### Inflation Warning Is Given

### Chief Appeals For Restraint

By DOUGLAS B. CORNELL WASHINGTON (AP) -President Johnson said today the nation has achieved the ability to ward off recessions, hold booms in bounds and keep an American economic miracle going in 1966.

Johnson attached a condition to this glowing outlook: wage and price decisions by labor and business must be "sound and responsible - just as I am determined that public decisions

will be fully responsible." "If they are," the President said, "the American economic miracle will remain in 1966 the single most important force in the economic progress of man-

Sent To Congress This was in an 8,000-word message he sent to Congress along with the annual report of his Council of Economic Advis-

The report was a bit less exuberant in languange than the message But sprinkled through both were sentences and phrases of unvarnished optimism, qualified here and there with a word of restraint or cau-

They all added up to predictions that in spite of war in Viet Nam, and to some extent because of it, this will be another good, big financial year for just about everybody.

More Jobs Expected The forecasts are for more his family's Philadelphia business, more jobs, more profits, more spending and what Johnson called a "strong thrust

January 1963. The duration of last week's and this week's below-freezing weather was five days and 22 hours from 3 p.m. last Thursday until about 1 p.m. Wednes-

The duration of the January 1963 freeze was a little less than five days, but temperatures sank as low as 16 below zero on Jan. 13, 1963 and to minus 8 Jan. 12, 1963. The highest temperature recorded Jan. 12, 1963 was 10 degrees.

The lowest temperature recorded at the weather station during the just-closed freezing period was 3 degrees below zero Saturday morning. The lowest maximum reading was 27 degrees both Saturday and

Tuesday.
The 16-below reading in 1963 remains as the record low temperature registered by Lubbock Weather Station since it opened in November 1946. In data of Lubbock Experiment Station prior to opening of the weather station, lower temperatures had not been recorded since Feb. dropped to 17 degrees below

Remove ham from can and put on rack in shallow roasting pan. Drain oranges and mix juice slowly into cornstarch in a saucepan. Add orange marmalade, bitters, mustard, vinegar and ground cloves. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Score top of ham in a diamond pattern with a sharp knife. Bake in a pre-heated moderate oven (350°F.) for 1 hour. At this time brush ham with glaze, both top and sides. Bake for an additional 30 minutes, brushing glaze over ham several times. Remove from oven, decorate top with orange sections and whole cloves. Spoon remaining glaze lightly over sections. Bake another 5 minutes. Yield: 12-15 servings.

Convenience foods are here for us to live with happily ever after. But not necessarily monotonously.

Take the ease and the efficiency, but take just a little time to add something of yourself. The interesting business of transforming familiar canned, frozen and packaged foods into personalized examples of better taste is in

All these recipes use typical convenience foods. But the finished dishes are rare with flavor and imagination. They have a common ingredient that is uncommonly useful in making the ordinary extra-ordinary. It's aromatic bitters, a blend of many tropical herbs and spices that has the unusual quality of flavoring and seasoning while remaining virtually anonymous itself. One knows only that there is a subtle something, a difference that distinguishes the dish and makes it taste particularly good.

### TEXAS CASSEROLE

- 4 strips bacon, chopped
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 green pepper, chopped 1 garlic clove, chopped
- 1 can (4 os.) pimiento, drained and
- chopped 1 can (1 lb., 12 oz.) pork and beans
- 2 cans (151/2 oz. ea.) chili with beans
- spoons aromatic bitters

- 1 cup shredded sharp cheese

In a  $2\frac{1}{2}$  quart casserole fry bacon until crisp. Add onion, green pepper and gartie. Saute until vegetables are tender. Add pimiento, beans, chili and bitters. Cut bologna into 1-inch cubes and add to beans. Stir to blend mixture. Top with shredded cheese. Bake in a preheated hot oven (400°F.) for 20 minutes or until mixture is bubbly and hot. Yield: 8 servings.

### **ORANGE RICE**

- 1 can (6 oz.) frozen concentrated orange juice
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 21, cups water 1/4 teaspoon crumbled saffron threads -(or ground saffron)

3 cups pre-cooked rice

1 tablespoon aromatic bitters

In a 2 quart saucepan mix orange juice with water, saffron, bitters and butter. Bring to a boil. Slowly stir in rice. Stir to blend well. Remove from heat, cover and let stand for 10 to 15 minutes. Stir with a fork to fluff. Serve immediately garnished with chopped parsley. Yield: 8 servings.

