossland, 49, says he hopes only to make his herd a break-even hobby

Buffalo remain the same kind of wild animal they were in the mid-1800s when their U.S. population peaked at 50 million to 70 million, he

"They will tolerate the presence of humans but prefer to be left alone," Crossland said. "They don't want to be domesticated. Don't look at them straight in the eye — eye contact is a challenge, and they will take you up on it.'

The buffalo's powerful body, com-bined with its quick temper, makes the animal difficult to corral when humans challenge its privacy. Owners of meat processing plants are not enthusiastic about handling buffalo, he said.

buffalo, he said. "Because buffalo are so unruly and powerful, most packing plants won't let you in the second time. The first time they do so out of igno-rance," Crossland said. A mature buffalo bull's weight ranges from 2,000 to 2,600 pounds — about the same as its beef counter-



Young attorney channels anger into helping refugees

By CARMINA DANINI

LAREDO (AP) - Park M. Hughes is an angry young man. At various times, he has been outraged by the Catholic Church and some of its prelates, the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, the federal government and people who scoff at the plight of Central American refugee

But the 35-year-old attorney channels that anger by helping the refu-gees through his Refugee Legal Services. Established in April, the small, sparsely furnished two-room office is on the third floor of the Sames-Moore Building downtown.

The non-profit service operates basically for Central American refugees, with Hughes conducting deportation defense for those who do not wish to return home. He also contacts churches across the country to raise bond money for the refugees. Other detainees not from Central America are referred to the local Bar Association for assistance. For the first few weeks after mov-

ing here from Washington D.C., Hughes operated out of his car. A small network of new, local friends donated chairs and a desk for his office and even business cards, he says gratefully.

His first clients were referred by Proyecto Libertad in Harlingen, where he worked first as a staff attorney, then as director.

IN SEPTEMBER 1984, Hughes moved to Washington and went to work with the Central American Refugee Center.

The move to Washington was pre-dicated on his belief that Walter Mondale would win the presidency - "I felt there was no way Reagan could win against Ferraro," he says now - and immigration policies would change.

"I hated leaving the border, which

I love, but felt that it would be best if I were in Washington," he grins. The establishment of the new detention center here operated by the Corrections Corp. of America led to Hughes' return to the border.

He almost didn't come, said Hughes. "I was at a point where I didn't

want to do this work any more," he admits. But his outlook changed after an eight-day trip to El Salvador in November 1984.

Hughes says the trip was an eyeopener. "I'd read about the situation and I

knew from what many of the refugees told me but I was shocked by what I saw," he says. Six months later, he still recalls

vividly the six people he saw living inside a cardboard box that had been used to import a Sony television set into the country. He says the "incredible squalor"

he saw in other parts of the world was nothing compared to that in El Salvador, which he calls the poorest country he's ever visited.

WHEN HE and attorney Steve Cooper, who defended Jack Elder, director of Casa Oscar Romero halfway house in San Benito, visited a village not far from the capital, they were detained by Salvadoran soldiers. Hughes says the soldiers pointed guns at him and asked what he was doing there.

They didn't believe that I was an attorney. They kept asking me if I wasn't a priest. That's because the threat to Salvadoran oligarchy is the Catholic Church," he says.

"For me personally to have seen and talked with the people and to get that sense of what people are going through, was incredible. The human rights violations, lack

of freedom of movement, of travel, terrorism, is unimaginable by people in this country. There is nothing but

death and every day these people say, 'gracias a Dios, (thank God) I

didn't get it.' "There are images that I don't

even deal with very much, they affect me so much. He says there has been a huge dislocation in Salvadoran history, with whole families killed. "You don't see babies or men; not young ones any-

"Amazingly, even with living through all that terror, the people are submissive but not broken. They still have hope the nightmare wil end and things will go back to how they were before."

"That's where I first learned about Laredo, because of the migrant workers who worked there," he recalls. A promotion to production foreman didn't last long because, he was told, he was "much too sympathetic with the Mexicans.'

But Hughes continued his advo-cacy work with the Minnesota Migrant Council, and later was sent back to Glencoe to work with migrant workers.

During 1977 and 1978, he worked as personnel director at a twin plant operation in Ciudad Acuna, Mexico. In 1979, he returned to college and received his degree in Latin Ameriond of 10 children born to an Irish Catholic couple, grew up.

"Oh, we had problems, but we dealt with them," he grins mischievously

He dropped out of college after three years and began traveling around the world, "visiting other cultures," as he puts it.

In 1973, he went to work at a corn factory in Glencoe, Minn., and used Spanish he had perfected while traveling in Barcelona for nine months. can history. A year later, he began law studies in St. Paul. During the summers, he would work in the Rio Grande Valley and following graduation, returned to Harlingen where he began fulltime work with Proyecto Libertad.

HIS JOB there put him in contact with dozens of refugees from Central America. "In Salvador, those who've stayed behind for some reason or another talk of those who fled as the rich. In reality, they're poor; you could even say they're the poorest of the poor," he says. "But they're all, the ones who stayed, and the ones who left, struggling for justice

Hughes brushes aside suggestions that what he and a handful like him are doing for the refugees is selfless.



The 11-1 approval of Texas Assessment of Minimum Skills tests came affer a two-hour closed session then another hour of debate over the public vote.

The new test is the result of the major school reform bill passed by a special session of the Legislature last summer. It will be given first this October to 11th graders. If a student fails, there will be three more opportunities to retake the test before the

end of the 12th grade.

"This follows up the requirements of House Bill 72, when the Legislature said we must expect more of the educational system of this state," said state Education Commissioner W.N. Kirby.

"We believe it is not only legal, but fair," Kirby added.

Board member Carolyn Crawford of Beaumont suggested that the approved test was too strict and a test now given at the 9th grade level should be used at least the first year. "I fear we will be in the courts for years," she said.

Kirby said the Texas Education Agency staff didn't believe the cur-

rent ninth grade test would fulfill the Legislature's requirements. Kirby estimated that about threefourths of Texas students would be

able to pass the new test this fall. "This means that about 25 percent will need additional help in the next two years, when the test will be

The commissioner said the proposed test will have 72 questions on mathematics and language arts.

Of that number, he said, it is possible that 20 of the math questions haven't been studied by some students in some districts because new school curriculum laws don't take effect until this fall.



Administration attacks interpretation of Voting Rights act

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Rea-gan administration is arguing that Congress never intended the Voting Congress never intended the voting Rights Act to guarantee blacks would be elected to public office in direct proportion to their percent-age of the population. Instead, the Justice Department

ays, a 1982 amendment to Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act was designed to ensure "access to the electoral process - not ensure victories for minority candidates."

These arguments are contained in a friend-of-the-court brief filed by Acting Solicitor General Charls Fried with the Supreme Court in a North Carolina case involving chal-lenged state legislative district boundaries

The high court has agreed to review a 1984 decision by a three-judge federal court panel in North Carolina invalidating nine legislative districts as illegally diluting the voting strength of blacks. The decision invalidated seven state house and two senate districts involving 30 seats

lawsuit filed on behalf of black said the brief. The document was

voters who challenged a provision in the North Carolina constitution prohibiting division of counties into more than one legislative district.

Civil rights activists had contended that electing several representatives from each county, rather than the old single-member practice, made it harder for blacks to be elected.

In its brief, the Justice Depart-ment argued that nothing in the Voting Rights Act of 1965 permits federal judges to insist on election district boundaries that guarantee safe seats for blacks.

The brief, which also was signed by Assistant Attorney General William Bradford Reynolds, head of the civil rights division, said "this is the first case" in which the high court would review a ruling that multimember election districts violate that 1982 amendment to Section 2.

The Voting Rights Act was passed in the 1960s along with a host of major civil rights laws in the areas of housing, employment and other fields. It fully covers nine states, mostly in the South, and partially covers 11 others, all with histories of voter discrimination.

In its brief, the administration noted that blacks have been elected to the legislature from several of the districts that have been challenged in court by black groups.

It also noted that the three-judge court had said "it has now become possible for black citizens to be elected to all levels of state government in North Carolina.

The three-judge panel, however, also ruled that multi-member state house districts should be redrawn as single-member districts in seven counties and two multi-member senatorial districts.

The larger issue centers on an amendment to the Voting Rights Act, which was approved by Congress and signed into law in 1982.

MULESHOE (AP) - Thousands of mustangs that have overpopulated western range lands in recent years are now making Muleshoe their foster home while they wait for adoptive owners.

