TO EXPOSE MEMBERSHIP LISTS

Anti-Klan Group At Work

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) North Carolina Gov. Dan Moore, conscious of reports his state leads the nation in Ku Klux Klan units, says he has a committee of state leaders actively working to expose Klan membership lists.

The governor confirmed reports of the existence of the anti-Klan committee Sunday night. The committee chairman is Malcolm Seawell, chairman of the State Board of Elections and a former state attorney general.

Seawell indicated that public exposure of Klan membership lists, will be one of the weapons the committee will use. During hearings last October of the House Committee on Un-American Activities, a committee investigator referred to North Carolina as "Klansville, U.S.A."

In his statement, the governor said he had worked closely with state agencies "in maintaining a constant vigil on the activities" of the Klan. Moore has repeatedly spoken out against the Klan.

Named to the committee in addition to Seawell, were Walter F. Anderson, director of the State Bureau of Investigation; A. Pistol Godwin, motor vehicles commissioner; I. L. Clayton, commissioner of revenue; Wade Bruton, state attorney general; and Ed Rankin, director of administration.

Munitions Strike Ended

EAST ALTON, Ill. (AP) — Production of gunpowder for use in Viet Nam resumes at the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp. munitions plant after striking union members voted to accept new contracts and return to work today.

The International Association of Machinists AFL-CIO voted 1,599-1,543 Sunday to accept a contract worked out last week in Washington. The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers ratified a similar pact by a 50-25 vote.

Earlier Agreements
Two other unions that struck the plant Dec. 1, the International Chemical Workers AFL-CIO and the Western Employees Trade Council, had voted previously to return to work.

A company official says full production of gunpowder could begin in a day and that full production of finished ammunition will take about a week.

Olin Mathieson's Winchester Division at New Haven, Conn., said about 500 employees laid off Dec. 22 because of the stoppage of gunpowder production would be put back to work this week.

The strike of about 4,200 union members halted production by the nation's only manufacturer of a special gunpowder for some rifle and tracer bullets and 20mm cannon shells used in Viet Nam.

The Army plans to reactivate its Badger ammunition plant at Baraboo, Wis., but it is expected to take six months to begin production.

Counted Three Times
The vote of the machinists, who had rejected four previous contract offers, was counted three times on demand of union members.

The machinists' three-year contract includes fringe benefits and improvements in seniority rights, a 4 per cent hourly wage increase with a 10-cent minimum the first year, a 10-cent across-the-board raise the second year and a 4 per cent increase with a 10-cent minimum the third year. The average hourly wage was \$2.78.

The union had sought an 18-month contract, four weeks paid vacation after 15 years and a cost-of-living clause.

William Parker, Electrical Workers business agent, said his union's contract included substantial improvements in job assignments, seniority rights and fringe benefits.

The International Chemical Workers accepted a contract Dec. 23 calling for a 35-cent-an-hour wage increase, plus added fringe benefits. Terms of the contract approved Saturday by members of the Western Employees Trade Council were not announced.

SPEAKS IN ALABAMA

Katzenbach Warns Of Intimidation

MOBILE, Ala., (AP) — U.S. Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach, returning to Alabama for the first time in three years, says that persons who try to intimidate Negro citizens will collide head-on with the federal government.

The attorney general — who confronted Gov. George C. Wallace in 1962 on the campus of the University of Alabama — was warmly received by an integrated audience of 4,400 persons Sunday night.

Issues Warning
"I have a message for those noisy few who may entertain thoughts of trying to frighten or coerce a Negro citizen — or any citizen — from trying to register to vote. If you do, you will have the federal government to reckon with," he said.

Katzenbach warned against outward intimidation and the more subtle forms. He promised action against night riders — explaining later that this was aimed at the Ku Klux Klan.

"And we will not hesitate to act just as quickly on evidence of other attempts at intimidation in any county. Investigations of possible intimidation efforts are now under way in Lowndes and Wilcox counties (Alabama)," Katzenbach said.

This apparently was in reference to an announcement last week by the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee that it had bought some land near Lowndesboro to accommodate Negro families it claims have been forced off farms by owners because of voting rights activities.

To Send Out Letters
The Justice Department plans to send out letters shortly "to the voting officials of every county and precinct covered by the Voting Rights Act explaining to them their duties — and our duties — under the act," Katzenbach said.

The municipal auditorium meeting, a civil rights rally, was sponsored by three predominantly Negro organizations to

observe the 103rd anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation. About 100 whites were in the group.

His welcome here, Katzenbach said, was much warmer "than I experienced the last time I came to Alabama, as a visiting lecturer in constitutional law at the University of Alabama."

This was in reference to his duty as deputy to then Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy to enforce court orders admitting two Negro students to the once-all-white university at Tuscaloosa. Wallace sought to bar the students in a confrontation with Katzenbach at a doorway.

He said there are still 900,000 Negroes unregistered in the seven states covered by the Voting Rights Act.

Westmoreland Given Honor

NEW YORK (UPI) — Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of U.S. forces in Viet Nam, is Time Magazine's Man of the Year for 1965.

In announcing its choice Sunday, the News Magazine said:

"General Westmoreland was the personification of the American fighting man in 1965 who, through the monsoon mud of nameless hamlets, amidst the swirling sand of seagirt enclaves, atop the jungled mountains of the Annamese Cordillera, served as the instrument of U.S. policy, quietly enduring the terror and discomfort of a conflict that was not yet a war, on a battlefield that was all no-man's land."

