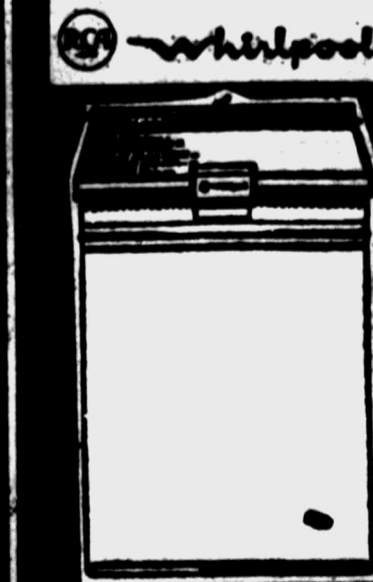
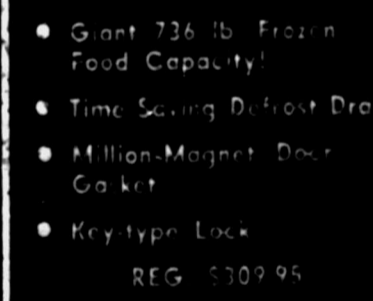

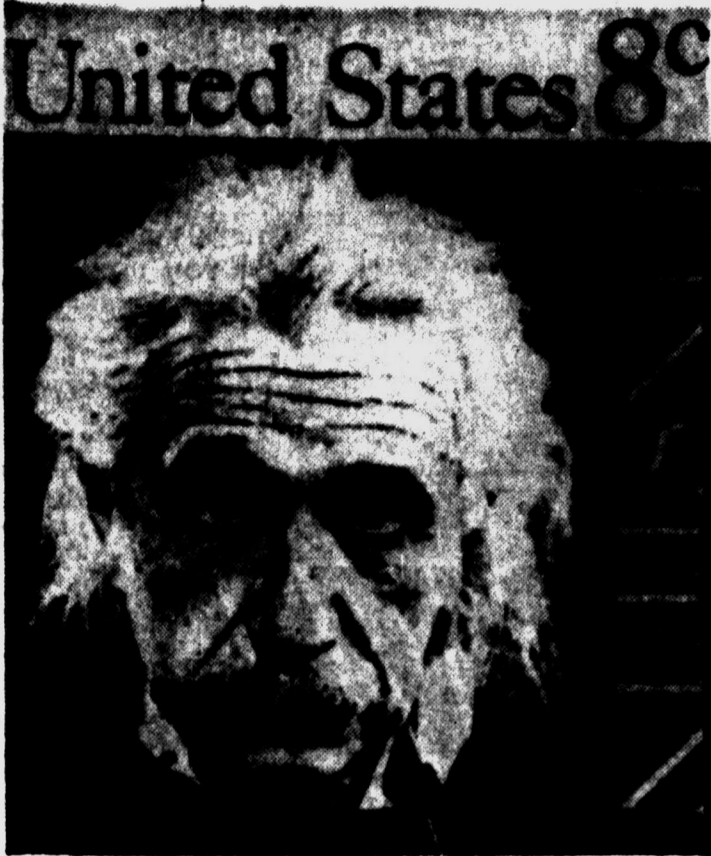

**Court Upholds Two Convictions**

AUSTIN (AP) — There was sufficient evidence at the trial of Walter Lee Sirois to support his conviction in the rape of a 20-year-old Houston woman who was seven months pregnant, says the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

Sirois was sentenced to death in the March 1963 assault. Court records indicate the woman was walking with her husband when two men forced her into a car and later raped her.

The court also upheld the murder without malice conviction of Daniel A. Rios.

Rios drew a five-year sentence from a Big Spring jury after conviction on evidence he was under the influence of alcohol when his car crashed into one driven by Albert Grantham, killing Grantham.

**12 KILLED IN BLAZE**

**High School Student Faces Arson Charges In Yonkers**

YONKERS, N.Y. (AP) — A quiet, tense, dark-haired boy with an unsettled background and a drive for hard work, was in custody Wednesday in connection with starting a fire that killed nine children and three adults.

The youth, Thomas Ruppert, 17, was held in the psychiatric division of Grasslands Hospital, at the request of Westchester County Family Court.

"Couldn't Do It"

Police issued a warrant for him, charging he had set fire last Dec. 20 to the Jewish Community Center here where he worked part time under the city's antipoverty program.

"I know Tommy didn't do anything like this," the youth's father, Robert J. Ruppert, said. "He's an emotional boy with a conscience. No one with a conscience could do something like this."

The warrant, charging first-degree arson, said the youth "took a five-gallon can of gasoline from the basement of the center and spread it around the balconies of the third and fourth floors" and then ignited it.

He has admitted the act the warrant claimed. Police Capt. Frank Viscio said he knew the motive but declined to make it public.

**High School Student**

A high school student and second oldest in a family of eight children, he had lived in various foster homes and institutions from the age of 9 until he returned home to stay recently.

The family lives in a municipal housing project. The mother, in a hospital, has been seriously ill for some time. The father operates a truck for a diaper service and has been caring for the children by himself.

At the Jewish center the youth worked as a maintenance helper on assignment from the Yonkers Neighborhood Youth Corps, part of the city's antipoverty program.

He was on duty at the time of the fire and afterward returned to the center as part of a clean-up detail. The father asked, "How could he go back to the place if he did what they say he did?"

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**SECURITY STILL TIGHT**

**Witnesses Say Explosions Preceded Airplane Crash**

ROY, N.M. (AP) — The Air Force security shroud around hour spy plane in northeast New Mexico was punctured only a little Wednesday by witnesses.

Rancher Albert Mitchell Jr. and other witnesses said they first heard two explosions at what they termed an unusually high altitude and then saw the SR71 supersonic, twin-jet reconnaissance aircraft crash Tuesday near the Mitchell ranch 30 miles east of Roy.

They said they saw the two pilots floating earthward about four minutes after hearing the explosions. Test pilot James T. Zwyer, Lancaster, Calif., was found dead in his parachute-ejection seat. Pilot Bill Weaver, 35, Northridge, Calif., survived with minor injuries.

There was no statement from the Air Force investigation team headed by Brig. Gen. C. D. Stewart of Norton Air Force Base, Calif. Civilians were kept at a distance.

Zwyer and Weaver, test pilots for Lockheed Aircraft Corp., which built the aircraft, were on a test flight out of Edwards AFB, Calif.

Mitchell said he and two ranch hands were branding colts in a corral when they heard the explosions. They saw the black aircraft in a spiraling flaming descent. Then they saw two parachutes.