Randall and Paula Carr, two Tennesseans who handle surplus horses and burros for the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, have opened a holding pen for 2,000 mustangs here. The horses will later will be sold to

new owners nationwide from three adoption centers. The ranchers in several Western

states have been asking the government to take the overpopulated horses off the land because there just isn't enough grass to go around," Mrs. Carr said.

"This facility is just the first stop before the horses go the the adoption centers."

While the Carrs have participated in the government adoption program at their ranch in Cross Plains, Tenn., the Muleshoe contract with the Department of Interior proved to be one of their biggest challenges, they said.

After being chosen last year from among 400 applicants who submitted bids for the holding facility, the Carrs were awarded the job with the stipulation that the 40-acre facility be ready to receive the wild horses within 52 days.

"We finished it in 32 days," Mrs. Carr said.

The facility was put in Muleshoe, she said, because the government required that a holding pen be built west of the Mississippi. Muleshoe also was a convenient location as a baldway point for moving the ani halfway point for moving the ani-mals to the three adoption centers, and because of its amenable climate.

The first large shipment of wild horses arrived May 10, another in June, and a third is expected in the fall.

Most of the wild horses come from Nevada, Wyoming and Oregon and suffer from severe malnutrition. But on a diet of ground hay, oats and high-nutrition alfalfa cubes, they lose the gaunt look so prevalent in the newer arrivals, the Carrs said. "Burros are the craze," she said. "Burros hate wild dogs, and they're good at protecting cattle because of that. They'll stomp any wild animal that tries to attack the herd."

The three officers were sacked on May 30 without proper investigation or even the right of selfdefense. Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger announced the decision following renewed congressional assaults on the military budget that were being stimulated by revelations that Miramar purchased \$659 aircraft ashtrays, \$404 socket wrenches, and \$2,710 landing-gear locks.

Secretary Lehman reports he "made the decision to relieve those three people" after Secretary Weinberger called him about the horror stories out of Miramar and demanded accountability. The result was a collective Pentagon decision to prove to Congress and the coun- everywhere anew about accounttry that such irregularities would not be tolerated.

But this theatric didn't play well in Peoria or anywhere else. There was a widespread public Congress.

inally the Pentagon has outcry at the Pentagon's obvious sacrificing of career officers to deflect criticism from itself. To its credit, the Navy then undertook the sort of thorough investigation that should have been carried out in the first place.

Secretary Lehman is to be praised for righting the wrong done Adm. Cassidy, and thereby acknowledging his error. In doing so, he dealt with the focus of public opinion, which, without knowing the ins and outs of Navy procedure, correctly perceived that responsibility lay with the base commanding officer and supply officer, not with an admiral charged with pilot training and flight operations.

The latest investigation confirms previous adverse inspection reports that listed Miramar among five of 374 naval installations with uncorrected irregularities. The base commander and supply officer cannot avoid accountability for this or for the discipline laid upon them.

Certainly the American public has every right to demand that the military not be wasteful and that officers be accountable for their actions. But that discipline must be carried out in the proper manner and directed at the proper parties. It was not in the earlier decision. The unfortunate Miramar epi-

Eden Pastora Gomez was born about 48 years ago, the son of a Costa Rican mother and a Nicaraguan father who was killed by an officer in Anastasio Somoza's National Guard when the boy was 7. Educated by the Jesuits in Managua, young Pas-

were sent "to the exterior," meaning Cuba or the Soviet Union, to win support for the cause, while the older men fought as guerrillas in the mountains.

In 1963, a curious incident occurred that may have cast a long shadow over Pastora's later relations with his Marxist compatriots. The young rebel and a companion, Alejandro Martinez, were sent by Fidel Castro to Mexico to pick up \$80,000 at the Soviet Embassy. The money was to be delivered to Castro, who would then disburse it to the Sandinistas.

But Castro never got the \$80,000. Pastora refused to let Martinez accompany him to the embassy, and returned five hours later. Less than a month after that, Martinez was arrested in Havana, accused of being a CIA agent and of having stolen the Soviet money. He spent several years in prison before he finally won an interview with Castro and told him that Pastora had taken the \$80,000. Castro was evidently convinced, because Martinez was released forthwith.

Pastora is the quintessential pragmatist, especially in matters of fundraising and buying weapons. "We'll buy from the United States if they'll sell to us," he told our former asso

a small force of Sandinistas seized the National Palace in the heart of Managua and liberated 59 rebel prisoners.

During the months of civil war that followed, Pastora commanded the Sandinistas' southern front with mixed success. When Somoza fled and the Sandinistas entered Managua in triumph in 1979, Pastora was still pinned down by the national guard in the south. His late arrival in the capital may have cost him a top spot in the ruling junta.

As it was, he served in a couple of second-echelon jobs and finally resigned in July 1981. He traveled to Cuba, Libya and Costa Rica, where he publicly denounced his former comrades-in-arms in April 1982, and formed his own anti-Sandinista force. In the years since, Pastora has excelled at raising money and recruiting soldiers, but has had little success in the field.

A quixotic blend of showman, soldier, patriot and womanizer, Pastora is a genuine "caudillo," or leader of men. He has more lives than a cat, and President Reagan is known to be more than a little concerned that some unforeseen twist of fate could put Pastora in the presidential palace in Managua. No one can be sure which way Pastora would lead his

To many Democrats, a Reagan retreat on taxes following Social Security and defense also would complete the vindication of Walter Mondale.

All that House Democratic leaders ask to push a tax boost is a single word from Ronald Reagan, ensuring he will actively support them. It looked as though that word might be in the offing during the Fourth of July weekend when reports spread through Washington that tax re-form was being pulled back for re-pairs with all effort put on deficit reduction.

Another Reagan retreat? Not yet, anyway. The timetable always called for the president to ease up his campaign during the summer while tax reform percolated in the Ways and Means Committee.





HOUSTON (AP) - It took him 18 years and 10months to be in a position to notch his 4,000th career strikeout, and when the opportunity came Houston's Nolan Ryan knew exactly what to do.

Just as he had done so many times in his strikeoutfilled major-league career, Ryan played New York Mets left fielder Danny Heep exactly as he planned Thursday night, sending the former Astro into the record books as the strikeout ace's 4,000th victim. The accomplishment came on a night when Ryan had been selected to the National League All-Star team for the sixth time.

Ryan needed only three pitches against Heep, a fastball which Heep fouled off, a changeup, which he took, and a curveball that Heep chased and missed.

"That's exactly what I wanted to do," Ryan said. "I went over those three pitches in my mind and I decided that's the way I wanted to do it if I didn't get behind him.

FOLLOWING THE historic strikeout, the normally stoic Ryan looked almost emotional as he doffed his cap to the standing ovation that greeted him. "I think the fans came out to see me accomplish this tonight," Ryan said. "This was special, I wanted to do this at home. I knew that if I didn't do it tonight I'd probably do it on the road.

This was my last start before the All-Star break. After the All-Star Game we have a long road trip, so that was my motivation."

Ryan started the game with 3,993 strikeouts and an 85-strikeout lead over his nearest rival, Philadelphia's Steve Carlton, who currently is on the disabled list with a shoulder injury.

HE PITCHED seven innings and had 11 strike-outs, running his career total to 4,004. It also extended his career total to a major-league-record 158 games of 10 or more strikeouts.

"He's a competitor," Mets outfielder George Foster said. "When you face Ryan, you have to be ready, or a lot of guys will be walking back to the dugout. "He's one of the most consistent pitchers around

to throw as hard as he does for as long as he has. He s lost some of his fastball but not much." Montreal's Brad Mills was Ryan's 3,509th career strikeout on April 27, 1983, breaking the career strikeout record of Walter Johnson that had stood for 55 years.

RYAN'S MILESTONE strikeout ironically came against the team that he broke into the major leagues with in 1966.

'I didn't have any special team to get 4,000 against, but if it couldn't be the Dodgers, then it might as well be the Mets," Ryan said.

Ryan recorded his first major-league strikeout in a Mets uniform on Sept. 11, 1966, fanning Atlanta's Pat Jarvis.

Ryan, who has five career no-hitters, says he never imagined early in his career that he'd still be pitching in his late 30s.

He attributes his longevity to a devotion to proper pitching mechanics and a lucrative salary structure that allows players to avoid off-season jobs.


The two keys for me are due to the fact that I've concentrated so many years on good mechanics of pitching and also I've concentrated on being as wellconditioned as possible," Ryan said.