White House Has Long History Of Colorful Weddings

WASHINGTON (AP)—The president was delighted when the younger of his two daughters, a lively teenager, confided that she wanted to marry. He thoroughly approved of her young man, and without a moment's hesitation he gave his consent.

So Maria Hester Monroe married Samuel L. Gouverneur, her father's private secretary, in the first White House wedding of a president's daughter.

The pressing question now, nearly a century and half later, will 18-year-old Luci Baines Johnson become the seventh daughter of a chief executive to be married at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue?

After all, Washington society has been waiting more than 50 years—ever since Eleanor Wilson in 1914, in fact—for another president's child to marry in the executive mansion.

Euphoric State
Whenever a president with a marriageable daughter takes office, the capital's socialites are caught up in a euphoric state of anticipation.

Hope bloomed when Lyndon Johnson moved two daughters into the White House, and the wishful rumors started early.

Lynda Bird, the older girl, would have a spring wedding in 1964. Later, her engagement to Lt. Bernard Rosenbach was broken quietly.

Now Luci, a convert to Roman Catholicism, is in the spotlight, and she may choose to wed Pat Nugent in church. Wherever the services are held, the wedding is bound to be an event in White House history.

Besides Maria Monroe and the Wilson girls, the marrying first daughters were Elizabeth Tyler, Ellen Grant and Alice Roosevelt.

The only son to say "I do" in the East Room—where Abigail Adams used to hang the family wash and which later, and unluckily, became the favorite room for weddings—was Abigail's grandson, young John Adams, son of President John Quincy Adams. He married his cousin, Mary Hellen of Washington, in 1886.

Simple Ceremonies
The two widower presidents marrying away from the White House kept it very simple: President Wilson and Edith Bolling Galt in her Georgetown home on Dec. 18, 1915; and President Tyler and Julia Gardiner in New York on June 26, 1884. Tyler also kept it secret.

until he and his 24-year-old bride, 30 years his junior, arrived at the White House.

Nowadays it's hardly possible for the president's family to keep secrets of marital magnitude.

Back in 1920, when James Monroe's 17-year-old daughter Maria was setting a precedent, press coverage went like this: Two days after the wedding—on March 9—the Washington Intelligencer carried a one-sentence notice of the event.

Social Washington, though, had been planning big things for the first White House wedding of a president's daughter. Then entered Eliza Hay, Monroe's older daughter, who had taken over as mistress of the White House because her mother was an invalid.

Kept In Furore
Mrs. Hay managed to keep Washington society in a furore most of the time and her sister's wedding was no exception. She invited only relatives and close friends. No cabinet. As for the diplomatic corps, she sent word that the members were not expected to take any notice of the event. They complied with vehemence.

The ceremony in the East Room, though, went off well. Maria looked charming in a light blue dress of stiff silk with intricate embroidery of real wheat stalks, according to accounts.

Elizabeth Tyler's mother was also an invalid, and the only time Letitia Tyler appeared as hostess in the White House was at her third daughter's wedding reception.

France.

President Rutherford B. Hayes escorted his niece, Emily Platt, at her marriage to Gen. Russell Hastings in 1878. Another presidential niece, Alice Wilson, daughter of Woodrow Wilson's brother Joseph, married the Rev. Stuart McElroy in 1914.

Then came the ceremony in the East Room at which President Franklin D. Roosevelt served as best man. That was in 1942 when Harry Hopkins, the president's friend and adviser, married Louise Macy, New York divorcee and fashion expert.

Emergency Declared In West African Nation

OUAGADOUGOU, Upper Volta (AP)—Police fired tear gas at thousands of demonstrators swarming around the presidential palace today after the government of this West African nation seized emergency powers.

Many in the crowd called for the army to take power. Police hurled tear gas grenades when demonstrators threatened to storm the palace.

The political climate in Upper Volta has been tense since President Maurice Yameogo declared a state of emergency Sunday. He announced he had uncovered a plot led by Joseph Ouédraogo, a union leader and former National Assembly president.

President Yameogo declared a state of emergency after a military coup Saturday in the Central African Republic, another former French colony 900 miles to the east. Both countries gained independence in 1960.

The demonstrations outside the palace took place during a general strike in Ouagadougou. The strike blacked out telephone service and the state radio.

Troops in combat gear patrolled the streets and broke up scattered demonstrations. Several union members were arrested, but a search for the union leaders failed to locate them.

The bridegroom was Secretary of the Treasury William McAdoo. His daughter, by a former marriage, was a flower girl.

Luci Baines Johnson would make the seventh daughter of a president to be married in the 166 years of the old mansion.

The first wedding of any sort that we can be sure of took place in March of 1812 and united Dolly Madison's sister Lucy and U.S. Supreme Court Associate Justice Thomas Todd.

President Andrew Jackson, a widower who couldn't resist matchmaking, contributed three weddings. Two of the brides were his nieces: Mary Eastin, who married Lucius Polk in 1831; and Elizabeth Martin, who wed Lewis Randolph in 1835. Between them—in 1833—was Della Lewis, daughter of Maj. William B. Lewis, a close friend of Jackson's who took up residence in the White House after the inauguration in 1829. Della married Alphonse de Pageot, secretary of the French legation, later minister from

Backed By Reds

Reports said the alleged plot was Communist-inspired. There was no word on the whereabouts of Ouédraogo.