Mitchell said he dropped his branding iron and ran toward the ranch hangar and helicopter. He said he found Weaver about one mile from the ranch hangar and Zwyer's body about one mile from where Weaver landed.

The rancher said both pilots were in pressurized suits and their faces seemed somewhat swollen after the high-altitude descent. He said he had to cut the stirrups and straps holding the men in their parachute-ejection seats. Zwyer's face was smeared with blood, Mitchell said.

Mitchell quoted Weaver as saying, "Everything was going fine and suddenly whoof."

He said his hands nearly were frozen during the fall, Mitchell reported.

Weaver was reported in good condition and walking in hospital corridors at Tucuman on Wednesday, where he was taken for observation. Zwyer's body was at a Tucuman mortuary.

**Connally Slates Week-Long Trip**

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. John Connally said Wednesday he plans a week-long trip beginning Feb. 21 to invite the presidents of South American countries to take part in HemisFair.

HemisFair will open April 1968 in San Antonio as a Western Hemisphere fair and exhibition.

Connally said his plans, still incomplete in some respects, call for his party to fly first to Caracas, Venezuela, then to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and Buenos Aires, Argentina.

If his schedule can be arranged for another four days, Connally said he also will visit Santiago, Chile, and Lima, Peru.

**Building Planned**

Texas has appropriated \$4.5 million toward building a permanent exhibit building at the HemisFair that could be used for state agencies after the exhibition is over. Congress has voted planning funds for the exhibition.

At a recent news conference in San Antonio, Connally said he would ask the 1967 Legislature for another \$5.5 million for Texas' participation.

The governor said he and Mrs. Connally will travel by commercial airliner, accompanied by Tom C. Frost Jr., San Antonio banker and HemisFair vice president in charge of international participation, and Carlos Freymann, HemisFair staff member in charge of Latin American participation.

Connally said HemisFair is paying for the trip.

**'FORGOTTEN MEN?'**

**GOP Leaders Asking Bill To Aid Viet Nam Veterans**

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Specific reference to the House Republicans accused subject President Johnson Wednesday of turning the education-seeking veterans Viet Nam into the "forgotten men" of the Great Society's "forgotten men." It would be to retroactively award them the same benefits as World War II and Korean War veterans. The attack came from GOP House leader Gerald R. Ford, chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee, and Rep. Ross Adair, Ind., ranking Republican on the Veterans Affairs Committee. They urged Johnson to propose a better GI education bill than the one he "casually mentioned" in his State of the Union speech on Jan. 12. In his address, Johnson urged new legislation to extend opportunities to those who risked their lives in our armed forces. That was his only proposal for next week.

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP)—Civil rights leaders, satisfied with swift enactment of a Kentucky public accommodations and fair employment law, said Wednesday a fair housing bill is their next goal. "The fight is now over yet," said the Rev. A. D. Williams King of Louisville, a brother of Nobel Peace Prize-winner Martin Luther King Jr. "We seek open occupancy."

The Very Rev. Robert Estill, chairman of the State Human Rights Commission, agreed a major push might be made in the 1968 legislature for an equal housing statute.

"Not As Strong" "The bill passed this week is not as strong as we would have hoped in some areas," said the Rev. W. J. Hodge of Louisville, state president of the NAACP. "We were not for any exemptions. But you have to be practical."

Galen Martin, executive director of the Rights Commission, said Kentucky's new law is far stronger than any border state version and almost as inclusive as the law in any North-eastern state.

He predicted Kentuckians would accept and comply "to a greater extent than has been the case in most other states." Gov. Edward T. Breathitt echoed the forecast. "Our history and tradition has always been free from deviousness and subtle resistance to the law," he said.

Only One Against Breathitt's comprehensive bill emerged practically intact and encountered surprisingly little resistance in the General Assembly, which passed it in eight days. There was only one dissenting vote.

The governor will sign the bill Thursday at the base of Abraham Lincoln's statue in the Capitol rotunda. The law takes effect July 1.

The Rev. Mr. Estill said the new law could help transform the state's Negro population in at least three ways. "With few exceptions, he can in good conscience go to any public accommodation without having to wonder if he will be humiliated."

More Jobs Open "He will have some 40 per cent greater availability in looking for jobs, by our estimate, without being eliminated immediately because of color. And he will have a more specific way of filing a complaint or seeking redress. This will be done through our commission, which has stayed in pretty close touch with Negroes instead of

becoming a faceless bureaucracy." Every civil rights leader foresaw an increase in jobs for Negroes. Some said coverage in the law of employers of as few as eight workers—the federal bill includes 100—would mean Negro opportunity in smaller cities.

Kentucky, with about three million people, has an estimated 216,000 Negroes. More than one-third live in the populous Louisville area. Every Kentucky governor since World War II has been publicly for civil rights progress. The Ku Klux Klan and Citizens' Councils never gained a

strong hold in Kentucky. However, one of the first open outbreaks against court-ordered school desegregation occurred in 1856 at the western Kentucky communities of Clay and Stuttgart. The trouble ended after then-Gov. A.B. Chandler called the National Guard to restore order.