Ryan, who is signed through the 1987 season at a salary of about \$1 million per year, says modern-day players have more time to train.

WITH SALARIES the way they are now, a player doesn't have to worry about getting an off-season job and he can spend more time staying in shape,' Rvan said.

Ryan has registered 300 or more strikeouts five times in his career, including a high of 383 in 1973 as a member of the California Angels. He's struck out 10 or more batters in a game 158 times in his career. Mets starter Sid Fernandez struck out seven Astros and was overshadowed by Ryan's performance but he didn't seem to mind.

"This was Nolan's big night and I couldn't be intimidated, I had to go out and pitch my game," Fernandez said. "I was glad he got his 4,000 strikeouts and I was glad to be part of the game. It's something I'll always remember and tell my kids about. I don't have any kids. But when I do, I'll tell them.

Fehr: Financial problems should not impede negotiations But owners, players put off talks for another week

NEW YORK (AP) - Donald Fehr. acting executive director of the Major League Players Association, says it isn't necessary for the union to acknowledge that owners have financial problems before an agreement is reached.

"Even if those disagreements (over teams' financial status) persist, we still must negotiate an agreement," Fehr said after a one-hour meeting

between the two sides Thursday. The only way we know how to do it, with the backdrop of the past several months, is to go back to the nuts and bolts, the issues, on as intensive a basis as the parties feel is likely to allow us to make progress."

When that's done, we'll proceed rapidly, whether there's a strike vote or not," MacPhail said. "The clubs are just as frustrated as the players with the time it has taken. We knew it would take a long time when we brought the problems to the players. We were reluctant, but we had no alternative.



Feisty Rangers still fall to Yanks

NEW YORK (AP) - There are no hard feelings between the New York Yankees and Texas Rangers - except for Joe Cowley's broken nose and Glen Cook's inflated earned run average

In fact, Billy Martin, the feisty Yankee manager who has never met a fight he didn't like, phoned Texas second baseman Toby Harrah after the game to tell him there was no animosity following his baseline collision with Cowley in the third in-ning of the Yankees' 11-7 victory Thursday night in a game that could have turned ugly.

The Yankees were leading 3-0 thanks to Dave Winfield's two-run homer in the first inning and Willie Randolph's solo shot in the second. Cook, the Texas rookie, also hit two Yankees with pitches. To start the Texas third, a pitch from Cowley conked Curtis Wilkerson on the helmet and dazed him, but he remained in the game. Umpire Marty Springstead warned both managers against further retaliation.

ODDIBE McDOWELL singled, and Cowley fielded Harrah's chopper near the baseline and tagged him as they collided. It appeared that Harrah veered toward Cowley and used his elbows to try and knock the ball loose. Instead, he clipped Cowley on the nose, breaking it and opening a cut that required six stitches.

"I never hurt anybody or tried to hurt anybody in my life," Harrah said. "I just hope he's all right. I just spoke to Billy on the phone. I understand things, but I repeat - I didn't try to hurt him.

Martin also absolved Harrah of any intent. "He meant to knock the ball out of

his hand," Martin said. "I know that. He didn't go out of his way. He was right in the baseline. He didn't mean to hurt the guy. That's hard, clean baseball. It's a shame our pitcher got hurt, that's all.

"He (Harrah) went like this (Martin raised his elbows like a pass-blocking lineman in football). What are you going to to do, run with your face out?

"Cowley didn't want to hit anybody. You don't hit anybody with a three-run lead. You don't want to wake anybody up. That woke them up and they got four runs."



DALLAS - Randy White may be All-Pro evidence that training camps are an unnecessary evil for profes-sional football players. White en-joyed one of his best years during his 10th season with the Dallas Cowboys, although he did not visit Thousand Only Control Oaks, Calif.

But there's no excuse for White to fish through the entire summer this year. There's no salary dispute, no reason for a holdout. He is on a new contract worth millions, and as the time nears to head for the Cal Lutheran training site, White wants to be ready

Bob Ward and some vistors from the East who help teach the Dallas defenders the martial arts - especially movement, leverage and handeye coordination - would have been pleased to have the view recently from a seat in White's bass boat.

FROM THE nose of the craft, the big defensive lineman with a chest the size of a tennis court tests his skills against an opponent that is considered no slouch in the quickness-and-reflex department.

On a recent outing, White cast spinnerbait several feet beyond an alligator's head and rippled it back slowly near the surface. The gator waited patiently, its large eyes peris-coping over the water. When the coping over the water. When the lure came within striking distance, the reptile swung its head and clamped down with its jaws. "Missed again," White laughed af-ter jerking the lure from the gator's jaws before it could hook itself. "One thing L don't want to onthe its ar

thing I don't want to catch is an alligator.'

For a man whose job restricts his fishing to less than one day a week for more than six months each year, White has come a long way in the 41/2 years he has been a serious bass angler. Being who he is has opened the gates to some of the best private fishing holes in the country, of course, and that has been a factor in his fishing education.

IT ALL started just under five years ago when White accompanied his coach, defensive coordinator Ernie Stautner, on a bass fishing trip.

Texas Topic

"I didn't catch a fish," White recalled. "But I was throwing a buzz bait - a Lunker Lure I think it was - and the water was clear enough that I saw a little fish run at the lure and miss it. I think I was hooked from that minute on.'

Enter Charlie Waters, a now-retired defensive teammate of White's, and John Haney, father of White's wife, Vicci.

Charlie had this place up north (of Dallas), and it was loaded with small bass," White said. "The first trip up there I caught about 60 popcorn bass. It was an exciting day. Haney's influence on his son-inlaw was considerable. A former boat racer and a sportsman in his own right, Haney is a respected businessman (fishing lures and fishing boat electronics) and angler who holds the state record for hybrid stripers

at 19 pounds, 10½ ounces. "He didn't force me into fishing," White said. "But when I got hooked on it, he was ready to help any way he could. I've met a lot of people and learned a lot from being with him, on a lake or at some boat or tackle show where he was manning a booth. And he let me clean some of the first bass I caught in his driveway.

WHITE IS known at many roadside stops from Mount Pleasant to Palestine, Brushy Creek to Edom, Caddo Creek to Koon Kreek, Catfish Creek to Brownsboro, Murchison to Poynor and Monticello to Athens. And he is respected as a guy that pays his dues.

He has spent his share of chilly days and icy nights during the big-bass season on Monticello, at first learning from people like Bob Gar-cia, Tommy Milam and Jerry Riney. Now, he mostly fishes alone, which may be the truest measure of his dedication.

"I'm not a big-bass nut," White said "but I enjoy the challenge of a lake with big bass, like Monticello. I like to catch fish, but I'm not that hung up on big fish." White's largest catch from public

"THOSE TOURNAMENT guys that go out on a lake cold and have to find fish in a hurry and then find and catching techniques faster than the norm, but that he is behind the average bass enthusiast in fishsome more the next day amaze me,' he said.

How has White learned what he has learned so well? "I watched a lot, I read and I listen.

Then I go try something out and see what happens.'

White's fishing days will grow less frequent as the summer ticks on, but unlike past years, they will not cease. He is no less dedicated to football, understand, but will keep fishing a few days each week up until he reports to Thousand Oaks the third week of July. White does limit his night fishing, and as training camp nears, he stops completely.

White has made it as a football player, and he is making it as a bass fisherman. Pro football and fishing have helped him emerge from the shell, the backwardness, he seemed to have as a rookie.

WATCHING HIM wield a 7-foot, heavy-action flipping rod as if it were a toothpick is a sight to behold, but watching him be a good ol' boy around the gas pumps, short-order griddles and cracker barrels in those wide spaces in the road in East Texas is amazing.

Even though White is a native of Delaware who attended Maryland and who owns a farm in Pennsylvania, he is more Texan than many native sons. He talks the language and that includes some of the bull it takes to survive among fishermen.

He has an eye out for a place in this creeky country southeast of Dallas he loves so well, and the farm in Pennsylvania may be part of the deal. White will someday become "totally Texan."







Actor Victor French says Michael Landon 'real angel'

LOS ANGELES — Actor Victor French says it was Michael Landon who recognized the "good" in him and rescued him from a succession of hed num relation of bad guy roles.







WASHINGTON (AP) - Retail sales fell a sharp 0.8 percent in June, the biggest decline in 11 months, the government reported today.

