# 'Live Aid' concert readies to go live

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Workmen put the finishing touches on the giant stage, linked electronically to a concert site in Britain, that on Saturday becomes the scene of the world's biggest rock bash to aid the hungry in Africa.

Worldwide, it's costing \$4 million to put on, half for television arrangements, but we expect to net over \$30 million," said Larry Magid whose Electric Factory Concerts is one of the local producers of the 16-hour Live Aid extravaganza. Because of higher American costs, the expenses here account for \$3 million of the

'Already we have some \$14.5 million in the till which includes \$6.5 million from live gate receipts in Philadelphia and London, plus \$8 million from TVradio rights and corporate spon-

sors," Magid said Friday. He said organizers hope that souvenirs, such as T-shirts and buttons, refreshments and

worldwide broadcast network will bring in an additional \$20

Magid, like everybody else, was awed by the magnitude of the project, expected to reach more than 2 billion people.

"It's the biggest thing anybody in this business has ever tried, he said.

The stage at the John F. Kennedy Stadium here is a jungle gym of pipe 107 feet tall, 321 feet wide with a 150-foot revolving performing area lighted by more than 400 spotlights and surrounded by 450 amplifiers that will carry the sound for two

"It's incredible," said David Anderson, 27, of Valley Forge, one of more than 200 carpenters, electricians and sound persons working since July 1 to put together the show

# Reagan undergoes surgery

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan will undergo surgery today for a large, potentially cancerous growth in his colon that doctors discovered when they removed a

smaller, benign polyp on Friday. White House spokesman Larry Speakes said the fleshy intestinal polyp, believed to be "precancerous" but still being studied by doctors, was discovered during a thorough examination of Reagan's intestine at Bethesda Naval Hospital.

The three-hour surgery is to be performed by Navy Capt. Dale Oller, chief of general surgery at the military hospital, who was quoted as saying, "The president is in superior condition, and chances for a normal and full recovery are excellent."

Asked if there would be a temporary transfer of power to Vice President George Bush, Speakes would say only that, "We are prepared for any contingency. Whatever needs to be done we can do. Whatever is required to be done we

Bush, who was scheduled to spend the weekend at his summer home in Kennebunkport, Maine, planned to remain there and was in touch with the White House, Speakes said.

Doctors won't know whether the large growth is malignant until a biopsy — a microscopic examination of a tissue sample — is completed

Asked how large the growth is, Speakes refused to be specific, saying only that it is "large."

The smaller, benign polyp that

doctors had planned to remove during the procedure was taken out without incident, Speakes said, but the new growth requires more extensive surgery.

The spokesman said Reagan, 74, was told by his doctors of the need for further surgery and given a choice of having it immediately or putting it off for two or three weeks, and he chose to have it done immed-

Speakes said the president was

nancy. Early signs of these changes in cells, including changes in their structure and appearance, are called "precancerous" because they portend the progression to full-blown Speakes said Reagan would

undergo surgery at mid-day Saturday under general anethesia. If the operation goes as expected, the president will remain in the hospital for a week to 10 days.

The Cabinet and congressional leaders have been informed of the president's condition, Speakes

added. Entering the hospital early Friday afternoon wearing a Western-style sport shirt and casual slacks, Reagan smiled and told reporters he felt "fine." He was accompanied by his

wife, Nancy. Speakes, who was briefed by Rea-gan's doctors after the examination, described the growth as a "large villus adenomatous-appearing polyp in the cecum," which is at the top of the large intestine, where the colon joins the small intestine.

To remove the polyp, doctors will make an incision in Reagan's abdomen and cut through the colon on the right side in a procedure known as a "formal right colectomy."

Friday's procedure involved insertion of a long, flexible tube into the colon. The polyp that doctors did remove was discovered during Reagan's physical examination in March. A similar small polyp was found less than a year earlier, and part of it was removed for microscopic examination, which showed the growth was benign, or non-cancerous, Speakes said at the time.

When doctors re-examined Reagan in March, they found no evidence of the first polyp and con-cluded most of it had been removed during the biopsy and apparently had healed without need for further

treatment. Such growths are fairly common among people over age 50

# Engines shut off seconds before liftoff

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) -All three engines on space shuttle Challenger ignited, nearly reached full power, then shut down three heart-stopping seconds before sche-duled liftoff Friday. The crew was disappointed, but safe.


The ship was loaded with more than 500,000 gallons of fuel. A water spray system was turned on immedi-

ately, and there was no fire. Officials said the launch cannot be tried again for at least seven to 10 days, depending what problems engineers find when the No. 2 engine is dismantled. Indications were that the postponement could be much longer

Robert Lindstrom, a NASA official, said the shuttle's onboard computer sensed a problem with the closing of a hydrogen coolant valve on the No. 2 engine and commanded shutdown of the whole system.

It was a replay of a failure a year ago, which caused a flight delay of more than two months. The June 1984 failure was in a different valve and on a different shuttle, Disco-

The engines ignite 6.6 seconds before liftoff, so that they can reach full power before the shuttle's



attached solid rocket boosters fire. The boosters had not lit when the shutdown occurred.

A backup channel on the engine valve worked properly and would have allowed the flight to continue, Lindstrom said, but NASA rules forbid a liftoff unless all valves of that type have working primary and backup systems.

stopped after the engines ignited. The first time was on June 26, 1984, when Discovery's maiden launch was aborted, with four seconds to go before liftoff.

Then, only one engine had fired and another was starting up. The engines are fired 120 milliseconds "All three main engines fired and

reached full power level," said NASA's Jim Ball soon after the abort. But later, Lindstrom said only two of the engines had reached full power and the third was close to it. The seven-man crew remained

aboard the shuttle while automatic fire sprays engulfed the ship's engines, lest any vapors from the more than 500,000 gallons of liquid hydrogen and liquid oxygen were to escape and burst into flame.

Challenger was scheduled for a seven-day stargazing flight, described as "the most ambitious scientific mission flown by any government anywhere at any one time."