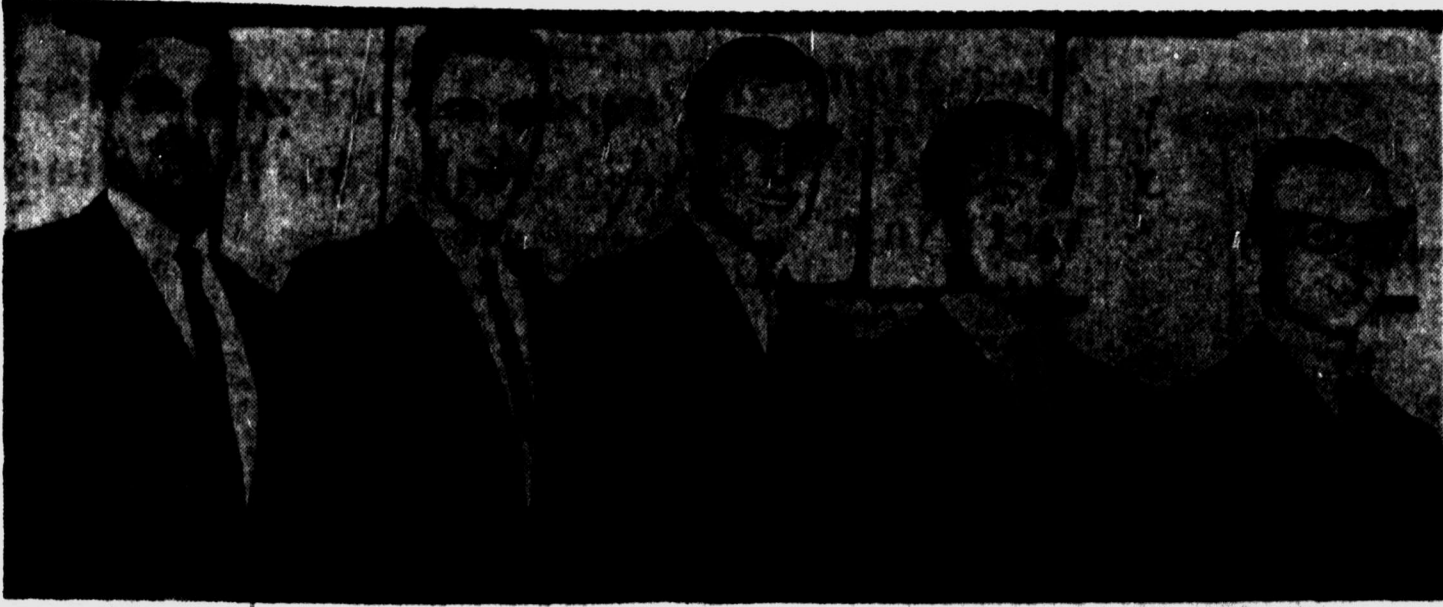

**New Phase In Cuban Raids Said Emerging**

By THEODORE A. EDIGER, sitting in. MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Militant exile bands say a new phase is emerging in their anti-Castro campaign, resumption of U.S.-forbidden raids on Cuba, but on a coordinated basis. "If we can't unite, we'll coordinate," said Ernesto Freyre, one of three groups participating in the last announced hit and run attack against Fidel Castro's island. Until the U.S. government halted them, such raids occurred frequently. "Meet Secretly" Representatives of rival anti-Castro organizations meet weekly in secret plotting chambers in the "New Havana" section of West Flagler Street. "We sit at the table at the same level; there is no leader and every group keeps its own identity," Freyre said. "Our plan is not for an occasional attack, but periodic action, one action after another. We harass Castro that way, he will have less time to organize aggression against other countries. Resolution to proceed in the face of the U.S. moratorium on such sniping was general among leaders of half a dozen groups

"The United States should bless us rather than be mad at us for fighting our common enemy, communism," Freyre said. U.S. Disagrees A State Department official disagreed. "Hit and run raids have no value, and on the contrary they cause the Cuban government to take precautions that would not be taken otherwise. Cuba can say, 'look at us, how we are being abused.' And they can cause hardships for people inside Cuba with reprisals." The official continued: "We can stop them, and we will stop them. If laws are violated, we will act accordingly." 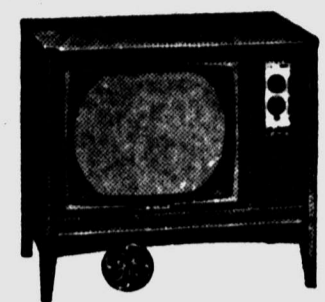

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### 'Booster Pump' Designed For Ailing Human Hearts

By ALTON BLAKESLEE  
 NEW YORK (AP) — A substitute heart made of plastics is almost ready for placement in a heart patient's chest.

It's designed to do a major part of the pumping work of an ailing human heart, for days or weeks, and then could easily be removed. And it has passed careful tests in animals, a famous surgeon said Wednesday.

The spare heart, powered by a bedside air pump, should be available for first human use within a month, said Dr. Michael E. DeBakey of Baylor University Medical Center. Its first trial in a suitable patient could come anytime "within a year," he said.

The plastic heart is truly a spare, to be placed between a person's ribs. Plastic tubes take blood returning from the lungs, then pump it out through the body.

The spare heart thus can do any desired degree of the pumping work of the left ventricle.

the chamber that sends blood flowing out of the heart to the body.

Pulses of air within linings in the tubes squeeze the blood along.

The air pump later could be miniaturized and powered by battery so the patient easily could walk and work with his substitute ventricle, DeBakey said. A dog given an artificial heart was equipped with a small, portable air pump, he added.

#### Design Exhibited

DeBakey showed the latest design of the substitute heart at a news conference sponsored by the New York Heart Association on its 50th anniversary Wednesday—and the American Heart Association.

He cited the artificial heart work as an example of rapid progress from research against heart disease, leading killer of Americans.

Dr. DeBakey said the Baylor pump could help heart patients who need temporary aid, until their own hearts recover, and might benefit some persons who face constant danger of a severe heart attack.

If produced in quantity, the artificial heart might cost about \$200 to \$300, he said.

# Five Louisiana Parish School Systems Indifferent To Federal Fund Loss

By BOB ROWAND  
NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP) — Five Louisiana Parish school systems seem indifferent to their loss of more than \$2 million in federal aid for refusing to desegregate their classrooms. They say they're doing all that federal aid should be doing and don't intend to stop. "We have exactly the same

things this year as last year and kind under the 1964 Civil Rights Act," said Supt. G. Act. However, one of the six Webster is under federal court desegregation orders and is seeking eligibility for the federal aid. The other five are Tensas, Union, Vermilion, West Carroll and Winn. ## IN SOUTH CAROLINA

### Reapportionment Try Blocked By Talkathon

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Small-county legislators, seeking to retain as much political power as possible, have filibustered for more than 100 hours to block a plan to reapportion the South Carolina Senate.

Round-the-clock sessions have been marked by a few bad stories, occasional oaths, gallons of black coffee, strained nerves and iron eots on which senators nap in the chamber. A federal court has told the legislature that it must reach the Senate by Feb. 7 in line with the U.S. Supreme Court's "one man, one vote" ruling. After considerable debate, a conference committee agreed on a plan which would increase the Senate from 46 to 50 members, representing 27 districts.

Want Second Plan Each of the 46 counties now has one senator. In South Carolina, a senator wields considerable power in county and state government. The small-county senators want the legislature to submit to the court an alternate plan which would increase the Senate membership to 39 elected from 26 districts.

Sen. Bradley Moman, acting president, dispatched state troopers Wednesday to rout senators from their beds in Columbia hotels. He said the rules of the Senate were being deliberated. He said he instructed officers to promptly escort all senators back to their chambers. Many senators had left after one of the filibustering lawmakers announced he would not talk for a quarter while talking.

Talked 27 Hours Sen. R. B. Gasque talked for 27 consecutive hours and was tired down Tuesday. In the early morning hours, Gasque, who is an attorney, gave the senate the details of a plan to increase the number of senators from 46 to 50, using the

names. Gasque, who once talked 24 hours in another filibuster, presented a cardboard duplicate of the state seal. One side said, "The Champ," and the other said, "The Chump." As he walked from the chamber, a weary Gasque told the Senate: "I'll go get a shave and I'll be back about Thursday or Friday. I don't want to deprive my colleagues of a chance to talk."