Yameogo, 45, has been president since Upper Volta became independent. He is a former health service clerk and a member of the dominant Mossi tribe. His landlocked nation occupies 105,838 square miles and has a population of about 3.6 million. About 47,500 persons live in the capital. Upper Volta is surrounded by six other nations—Mali, Ivory Coast, Ghana, Togo, Dahomey and Niger.

Austerity Protest
The union leaders said the strike was not part of a Communist plot but a protest against the government's austerity program. The program includes a 20 per cent cut in salaries of state employees.

Government May Cut Steel Purchases From Bethlehem

WASHINGTON (AP) — Administration sources here today said the government may reduce its purchases of structural steel from an increase which Bethlehem Steel Corp. has announced.

So far, no other steel firm has followed Bethlehem's lead for higher prices. President Johnson has called the increase unwarranted and said it could lead to inflation.

But Edmund F. Martin, chairman of second-ranking Bethlehem, said in a statement Sunday night the three-day-old price hike was a result of product improvements that enable lighter-weight steel to do heavier jobs.

Company refuses to withdraw its increases. The government now consumes about 25 per cent of the total output of structural steel shapes.

Consumption High
Government sources indicated Sunday that a cutback of federal purchases from Bethlehem may be forthcoming if the company refuses to withdraw its increases. The government now consumes about 25 per cent of the total output of structural steel shapes.
The sources said the administration feels that if other major steel firms can be convinced not to raise prices, Bethlehem will rescind its boost.
But if the increase is not rescinded and other company's follow Bethlehem's lead, the officials said, it would be a matter of "grave concern" to top administration officials and Congress.
"No one wants price controls or anything like that," a spokesman said. "This calls for extra responsibility by business and labor."
Control Denied
The source said that in the steel case, as in earlier price hikes in the aluminum and copper industry, the government does not consider its actions an attempt to control prices.
The price hike, which affects about 7 per cent of the market, was announced Friday for the construction of big buildings, bridges, highways and some equipment. The new prices went into effect Saturday.
Gardner Ackley, chairman of President Johnson's Council of Economic Advisers, and Cabinet members have joined the President in condemning the Bethlehem price hike.
The government contends the firm also may be open to a charge of profiteering if it does not rescind the increase.
Sources said Bethlehem's profits for the first nine months of 1965 were 83 per cent above 1963 figures for that period, reflecting the healthy profit trend in the steel industry.

House Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass., described the increase as dangerous and unnecessary. He urged that it be rescinded.
"An shortsighted attempt to make a quick profit without regard to the consequences for our economy is a disservice to the long-term interests of the company's own stockholders," McCormack said in a statement. "They have as much at stake as the rest of us in a continued, orderly expansion of the American economy."
House Democratic Leader Carl Albert of Oklahoma warned that stable prices and reduced unemployment cannot continue if producers take advantage of the Viet Nam war to raise prices.
"We are not asking the com-

pany to sacrifice its own interests," Albert said, "but merely to refrain from making our nation's burdens still greater for the sake of an opportunistic and unnecessary increase in their own profits."

SLUMS, WATER, TRAFFIC POSE STAGGERING PROBLEMS

Major Cities Of America Termed In "Deep Trouble"

First Of Three
By MARGARET BELLOWES
(By United Press International)

American cities—where 70 per cent of us now are born, live, work, retire and die—are in deep trouble.

Their inner cores are rotting, swelled by the ghetto poor and underprivileged, jammed by traffic, made bankrupt by the flight of the wealthy to the suburbs and the mounting bills for welfare, education and rebuilding.

Even so the movement of Americans into the cities rises day by day. The fate of the Negro in the urban centers is alone a problem of staggering magnitude and urgency.

United Press International took a poll of mayors and newspaper editors in the nation's 20 largest cities, asking them to name the worst problems of their communities.

Lack Of Funds
While each had its own

unique worries, ranging from smog to traffic to water, most of them face the same great bottleneck: lack of money.

It is nothing rare to find politicians crying for more funds, but the validity of their dilemma was summed up best by Joseph M. Barr, the mayor of Pittsburgh.

"Our major challenge is to find financial resources to carry on rebuilding efforts without entering into a self-defeating cycle," he said. "The question is how far can we go in raising taxes before we reach the point of discouraging families from living here and industries from locating and expanding here."

It is the No. 1 problem too on the lists of Mayor Frank Curran of San Diego, J. D. Baman of Seattle, and Theodore McKelton of Baltimore.

"Sheer lack of public revenue," says John F. Collins, Boston's mayor, whose program to replace old schools and bring equal educational oppor-

tunity for Negro and white children, is blocked by the money shortage.

Flight to Suburbs
Staff Writer Roy J. Harris of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch puts it this way:

"Blight and slums resulting from a population explosion from immigration of the disadvantaged make it impossible to keep pace with the spread of physical decay. This has been accompanied by wholesale flight to the suburbs of many thousands in higher income brackets which has an increasingly harmful effect on the economic, political and social life of the city."

Automobiles are the bane of many cities.

"We're choking to death," says Mayor Erik Jonsson of Dallas.

Mayor Victor Schiro echoes: "New Orleans is an old, sprawling city with narrow streets built on precarious swampy soil. They are jammed with automobiles." San Diego has a money losing transit system as does New York.