Consumer spending has been a driving force behind the current economic recovery and the disappointing June sales performance was likely to spur fears about the durability of that recovery.

The Commerce Department said that retail sales totaled \$113.9 billion in June, compared to \$114.8 billion

LONDON (AP) - The dollar fell sharply in light European trading early today ahead of the publication of two key U.S. economic indicators. Gold prices rose

Dealers said the dollar continued a downward trend which in the past five trading days has brought it to its lowest levels in almost a year. In Paris, it plummeted to 8.8200 French francs, its lowest level since last Aug. 29. from 8.9450 francs late Thursday U.S. retail prices and the U.S.

producer price index for June were to be published today Dealers said they were anticipat ing a 0.3 percent decline in retail sales after a 0.8 percent fall in May. But the producer price index was expected to have risen by 0.2 percent in June, dealers said

In London, the British pound strengthened despite expectations that British banks would cut base interest rates today by 0.5 of a percentage point to 12 percent and Mexico's decision to cut its oil prices. Britain is the world's fifth largest oil producer. The pound sterling has gained 10 cents in the past two weeks. helped by relatively high interest rates. It cost \$1.3855 to buy one pound, more expensive than \$1.3820 late Thursday. In Tokyo, where trading ends before Europe's business day begins, the dollar fell to 242.80 Japanese yen, a seven-month low, from 242.95 yen at Thursday's close Later, in London, it fell further to 241.85 yen Other dollar rates at midmorning, compared with late rates Thursday, were: 2.9035 West German marks, down from 2.9410; 2.4205 Swiss francs, down from 2.45825; 3.28425 Dutch guilders, down from 3.3140; 1,883.00 Italian lire, down from 1,894.00; and 1.3536 Canadian dollars, down from 1.3540.


The June decline was the third setback in the past four months and the largest decrease since a 1.4 percent drop last July.

The weakness in consumer sales is coming at a time when overall economic growth has also slowed. The

1985 has grown at a weak annual pace of 1.7 percent, far below the 4 percent rate which the Reagan administration had been predicting when the year began.

While the administration and some private economists are expecting that growth will pick up in the second half of the year, they could take little comfort in the weak June sales figure and other recent business barometers pointing to a sluggish economy.

economy during the first half of June after a 1 percent May decline. Sales of furniture and other home furnishings were down an even steeper 4.6 percent while sales at hardware and building supply stores declined 2.3 percent in June.

In all, sales of durable goods, items expected to last three or more years, dropped 2.1 percent during the month while sales of non-durable goods remained unchanged.

In the non-durable category, sales at department stores fell 1.2 percent while sales at gasoline service stations declined 1.2 percent.

These declines were offset some-what by a 0.7 percent gain in sales at grocery stores, a 2 percent increase at specialty clothing stores and a 0.5 percent gain in restaurant business.

The government report followed release Thursday of information from the nation's major retailers, who also reported disappointing sales in June. Analysts blamed the weak performance on sluggish consumer demand and unseasonably cool weather, which dampened demand for air conditioners and summer clothing.






Q. I have three bonds issued by a telephone company. These are registered in my name and pay interest on October 1 and April 1. I have owned two of the bonds for a number of years

and purchased the third on April 13, 1984. The interest checks are supposed to be depo sited directly in my bank account. My bank says it has received the interest checks for the first two bonds but denies receiving the interest for the third bond. The Forms 1099 I received from the bank that is interest paying agent for the bonds show the interest checks were sent out in 1984.

How can I get the missing interest, which amounts to \$862.50?

A. Start by contacting the interest paying agent bank. Find out the address to which the missing interest checks were sent and if those checks were cashed.

It may be that the interest checks for your third bond were mailed to the wrong address. If your bank didn't receive those checks, it couldn't credit the interest to your account.



checks most likely have been returned to the paying agent bank. Have them sent to your bank. There's a possibility that the checks were mailed properly and someone at your local bank goofed by not crediting the two missing interest

payments to your account. In that case, your bank should straighten things out. Direct deposit of interest, dividend, payroll and

Social Security checks is gaining in popularity. Increasingly, as with SS checks, it's done by electronic funds transfer - by wire, without paper checks being written.

Direct deposit is a good thing, because there's no delay in deposit and, usually, no worries about loss. Foul-ups such as you encountered are mighty rare.

Q. I own several tax-free municipal bonds in "bearer" form, which my broker is holding. The brokerage firm clips the interest coupons as they come due and credits the money to my account.

My banker says this is risky and the bonds could disappear if the brokerage has serious financial problems. He strongly urges me to take possession of the bonds and keep them in my safe deposit box.

The broker says this is foolish, as I have confirmation slips showing I purchased the bonds and the bonds are listed on the monthly statements I receive. He also says I might miss a "call" and lose interest. What do you say?

A. I go along with the broker. Bonds and any other securities you leave with a brokerage firm are covered by Securities Investor Protection Corp. up to \$500,000. Many brokerages provide additional coverage, written by private insurance companies.

In the unlikely event that brokerage firm goes bankrupt, you would get your bonds. SIPC hasn't failed investors since it was set up by act of Congress in 1970.

Your broker makes another good point about calls. Many investors who have possession of bearer bonds don't find out that their bonds have been called for early redemption until they try to redeem an interest coupon six months later. As a result, they lose the interest and their money for at least half a year. Leaving your bearer bonds with a brokerage firm eliminates that problem, because brokerages watch out for calls and redeem the bonds for their customers. ...

Q. My broker suggests I move most of what I have in a bank money market deposit account to a money market mutual fund. He claims I would get a higher yield. Is this true?

A. Probably. The dividends paid on most money market mutual funds do result in higher yields than the interest paid on most money market deposit accounts.

Technically, a money market deposit account at a bank with Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. coverage or at a savings and loan association with Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp. coverage is safer than a money market mutual fund.

However, money market mutual funds use accounting methods that keep the values of their shares constant — at \$1 per share, in most cases. Money market mutual funds are virtually risk free.

Japanese firm charged with import violations

HOUSTON (AP) - A subsidiary of a huge Japanese trading company has been charged in federal court with violating import laws by overstating prices of steel shipments, federal authorities said.

C. Itoh & Co., a wholly-owned subsidiary of the import-export company itself, was charged Thursday with nine counts of making false intentions to the U.S. Customs Ser-

The criminal information filed by the U.S. Justice Department in Hous-ton charges that C. Itoh & Co. overstated the selling price of nine shipments containing steel coils, wide flange beams, iron coils and nails by a total of about \$100,000.

The false statements about the prices of the shipments enabled the company to bypass U.S. laws designed to protect the domestic steel industry from imports priced too cheaply, officials told the Houston Chronicle.

Hanna Co. sells 60 percent of its ownership

CLEVELAND (AP) - The M.A. Hanna Co. said Thursday that it has sold 60 percent of its ownership interest in WellTech Inc., a Houstonbased oil and gas well servicing company, to WellTech's co-owner, Bechtel Investments Inc.

The sale is part of a previously announced restructuring effort intended to improve Hanna's performance in its coal, oil and gas businesses, the announcement said. The sale lowers Hanna's interest in Well-Tech to about 20 percent from almost 50 percent.

The company refused to give the terms of the deal, but the announce ment noted that the company had accounted for a loss on the transaction when in early June it announced a second quarter non recurring loss of \$131 million related to restructuring.



FAA expected to approve air park relocation by August

Approval from the Federal Aviation Administration, Department of the Interior and Environmental Protection Agency on a master plan for relocating Midland Air Park to a site northeast of the city is expected by mid-August, according to Midland aviation officials.

A final public meeting on the master plan for Air Park was held Thursday in City Hall Council Chambers, with representatives from the engineering firm of Daniel, Mann, Johnson & Mendenhall explaining their proposal.

The public hearings and planning are on schedule, according to Aviation Director Victor White. "We're exactly on schedule from when we hired them (DMJM)

last fall. We hope that's a good sign." Construction will be done on a "fast track" method, he said, with it divided into phases. Plans and specifications will go out for bids according to phases with the first part to be ready for bids this fall. Construction should start in February or March with completion scheduled for late spring 1987 "if there are no hitches," he said.

"A lot of earth has to be moved out there for the paving," White said.

Once phase I is completed and Air Park has been moved to the new site, the city of Midland can begin selling land at the current site, he added.

In Thursday's hearing, Wayne K. San Filippo, chief civil engineer with DMJM, and Ray Landy, project manager, showed the layout for the new Air Park, including location for the runways, hangars, fixed-base operators and offices. The master plan details where additional hangars, parking areas and roads should be located during future expansion.