Some Play Cards Each night a dozen senators stretch out on eots while a few aides and porters bring in food and beverages. Some senators play cards in a nearby committee room. 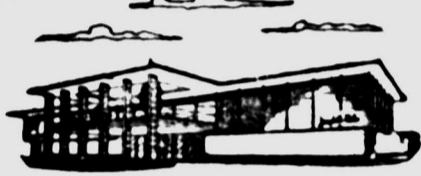

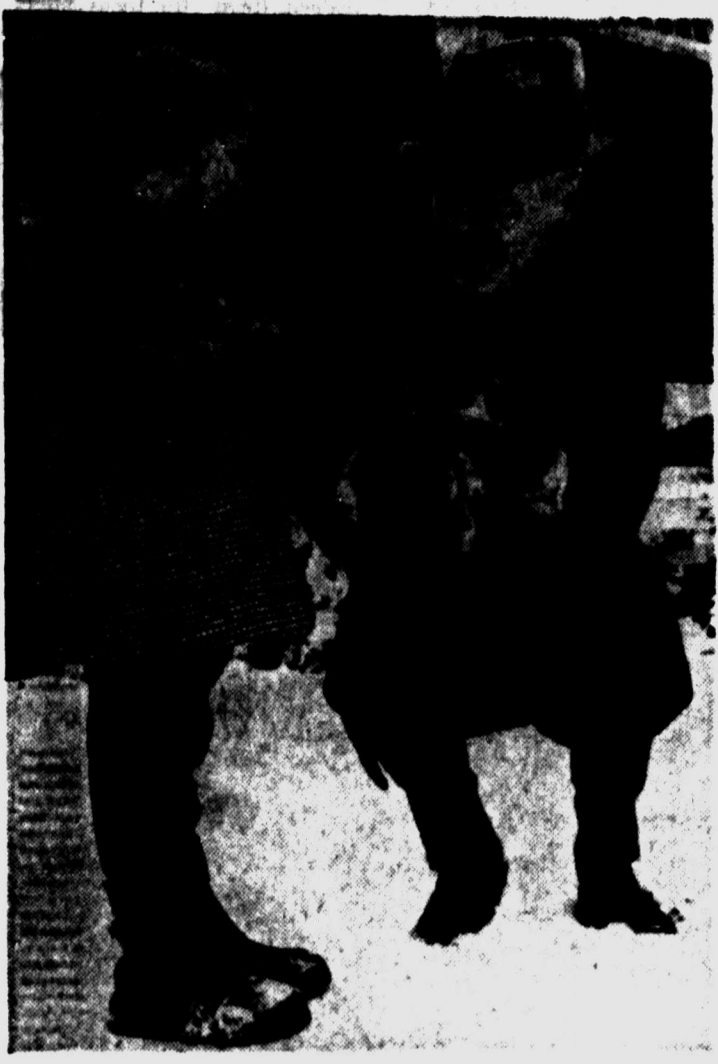

**CAUSE NO DAMAGE**  
**Reds Lob Mortar Shells At Airbase**

**SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)**—A Red mortar crew lobbed two shells at the Da Nang airbase complex early Thursday as if in response to an allied offensive that rained hundreds of tons of explosives on suspected Viet Cong centers.

The mortar shells landed near the U.S. 9th Seabee Battalion area shortly after midnight, but caused neither damage nor casualties, Marines fired several rounds in return.

It was a re-enactment in miniature of a mortar duel early Tuesday at Da Nang, 380 miles northeast of Saigon, in which the Viet Cong killed three Americans and two Vietnamese.

**Avoiding Conflict**

Whether for military or political reasons, Communist field units were avoiding any substantial contact with probing troops of South Viet Nam, the United States and other allies.

In the biggest encounter reported, tough troops of the Vietnamese 9th Division killed 14 Viet Cong and captured 114 Wednesday in Kien Phong Province on the Cambodian border, a government spokesman said.

Among the prisoners were 100 described as recently recruited. A large store of arms was reported taken.

In the same province, Vietnamese troops used artillery and air strikes to drive back a Viet Cong attack on an outpost.

Washington sources expected that President Johnson soon would order renewal of U.S. bombing attacks on North Viet Nam, suspended since last Christmas Eve as one phase of a peace offensive that Hanoi denounced as tricky.

NEW YORK (WNS)—The cosmetics creators are looking forward with glee to 1966, which they foresee as one of the biggest ever for makeup. They base their optimism on the beauty news of 1965, which was practically all in makeup.

Biggest news maker was a Roman high fashion makeup created, called simply "Pablo," who came here and proceeded to dazzle the beauty fashion world with eye effects seldom seen before.

Pablo pasted sequins, feather double ring ceremony Jan. 19 and eyelid colors on the fashionable eyelids of New York, creating butterfly, bird and tiger effects that stood the make-up people on their ears.

In fact, he was the first make-up artist to be given a Clayborne Fashion Critics Award, the high-est accolade the fashion world bestows each year.

Don't Expect Feathers  
While beauty forecasters don't expect women all over the U.S. to start putting feathers on their eyelids, they do expect that such avant garde ideas will give a big boost to eye makeup in general.

When you've seen Pablo's eye effects, ordinary eye makeup seems to look as if it were a thing of the past.

The average woman is trying out fake eyelashes, for instance, by the millions of pairs.

Consumption has shot up so high that the supply of real hair for them has run far short of demand. Dandel and other synthetic fibres are now more used for fake lashes than real hair.

Next to false eyelashes, next year women will buy the many kits being put out for eyelid colors. This is the new name for what we used to call eye shadow.

It isn't shadow anymore, not when it comes in silvery greens, blues, and violets. Only the taupe shades can be called shadow.

Women are learning to use two shades of the same color on their lids, where once a timid dab of black or the lashes are all they dared. They're wearing eye makeup for daytime, too.

These still afraid of false lashes for day are using the mascara that contain tiny bits of oil to thicken and extend the natural lashes.

It is the big news, next comes the changeover in face makeup. This is the year women discovered contouring the cheeks on the face to sculpture and enhance the features.

The flat matte look, supreme for perhaps ten years, went out in favor of a fresh dewy look which actually used more make-up to look like less.

Not was lipstick neglected, as cosmetics houses fought back last year's "lipstick" look. They silvered their colors, so they would shine, called them "frosted" shades, and sold more lipstick than ever.