Berne Jacobsen, editor of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, points to the need there for a rapid transit system to eliminate automobile paralysis in the city's central core.

Los Angeles, a 450-square mile area dependent on wheels, has 250 miles of freeways. But peak traffic hours still bring cars to a standstill.

Chicago Sun-Times Editor Emmett Dedmon lists transportation as a major block. So does Cleveland Press Editor Louis B. Selzer.

Editors State Problems
Three Chicago editors state the dilemma of a city trying to provide increased services on dwindling income. Says L. S. Fanning, editor of the Daily News, "We must keep the city habitable in the face of rising costs." Says Emmett Dedmon of the Sun-Times, "The main problem is education of the poor in both the conventional and job sense." Loyd Wendt of the American says, "we must integrate people from

rural areas, both Negro and white, into the city, and redevelop urban areas to accommodate both industry and housing."

Washington's president of the board of commissioners points to the inter-related problems of crime and housing as the major problems of the nation's capital.

Philadelphia, engaged in one of the country's massive urban renewal programs, has made great progress. But Mayor James H. J. Tate still sees "crime and education, intertwined with unemployment," as its biggest threat.

Detroit, which also has made great progress with racial

tension and urban renewal, feels, according to Lee Hills of the Free Press and Martin Hayden of the News, that urban redevelopment and blight still face the city.

Pollution Plagues Cities
Air and water pollution plague most cities. Berne Jacobsen of the Post-Intelligencer and Henry MacLeod of the Times list this as one of Seattle's major problems. Los Angeles has been covered by smog—from industry and exhaust fumes of 3 million automobiles—for many years. After years of "crack down" legislation, the city still suffers from smog. New York has the same problem.

Cleveland lists pollution of air, education, housing and service, according to Lee Hills of the Free Press and Martin Hayden of the News, that urban redevelopment and blight still face the city.

Today, despite the highest national wealth in history, American cities and the people in them are caught in vicious cycles.

The cities can't get the money to cure the blight that is driving the people with money out of the cities.

And the poor can't get the educations which will get them the jobs that will make them the money that will furnish the taxes to pay for better

U.S. Must End Attacks To Gain Peace, Reds Say

TOKYO (AP) — Communist North Viet Nam said today if a political solution to the war in Viet Nam is to be achieved, the United States must halt "definitely and unconditionally" all acts of war against the North.

It said the Americans would also have to "acknowledge" the four conditions the Communists have laid down for an end to the war, including withdrawal of American forces.

"Trickery" Charged
The North Vietnamese Communist Party organ Nhan Dan in a long editorial dismissed current American peace overtures as "trickery." It described the four points and five others posed by the Viet Cong as "the most correct basis for the settlement of the Viet Nam problem," but did not insist they were the only ones.

"If a political solution to the Viet Nam question is to be achieved," Nhan Dan said, "the U.S. government must solemnly declare its acknowledgment of the four-point stand of the (North Vietnamese) government and prove it by practical deeds. It must stop definitely and unconditionally all acts of war against the Democratic Republic of Viet Nam."

Navy Launches Bonus Incentive

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP) — A six-year re-enlistment by a sailor aboard the Newport-based destroyer escort Hartley will net him \$7,848 under the Navy's incentive program.

Ronald E. Hassler, 22, of Wichita, Kan., took advantage of the new program effective Saturday, which offers a variable bonus to critically skilled personnel who re-enlist. He is a sonar technician second class.

He received \$1,589.60 in normal re-enlistment and \$1,046.40 in variable re-enlistment bonus. He also will receive a check for \$1,046.40 on the anniversary of his re-enlistment for the next five years.

The variable bonus is designed as a re-enlistment incentive for Navy men in special skills such as radarmen, and missile and sonar technicians.

Gold Found In Section Of Maine

AUGUSTA, Maine (AP) — Ten years and more of hard work in geology by the state and mining interests have proven something not many people would suspect: Downeast Maine has gold in those flatlands.

What is more important commercially, there are also copper, zinc, some lead, a little silver and probably some of the current "in" metal, molybdenum.

Just how much of each hasn't yet been established, but in 1965 alone the mining companies have spent more than \$2 million exploring and, in one case, starting to remove ore.

Credits Surveys
 State Geologist Robert G. Doyle credits much of the interest to the results of aerial and ground surveys conducted over the past decade or more by his division of the Maine Department of Economic Development.

So far, two principal areas of work have been developed. One is a few miles west of the famous Bar Harbor area. The other is farther east, on the New Brunswick border near the coast.

The latter section is where gold, along with copper, has been found in an area being explored by Dolsan Mines, Ltd., one of several Canadian firms interested in Maine.

Profit Margin
 Doyle says it cost \$8 to \$12 a ton to extract and refine the copper ore, and that the gold would be, in effect, the profit margin.

REFUNDS BACK IN VOGUE

Withholding Rate To Be More In Line With Tax Figure This Year

Refunds should be back in vogue again this year. While filing an income tax return is never an event looked forward to with great expectancy, this year's task should not be the nightmare experience shared by so many a year ago.

The Revenue Act of 1964 cut the tax rate in two stages. Two-thirds of the cut was effective in 1964; the other third applies to income received in 1965.