### TOSSED VEGETABLE SALAD WITH DRESSING

- Bite-size pieces of salad greens
- 6 fresh mushrooms, trimmed and cut into 14-inch slices 1 package (10 oz.) frozen asparagus
- spears, cooked and chilled 2 packages (10 oz. ca.) frozen mixed
- vegetables, cooked and chilled
- cup lime juice
- teaspoon white peppe teaspoon paprika
- teaspoon granulated sugar 2 tenspoons grated onto

Line a large salad bowl with bite-size pieces of salad greens. Arrange mushroom slices and asparagus spears around the outer edge of the bowl. Fill center of bowl with mixed vegetables. Chill until ready to serve. Put remaining ingredients into jar with tight-fitting lid. Shake until well blended. Pour saind dressing over saind just before serving. Toss gently to blend all ingredients. Yield: 8 servings.



WASHINGTON A brass curtain has been low- to help empty the holds of ships they manned ered by Pentagon and State Department officials around the slow-motion Vict Nam supply system

The folds of that curtain are being used to gaz union officials, who have learned of lethargy, lack of ; lanning, correction and rule-book inefficiency now slowing the flow of equipment, weapons and food to our troos and alses

BECAUSE OF ancient Army regulations in a lions of dollars are being wasted weekly. Cargo ships which should be speeding the oceans, are idling at anchor. Seamen who could be working, and have volunteered and have been rejected are stewing on hot decks in a steaming sun for 50 and 60 empty days at a stretch. And troops go without ammunition, food and tools.

All this and far more has been learned by waterfront union leaders. But the Navy and the State Department last week forbade them to report their findings to the public.

SINCE THE Viet Cong gets word of all this to Hanoi long before U. S. intelligence gets its reports to Washington-State Department and Pentagon brass obviously are seeking to withhold the story from the American public and from President Johnson himself.

Unloading of vital cargo in South Vietnamese ports is notoriously leisurely. Though several years ago it became obvious that huge supplies would have to pour into the mudbank bays and ports, the military did little planning. Even now slender women, weighing less than 100 pounds, carry 200-pound bags of cargo. Corruption is more rampant than malaria. But everybody says little

RESULT IS that the Army uses its own longshoremen gangs to unload supplies. They are short-handed. So they work one hatch at a time. But they can get help and not from the South Victnamese flesh-peddlers either.

Crews, belonging to the National Maritime Union, headed by Big Joe Curran, have offered

Thus the ships that manage to get into port are held in their berths many days longer than it would take to turn them around if the brass permitted the American seamen to pitch-in.

THE LONGER it takes to unload these vessels. the longer the ever-arriving freighters must stay on the hook." This is costing the U. S. many millions of dollars. The Government must pay an average of \$5,000 a day for each ship while at sea. This is a charge under the charter arrangement. So, if there are 50 or more ships idling in the harbor or bay for 50 or more days at some \$5,000 daily, it comes to somewhat more than the take on a charity bingo game night.

TO TAKE a first-hand look at the maze and mess, Joe Curran has dispatched two NMU officials to Saigon. With their experience they may yet show the military how to tow in World War II liberty ships, anchor them and turn them into waterborn tool shops and "reefer" vessels (refrigerator ships).

Thus as in the last big conflict, there could be fully-equipped floating repair and assembly shops, mammoth floating ice boxes for perishable foods, floating warehouses into which the other freighters could empty their holds.

THEN THE ships need not idle for as long as a month. They could return for new, desperatelyneeded cargo. And crews could be consolidated on those craft which must stay in the bays while skeleton crews take some freighters home. Some could be flown back to crew undermanned ships

It takes planning. There has been mighty little. Small wonder the brass' curtain has been wrung down on that corner of the China Sea.

### Get Raborn **Drive On**



WASHINGTON-Central Intelligence Director William Raborn is being virulently attacked from both within and outside the huge agency-by some

strange bedfellows. One of these smear campaigns, which involves the circulation of forged documents and planted anti-CIA press reports overseas, is being masterminded by the KGB, the Soviet secret police.