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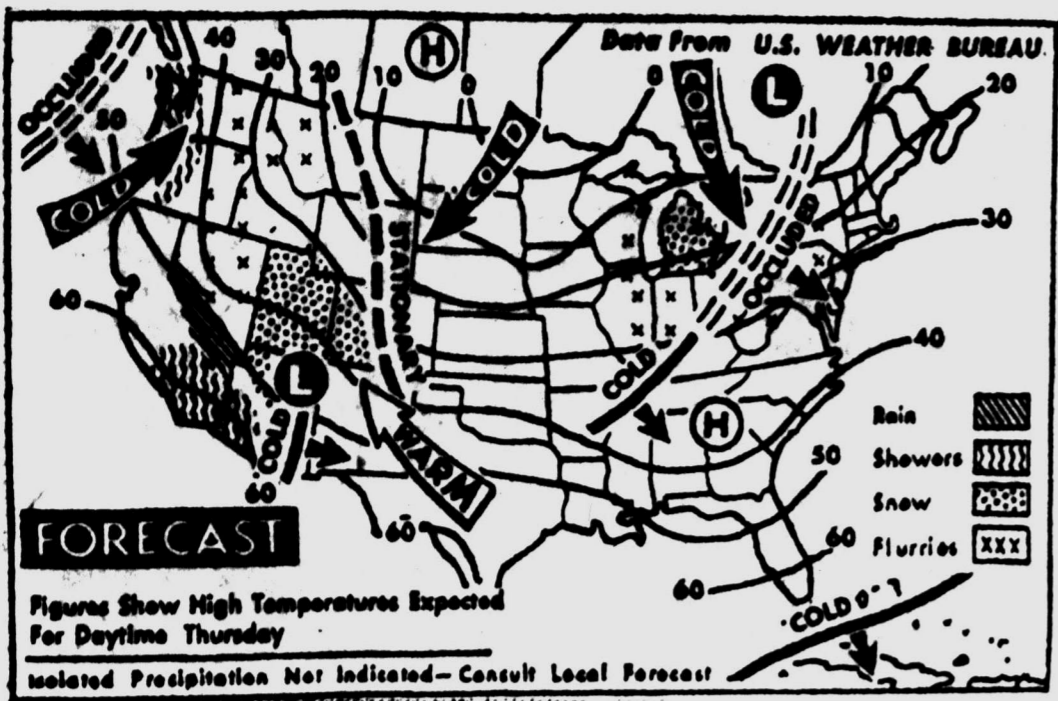

**LIST, STANDARD, MINIMUM**

**Three Deduction Methods Available To Taxpayers**

**EDITOR'S NOTE**—The standard deduction is often—but not always—the best way to figure an income tax return. This article outlines the differences between the various procedures for claiming deductions.

Many taxpayers have to use the trial-and-error method of determining which of the three procedures for figuring deductions applies to them—and which is the most profitable.

The minimum standard deduction, inaugurated in 1964, is designed to give a tax break to a single or low-income family, or a large family.

The standard deduction, usually 10 per cent of income, is the best procedure for many taxpayers.

The third method involves listing the actual allowable deductions—state taxes, church and charitable contributions, interest, medical expenses, etc. This is almost always the best procedure for those who have actual deductions of more than \$1,000. The regular standard and minimum standard deductions are limited to \$1,000 on a

single person's return and on a joint return. For married persons filing separately, it is limited to \$500.

Itemizing deductions may also prove beneficial for those with deductions below these amounts if the total is more than 10 per cent of adjusted gross income.

In most cases, a taxpayer should first find whether the standard or minimum standard deduction would result in a larger deduction. The best of these two then should be compared with his itemized list.

The minimum standard deduction may confuse some taxpayers since it is based on the number of exemptions, including dependents, which are deductible in figuring your tax. Exemptions and the minimum standard deduction are separate items—each though both are subtracted from income and have the effect of reducing the tax.

The deduction should be computed and subtracted before subtracting your exemptions.

If you use one of the tax tables for incomes under \$5,000, both the exemptions and deductions are computed automatically—you get the benefit of either the minimum standard deduction or the standard deduction. In Table C, which applies to married persons filing separately, there is a choice between the standard and minimum standard deductions, but both husband and wife must use the same method.

Here is one formula for computing the minimum standard deduction allow \$300 for yourself, plus \$100 for a wife or a husband on a joint return, plus \$100 for each dependent. For married persons filing separate returns, allow \$200 for each spouse. If you are over 65 years old or blind, add another \$100 if your wife or husband is 65 or over or blind. If both blind and over 65, add \$100 for each of these exemptions.

Here is an example. Mr. Kelly, married, with two children, has an income of \$3,330. The regular 10 per cent standard deduction would be \$333. The minimum standard deduction would allow \$300 for Kelly, \$100 for Mrs. Kelly and \$100 each for the little Kellys, or \$600.

Thus, he would choose to use the minimum standard deduction. Table B automatically allows him the higher deduction, which in this case is the minimum standard. Using Table B, he finds that his tax is \$46.

However, if he has actual ex-

gible deductions of more than \$600, he can itemize them on Form 1040 and save money.

Another example: Mr. Brown makes \$8,000 a year, is married and has five dependent children. His regular 10 per cent standard deduction would be \$800. The minimum standard deduction would offer him a higher deduction—\$300 for himself, \$100 for his wife and \$100 for each dependent, or \$900.

He naturally would choose to use the deduction is \$100 higher—the minimum standard. However, suppose that he finds that his actual deductions amount to \$1,240 because of unusually high medical expenses, interest paid on a home mortgage or other items. Naturally, he would choose to list these items on Page 2 of Form 1040 and take the larger deduction.

The procedure is quite different for a family which has an income of more than \$10,000 a year. Approximately 25 per cent of American families have incomes at this level or above. In this situation, the taxpayer filing a joint return is limited to a \$1,000 deduction under either the 10 per cent standard or minimum standard rules. This ceiling holds regardless of his income.

If he has itemized deductions of more than \$1,000, he can save money by listing them.

**Board To Hear Pipeline Case**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Power Commission announced it will hear oral arguments March 29 in a case involving competing applications by three pipeline companies to supply natural gas to Southern California.

Examiner Avian A. Kutz filed Dec. 16 that the proposal of Gulf Pacific Pipeline Co. should be approved. He ruled against competing applications by Transwestern Pipeline Co. and El Paso Natural Gas Co.

Exceptions to his decision were filed by 16 parties to the proceedings, including the three pipeline applicants and the commission staff.

Gulf Pacific proposes a \$14 million pipeline to transport gas purchased in Texas by two Southern California electric utilities for use as boiler fuel in their generating plants. The utilities are Southern California Edison Co. of Los Angeles and the Department of Water and Power of the city of Los Angeles.