And for all of 1965 the withholding tax tables were in complete harmony with the tax rates. This was not true in 1964 when



the withholding tax cut was too deep to match the tax rate reduction. Consequently, many who had been accustomed to a refund had to make a payment in April 1965 and others found the tax due to be far greater than they had anticipated.

A reduction in the rates—in the lowest bracket the rate has been trimmed from 16 per cent to 14 per cent (a 12 1/2 per cent cut)—is just one of the many changes affecting 1965 earnings.

Persons who have stock investments will find new rules for the accounting of their dividends. The first \$100 in dividends is excludable from income. If a husband and wife are filing a joint return and each has dividend income or they own stock jointly it is possible for them to receive \$200 in tax-free dividends.

After this initial reduction the dividends are fully taxable. Formerly there had been a dividend credit. For example, prior to 1964, of \$500 in dividends received, \$100 was excluded on a joint return. The balance of \$400 received a 4 per cent tax credit of \$16. This amount was subtracted from the total income tax due figure. A year ago this credit was reduced to 2 per cent. In 1965 it disappeared completely. This means we still have the exclusion but no longer the percentage credit.

NEW YORK (AP) — Long before Lief Ericson or Christopher Columbus reached the New World, the Japanese may have been patting around South America.

Evidence that Japanese landed in this hemisphere as early as 3000 B.C. is reported by two anthropologists at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C.

Japanese-like pottery found in Ecuador, on the northwestern coast of South America, is the basis of the findings.

The anthropologists are the husband-and-wife team of Clifford Evans, curator of the Smithsonian's division of cultural anthropology, and Betty J. Meggers, research associate. Their report is published in the January issue of Scientific

American magazine and is amplified to become the first volume of the institution's "Contributions to Anthropology" series.

The two anthropologists speculate that the Japanese landing was accidental.

The report comes after recent estimates that Scandinavian Lief Ericson landed in the New World around 1000 A.D., some

500 years before Christopher Columbus.

The anthropologists' article says man-made objects found in Ecuador indicate that the knowledge of pottery-making was carried there by Japanese. They suggest that perhaps a fishing boat was caught in a typhoon off Japan and was swept away in the prevailing See **LANDING** Page 8

Repeal Of 14-B In '66 Unlikely

GIRL KIDNAPED Couple Held In Waxahachie For Tavern Holdup

WAXAHACHIE (UPI) — Bond of \$2,500 was set Sunday for Mr. and Mrs. Darrell Edward Taylor on charges of shooting a policeman who tried to arrest them for robbery and kidnaping.

The charges filed before Justice of the Peace Howe French of Corsicana stem from a Friday night holdup of an Ellis County tavern and abduction of the owner's 16-year-old daughter.

Taylor, 23, was in Ellis County jail at Waxahachie and his wife Iris being treated at Corsicana Memorial Hospital from a leg wound received during a gun battle. Mrs. Taylor is in satisfactory condition.

Kidnaping and armed robbery charges also were filed against the couple before Justice of the Peace Paul Grafton of Ennis.

Police said Taylor and his wife robbed the Hilltop Drive-In and took Vonda Chandler as a hostage, later trying to get ransom for the teenaged girl who was rescued unharmed.

Scientist Confirms Hogs Like Humans

BELTSVILLE, Md. (AP) — A scientist at the Agriculture Research Service here says he has confirmed that hogs are more like humans than any other non-primates.

"They are physiologically more like humans and they are subject to many of the same maladies," explained Dr. Jack C. Taylor, who is engaged in developing a miniature breed with which researchers can work more easily.

Early Bid Expected

 WASHINGTON (UPI)—Labor's most-wanted legislative plum, federal repeal of state "right-to-work" laws, appears as much out of reach in 1966 as it was in the big congressional year of 1965.

In the new session, it may go down as another casualty of the Viet Nam war.

President Johnson told AFL-CIO convention delegates in December that "with your help, it will pass." Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey promised that "we will fight hard and win—I repeat, fight hard and win."

Near-Miracle Needed
 But it will take a legislative near-miracle to win Senate approval of labor's cherished objective in this election year. The bill to repeal the Taft-Hartley law's section 14-B, under which 19 states have enacted so-called "right-to-work" laws, passed the House last July. The vote was 221 to 203.

But when Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield tried to call up the measure in October it ran into a filibuster led by GOP leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill.

And when Mansfield asked the Senate to impose gag rule to end the talkathon, the effort failed by the wide margin of 17 votes. The Democratic leader then bowed to the inevitable and put off further action until this year.

Now the expectation is for an early Mansfield move in 1966. If he delays action until late in the session, when a filibuster has its greatest impact, he and the Democrats may wind up in labor's private political doghouse. Union leaders are unhappy because the Montana Democrat refused to hold the Senate in around-the-clock sessions to kill Dirksen's filibuster. Privately discouraged, labor See **CONGRESS** Page 8

Bedrooms Take On New Appearance With Ideas From Leading Designers

For years the most ignored room in the house has been the bedroom. It's been concealed behind closed doors, deleted from guest tours and rarely assigned daytime duties. But the time has come for the bedroom to receive its due decorating consideration.