# Mobil taking aggressive position in Permian Basin

"Midland is very important to Mo-bil," said Fines Martin, president and general manager of Mobil Producing Texas & New Mexico Inc., in a press conference at Midland Petroleum Club, Friday. "This producing area generates about \$1 billion annually for Mobil."

In Midland to explain the recent restructuring of the firm, Fines said Mobil would be taking an aggressive position in exploration and development in the Permian Basin through the new division office. The company has planned capital expenditures of \$250 million and an estimated expense budget of \$250 million. The restructuring also involved the relocation of 165 families to Midland and the hiring or 30 additional employees here, following the merger with Superior Oil Co.

to be done in existing fields and some exciting exploration opportunities with a large inventory of acreage to be evaluated."

The restructuring marks a return of a Mobil Division to Midland. The company centralized its operations in 1976, moving many employees out of Midland. With the return of a division office to Midland, Mobil will employ 365 at Midland and about 700 in the field to oversee the expanded inventory of oil and gas properties.

Five districts including the Hobbs, Monahans, Snyder, North Texas and Pegasus districts will report to the Midland Division.

Following the acquisition of Superior properties the Mobil inventory includes 15,830 oil wells of which almost 5,000 are operated by Mobil and 1,221 gas wells of which 641 are operated by Mobil. Production includes: 90,000 barrels of oil per day; 330 million cubic feet of gas per day and 16,000 barrels of natural gas liquids.

Mobil also sells about 29 million cubic feet of carbon dioxide daily, being a partner with Shell in the McElmo Dome field of Southwestern Colorado and the pipeline to Denver

A.G. Peperone, exploration and production manager of the Midland Division, said the firm's strong position in carbon dioxide would make it an aggressive contender in the move to bring tertiary projects to the Ba-sin. He said Mobil has immediate plans to initiate an enhanced oil re-covery project in the H.O Mahoney lease of the Wasson field, which would involve 640 acres and 32 wells. It will be the second tertiary project for Mobil, which has operated the GMK CO' flood for two years.

Peperone said Mobil would in-crease its exploration efforts for shallow to intermediate oil reserves, but would not put much effort into deep exploration. "We have almost doubled our exploration depart-

ment. We have a large staff of geologists and geophysists who can help us look at the complex structures of the Permian Basin. We will also be looking at some of the deeper zones in light of new technology." He said Mobil expects to drill 600 wells by vear's end.

Martin said Mobil was encouraged because it had been able to merge two strong staffs with the acquisi-tion of Superior. He said 95 percent of the producing and exploration professionals with Superior Oil had been brought into the organization. "It's not usual that a merger allows

"It's not usual that a merger allows a company to merge two very strong staffs such as this," he said. "Of the 2,900 Superior employees still on the payroll at the time of the merger, only \$25 were declared redundant, and 500 of those were in Houston." Martin, who was the former vice president of production for Superior, said all measures possible had been taken to minimize the human

Dr. Gary Gitnick, professor of medicine at the University of California, Los Angeles, said in a telephone interview that this type of polyp is relatively rare, representing only 2 percent to 14 percent of those found in the intes-

Based on several series of patients, this type of polyp has been found to be malignant, on average, in about 35 percent of cases," Gitnick said.

Several experts said there was up to a 50 percent chance that the fern-like growth in Reagan's intestine is cancerous, based upon the 74-year-old president's age and history of intestinal

polyps. The occurrence of polyps increases with age and the more that are found increases the chances that one or more may be

of the cancerous variety. Villus adenoma-type polyps have a greater chance of becom-ing malignant than some other varieties. Villus, which means "finger-like," polyps are easily identified because of their

feather-like appearance.
Dr. Marshall Bedine, assistant professor of medicine at Johns

Hopkins Medical School and an intestinal cancer expert, said that if Reagan's polyp is cancerous, chances of curing it will depend upon how deeply the malignancy has penetrated the intestine. "If the malignancy is confined to the lining of the colon, then the cure rate is over 90 percent."

But if the cancer has penetrated the intestinal wall and perhaps spread to the abdominal cavity, he said, the chance of curing it drops dramatically.

# FERC says oilmen sold gas illegally

eral Energy Regulatory Commission on Friday agreed that 35 independent Panhandle oilmen illegally sold natural gas produced from what the Texas Railroad Commission had classified as oil wells.

The commissioners upheld an ear-lier decision by a FERC administrative law judge in favor of out-of-state natural gas purchasers who said the independents were illegally diverting gas from interstate com-merce and federal pricing regula-

The Commission finds...that the respondents in the Panhandle West Gas Field are in violation of section 7(b) of the Natural Gas Act for the diversion of dedicated reserves and section 504(a)(1) of the Natural Gas

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Fed- Policy Act for the overcharges," said could be sold at higher prices than the commission's ruling.

"We're extremely pleased and gratified and feel that justice at last has been done," said Washington attorney Philip Ehrenkranz, who represented the said washington attorney. sented plaintiff Dorchester Gas Producing Co.

Another hearing will follow to determine remedies, which could include a return of revenues derived from the disputed natural gas, a fig-ure estimated to range into the billions of dollars.

The natural gas under the Pan-handle field had been sold in longterm contracts to out-of-state buyers, but the oil leases, sold separately, went wanting.

But when a 1978 federal law said natural gas produced from oil wells

gas from gas wells, the rush to buy up the oil leases was on. While the gas producers were limited to one well per 640 acres, the oilmen could drill a well every 10 acres.

The independents maintain they merely sold "casinghead gas," a nat-ural byproduct of oil drilling, legally theirs to sell. The gas producers said the oil drillers weren't producing oil, only natural gas already promised to the out-of-state buyers.

In a similar case before the Texas Railroad Commission, natural gas buyers accused the oilmen of selling natural gas as liquified "white oil."

Local officials in the Panhandle have warned that a ruling against the oil drillers could have a severe impact on their communities

because of the loss of "white oil" revenues.

The Texas Railroad Commission is caught in the dispute because it is responsible for inspecting and classifying wells as oil wells or gas wells. It ruled in May that the independents' wells must be retested.