Councilman Gordon Marcum II asked about the cost of building new hangars vs. moving the current ones out to the new site. Filippo said the plan calls for moving the old hangars, with the exception of one old hangar.

In the Executive Summary prepared by DMJM, it was noted that "examination of the existing Midland Air Park reveals a facility that is currently in poor shape with respect to airfield conditions. The runways are deteriorating and their length is insufficient for utilization by larger general aviation aircraft. The land-side portion of the Air Park, presently underutilized, had, however, reached capacity in 1982, during the recent boom.

Their evaluation showed the number of aircraft based at Air Park to increase at a rate of 5 percent a year, reaching a high of 290 by the year 2004.

The report also substantiated the City Council's actions to move Air Park to the site northeast of the city. Air Park "has become encircled by rapid development that has eliminated vacant areas for future expansion. These vacant areas also acted as buffer zones around the airport. And to handle the expected increasing number of larger aircraft, longer runways would be needed

The city obtained the site, containing about 2,600 acres that spill over into Martin County, through a land trade with the owner. In exchange, the owner received about 90 acres of Air Park and Midland Regional Air Terminal land.

White said the federal agencies haven't found anything of significant impact on the site that would cause them to reject the plan.

Filippo said the planning process "has gone well. It's generated input from the community."

McCubbin gets 99 years for murder of foreman



Chronic child support violator arrested hours after 'most wanted' lists published

AUSTIN (AP) - A Fort Worth man was arrested within hours after a list of chronic child support violators was published, and Attorney General Jim Mattox says that convinces him a new "most-wanted" list program will work.

"The fact that the one newspaper in the state which ran the list of names got us some immediate action makes me believe even more firmly that the mostwanted list program will be a success," Mattox said Thursday.

Mattox unveiled his mostwanted lists on Wednesday, asking the news media to help publicize violators in several Texas cities.

The lists (of seriously delinquent child support violators) have been compiled for several areas around the state, with more on the way, officials said.

Within hours of publication of names by the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, one man was arrested in that city, Mattox said.

About 8:15 a.m. Thursday, a newspaper reader in Fort Worth recognized the name of a Fort Worth man and notified the attorney general's regional office

Mattox said a warrent was issued for James Thomas Brackeen, 26, who allegedly is at least \$4,070 behind in child support payments for his 6-year-old son. Mattox said court records indicate Brackeen hasn't made a child support payment since 1982. The man was arrested about 11 a.m.

The man was being held in the Tarrant County jail for contempt of court by failing to make the payments. A judge will hear the case and determine what steps should be taken to make certain the payments are made, Mattox said

binski of the NCA in Washington D.C. Cirrhosis of the liver kills 30,000 yearly. Alcoholism and alcoholic psychosis cost another 5,000 lives. Accidents, homicides and alcohol-related suicides kill 60,000 a year.

There's a lot of chicken-and-egg argument about alcoholism and behavior connected with it, but some general agreement: It is not a moral infirmity or a weakness; it is a disease, and it is treatable.

BUT IT IS NOT curable, says Dr. George Kolodner, a psychiatrist who heads Washington's Kolmac Clinic, an outpatient treatment center for alcoholism. And because there is no cure, Kolodner advocates abstinence.

"It's not like a broken leg that you can stay off for a while and then walk again," he says.

"I also tell people that there'll be a 'cure' in the newspapers every six to eight months, but that you ought to hold off taking that cure until the person who has devised it has won the Nobel Prize. You can bet that if a cure is ever discovered, the person who does it will get the Nobel Prize.

Unlike social drinking, Kolodner says, alcoholic drinking tends to be self-perpetuating. "I had a guy walk in this morning," Kolodner said re-cently, "who said he didn't think he was an alcoholic because 'I don't drink every day, but once I start I can't stop.' I said, 'Right, you've got the disease of alcoholism.

"It's not what you drink or when, but what happens after you take the first drink, and that's what separates alcoholic from the the nonalcoholic."

IT'S NOT SURPRISING that al-

coholism treatment is big business. Americans spend about \$1.3 billion each year on such programs, says John Noble, deputy director of the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) in Rockville, Md. Treatment programs typically fall into three categories: programs within hospitals, residential or some combination of those.

One kind of treatment option is offered by Comprehensive Care Corp., known as CompCare, which controls 27.3 percent of the alcoholism and drug treatment in the private sector, according to spokesman Ken Estes.

Headquartered in Newport Beach, Calif., CompCare has contracts for more than 110 treatment programs in community hospitals in the Unit-ed States, plus 17 hospitals owned outright and used solely for the treatment of alcoholism. In the last fiscal year, CompCare grossed \$114 million and had profits of \$14.1 million, Estes said.

ANOTHER LARGE treatment conglomerate is Recovery Centers of America Inc., which is a wholly owned subsidiary of National Medical Enterprises Inc. of Los Angeles. RCA treats chemical dependency under the name New Beginnings. Insurance reimbursement is currently in a state of flux, largely because of changes in Medicare coverage for alcoholism treatment.

Researchers in California looked at 40 pairs of twins - 23 identical, 17 fraternal - in which at least one of


the two was autistic. Of the 17 sets of fraternal twins, both siblings were autistic in only four cases. But among the identical twins - who, unlike the fraternal twins, have identical genes - both were autistic in 22 of the 23 sets. Those figures suggest that the

trait is the product of a recessive gene - one that must be carried by both parents for it to be passed on the Harvard Mental Health Letter

In addition, a higher-than-expected number of the nonautistic twins had some difficulty learning language. The researchers speculate that autism may be a severe form of this language-learning problem.

Older alcoholics drink less

Dear Dr. Solomon: I know some older people who like to drink, but I've never known an older person who showed the serious kinds of problems that younger alcoholics have. Is it possible that older people have learned how to handle their liquor better? - Kenneth, Los Angeles

Dear Kenneth: Dr. Sheldon Zimberg, of Mount Sinai School of Medicine in New York, points out that older individuals, even those who may be considered problem drinkers, generally consume much less alcohol than do younger people. As a result, alcoholism in older people is usually a more subtle condition and has less acute manifestations.

Dear Mrs. L.: Tests should be used when indicated, and not used when not indicated. The large majority of women with amenorrhea (cessation of menstruation) can be diagnosed by a physician simply on the basis of a careful history and a thorough physical examination.

For example, simply talking with a patient can reveal whether she has been subject to a stressful period, which may account for the amenor-rhea. In such cases, I might ask her about her family, whether there has been a death or serious illness or

weight on nutritionally inadequate diets. Recent weight loss can alert me to a nutritional basis for the amenorrhea. A history of vigorous participation in athletics would also help explain the disorder.

In all these instances I've cited, extensive testing would be unnecessary and therefore a waste of the patient's time and her money.

For Beverley, Atlanta, Ga.: Smoking, even in the absence of other risk factors, increases the risk of sudden cardiac death about five times.



Kevin's problems first surfaced in December 1983, when he was caught in a marijuana transaction at an elementary school, where he was taking gifted student classes.

He was suspended from school briefly but because it was his first offense and involved a small amount of marijuana, police suggested the 12-year-old get counseling through the South Bay Juvenile Diversion Program.

Kevin began attending sessions with a diversion counselor and a private psychiatrist, and was transferred back to his former elementary school to get him away from a peer group his parents didn't like. A month later, Jane, 29, a manufacturing planner at TRW, said she came home and found her only child "in a fog," stoned from smoking marijuana in a park.

Within weeks, he was expelled from another elementary school for possession of a hash pipe and his parents tore down his clubhouse after they found marijuana pipes, cigarettes and Playboy magazines inside. Instead of going to Boy Scout meetings, he was keeping the dues money.

In the next months, Kevin was withdrawn from counseling after the therapist said it was a waste of time, put on restriction by his parents, and suspended from high school for being truant 17 days in a month, stealing hall passes and forging notes.

When the family dog started acting strangely, a veterinarian determined the pet had been fed marijuana.

One day, Jim overheard his stepson say "homeboys would take care of" his parents. Without explanation, the couple found an empty gas can on their front porch.

Police were called on several occasions, but they had no authority under juvenile laws to take any action.

say he's committed a crime (to get him into the juvenile justice system)," said Jim, a 43-year-old electronics company quality-assurance director and Kevin's stepfather for three years.