The best starting point in deciding the color scheme for

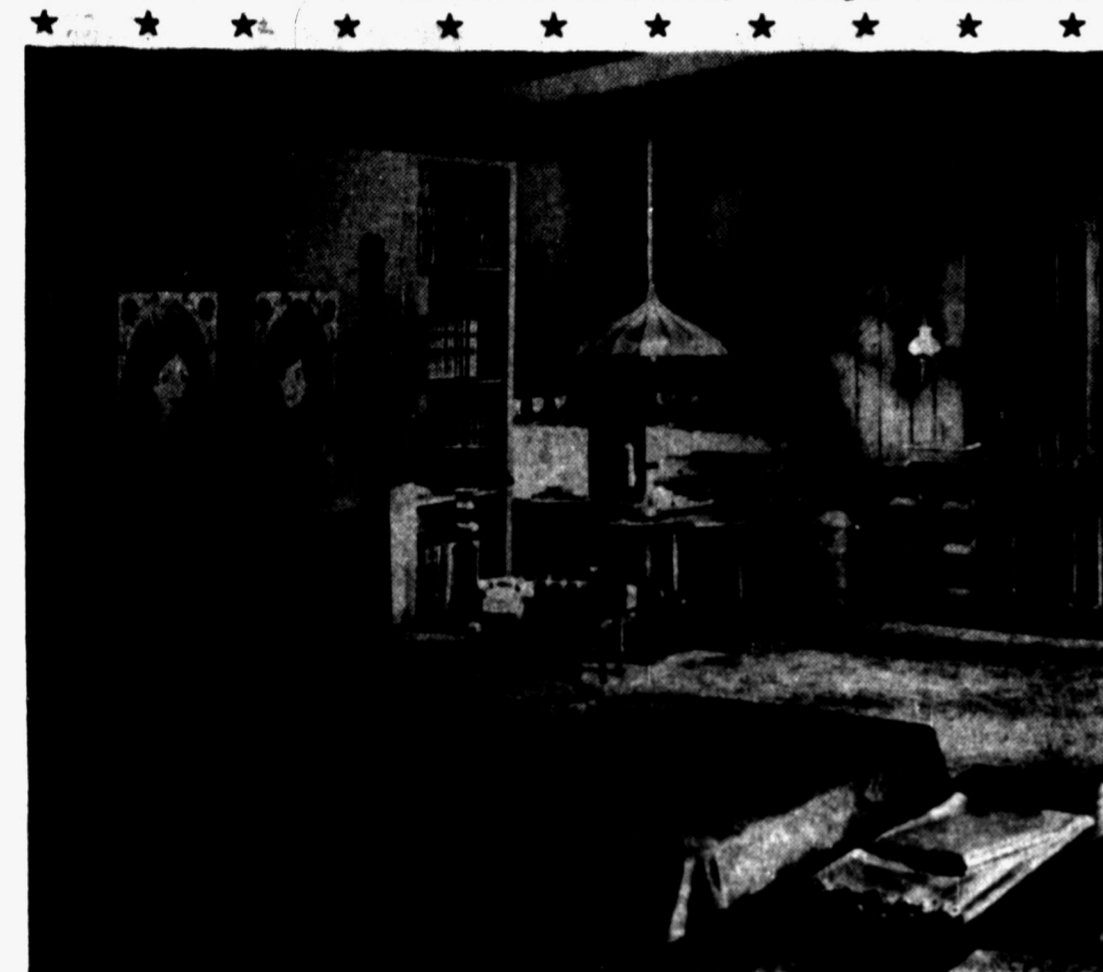

Any space "saved" can be put to use for other activities.

With the addition of a comfortable chair and handy lamp table a bedroom can double as a reading retreat. Or in a larger room the space can be used for a game table and chair grouping. These additions will add both more charm and meaning to a bedroom.

Other flexible storage solutions for bedrooms are bunting and stacking units. They are particularly well suited for the room designed to serve a dual purpose... such as a listening room or library... since more are available with units designed specifically for record or book storage.