Transwestern and El Paso propose alternative ways of meeting the gas requirements.

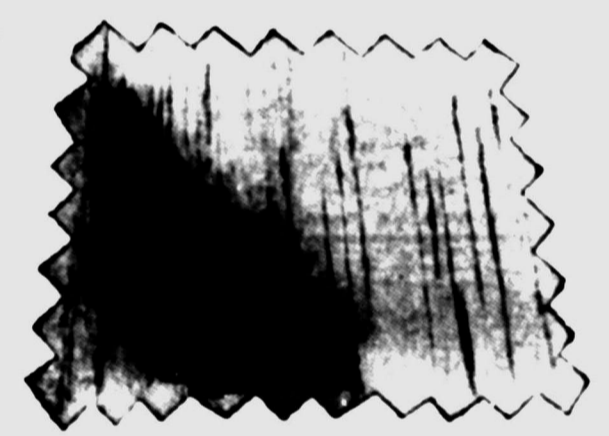

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# Air Force Unveils New Defense System Hidden Deep Inside Colorado Mountain

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — A new \$142.4-million command center for the North American continent's air defense system, hidden deep inside a mountain, was unveiled Wednesday by the Air Force.

A 1,600-foot granite hill, the top of Cheyenne Mountain, will protect the center from nuclear attack when it goes into operation next July. It will replace the two-story block structure at Ent Air Force Base in Colorado Springs, seven miles away.

**Present Building Vulnerable**

A former commander of the North American Air Defense Command — NORAD — described the present building as vulnerable to any man armed with a bazooka.

Officers wouldn't go so far as to describe the mountain installation as invulnerable. Maj. Gen. Joseph L. Dickman, commander of the complex, said, "We have to rely on the probability they won't be able to place a big enough weapon to knock us out."

He said it is probable that the

Soviet Union has a similar underground command post.

Touring newsmen were told that the complex could operate "completely buttoned up" for up to 30 days, drawing on its own power supply, water stored in five underground reservoirs and air drawn through a filter system designed to remove residue from a nuclear blast.

Officers said there are six air intakes and it is unlikely that enemy bombs could close all of them.

Eleven buildings, most of them three stories, form an underground city about one-third of a mile into the mountain. They are mounted on 937 coil springs to cushion the shock of any nearby blast.

Gen. Dickman said the cost of putting the complex underground was only a fraction of the total amount, \$35 million of the \$142.4 million. Most of the balance is invested in equipment, including computers.

This was described as the nation's largest collection of military computers.

From the command center speaker connects the underground post with national defense headquarters.

A large screen in the command center can show any aircraft over the continent except for orbiting satellites which are shown on closed-circuit television.

They said equipment in the new center won't greatly change the present capacity to detect missiles and space vehicles, but will improve the de-

fense against manned bombers. Inside, the mountain entry to the complex itself is protected by two 30-ton sealed doors. About 470,000 cubic yards of rock were removed from the excavation, but officers said no precious metals were found, although the center is only eight miles airline from Cripple Creek, a rich mining camp in early state history.

### THEOLOGIAN SAYS Catholicism Challenging Protestants

DALLAS (UPI) — A leading Methodist historian who was an official observer at the Vatican Council said Wednesday night the Roman Catholic Church has "leapfrogged the rest of us" in church renewal and ecumenical action.

Dr. Albert Outler, professor of theology at Southern Methodist University, said, "Protestants now face 'a charter for change' in their own religion."

He said the one great unresolved issue of four years of Roman Catholic deliberations was birth control, "which some of us think of as its greatest failure."

#### Mixed Solution

"What they (the 2,300 delegates) were looking for was an ideal or perfect solution and they couldn't find it—and so chose to stand by their old tradition," he said. "But they also recognized that there are compound aims and value of love and marriage—procreation and interpersonal communion—both primary but not identical."

"This opens the way to further reconsideration of the question and provides a charter for the changes that are bound to come sooner or later."

From an historical standpoint, Outler believes the most obvious change made by the council was from Latin to the vernacular in the liturgy. It could lead to "further mutations in sacramental theology," he said.

### Rusk Predicting Subversion Rise

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk said Wednesday a recent Communist conclave in Cuba signaled a step up of terror and subversive activity on the Latin American continent.

Rusk told the House Foreign Affairs Committee many of the Latin American delegates to the Communist-sponsored tri-continental meeting in Havana left with "bags stuffed with money" to stimulate subversion in their home countries.

The United States must make sure the countries of the hemisphere are alerted to the danger and are in position to provide their own internal security, he said.

Rusk testified before the committee about an emergency foreign aid bill.

He said delegates to the Havana meeting had publicly pledged to common front on political action. But "they also are moving more and more toward militancy as a technique, and the Soviet Union approved," he added.

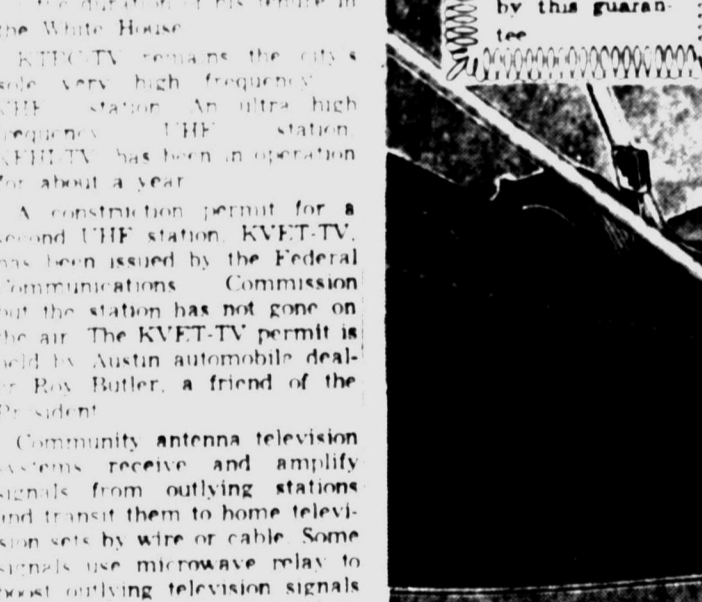

Organized Labor Screams 'Foul' After Briefing On LBJ Economic Report

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Organized labor is accusing the administration of unfairly freezing at the 1965 level the wage-price guideposts that President Johnson follows in assessing the inflationary impact of wage and price increases.

Labor sources said Wednesday that Johnson's economic report, which goes to Congress Thursday, would call for the same 3.2 per cent ceiling on pay or price increases advocated last year.