The decision "wasn't entirely unexpected," said Houston attorney Charles A. Moore, who had represented many of the independents in the dispute.

Moore said the case was likely lost when the Texas Railroad Commis-sion declined to come to Washington to testify about its definition of





# Army discloses criminal probe into Bell Helicopter Textron Inc.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army, formally disclosing a federal crimition and reconnaissance work. nal investigation and allegations of overcharging, said Friday it was slashing in half monthly contract payments to Bell Helicopter Textron inc.

The decision, announced by Army Secretary John O. Marsh, will cut from roughly \$13 million to \$6.5 million the payments now being received monthly by the firm for contracts covering a number of

Army helicopter programs.

The suspension of payments will remain in effect "until Bell corrects apparent accounting deficiencies. rectifies reported mischarges and satisfies the Army that acceptable internal controls have been established at Bell," Marsh said in a state-

The Fort Worth-based Bell Helicopter Textron is a wholly owned subsidiary of Textron Inc., a conglomerate based in Providence, R.I., that in fiscal 1984 was the nation's 28th largest defense contractor.

Bell Helicopter Textron currently holds contracts from the Army worth a total of \$2.7 billion. They include such major programs as the AH-1 Cobra attack helicopter, the UH-1 Iroquois utility helicopter and the OH-58 Kiowa light copter.

The firm has also been selected as the prime contractor for the Army Helicopter Improvement Program, under which the Army eventually expects to modify more than 550

tion and reconnaissance work.

The federal criminal investigation. disclosed in published reports in May, was formally acknowledged by Marsh. He also said the Pentagon was launching its own investigation of the matter.

"Currently, the U.S. attorney for the Northern District of Texas is pursuing a criminal investigation into these irregularities," Marsh said. "The Department of Defense and the Army are assisting the Department of Justice in this criminal investigation."
Assistant U.S. Attorney Ronald

C.H. Eddins, reached at his Fort Worth office by phone, confirmed the Army statement.

Eddins said his investigation was prompted by a Defense Contract Audit Agency audit of Bell's books and had been under way for a year. To date, no grand jury has been empaneled, he said, adding: "We feel it will be completed within six months to a year.'

The investigation was prompted by DCAA audits that uncovered pricing irregularities," Eddins continued. "The substance of the investigation concerns fraudulent billings to the Army for helicopter spare

parts. Asked how much money might be involved, Eddins declined direct comment. Asked, then, about a Fort Worth Star Telegram report in May that the probe involved about \$15

Efforts to discuss the matter with officials of Bell Helicopter Textron were unsuccessful Friday. A Washington spokesman, George G. Troutman, at one point said he expected to release a prepared statement. But later calls to his office went unans-

An Army source who asked not to be named said Friday the defense audit that Eddins cited was "a routine, post-award audit of Bell's financial accounting system" that was completed in March 1984. Less than three months later, by June 1984, the federal criminal investigation was under way, the source added.

The source refused to elaborate on what the auditors found, beyond saying: "We obviously think we're paying them too much. We don't accept their accounting."

Marsh indicated in his prepared statement, however, the overcharges were believed to be substan-

"The 50 percent suspension reflects an estimate of the percentage that is at issue of total progress payments," the statement said.

The Army declined to elaborate. The statement added that Marsh had designated Under Secretary James R. Ambrose to oversee the Army's probe "into reports of accounting irregularities and deficiencies and the implementation of corrective action at Bell.'

# California melons blamed in illness of El Paso woman

EL PASO (AP) — California water-melon and California-manufactured cheese have been pulled from El Paso store shelves because of possible contamination, and residents are being warned not to eat one brand of beef jerky linked to salmonella poisoning in neighboring New Mex-

A 67-year-old woman became ill after eating two slices of a California watermelon last weekend, said Dr. Laurance Nickey, director of the El Paso City-County Health Depart-

Contamination of watermelons with the insecticide Aldicarb has been blamed for an outbreak of illness in California. Symptoms include profuse sweating, headache and nausea.

Nickey said the El Paso woman was "doing fine" Thursday, but that an 80-year-old man is the city's second "suspect case.

Nickey said 5,300 pounds of the California product have been picked up at El Paso stores and destroyed. No melons from the Pacific coast state remain in the city, he said.

Meanwhile, a California-manufactured brand of cheese also has been pulled from store shelves in El Paso because cheese from the company was shown to contain the same germ responsible for 51 deaths in California last month.

The cheese, manufactured by Cacique Fine Foods of California, is distributed in Texas through warehouses in Houston and Dallas and has been shown to contain the germ listeriosis.

But state health officials in Austin said Thursday that no cases of listeriosis have been linked in Texas to the Cacique brand of cheese.

Robert Henna of the Texas health department's food and drug division said city, state and federal inspectors were working with Cacique Cheese of Texas in Houston and Rudy's Food Products in Dallas to determine what stores may have stocked the cheese.

"Consumers are warned not to eat affected cheese carrying earlier expiration dates," Henna said in a

Rudy Guerra of Rudy's Food Products said his firm sought the removal of Cacique dairy products from 40 Dallas-area stores as a precautionary measure.

Ten Texas cases of listeriosis, including the deaths of two elderly people, a stillbirth and a miscarriage, have been associated with contaminated cheese, according to the health department. Those cases, however, involved people who ate Jalisco or Jimenez cheese, officials

In El Paso, residents also were being advised to avoid eating La Tiendita beef jerky, which has been linked to 21 cases of salmonella poisoning in New Mexico. Production of the product at Alcalde, N.M., has been halted.

# New magnet coil added to A&M atom smasher

COLLEGE STATION (AP) -The addition of a new magnet coil to an atom smasher at Texas A&M University has made the device one of the most powerful of its kind in the country, accord-

ing to a researcher at the school.

Dave Youngblood, director of Texas A&M's Cyclotron Institute, said the coil allowed researchers on Thursday to test the magnetic field of the school's new \$8 million cyclotron for the first time. lion cyclotron for the first time.