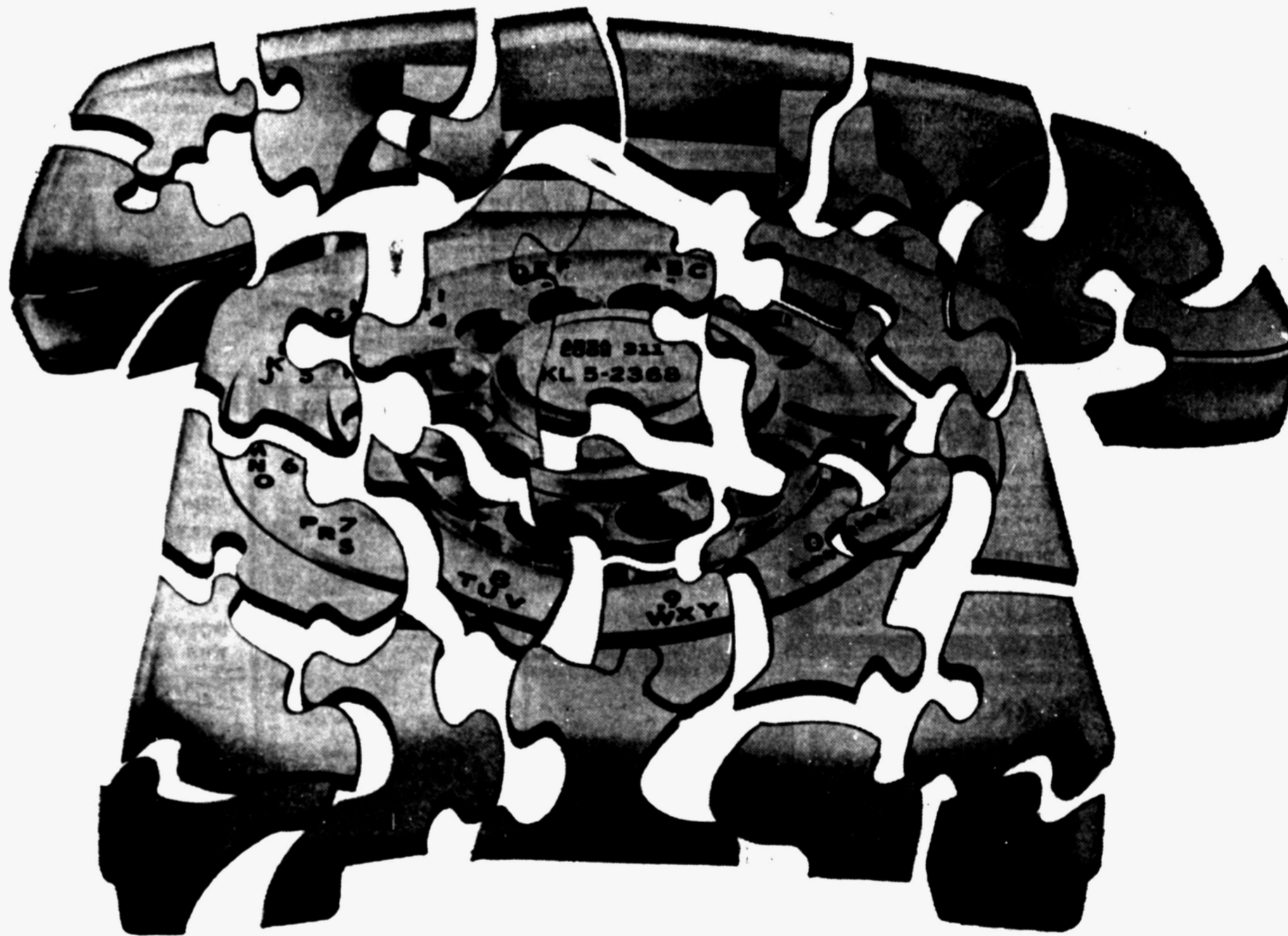

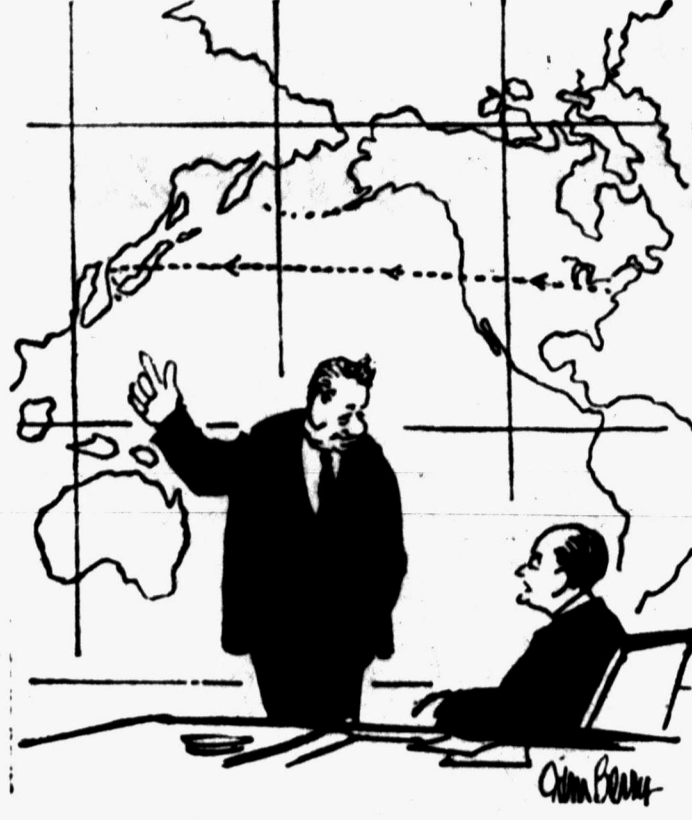

Dissipation Tales Usually Distorted

IT'S BEEN THREE DAYS now since Texas Tech lost in the Gator Bowl, and there's been a surprising absence of malicious rumors in connection with the defeat. Last year, fans still were filling out of the Sun Bowl when stories of dissension and dissipation began to spread through the Lubbock delegation.

That procedure is not too uncommon, it seems. In 1949, the Lubbock Westerners were upset by El Paso Austin in bi-district play. Before the team got home, rumors were circulating that the boys had spent the night before the game in Juarez. Plus a few choice tales about friction between team members, of course.

There then was the time in 1947 when a powerful Odessa High football team, led by the fabulous Byron (Santone) Townsend, was upset in the state playoffs by Highland Park of Dallas. "The gamblers made a killing on that one," the whisperers went. "Some of the players showed up with new cars the next week," others elaborated on the slander. And that's the way it went, ad nauseum.

Curfew-Breaking Is Problem WHICH IS NOT to say that there sometimes isn't a fact or two at the bottom of some of the stories that get started. There have been authentic cases of dissension and jealousy on football teams—but not nearly as many as fans are led to believe by the rumor-spreaders.