Union leaders said that under the administration's own ground rules, the ceiling for wage hikes would have gone higher this year. They charged that the freeze was an arbitrary decision, pulled out of the hat, and was tantamount to changing the rules in the middle of the game.

**REGION ABOLISHED**  
ENUGU, Nigeria (AP) — In its effort to end competitive regionalism, Nigeria's new military government has abolished the designation of the eastern region and made it the eastern provinces. The eastern regional agent-general office in London has been abolished. The nation of 55 million previously had four distinct regions.

The union officials who sat in on an advance briefing Tuesday by administration officials on the economic message said they were told the formula used in the past for establishing the guideposts was being dropped.

Under that formula, there would have been a rise to 3.6 per cent in the key figure used by the government to gauge whether wage or price rises were inflationary.

Johnson is expected to tell Congress Thursday that because of the pressure of the Viet Nam war and other inflationary threats in the economy, wage-price guideposts will be unchanged.

**Taxes May Increase**  
The President also is expected to remind lawmakers that war demands might make it necessary for him to ask for tax increases later this year.

Under the economic guideposts, frequently criticized by labor and sometimes by management, the idea is that wage increases should not exceed the average rate of gain in productivity.

**SHASTRI DIED POOR**  
NEW DELHI (AP) — The late Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri remained poor to the end. When he died, his bank account was overdrawn. By the same token, the theory is that a company whose output has kept pace or exceeded the national average living expenses he habitually should be able to absorb wage hikes to employees up to that rate without increasing prices.

Vatican Takes Stand On St. John's Strike

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Vatican has taken a stand in the unprecedented faculty strike at St. John's University by letting the apostolic delegate to the United States rebuke priests who become "militant" unionists.

The Most Rev. Egidio Vagnozzi made the criticism Tuesday in a dedication speech at a Roman Catholic seminary in Boynton Beach, Fla. It was distributed to the news media Wednesday by St. John's, the nation's largest Roman Catholic college, at the request of an official of the Vincentian Brotherhood which operates the university.

Archbishop Vagnozzi did not mention any specific priest or priests, but his references were seen in church circles as a slap at the Rev. Peter O'Reilly, strike leader and head of the United Federation of College Teachers (UFTC) local at St. John's. Sixty-nine teachers have been on strike there since Jan. 1 to protest the firing of 31 union members in a dispute over academic freedom.

"I am sure it would meet with general disapproval were priests to become militant in the inner workings of labor unions where they might exercise undue influence because of their priestly character," Archbishop Vagnozzi declared. "There are limits of fitness and suitability which prohibit a priest from assuming responsibilities in fields which are of not direct concern of his unless expressly authorized to do so by his ordinary (superior)."

**First In History**  
As to complaints that Catholic universities are not arenas of free discussion, Archbishop Vagnozzi said the teaching of anything "contrary to definitive Catholic tenets" at a Catholic university could not be tolerated.

The apostolic statement came as eight of the striking teachers broke ranks and informed St. John's they would return to classes when the spring semester begins next Tuesday.

The strike is the first by a college faculty in the history of American education and highlights a current wave of discussion about the conservatism of Catholic institutions of higher education.

Fry's duties will be coaching both the offensive and defensive backs while Parker will deal primarily with the tackles.

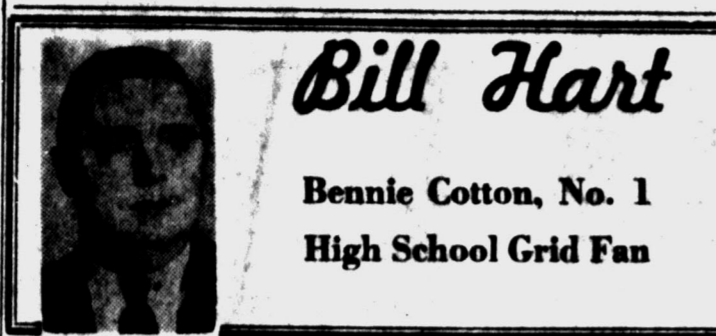
Parker has also served as Lubbock High head baseball coach for the past six years and Fry is the head track since last spring.

The Orangefield native became interested in schoolboy football—statewide—while attending the school there that played six-man football. He read the papers everyday and started following the progress of such powerhouses as Odessa, Wichita Falls and Breckenridge on their way down the state race.

He kept up the interest long after his high school days and the urge to travel to the sites of these contests soon got the best of him. Now he sees as many as 28-36 high school football games a season and he'd see more if it wasn't for money, his family and his work.

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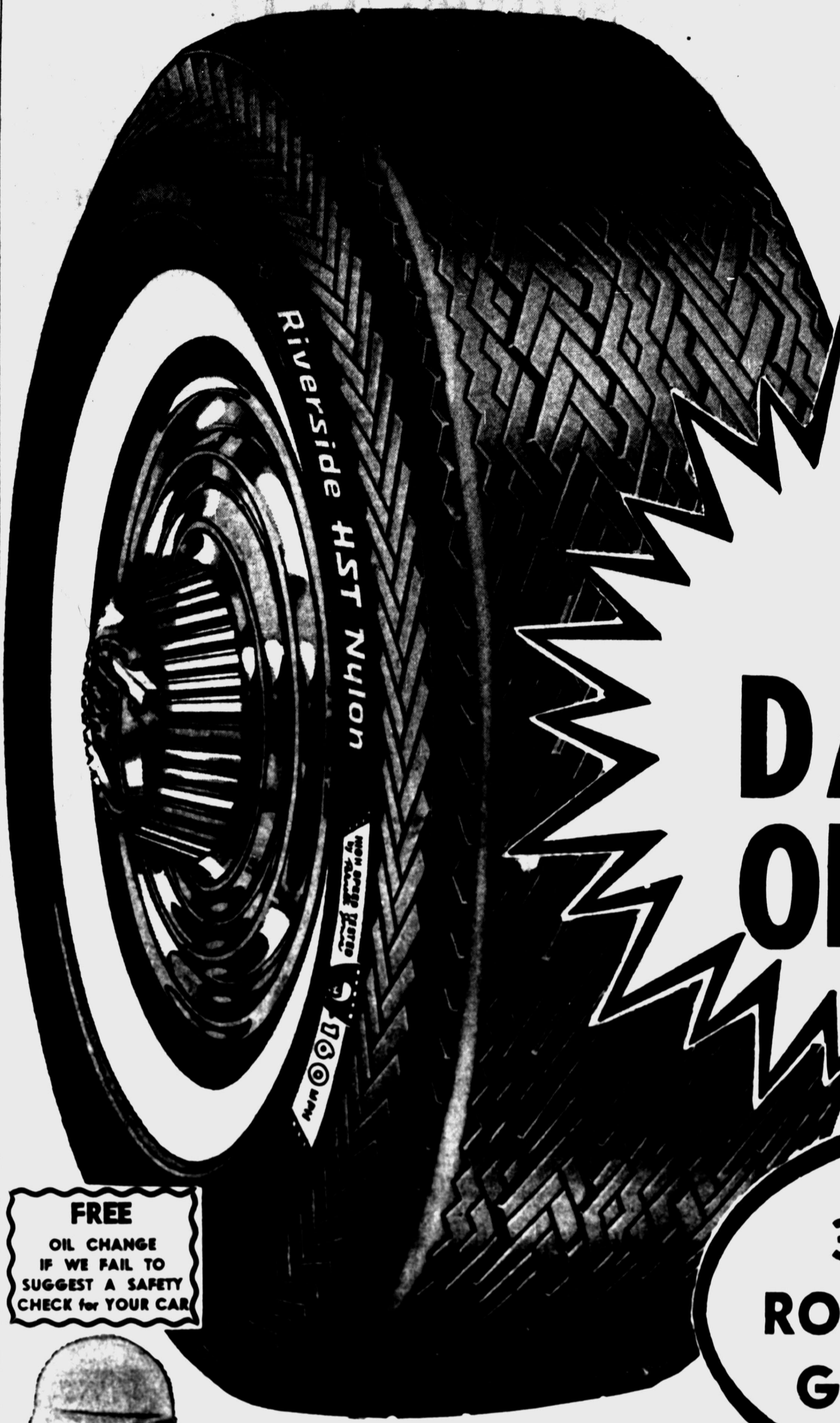