The new superconducter, which is still under construction, has a magnetic field three times the size of a similar device built at the school 20 years ago, Youngblood said.

"This new cyclotron will open up new fields of nuclear science for exploration by Texas A&M scientists and students," he said. "New states of nuclear matter can be explored and entirely new types of phenomena may be

Only one or two other units in the U.S. can store as much energy as the superconductor at Texas A&M and the device is so advanced only a few are planned worldwide, he said.

Cyclotrons accelerate atomic nuclei to almost the speed of light. The nuclei are then extracted as beams of highenergy particles and thrust toward a target. Scientists use the devices to study transformations that occur during collisions or near-collisions of the particles.



# Cooler weather, troops aid weary firefighters

Cooler weather and National Guard troops aided firefighters battling wildfires across the West on Friday, as napalm dropped on a per-sistent Northern California blaze eased a threat to key mountaintop communications towers.

Firefighters in helicopters dropped flaming blobs of napalm left over from the Vietnam War on the fire near Los Gatos in a gamble that paid off Thursday night.

The napalm started a controlled burn to head off the main blaze and stopped flames from reaching the towers atop Mount Loma Prieta, said fire Capt. Ken Gilbert. The communications towers are vital to coordinating firefighting efforts.

Fires that have scorched more than 1.2 million acres across more than a dozen Western states were still burning Friday in at least seven states, but cooler temperatures and moist air brought some relief. Firefighters were working on blazes in Arizona, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Wyoming and in several Canadian provinces, as well as Cali-

New fires included a 1,000-acre blaze in Wyoming, just west of South Dakota's Black Hills National Forest, and a 600-acre fire in the McKelvey Forest in Nebraska. In British Columbia, around 20,000 people in mountain valleys still faced possible evacuation as fires raged on in the southeastern part of the prov-

# Did man have legitimate right to shoot suspect?

FLORENCE, S.C. (AP) - Harry Shelley was parked outside the Southern Bank branch in his pickup truck, helping his son roll up some coins, when he saw a man with a mask and a shotgun about 20 yards away, walking briskly with police in

Shelley reached for his deer rifle. and fired one shot which struck Murray Miller in the abdomen. As Miller fell, a dye packet exploded inside a money bag he was carrying, leaving a blotchy red stain on the sidewalk

According to police, the 25-year-old man had just held up the bank. They also said Miller was walking away from Shelley and the shotgun was unloaded when they recovered

"I did what I thought I had to do," Shelley said shortly after the incident. "That man could have shot

That shot on July 1 has ricocheted all around this tobacco-rich town of 31,000, which is exactly halfway between Miami and New York City

on Interstate 95. Shelley has been charged with assault and battery with intent to kill, but some people think he acted legitimately in self-defense.

Florence's police chief, Ralph Porter, consulted two century-old laws

in bringing the charge. "It is an issue of a citizen making a judgment call to stop a fleeing felon," said Porter.

Porter said his station has been flooded with calls since the shooting, with public opinion running about '50-50" for and against Shelley's action.

"I don't operate on public sentiment. I don't write the law," he said. One section of South Carolina law says a citizen who witnesses a felony has the right to make an arrest and bring the suspect before a magistrate. The other says a citizen has the right to arrest a suspect at night, under similar circumstances, "even if the life of such person shall be thereby taken.

"I think the notion of a citizen's arrest is something that is an interesting and fascinating part of our heritage, something that should be prohibited now," said Jon Thames, a law professor at the University of South Carolina.

Police have mixed feelings about such crimefighters, said Donald Baldwin, executive director of the 300,000-member National Law Enforcement Council, an umbrella group for 12 national law enforcement groups.

"You don't want to discourage people, (but) at the same time, you don't want to sanction this kind of thing because it could get out of hand," Baldwin said.

Shelley, a 51-year-old Mullins resident described by his lawyer as a Christian and a family man, has said he and the police officers were in

jeopardy.
"No citizen is justified in being a vigilante," said Hicks Harwell, Shel-

ley's attorney, but he says his client doesn't fit that description.

When Shelley spotted Miller leaving the bank with his mask and money bag in one hand and shotgun in the other, he "really knew" he and others were in danger, Harwell

"It's got a lot of folks, including me, asking questions in my own mind as to what I would do," Harwell said.

Miller, who was fired from his last job at a pizza parior, was served with two warrants a week ago in his guarded McLeod Regional hospital room.

Some physicists at the University of Illinois have launched a drive to convince colleagues around the country not to accept funding from the Pentagon for the program, which Reagan calls the Strategic Defense Initiative.

And a computer scientist recruited to serve on a special advisory panel on "computing in support of battle management" resigned late last month after attending the group's first meeting, concluding it would never be possible to reliably program the vast complex of com-puters envisioned for the anti-mis-

Professor David L. Parnas, an merican citizen who works at the University of Victoria in British Columbia and serves as a consultant to the Office of Naval Research, said

Computers and the programs, or software, that would control them are vital elements of the Star Wars program. The Pentagon envisions a system that would have to help orbiting sensors detect and count missiles launched in an attack; sort decoys from warheads; calculate trajectories and track targets; aim weapons, assess hits and misses and then aim weapons again for additional shots.

"In my experience as a physicist who has written some pretty large computer codes, there is no way you could produce a code large enough to handle the job and do it perfectly the first time, which is what you would need," said Larry Smarr, head of the university's new National Center for Supercomputing Applications.

"I can't imagine any developments in computer technology that would make it possible in the foreseeable future," he added.

Fred Lamb, a physics professor serving as a spokesman for the Illinois group, said 47 of the school's 60 physics faculty members have signed a statement that calls the Star Wars program "technically dubious and politically unwise."

# Fatal Florida blast still mystery

NAPLES, Fla. (AP) — Investiga-tors say the blast that killed tobacco heiress Margaret H. Benson and her youngest son remained a mystery Friday as two wills dealing with her \$10 million estate were filed six hours apart.

The documents were filed Thursday in Collier County Circuit Court. One gives her children authority over her estate, previously estimated at up to \$400 million, and the other names the family lawyer as executor, The Tampa Tribune reported Friday.