Organization founded to help parents, autistic children

He spoke in simple sentences, while proudly showing off his sketchbook.

"I did the mountains and the flowers and the sky and the clouds," he said in a loud monotone, sharing a simple color drawing with a visitor.

His smile was shy, but friendly. He seemed eager to please, but there was a bridge between himself and the rest of the world that was impossible to cross

Mark Rimland continued leafing through his book, answering questions with the direct simplicity of a ehild.

Yet he was not a child. He was a gentle young man with a cruel and baffling learning disability called autism.

"I'm 29 years old," Mark said, when asked his age. "I draw and paint," he said, when

asked about his artwork.

"I enjoy swimming," he said in response to a question about his hobbies

IT WAS LATE afternoon and Mark Rimland had just come home from school, a special school for him and others like him in El Cajon. Calif.

Moments earlier, his father, Bernard Rimland, said there was always something different about Mark, right from the start.

'The first symptoms were (seen) the day he was born," said Rimland. "He was hyper-alert, looking around as if he could talk.

'And he began to scream, and he screamed incessantly for hours at a time.

Soon, there were other signs that

Mark wasn't like other kids.

He would speak in sentences before he was 1 year old, but the sentences were like tape recordings of things he heard. He could parrot a nursery rhyme, but wouldn't ask a question

Nor did Mark like being touched or held, like other youngsters. "He was like a robot," Bernard said. "A screaming robot."

AUTISM, COINED FROM the Greek word "autos" or "self," de-

scribes a variety of symptoms that include withdrawal from human contact, sensory confusion, parrotlike speech, a compulsion for sameness and repetitive, self-stimulating behavior, such as tapping teeth.

Occasionally, this can escalate to more violent actions, such as headbanging or flesh-biting.

The symptoms are sometimes accompanied by surprising talents, musical ability, a feel for art or a surprising ability to memorize events.

Mark has an uncanny gift for remembering the dates and even the times of events in his life that others would likely forget.

He enjoys art and has sold some of his drawings, his father said. 'He's far beyond what we thought

he might possibly be," Bernard said "When he was 3 or 4 we of his son. were told to institutionalize him and that he was totally helpless. He's far from totally helpless."

THERE WAS NO ONE who could help Gloria and Bernard Rimland when they first were confronted with the unusual behavior of their young son.

Mark's pediatrician couldn't find anything physically wrong with the boy; autism wasn't well-known at the time.

"I had a Ph.D. in psychology for five years and I hadn't even heard of autism," Bernard recalled.

"My wife had remembered reading a case history in a textbook when she was in college about a child who walked around repeating nursery rhymes in a hollow monotone. So we tracked down that book and went to the library and saw the listed references for the book."

For the next several years, Rimland devoted his life to finding out everything he could about his son's condition.

WHAT HE FOUND, he said, shocked him.

"I was thunderstruck by the startling ignorance of the so-called experts in the field," he said.

What started out to be a research paper turned into a book called "Infantile Autism," published in 1964. The book won him worldwide acclaim, challenging the notion that the condition was brought about by cold, unfeeling parents.

Instead, Bernard posed the theory that autism was rooted in a biochemical abnormality in the brain, that it was a neurological disease like cerebral palsy or muscular dystrophy. The theory was a relief to the thousands of parents who previously

had to bear the burden, the stigma, of somehow being at fault for their child's problems.

"We had parents who were di-vorced because of this," Bernard said. "We had parents who committed suicide because they believed

they caused this disorder. This was a terrible blow to a person's pride, self-esteem and everything else."

AFTER THE PUBLICATION of his book, Bernard began receiving phone calls and letters from parents of autistic children throughout the country. They invariably wanted more information, comfort and ways to help one another.

He'd arrange for groups of people from the same area to get together, thus setting in motion the National Society for Autistic Children.

Today, this support group with 130 chapters operates out of a small storefront office in San Diego. The files contain case histories from all over the world; by cataloging and studying these cases, Bernard has come to better understand the complexities of the condition.

From that office, he still answers calls and receives mail from worried parents. The voices and letters come from as far away as South America, Europe, Japan and Turkey. He also has become a one-man cru-

sader for a vitamin approach to autism, particularly vitamin B-6, a therapy attacked by members of the medical establishment as unproven.

BERNARD SAID STUDIES are beginning to confirm his theory.

'It doesn't cure the disease but it does bring about noteworthy improvement from one-third to half the kids, depending on the study you're talking about.'

Bernard acknowledges that vitamin therapy isn't the whole answer. Research into brain chemistry and genetics may pave the way to a better understanding into the causes

and possible treatments for this condition "I think it's an extremely impor-

tant development," he said. "I think no one knows how many autistic kids fall into this category. But no matter how small a category it may turn out to be, the model it presents

is extremely important for the stimulus it gives to others to try to do the same thing for other forms of autism.

In the meantime, Bernard said he's still going to fight for his son. "He's going to be normal or I'm going to be dead," he said.

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) -Large man-made crystals grown like big pieces of rock sugar candy are playing a vital role in research into a new energy source.


Scientists at the University of

Rochester's Laboratory for Laser Energetics are using half inch slices of a manmade crystal called KDP in their efforts to tap fusion power - the energy that fuels the sun. The crystals are slowly grown in vats of solution until

When an infrared laser beam is passed through a slice of such crystal, it is converted to an untraviolet beam - a key step in harnessing fusion energy





Humidity helping in battle with fires

Moist air helped a legion of firefighters battle Western fires that have charred more than 1.2 million acres, but new blazes left one area looking "like a moonscape" today.

Humidity "has just given us a chance to take a breather and maybe make some headway," said Scott Brayton, a spokesman for the Interagency Fire Center, a logistics and information center in Boise, Idaho. "The general situation is still very critical."

However, the moisture that helped crews against the 13,800-acre Los Gatos, Calif., fire and a 150,000acre blaze in Idaho, was only temporary. More hot weather was forecast today with temperatures in the 908.

The 6th Army put 1,000 troops on alert in case help is needed, a spokeswoman said at the Presidio in San Francisco, but officials haven't decided whether to use the troops.

In Southern California, 150 trailer park residents fled a 300-acre fire near Malibu that authorities said may have been arson. About 400 Girl Scouts and residents of 75 rural homes were moved away from a 350acre fire at Lake Hemet, 100 miles east of Los Angeles.

Elsewhere, there were signals of victory. In San Luis Obispo, Calif., where a 75,000-acre fire was stopped just outside city limits, residents

hoisted a banner reading: "We love firefighters. Thank you for saving

our city." More than 1,000 fires burned Thursday in Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, New Mexico, Montana, Oregon, Utah and Washington. Others were contained or controlled in South Dakota, Nebraska and Wyoming. Fires in Colorado and North Dakota were out, the Boise center said.

About 42,000 new acres of range and brush erupted in flame in various states Thursday, adding to more than 1.2 million acres that have burned since late June, Brayton said. Wildfires have charred 380,260 acres since June 27 in California alone, destroying 175 homes and killing three people. The largest group of firefighters

The largest group of firefighters ever mobilized, from all parts of the country, attacked 393 new fires Thursday, Brayton said. None were major blazes.

The Lexington Reservoir fire near Los Gatos was 60 percent contained Thursday after destroying 15 homes and five cabins. Property damage was set at \$4 million and firefighting costs at nearly \$1 million.

Napalm was dropped on the fire Thursday from a helicopter Thursday to start a "controlled fire" and save private television, radio and micro-wave towers, as well as a relay station for firefighters' emergency communications atop Mount Loma Prieta.

CIA clerk charged with spying

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government of Ghana used a love affair between a relative of that nation's leader and a CIA clerk to identify U.S. undercover agents as well as Ghanaian dissidents secretly cooperating with the CIA in the African nation, the FBI says.

perating with the CIA in the Aritan nation, the FBI says. "We do not yet know the full extent of the damage" to U.S. interests, Assistant U.S. Attorney Justin Williams said on Thursday at the arraignment of Michael Agbotui Soussoudis, a citizen of Ghana, and Sharon M. Scranage of King George, Va., both of whom are charged with espionage conspiracy.

However, Williams said the seriousness of the charge, as well as potential additional security damage if Soussoudis should be released, made it necessary that the Ghanaian be held without bail, a request quickly granted by U.S. Magistrate W. Harris Grimsley. Miss Scranage also was held without bail.

- Both were scheduled for formal detention hearings next week on the charges, which could lead to life sentences in prison if they are convicted.