There are cases of dissipation each season on nearly every football team in the country, but certainly not Roman orgies on the eve of a big game, as many like to think. Such dissipation usually takes the form of curfew-breaking, and the good coaches are ever alert for the night owls and crack down hard when they catch them.

A typical case was disclosed at the University of Alabama a couple of years ago, when a bed check by the famed Paul (Bear) Bryant showed that quarterback Joe Namath was not in his proper place when the bell rang. So when the Happy Hungarian sauntered in some time later, he found quite a reception committee. He also found himself suspended from the football team and his athletic scholarship for the remainder of the year.

FOOTBALL PLAYERS, strange as it may seem, act just about like the other students at their institutions. Most of them are decent, hard-working young men who are a credit to their families and churches. Some of them are actually superior students—they have to be to make excellent grades and still devote so much of their time to athletics.

But some athletes are like a great many other young people their own age. They drink, smoke and/or break curfew regulations. They are not considered "bad" boys, but they present some problems to the athletic organization and to the school administration.

NFL Trounces AFL In Signing Of Stars

By MIKE BATHET Associated Press Sports Writer The National and American football leagues, who do not meet on the playing field, have concluded their annual game for the top draft choices in the country.

The NFL's overwhelming victory in the competition was sealed when such prized catches as Donny Anderson, Johnny Roland, Harold Lucas and Francis Peay signed after concluding their college careers in bowl games.

The Houston Oilers made the big final push for the AFL by signing four tackles, including Glen Ray Hines, George Rice and Dave McCormick for a \$1 million package, while Kansas City pulled off a surprise by nabbing Heisman Trophy winner Mike Garrett.

Anderson, Texas Tech's two-time All-America running back, signed with Green Bay for a reported \$600,000 that might be the highest on record—but less than the \$667,000 Houston owner Bud Adams said he had offered for Anderson's services.

Missouri Stars Signs Roland, Missouri's all-purpose back, received more than \$300,000 for signing with the St. Louis Cardinals, who also grabbed Lucas, Michigan State's huge tackle. Peay, Missouri's stand-out tackle and a first-round pick, went with the New York Giants as did Nebraska and Freeman White.

Adams, who was specific about the figure he offered Anderson, refused to divulge individual figures about the four because "we never give out figures on tackles." But, he said, "we're talking in excess of a million dollars."

Walker reportedly plans to accept a position with a sporting goods firm in Seymour immediately. Applications for the school job, which includes head track coaching duties along with line coaching in football, are being taken by Superintendent Carroll Tatom or Athletic Director Dee Windsor.

HANOI STICKS WITH FOUR POINTS

Red Demands Foil Talks

By LEWIS GULICK
WASHINGTON (AP) — A couple of ingredients in Hanoi's four-point program on the Viet Nam war make it totally unacceptable to the United States. Until something changes on these, the two sides are not

about to sit down at the conference table. Point one of Hanoi's four calls, among other things, for a withdrawal of American forces from South Viet Nam and an end to their attacks on the north.

Point two stipulates neutrality for North and South Viet Nam — no foreign military alliances and no foreign bases or troops there.

Point four proposes peaceful reunification of the divided country to be settled by the Vietnamese people "without any foreign interference."

Plenty Of Room
U.S. diplomats see plenty of room for reaching agreement on points 1, 2 and 4.

As Secretary of State Dean Rusk put it: "We have said that we want no bases in Southeast Asia. We have said that we do not wish to retain U.S. forces in South Viet Nam if there is peace. We have said that the question of reunification is something which the Vietnamese themselves can decide on their own free choice."

But Hanoi's point three is something else. It demands that "the internal affairs of South Viet Nam must be settled by the South Vietnamese people themselves in accordance with the National Liberation Front program, without any foreign interference."

Washington sees this as a demand for imposing the Communist, or "National Liberation Front," program on the south which would amount to a Red takeover there. The United States is committed to prevent

this and that is what the fighting is all about.

A second sticking point lies in the terms for any negotiations. Hanoi has never really made it clear on the record whether it insists on U.S. acceptance of its four points as preconditions for talks.

President Johnson has offered unconditional discussions — including conferring on Hanoi's four points but on U.S. proposals, too.

Third parties have hinted from time to time that North Viet Nam was willing to negotiate without preconditions. After following through on these "peace feelers," U.S. diplomats reported Hanoi was in fact demanding its four points as a sole basis for settlement.

Hanoi has been sticking to its four points since Johnson set forth his offer last April. His current peace offensive is probing for a change, at least in willingness to talk unconditionally.

Not an outstanding issue at this time is the question of elections — a point often raised elsewhere by critics of U.S. policy on Viet Nam.

Hanoi's four points contain no call for elections. The United States endorses elections in South Viet Nam. Free-choice elections are not allowed in the Communist North.

From that moment on, almost every page produced a passage that I associated with the imminent return of the lawmakers. "Grow old along with me" brought to mind the seniority system.

"Grow old along with me . . . (And we'll committee chairmen be.)"

Tax Couplet
A poem by James Stephens fitted in with talk about a possible tax increase.

"And a naked man I go . . . (The income tax takes all my dough.)"

There was a Shakespearean reference to filibusters—"Tomorrow, and tomorrow, and tomorrow." Also a number of other lines that could be construed as references to

congressional oratory.

"Calm is the morn without a sound . . . (Senator Morse is out of town.)"

The overseas trips that members take after Congress adjourns likewise had a poetic allusion.