Mrs. Benson, 63, widow of a tobacco company executive, and son Scott, 21, a professional tennis player, died when two bombs

## 'Mountain man' convicted of kidnapping, homicide

VIRGINIA CITY, Mont. (AP) -"Mountain man" Don Nichols was convicted Friday of kidnapping, deliberate homicide and aggravated assault in the abduction of a woman athlete and the slaying of her would-

A Madison County District Court jury found Nichols, 54, guilty in the kidnapping of Kari Swenson, a mem-ber of the U.S. women's team for the biathlon, an event combining cross-country skiing and riflery. He also was convicted of killing Alan Goldstein, a searcher who found Nichols and his son with Swenson in the mountains near Big Sky last sum-

Dan Nichols, 20, was convicted two months ago of kidnapping and misdemeanor assault and acquitted in the slaying. He is free on bail pending sentencing.

Authorities claimed the two men abducted Swenson, of Bozeman, as a

bride for Dan Nichols. Don Nichols showed no emotion as the verdicts were read, and he was taken from the courthouse immedi-

ately afterward. Nichols faces up to 140 years in prison on the charges, but District Judge Frank Davis said he anticipated it would be at least a month before Nichols is sentenced.

# Lebanese radio says government will prosecute TWA jet's hijackers

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — State radio said Friday that the government will prosecute three men accused of hijacking a TWA jet, killing one of the American passengers and holding others hostage for 17

days.

The radio, which announced the names of the three men, carried the item in its 11 a.m. news broadcast, but dropped it from later programs without explanation. Government sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said it was done on

orders "from above." In its announcement, the radio said the names were "referred to the competent judicial authorities" in the Mt. Lebanon part of Beirut, which includes the airport where the red-and-white Boeing 727 still sits on the tarmac.

It identified them as Ali Atwi, Ali Younis and Ahmed Gharibeh, but said it had no further information about them or about an unspecified number of "others" it mentioned as

Atwi was arrested at Athens Airport while trying to board the Rome-bound TWA jetliner, which was commandeered soon after leaving the Greek capital. He was freed later and flown to join his two comrades in Algiers, where the plane landed twice before settling in

Beirut June 17 for the third and last

The hijackers freed most of the 153 people aboard the aircraft and accomplices joined them when the plane was on the ground in Beirut. During the second Beirut stop they threw the severely beaten body of Robert Dean Stethem, a 23-year-old Navy frogman from Waldorf, Md., onto the tarmac.

The radio station said it did not know whether the three men were in custody or whether warrants had been issued, but stated: "The names were referred as a prelude to prosecuting them and to take adequate legal procedures against them." It cited no sources.

A police spokesman in Beirut said of the state radio report, "We don't have any information.

# Showers might 'wash up' area this weekend

For tonight, the weatherman is calling for late evening thunderstorms. The low temperature is to be in the mid-60s.

The weatherman is predicting a sunny Sunday, which may be struck with isolated late afternoon thunderstorms. The high temperature Sunday is to be in the mid-90s.

The high temperature Friday was 96 degrees, and the record high temperature for a July 12 is 104 degrees in 1933. The overnight low was 62 degrees. The record low for a July 13 is 49 degrees in 1936.

#### STATE

A high-pressure cell anchored over nation's southern half continued to keep most of Texas' skies sunny and warm Friday, except for some widely scattered thunderstorms and low clouds over the coastal waters.

Late-afternoon temperatures reached into the 90s over much of the state, although some upper 80s were reported in south Central Texas, according to the National Weather Service.

The 4 p.m. temperature extremes ranged from 100 at both Amarillo and Childress to 84 at Del Rio as a south wind of 5 to 15 mph breezed through the state.

## NATION

Much of the country's midsection sweltered Friday with afternoon temperatures climbing above 100 degrees from Oklahoma to Kansas and Southwestern areas also baking under the hot July sun. Temperatures were cooler across

# Bowie closes after 71 years

By GORDON BEARD

BOWIE, Md. (AP) - Bowie Race Course, an offbeat track which pioneered winter racing in the East and spawned weird happenings, closes Saturday after 71 years of operation.

Al Karwacki, general manager of the sixth Maryland track to fold since the 1950s, approaches the end with mixed emotions but he doesn't consider his vigil a death watch.

"It's just the end of an era," Karwacki insisted Friday. "Naturally, there's a degree of sadness, but it's tempered with the thought that the closing is for the betterment of Maryland racing. So, let's get it

While conceding his brave front may crumble when Auld Lang Syne is played after Saturday's ninth race, Karwacki said memories of Bowie's somewhat bizarre past will help stave off the sadness.

"The major thing I'll remember about Bowie is battling the ele-ments," Karwacki said. "I guess you might call us the track of adversity. But we got great satisfaction out of operating even after big snowstorms."

Bowie's worst storm occurred in 1958, before Karwacki joined the track, but it has become a treasured

memory in Maryland racing lure. The February storm began falling about the time the first race began, and thousands who stayed for the entire program were unable to move

their cars from the parking lots.

Those who couldn't squeeze onto the last train to Baltimore stayed overnight in the stands. The track supplied food and the fans provided their own entertainment, including various games of chance of skill.

Three years later, on another Feburary day, six fans died in a train derailment and some of the walking wounded refused immediate medical attention until after they hustled along the snow-covered crossties to place daily double bets.

To top off the bizarre day, a fire broke out in the grandstand and heavy smoke which blocked the view of the stewards forced cancellation of the final race.

We were closed by snow, by rain which flooded area roads, a broken water main in the town of Bowie, and by a felled tree which hit a line and knocked out the power," Kar-wacki recalled. "Other than that, it's been a piece of cake."

Milton "Muggins" Feldman, the Runyonesque public relations head who retired last year but is coming back for the final program, also contributed to the Bowie mystique.