According to Justice Department sources who spoke only on condition they not be named, Soussoudis, a self-employed business consultant, and Miss Scranage, a \$22,000-a-year CIA clerk, became lovers in Ghana's capital of Accra in 1983.

The FBI's affidavit, signed by special agent Julianne Slifco, accused Miss Scranage of furnishing, at Soussoudis' request, detailed descriptions of the CIA's operations in the African nation, including names and information about communications equipment.

In addition, the FBI said the Ghanaians obtained a CIA report on efforts by Jerry J. Rawlings,leader of the military government of Ghanaian, to get weapons from Libya. FBI Director William H. Webster

said the alleged spying over the past year and a half was unearthed by the CIA itself, but no further details were revealed.

However, an intelligence source quoted in today's Washington Post said the alleged disclosure of confidential CIA data was a "disaster" for CIA operations in Ghana.

"It's very bad," said the source, N whom the newspaper did not identify. "It tells people in Africa, 'Don't work for the CIA.'"

Miss Scranage, 29, confessed her role during interrogation by FBI agents at CIA headquarters Monday through Wednesday, the FBI said. She was arrested Thursday morning.

Soussoudis, 39, was arrested Wednesday night at a hotel in Springfield, Va., near Washington, where he had been led to believe he would have another meeting with Miss Scranage, the FBI said.

He said during his arraignment in nearby Alexandria, Va., that he was

Ghana Embassy spokesman Harry Marshall was away from his office and unreachable for comment Thursday.

According to the U.S. government's criminal complaints against the two, Miss Scranage returned to the United States two months ago after being asked by Soussoudis and other Ghanaians to get further CIA secrets from the agency's headquarters near Washington.

During Soussoudis' arraignment, government attorney Williams said, "There is strong evidence that he... is actively engaged in espionage against the United States." He added that Soussoudis was "in effect, associated with and serving the intelligence apparatus of the government of Ghana."

Soussoudis said, "I am not associated with any intelligence service in Ghana; I am just related to the head of state, that's all."

Miss Scranage answered formal questions about her age, residence and salary during her separate hearing but made no comments about the charge against her.

In the court affidavit, FBI agent Slifco said the alleged spying began in December 1983 when Miss Scranage, then a seven-year CIA veteran, was assigned to the agency's station in Accra as an operations support assistant.

The affidavit said Soussoudis actively sought the names of Ghanaian dissidents who were cooperating with the CIA, so he could have them arrested by the Ghanaian government.

Ex-hostage has surgery

CHICAGO (AP) — A 57-year-old former TWA hostage is "doing fine" after surgery to remove a potentially fatal skin cancer spotted by doctors in West Germany during a post-hijacking examination, the man's family said.

Simon Grossmayer, who underwent surgery Wednesday to remove a dime-size tumor, probably would not have had the tumor identified at this stage had it not been for the hijacking incident, said Dr. James R. Hines, chief of general surgery at Northwestern Memorial Hospital.

"Physicians at the American Medical Center of Wiesbaden, West Germany, deserve credit for such a thorough examination," Hines said.

"He's doing fine," Nora Grossmayer, 21, said Thursday of her father, listed in good condition and resting comfortably. A hospital spokeswoman said Grossmayer is scheduled to be released today.

Grossmayer's skin cancer, malignant melanoma, is the least common but most dangerous of three major types of skin cancer, which will kill 6,500 to 7,500 Americans this year, a hospital press release said.

Defector being debriefed

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. authorities are continuing an intensive debriefing of a high-ranking Czechoslovakian diplomat who defected to the United States two months ago.

Unidentified government sources said Thursday that the interrogations by FBI agents and other U.S. officials began May 14 when the U.S. government granted political asylum to Milan Svec, the No. 2 man in the Czech embany here.

The sources would not elaborate on why Svec, deputy chief of the Czech mission in this country, defected, but they mid he was willing to have his defection made pubtic at this time.

Sanctions approved against South Africa

Republican-controlled Senate, breaking with long standing Reagan administration policy, is calling for limited sanctions against white-ruled South Africa to protest "evil" apart-heid laws that discriminate against 23 million blacks.

'No group has a right in any country to be a master race," Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., said Thursday, hours before the 80-12 vote by which the Senate joined the Democratic-controlled House in approving sanctions.

Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., chair-man of the Sen. Foreign Relations Committee, added the bill would "distance this country from the evil of apartheid." the system of discrimination he said runs "counter to American concepts of decency and justice.

It was the first time the Senate has voted for economic steps against South Africa, and amounted to a statement that President Reagan's policy of "constructive engagement" does not go far enough. There was no immediate response from the White House to the legislation, although the president has consistently opposed sanctions in favor of his policy of seeking change in

South Africa through negotiations. Differences between the House and Senate bill will have to be worked out before a final product can be sent to the White House. Sen-

South Africans strike out at whites

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Unrest by blacks agitating against white-minority rule has spilled over into white neighborhoods, with blacks dragging two white women from their car in one suburb and marching illegally in another, authorities said.

The white women, one 38 and the other 21, were slightly injured Thursday when club-wielding blacks stoned their car in a Johannesburg suburb and dragged them from it, said police headquarters in Pretoria. The mob then stole the car, police said.

A spokesman, who demanded anonymity in keeping with police practice, said the women were driving a black woman to her home in Alexandra township. The black woman fled.

Police said they used whips to dis-perse black marchers in Vereeniging, a white industrial town south of Johannesburg. No arrests or injuries were reported.

Some 3,500 union members, mostly blacks and mixed-race people, went on strike at Volkswagen to protest "the building of buses for the pleasure of the privileged minor-ity while our townships burn."

Meanwhile, Foreign Minister R.F. Botha told reporters in Pretoria that he doubted the seizure of a Dutch teacher from the grounds of The Netherlands' Embassy would worsen relations between the two nations, which he said "are already as bad as they possibly could be."

The teacher, Klaas de Jonge, has been arrested by South African police on June 23. He escaped from a police car on Tuesday and fled into the Dutch Embassy, but police followed and rearrested him.

Botha said De Jonge was suspected of helping the outlawed African National Congress guerrilla movement stockpile arms in South Africa.

However, Dutch officials in The Hague lodges a strong protest over the "serious violation" of their embassy's diplomatic immunity.



Turkish tanker struck

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) - Iraqi warplanes fired a missile into the Turkish supertanker M. Ceyhan today, setting it ablaze in the Persian Gulf near Iran's Kharg Island oil terminal, marine salvage experts reported.

Bahrain-based maritime salvage sources said the 226,145-ton Turkish ship was "abandoned by its crew after the missile blast ignited a huge fire in the stern section.

The sources said the M. Ceyhan was raided at dawn about 100 miles south of Kharg at almost the same location where another Turkish supertanker, the M. Vatan, was raided last Tuesday.

Both tankers belong to the Turkish shipping company Cerrahogul-lari T.A.S. of Istanbul and were on lease to Iran to shuttle crude oil from Kharg to the makeshift Sirri Island terminal, out of range of Iraqi warplanes.

ASEAN pledged aid

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) U.S. Secretary of State George P. Shultz pledged more American military aid to Southeast Asia today, saying the region was increasingly threatened by the Soviet-backed "bully," Vietnam.

"Regional bullies cannot be allowed to terrorize and intimidate their neighbors," he said.

In remarks prepared for delivery to the foreign ministers of the Asso-ciation of Southeast Asian Nations, or ASEAN, Shultz also urged war on international terrorism and drug trafficking, pleaded for freer inter-national trade and sounded some positive notes on recent U.S. Soviet relations.

Shultz did not read his prepared speech, saying he wished to conserve time at a dialogue session between the United States and the

six ASEAN nations. He gave no indication that Wash-ington would take any initiatives in dealing with the Vietnamese occupa-tion of Cambodia, but stressed the United States will not recognize Vietnam until it pulls its forces out of Cambodia.

Congressional action assures toughest anti-erosion laws

WASHINGTON (AP) - The year 1985 already is shaping up as one conservationists will long remember - the year Congress took serious aim at the erosion problem that washes away billions of tons a year of precious topsoil.

Action this week in the House and Senate agriculture committees, coupled with recent Reagan administration endorsement of a new landretirement program, virtually assures that new farm legislation will contain the toughest anti-erosion laws in decades.

"It's a real high-water mark," said Maureen Hinkle, Washington lob-byist for the National Audubon Society. "It's the first time they have taken the appropriate steps to pro-tect the natural resource" of farmland.

