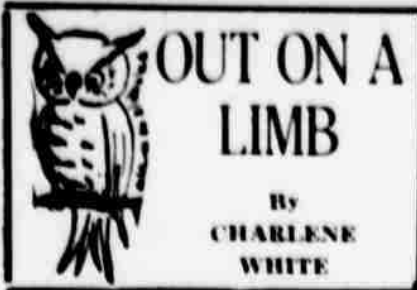

Cook. Injured were Fred Bishop, Frank Reynolds, G. W. Ammons, A. R. Graham, Jesse Childress, W. E. Brock, all of Haskell.

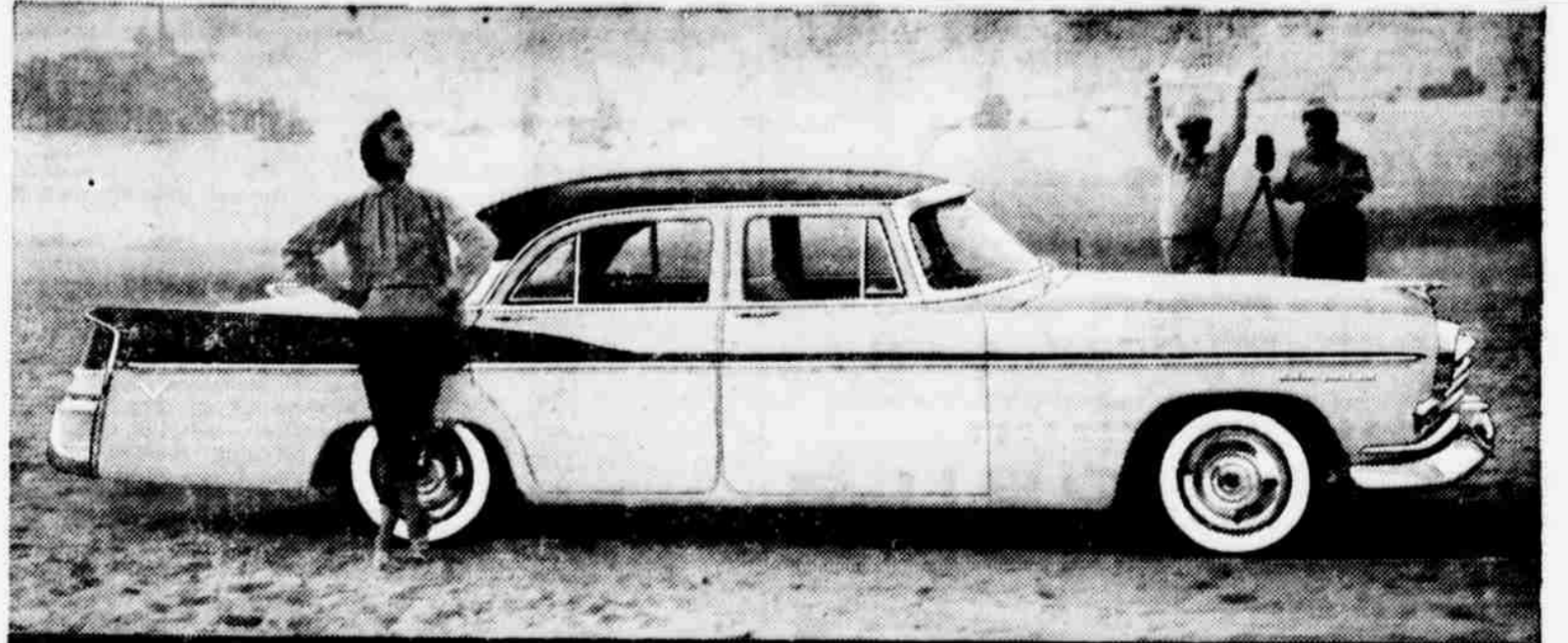





**Deadline April 1 On License Tags, Safety Stickers**

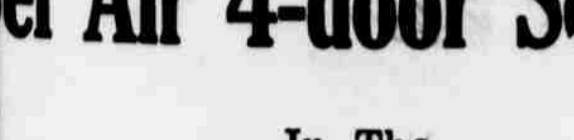