He publicized Bowie's winter meets with photos of penguins, and once staged an animal race in which a zebu (a zebra-buffalo hybrid) ridden by Danny Wright defeated a camel, a water buffalo and a llama. On another occasion, a handi-

capped race between a man, a Model-T Ford and a horse came under the Bowie curse for the bizarre. Veteran starter Eddie Blind, using a flare to signal the staggered start,

set it off while the runner was taking off his sweat pants. But Bowie also presented some of the best competitors in racing, with Kelso, Mongo, Kauai King and Dan-

cer's Image included among its winners. "The best race I ever saw was when Mongo beat Gun Bow by a nose in the 1964 Campbell Handi-

cap," Karwacki said.
The closing of Bowie, which was purchased by the owners of Pimlico and Laurel, comes at a time Maryland tracks will benefit from a new state law which lowered the state's "take" of the betting dollar from

4.09 percent to .50 percent. But if Maryland is to remain competitive with neighboring states, Karwacki said, not even that tax break would justify the continued existence of Bowie.

"There will be about \$10 million more available," he said, "but \$4 million will go to the horsemen and a three-way split would not provide sufficient funds for the major improvements the tracks need.

Bowie, which will close with a \$900,000 daily mutuel handle, a record for a Maryland summer meeting, will continue to operate as a backup stabling facility for Pimlico

## Boxing

Former Boxer Dwight Williams, was arraigned Friday on charges of fatally stabbing a 6-year-old girl and critically wounding her 4year-old cousin. Williams, 28, of Syracuse, also was charged with raping and sodomizing the 19year-old mother of the surviving child in the Monday night incident. Monday night, Erica Gatewood, 6, was stabbed 16 times in the heart, upper body and back while staying the night in her cousin's home, according to Chief Assistant District Attorney William Fitzpatrick. The child also was strangled. Gatewood's cousin, Valarie Jones, underwent emergency surgery at Up state Medical Center for multiple stab wounds and was in critical condition Friday. Williams fought on national television against Olympic gold medalist Mark Breland Nov. 15 in Madison Square Garden. He lost a decision in the welter weight contest, but his showing appeared to give him recognition and the hopes of a future in the sport... Australian Barry Michael scored a 15-round unanimous decision over fellow countryman Lester Ellis to win the IBF junior lightweight championship Friday. The 30-year-old Michael, a pro for 13 years and also the Australian and Commonwealth lightweight champion, dominated the fight in the closing rounds. Ellis, who was making his second defense, suffered his first loss after 16 wins...

## Harness Racing

On The Road Again, the richest pacer in the history of harness racing, is being syndicated by the horse's co-owners, Gordon and Illa Rum-

The Toronto Sun said Rumpel was set to sign a syndication deal worth some \$8 million. On The Road Again has won \$2,127,256 in 11 actual months of racing time spread over two years and four months. The syndication will involve 40 shares worth \$200,000 apiece..

Herschel Walker was named USFL Player of the Year in an AP poll of 28 writers and broadcasters. Walker corralled 27 first place votes to one for Oakland quarterback Bobby

Walker rushed for a professional-record 2,411 yards in 18 regular season games. That was nearly twice the total of the USFL's next best rusher, Mike Rozier of Jacksonville, who picked up 1,361. Walker credited 1984 Heisman Trophy, teammate and quarterback Doug Flutie, and his offensive line for much of his success. "Doug made things a great deal easier for me. He took a lot of the pressure off me, and he gave me an opportunity to learn a lot more about offense. I got a chance to read defenses like a quarter back and got a chance to become a receiver."

Mississippi State reported itself to the NCAA last year after learning that some athletes had charged long-distance telephone calls to the school. University officials, who provided the information in a statement and declined to elaborate, said MSU had declared all of those involved ineligible, then obtained restitution from the students and restored eligibility from the NCAA.

Cincinnati Bengals safety Bryan Hicks is retiring from the NFL team to enter private business. "Part of it is personal reasons. Part of it is that I have been injured the last couple of years. I've come back fairly well. But I've given enough of my body to football. I want to save it," Hicks said. "I feel like I'm in really good condition and all, but I don't feel like structurally my body's sound enough to take a beating. It's wore out."

The Washington Redskins have waived former All-Pro safety Mark Murphy. On Thursday, Coach Joe Gibbs said that Murphy, who lost his starting spot last year following an injury, had requested a trade and had been granted permission to talk with other teams after the Redskins had failed to make a deal for him...

"DOES GEORGE Hendricks think all these million-dollar contracts are handed but because the world needs people who can manage three hits every 10 times at bat? It may come as a shock to him, but the world doesn't even need another

If he thinks the game itself is so intrinsically interesting, have him drop in on a twilight league game in Visalia some night. Or even a triple-A game in Pawtucket. Nobody would even notice whom George Hendricks wasn't speaking to.



DALLAS (AP) - When the Harlem Globetrotters open tryouts Sun-day in Charlotte, N.C., searching for their first female team member, Paula and Pamela say they can't

The McGees, the talented 6-2 twins from the University of Southern California and the defunct Dallas Diamonds, say they could be overlooked in favor of some hot All-America. Even if that were to happen, they figure the camp will be a positive

step for women's basketball.
"The biggest problem in (women's basketball) right now is the lack of exposure," said Paula, 22, who has lived with her twin in a Highland Park apartment since the Diamonds opened their season last autumn.

We have no platform to display our skills. The Globetrotters opening up a spot or two on their roster to women will provide that. We may not be chosen, but we all stand to gain because it will showcase women's basketball."

Pamela said if the McGees — and it is a package deal, both or none at all - make the team, "it comes at a great time in our lives.

There is no pressure because you don't have to win. Pressure was the NCAA tournament and the Olympic tryouts. With the Globetrotters, you are on the court as ambassadors of the game and this country. You are there to entertain.

The McGees, and the other women

On the court they have always been strictly business. # Parker long gone, but Pittsburgh memories linger

N.Y. Times News Service CINCINNATI — He is nearly two seasons removed from the bittersweet years at Pittsburgh. But when Dave Parker remembers, everything still seems painfully alive, still seems to tug annoyingly at him. And he

Parker is home now, back herewhere he grew up and played high school ball before signing his first professional contract. He says he has found contentment again, that he can come to the stadium and play baseball without a backdrop of boos.

