Inspectors Laud School Plant at Paint Creek

A state accreditation committee which visited the Paint Creek school Wednesday, March 14, gave the plant an excellent recommendation, reports Dan McRae. Supt. of Schools.

The final report has not yet been received from the state office in Austin, but the commitee, composed of J. B. Golden, Miss Rubye Bennett, and Mrs. Mary A. Moore, submitted a report of their findings, he said. Their comments included "like the plant equipment, we believe it fits the need of the community." "The attitude of teachers, students, and personnel is very good." The trio also lauded the broad curriculum with its special emphasis on math and science.

Supt. McRae also stated the committee approved the admin-istration of the school which includes teacher and personnel files, board minutes, policy of the superintendent and the type of

Supt. McRae explained that the recommendation of the committee will consist chiefly of remarks on the physical part of the plant. The group was sent from the Texas Education Agency in Austin. The accreditation program is comparatively new, and although the Paint Creek school was inspected in April, 1954 on invitation, this is the first regular visit from the committee.

164 Applications Emergency Feed

A large number of Haskell County farmers and stockmen took advantage of the Emergency ment made effective in the courty from March 5 through March 16. and purchased more than a quarter million pounds of livestock

Wm. E. Lawson, local Farmers Home Administration Supervisor, said his office had received 164 applications, which were approved by the county FHA committee for a total of 370,955 pounds of teed.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office writes the purchase orders for the feed. Lawson explained, then the livestock owner takes it to his feed dealer and exchanges it for feed, which is grain designated as surplus by the Commodity Credit Corporation. The farmers or stockmen receive \$1.00 per 100 pounds discount on the grain con-

ent of the feed. Under the Emergency Feed Program livestock raisers ceive aid on livestock up to four pounds per day for a cow, three pounds per day for a yearling heifer, one pound per day for heifer calves being kept for foundation stock. Five pounds per day is allowed for a bull.

The local grain dealer honors the purchase order the same as he would cash. He can then present it to the Commodity Credit Corporation and have it redeemed in government surplus grain. There is no money involved except the difference the livestock owner pays over and above the value of his purchase order. In this manner the livestock raiser receives the aid and the government gets rid of the surplus feed.