THESE PROPAGANDA operations are part of a long-range Russian scheme to discredit the CIA's worldwide covert activities, and to try to force Admiral Raborn out of office. The immediate KGB objective is to dry up sources which are giving the CIA advance information on the Kremlin's machinations to foment "wars of liberation" in Asia, Africa and Latin America.

Illustrative of the scope, nature and success of the CIA's covert operations was the infiltration of its agents at the recent Tri-Continent Revolutionary Conference in Havana.

AT THE CUBAN meeting, Reds from Asia, Africa and Latin America called for the destruction or withdrawal of U. S. forces from South Viet Nam and the Dominican Republic.

The other attack against Raborn is from the rear. Congressional supporters of the Navy veteran deem it as sinister as the other. These CIA "insiders" are credited with strong-

ly disagreeing with his hardnose opposition to making concessions to Russia, and his firm insistence on obtaining "all intelligence" regardless of whether it facilitates friendly relations between the U.S. and the Soviet.

THIS INNER CIA attack on Raborn is currently manifesting itself in "leaked" stories to columnists and magazines. The usual tenor of these "plants" is that while Raborn did an outstanding job in directing the

Navy's Polaris missile program, he doesn't know how to boss or control the CIA. According to Congressional sources, these anti-Raborn officials, in an effort to embarrass him, are endeavoring to get the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to hold hearings on the CIA's

impact on foreign policy. Sen. Eugene McCarthy, (D-Minn.), has asked Sen J. William Fulbright, (D-Ark), chairman, to initiate a CIA probe. Fulbright is considering the

SHOULD FULBRIGHT reject the proposal, it is McCarthy's intention to sponsor a resolution authorizing such an investigation by a special committee. This would have to be voted on by the full

Congressional friends of Raborn attribute some of his difficulties with long-time career CIA emaployes to his setting up around-the-clock watch officers to keep him constantly informed of Rus sian and Chinese covert operations.

THIS HIGHLY sensitive check system was put into effect when Raborn learned that either im-portant intelligence was not sent to him or delivery was delayed for days.

Under the new arrangement, he is fully briefed "before 7 a. m." and conveys essential information to President Johnson immediately after, The President, who personally selected Ra-

# Falcons' New Coach To Build Tough Defense First

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — The new head coach of the Atlanta Falcons sometimes goes by the name of J. Jones.

By now, those interested in National Football League affairs know that the Falcons' man is Norb Hecker.

He used the name 'J. Jones'' to keep secret Falcon owner Rankin Smith's selection of a new head coach.

"I felt like agent 007 coming into Atlanta," said Hecker, 38,

who for the past six years has been assistant coach with the Green Bay Packers. "I thought the game was up on an airplane when a stewardess recognized me and said 'hello, Mr. Hecker.' But no one else found out.'

Hecker wasted little time getting to work. He started calling friends Wednesday afternoon in a search for five assistant coaches.

He said he doesn't plan to move his wife and five children

"because I'm going to be so busy I wouldn't have time to

spend with them anyway." Hecker was first contacted by the Falcons last Saturday, and was told Tuesday to fly to Atlanta so he could be introduced at a news conference Wednesday.

"It was a whirl-wind five days for me," Hecker said. "I still have to go back to Green Bay and clean out my office."

Atlanta has some top college players on its roster, "and with the 42 players we will get from the other teams I believe we

will have pretty good talent."
The former Baldwin-Wallace College star, who played half-back for the Los Angeles Rams and the Washington Redskins before a knee injury ended his NFL career in 1957, said he will first build a strong defense with the Falcons.

without a good defense," said Hecker, who has been defensive backfield coach for the Packers. "And it is easier to build a defense than an offense.

"Our biggest problem will be to instill a desire to win among our players," Hecker said. "I hope we can get some players from championship teams that will have that desire.'

Hecker was never mentioned as a candidate for the Falcon only one "of about 10 prospects" interviewed for the job that had not applied.

Hecker apparently was suggested for the post by NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle, who visited with Smith at length in Atlanta last Friday, when Red Hickey, former head coach of the San Francisco 49ers, was considered the top candidate. Smith's first contact with Hecker came a day after the one of Packer Coach Vince Lombardi's top aides. But he lacks Lombardi's brooding intensity and is slow to anger.

"Norb has all the qualifications of a paragon," Lombardi said. "He is a very fine young gentleman, highly intelligent and with a fine personality. He is extremely loval and one of the finest workers I have ever See FALCONS Page 4