Here, Parker is producing as he once did in Pittsburgh. Pete Rose, his manager, believes the 34-year-old right fielder is capable of winning another batting championship, as he did in 1977 and '78. Parker says he could be a legitimate candidate for enshrinement in the Hall of Fame with three or four more creditable

had he remained in Pittsburgh, where interest in the Pirates is wan-

ing and the franchise is up for sale.
"By the end," Parker said, "my heart wasn't in it. Pittsburgh just wasn't a practical place for me to play. The family atmosphere we had in "79 was gone and playing the game." in '79 was gone and playing the game was boring. I made a big contribu-tion toward establishing baseball in the city, but no one ever gave me credit. My last three years there were total torment.'

Parker, who signed a two-year agreement with the Reds as a free agent after the 1983 season, has found renewed happiness in Cincinnati. He hit .285 last season and negotiated a new contract that will pay him \$1.2 million per year from 1986 through 1988. He even spurned overtures from George Steinbrenner, the Yankee owner, who had hoped to bring him to New York.

Now, Parker is enjoying his best all-round season in six years. Going into Wednesday's game with the Mets, he was hitting .307 and ranked among the National League leaders with 14 home runs, 96 hits, 20 doubles and 57 runs batted in.

"He is the only guy who has played every day and produced every day," said Rose. "He's been steady, consis-tent. Day in and day out, he's done the job. He's having an m.v.p. year."
Parker sees nothing unusual about

his new vitality, except that he has left Pittsburgh for "the friendly confines of Cincinnati, my home." He has established a rapport with the fans at Riverfront Stadium and is playing like a youngster again. He has already gone through six pairs of uniform pants, having torn the others through typically reckless play. He hurt his shoulder making a diving catch in right field not long ago, then pronounced afterward, "Unless there's a bone sticking out, I'll be in the lineup tomorrow."

He fully believes he is capable of

recapturing the magic of his glory years in a Pirate uniform.

Parker came into the season with a .303 career batting average and 1.652 career hits. "With three or four more good years," he said, "I think there are people who would consider my credentials for the Hall of Fame. I want to maintain what I already have, which is my .300 average, and try to stay healthy for a while longer. If I can get 2,500 hits, I'm damn well gonna look for 3,000. And right now, 2,500 is a piece of cake.

Before he arrived here. Parker

had fallen to the professional depths in Pittsburgh. His seasons of triumph - five consecutive years of a .300-plus batting average, the most valuable player award in 1978, the World Series title in 1979 — were followed by a period of turmoil. He had knee surgery after the 1980 season, gained 25 pounds







# Doctor treats 'holditis'

ST. LOUIS (AP) - If the switchboard operators and receptionists at your company are rude and cut off callers abruptly, it may be time to call the doctor — The Telephone

Nancy Friedman guarantees she has the cure to ailments such as "holditis," "emotional leaking" and the dreaded "non-support state-

Mrs. Friedman — calling herself The Telephone Doctor — travels to companies nationwide presenting her 31/2-hour program on telephone manners.

Her talk has nothing to do with electronic gadgetry, long-distance service or call-waiting. Instead, it deals with attitude, tone of voice and language.

"The telephone is the lifeline of a business," she said. "Every question is a sales opportunity. When a person says, 'He's not in, can I take a message,' you've just lost a sales opportunity.

Mrs. Friedman said that rather than a general question such as "Can I take a message?" the response should be: "He's not in, but he'll be back at 2. Let me take your name and number and I'll have him return

Proper telephone technique applies to everyone who uses a company phone, Mrs. Friedman said, "from the top executive to the guy who sweeps the floors. There's nobody that's exempt from losing a

Mrs. Friedman said one of the most common problems is "holditis," when a person tells a caller he will

be put on hold.
"Don't order your customers to

hold," she said. "Ask them if they are able to hold. They're calling to

give you orders, not take them."
"Emotional leaking" occurs when a person having a bad day takes it out on an unsuspecting caller. "How do you avoid it?" Mrs. Friedman asked rhetorically. "You shift gears. You regain your professional com-posure. A phony smile is better than a real frown."

Those are bad habits, but not as bad as "non-support statements. They're the worst," she said.

In fact, it was a non-support statement — a response such as "no" without elaboration — that turned Mrs. Friedman into one smooth

She called her insurance agent three years ago and told him she was dropping her policies. When he asked why, she said it was because she could not stand dealing with the people who answered the telephones

"I told him, 'We treat our wrong numbers better than you treat your customers," Mrs. Friedman said. "It was in such an uncaring manner. I'd ask if he was in, and they would say 'no,' or 'he's out to lunch,' or 'he's gone.' I'd say, 'When did he die?' "

The insurance man invited Mrs. Friedman to talk to his office personnel, and he was impressed by the points she made. She was struck by everyone's lack of phone etiquette.

Her big break came when she related the story to a newspaper editor in Davenport, Iowa.

# Report cards cross country

SHELTON, Conn. (AP) — When it comes to mailing report cards on time, the U.S. Postal Service gets an F.

But give Shelton Postmaster Richard Sutkowski an A for effort in trying to figure out how more than 1,600 report cards mailed here two weeks ago

turned up in Oakland, Calif.



# Family of six lives, sleeps in two-door Ford

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — The head of a six-member family that lives with two dogs in a car since being evicted nearly five months ago says "we don't want to live like this," but the eviction has soured landlords on taking them in.

Members of the Kirby family keep their clothes and possessions in the trunk of their 1981 two-door Ford Fairmont.

They eat in restaurants and wash in public restrooms. At night, the six family members and their two dogs cram into the car built for four people, sleeping sitting up and pressed against each other.

'We're not street bums," said James W. Kirby Jr., the family's 64year-old patriarch who is crippled with emphysema. "We don't want to live like this, but we can't find anyone to rent to us.