Perhaps the boldest action came Thursday in the Senate Agriculture Committee, where an already tough "sodbuster" provision in the emerging farm bill was made even tougher by broadening it to an unprecedented degree.

The sodbuster language denies farm-program benefits — every-thing from direct subsidies to pricesupport loans to disaster relief - to farmers who break out previously unplowed fragile ground to plant crops.

As originally proposed, the bill would have denied such benefits to farmers who plowed up delicate acreage after the legislation was passed. Land already in cultivation,



even if erodible, would have been exempted.

But on a motion by Sen. David Boren, D-Okla., the panel moved to do away with all such exemptions in 1988, or later for land whose erosion potential has not been formally determined by the Soil Conservation Service by that date. A farmer still could avoid losing federal subsidies if he tilled the delicate acreage under an approved conservation plan designed to prevent erosion.

Peter C. Myers, assistant secretary of agriculture for natural resources and environment, called the panel's move "historic" and "a very big, big step." But he conceded the matter will be controversial.

'As a farmer, I don't like anybody to tell me how to manage my land,' Myers said. "But as a soil conservationist, I don't think farmers should farm erodible land."

The House Agriculture Committee had passed its own version of tough sodbuster legislation earlier in the week, although it kept in a clause exempting currently tilled delicate land from the penalties.

In addition, the House panel approved a new program estimated to cost upwards of \$11 billion over the next 10 years to pay farmers to idle their most delicate land and

plant it in trees or grass for at least a decade. The Senate appeared poised to call

for a similar conservation reserve program, and Agriculture Secretary John Block already has endorsed setting aside at least 20 million acres of delicate cropland.

"Things are looking good for con-servation," said Daniel Weiss, a lobbyist for the Sierra Club, which has made soil erosion one of its major egislative priorities this year.

Hinkle said that while soil conservation measures are on track, she still expects opposition to be felt from some farmers who have philosophical objections to government intervention in their land-management practices.

Some of that concern also was expressed by Sen. John Melcher, D-Mont., who said the added teeth in the sodbuster provisions could surprise farmers now planting on roll-ing farmland that could fall under the definition of "erodible.

"This thing has never been discussed with farmers. They are in the dark about what is highly erodible,' Melcher said.

But Sen. Rudy Boschwitz, R-Minn., noted that much of the erodible land now being farmed was put into production because federal programs rewarded producers who expanded their acreage bases by giving them higher subsidies.

"It's important to me that we do not continue to pay people who plow up highly erodible land," Boschwitz said. He and other supporters of the provision noted that cutting back cultivated acreage also could help efforts to cut back surplus production, which has depressed commodity prices.

Less than acre yields 20,000 pounds tomatoes


HOUSTON (AP) - The Weinberg family are veterans when it comes to growing vegetables and fruits. But this year's 20,000pound tomato harvest from less than an acre stunned the northwest Harris County family by surprise

"In all my life, I've never seen tomatoes like this year," said Mrs. Warvin Weinberg, who with her sons, Marvin Jr. and Stuart, farm about 30 acres of land west of Tomball.

The bumper tomato crop came from just two-thirds of an acre. In the space of just a week's time, the Weinbergs say they gathered about 10,000 pounds of tomatoes. For a few days they worked until 2 a.m. packing the tomatoes, Mrs. Weinberg said. Marvin Weinberg doers't know ily this year. 

Texas summers are usually hot and dry, and that means homeowners must give careful attention to watering their yards and gardens. Here are some tips on getting the most from irrigation water so as to keep plants and lawns healthy while keeping wter scosts down.

1. Practice slow, deep watering to allow roots to penetrate deeper so that plants become more stress-resistant

2. Soaker hoses and drip irrigation systems work well on trees and shrubs. It's more efficient to water at night or early in the morning because evaporation is less. However, night-time watering can promote more disease problems.

3. Too much water can be as detrimental, or even worse, than not enough. The rate at which water is applied should be no more rapid than the rate at which the soil can absorb it. Never fertilize landscape plants when soil is dry. It's best to water the area one day, apply fertilizer the next day, and then water again. Fertilizer will do no good unless it is dissolved and moved down into he soil.

4. Shrubs and trees near foundations, under eaves or on southern and western exposures need frequent watering because they often get less benefit from rainfall and have to deal with heat reflected from walls.

Randy Donaldson, a public relations manager for Coca-Cola Co., was sitting in his mother's den in Huntsville, Ala., one night during a late May weekend visit, watching television and drinking new Coke.

All of a sudden, Donaldson's mother spoke up.

"My mother said she liked the old Coke better. She just said, she liked new Coke, but she liked the old Coke better,' Donaldson says.

Donaldson, 35, wasn't the only Coca-Cola employee subjected to unsolicited comments about the new vs. the old Coke. Others were accosted by neighbors, at cocktail parties, at the

country club. And Atlanta headquarters was being barraged with thousands and thousands of angry phone calls and letters that wouldn't abate. The negative reaction to the April 23 announcement continued to receive widespread publicity. One critic wrote, "Changing Coke is like God

Another letter was addressed to "Dear Chief Dodo," and that one was passed directly to Chair-man Roberto Goizueta. Said Goizueta at a news say, 'I don't like new Coke.'"

It was increasingly clear that one of the world's foremost marketers had made a big mistake. Company officials had underestimated the loyalty many Americans felt toward the old Coke. How did that happen and what were they going to do?

Company officials, who said serious discussions about bringing the old formula back began in late June, provided a behind-the-scenes look at giant Coca-Cola in action in interviews. The final OK came Monday, they said.

The decision was ultimately Goizueta's. But Donald Keough, the president, Ira Herbert, executive vice president in charge of marketing, and Brian Dyson, the 52-year-old president of the company's domestic unit, played major roles. Dozens of employees and consultants of all types took part, spokesman Donaldson says.

The board of directors was informed, Herbert said.

Rumors had begun to circulate on Wall Street and among reporters late last weeek that Coca-Cola was planning to bring back the old Coke. Officials don't know where the rumors originated, but Herbert said they "ran like a brushfire

Coca-Cola executives meanwhile stonewalled inquiries. They said later that they didn't want the story to get out in bits and that they had planned to make the announcement at a news conference on Thursday.

But then there were inaccurate reports that the new formula would be scrapped and company officials became alarmed as the pace of trading in Coca-Cola stock quickened. Meanwhile, the portly, silver-haired Keough — he looks like actor Lorne Greene — went to an

Atlanta studio at 2 p.m. Wednesday to film an advertisement announcing the return of the old Coke under the name Coca-Cola Classic.

Back at headquarters, artists worked on the can design, which is red with "Coca-Cola" in script and "Classic" in modern type.





became increasingly concerned that investors might be buying and selling stock based on bad information. And they wanted to make sure they complied with Securities and Exchange Commis sion disclosure rules.

"It wasn't a question of panic," Herbert said. We were sorry we had lost control."

The company decided to issue a statement Transmitted on the Dow Jones News Wire at 3:18 p.m. Wednesday, it said Coca-Cola indeed would bring back the old Coke along with the new.

Around that time, Keough was handed a telex from a disgruntled customer in Maine, who threatened t organize a boycott of the new Coke and asked for the old one back.

Keough said he immediately sent a reply You've got it."

The company got 6,000 calls in the hours after the announcement, another 7,600 overnight, and 1,300 in the first hour of business the next day.

"The texture of the calls turned from 'You sons of bitches.' to 'I love you,' - just like that," Herbert said, snapping his fingers.

Taping the 30-second ad took Keough eight 'takes," Herbert said. The company used the fourth, after deciding Keough looked warmer and more believable than a professional actor. who was also tried. Herbert said.

The company asked the networks for the network news time slots on a few hours notice Wedneday, after deciding to rush the announcement The networks were cooperative, Herbert said.

The ad was flashed via satellite to a facility in New Jersey. Tapes were flown by helicopter to New York and delivered by courier to the networks by 6 p.m EDT, half an hour before they start their broadcasts, Donaldson said.

The ad ran seven times Wednesday night, once in each of the three network news programs, the other four times in prime time.

Keough had to perform again on Thursday, when Coca-Cola provided details at a 11/2-hour news conference in Atlanta that was patched into a New York hotel for hundreds of reporters and industry analysts.

As always, that cheerful red was everywhere, in the background, in the banners, in the executives' ties. An American flag stood on the platform.