The Kirbys started using the car as a house in February when they were evicted from the home where they had lived for seven years. They were three months behind on the

\$200-a-month rent. Kirby said the eviction judgment has dogged the family, making landlords reluctant to rent to them even though they maintain that they can pay the rent.

The family consists of Kirby, his wife, Mary, 61, who has heart trouble; their son, John, 28, who is under treatment for a nerve disorder, their daughter, Marilyn, 30; Marilyn's husband, Ralph Lunsford, 36; and another daughter, Patricia, 24.

The family is rounded out by mixed American spitz and terrier dogs - Panda and Boogy Bear. They have moved around a shop-

ping center area, from parking lot to parking lot. Their address is a post

It is cramped inside the car when everyone is inside. It is hard to sleep there. But they say they have to make do.

"You'd think we'd have gotten on each others' nerves so bad now we couldn't stand it, but we've been

able to get along," said James Kirby. "You only get a few hours of sleep at night, and there are some nights when we drive around all night because we can't sleep," said Patri-

"You can't change clothes, and it's hard to find places to wash up. Once or twice a month we scrape up enough money to go to a motel for a night so we can get ourselves

together The Kirbys say they are not destitute. James Kirby receives \$600 a month from Social Security, while Patricia and Marilyn are cashiers at discount stores, making \$125 a week

# Former reform-minded UMW head Miller dies in Charleston hospital

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) -Former United Mine Workers President Arnold Miller, swept into office by a reform move-ment and credited with bringing democracy to the rank-and-file, died Friday in a Charleston hospital. He was 62.

Miller, after spending 20 years in the mines, climbed through the ranks to lead the union from 1972 to 1979, when he resigned amid failing health and troubled relations with UMW officials.

**Arnold Miller** "Arnold Miller brought an era...of democracy," said Sam Church, who succeeded Miller as president. "He gave us many rights the miners over the years thought had been denied. He probably negotiated the best contract that's ever been negotiated,

with floating vacations and sick pay."

Miller, who had been living in Charleston, died at 1:45 a.m., said hospital spokeswoman Karen Frashier. Miller's son, Larry, said his father had pneumonia and had suffered a stroke-like illness.

Miller, the son and grandson of coal miners, was born at Leewood and spent much of his adult life in

Cabin Creek working as a miner.
"I worked in low coal the more than 20 years I was in the mines," he said during a 1978 interview. "The last two years of that time, I worked in mud and water and that, really, is what wiped me out. It was always cold and wet down there. I developed spinal arthritis and it got so bad, finally, I couldn't even sleep at night."

In addition to arthritis, Miller suffered from black lung disease and high blood pressure. Those ailments forced him to quit mining in 1969.

It was then that the soft-spoken Miller, who was trying to support his wife and two children on a \$106 military disability pension, began devoting all of his time trying to improve conditions for coal miners

Miller's work on behalf of miners began with his efforts to have black lung recognized as a compensable ailment. In three years, he was catapulted from obscurity to the presidency of the 270,000-member United Mine Workers of America, the major union representing coal miners.

Miller was swept into office by a reform movement to bring democracy to the UMW. But before his first five-year term had expired, critics said Miller was becoming more and more authoritarian. Some called him an ineffectual leader, saying his ninth grade education left him ill-prepared to guide

The film, "By Hunter Williams," will feature Hagman as the title character, a drinking novelist whose wife supports them both. One of his novels plots the perfect murder of his wife, and the film will find the author acting out the last chapter, said the producer, Pat Wolfe.

The picture is set in Austin, but there are absolutely no car chases or fat-bellied sheriffs," said Wolfe, a former director of the Texas Film Commis-

The independent production will be funded by Austin investors, Wolfe said, and will cost a reported \$4 million.

LONDON (AP) — Lauren Bacall has returned to the London stage in a revival of Tennessee Williams's "Sweet Bird of Youth," and most British critics applauded her performance as the fading screen star Princess Kosmonopolis.

CHICAGO (AP) - Former TWA hostage Simon Grossmayer was released from the hospital Friday after surgery to remove a potentially fatal skin cancer that was discovered in examinations in West Germany after he was freed, his wife said.

"He's coming home today and we just want to get back to our normal lives," said Elaine Grossmayer.

The surgery was performed Wednesday at Northwestern Memorial Hospital where doctors removed a dime-size tumor. The tumor was discovered when Grossmayer was

examined in West Germany after he and 38 other Americans spent 17 days in captivity. Doctors at Northwestern said the examination by Army doctors in West Germany probably saved Grossmayer's

CHICAGO (AP) - Cathleen Crowell Webb, whose recantation of a rape story led to freedom for her alleged attacker, is writing a book, entitled "Forgive Me," that should reach bookstores in Octo-ber, her publisher said Friday.
"She will not get one dime from the writing of

this book," said her attorney, John McLario of Menomonee Falls, Wis. "It's always been her intention to give everything...to Gary Dotson," the man she once accused

Dotson's attorney, however, says he has nothing in writing from Mrs. Webb and complained that her book will hurt the market for the "more scholarly" book which Dotson intends to write. Shortly after she came forward with her recanta-

tion last March, Mrs. Webb said: "I wish I was wealthy, I wish I could give him six

years, and I wish I had \$1 million I could give him to start his life over with, but I don't...I'd give him anything I have...' Dotson's attorney, Warren Lupel, said initially he assumed Mrs. Webb wasn't planning to give Dotson

any money from her book because he had received no communication on the matter. He noted her book would beat Dotson's to press because his is to be "a much more scholarly and

detailed work," possibly "a year in the making." As a result, Lupel said, her book will mean less public interest — and less money — for Dotson's.





# Singer Bailey 'resurrected' with 'Easy Lover,' 'Chinese Wall'

When he recorded "Easy Lover" with Phil Collins in 1964, "Philip Bailey rose from the dead," said the vocalist-songwriter himself in a recent phone conversation. Through the '70s, Bailey was the featured vocalist for one of the '70s biggest R&B groups — Earth, Wind and Fire. "But," said Bailey, "More people know me from that one song than from my entire career with Earth, Wind and Fire."