NCAA Grade Rule Under Fire

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)—Boston College Athletic Director Bill Flynn believes that any and all bona fide students should be allowed to compete in varsity athletics regardless of grades.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association recently approved legislation calling for a minimum C-minus grade for athletes competing in NCAA-sponsored championship events.

Others attending the NCAA's first news seminar in Tucson thought the rule was wrong.

Flynn said many colleges subscribe to the view that any student should be able to compete.

He cited as examples Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Tufts College in Medford, Mass., and other eastern schools, many of whom opposed the recent NCAA legislation.

"These schools believe that their academic programs are such that if a student is able to remain in school, he should be able to compete in the school's athletic program," Flynn said.

Flynn argued that a C-minus student at MIT might be able to earn a far higher grade in many other schools.

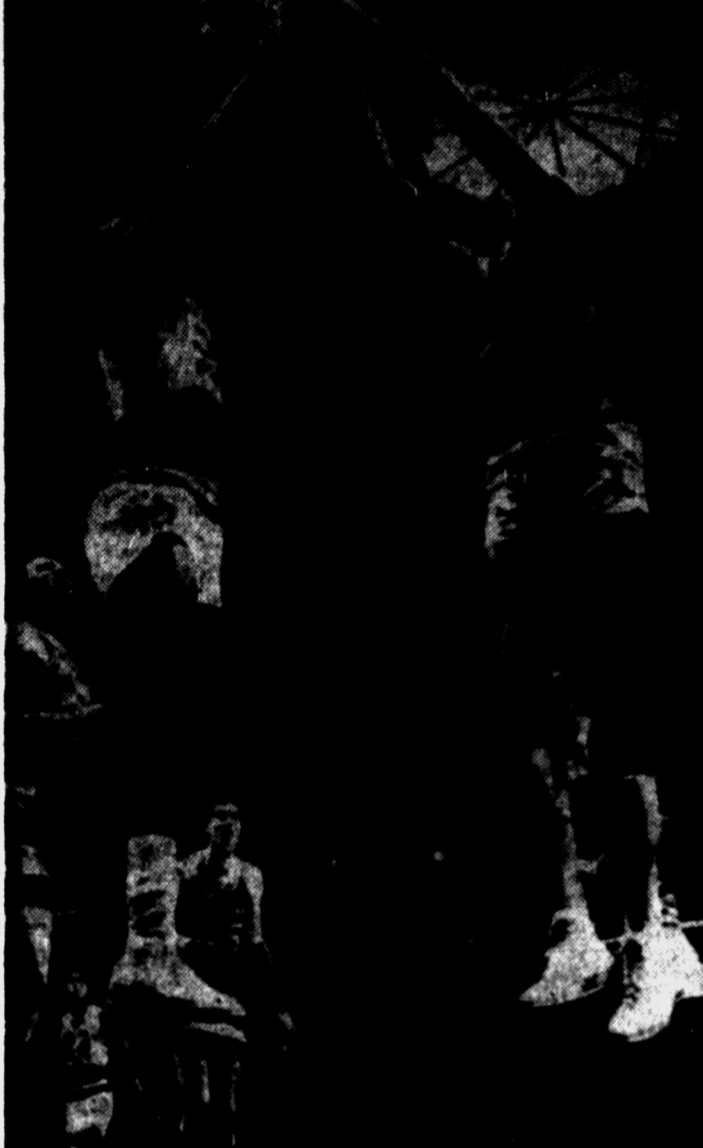
It was pointed out that most of the NCAA's 641 members attempt to operate legitimate athletic programs within the framework of their school's academic objectives.

Britain's Cooper Challenges Clay

LONDON (AP)—Britain's Henry Cooper threw out a challenge to world heavyweight champion Cassius Clay Wednesday after destroying world ranked American Hubert Hilton in two rounds.

"I am ready to tackle Clay any time, anywhere," Cooper said. The 31-year-old British heavyweight champion spoke after clobbering Hilton at London's Olympia Hall Tuesday night.

U.S. Team Protests Decision Bobsled limit Elicites Ire

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP) — The United States backed by three other nations, lodged a protest Wednesday and won reversal of a decision limiting how many bobsleds a nation can use on practice runs here for the two-man world championship.

The four-man international jury, under Amilcare Rotta, president of the International Bobsledding and Tobogganing Federation (IBTF), had ruled only two sleds per nation would be allowed on the training course Wednesday and Thursday nights.

The jury said its decision was based on a sudden rise in temperature, reducing the number of days the 1,700-meter Ronco Chiuso would continue to be at a technical park for racing.

U.S. team captain Jack Helmer of Hattisburgh, N.Y., said the jury's ruling jeopardized those teams that still have not chosen their final racing crews.

Helmer asked the jury to change its decision and allow practice with three bobsleds instead of two, for any nation wanting it.

Britain, Sweden and Austria backed Helmer's protest. Stan Benham of Lake Placid, N.Y., American member of the jury and world title winner here in 1952, brought the objection before the jury.

The jury accepted the objection unanimously for Wednesday night trials. But it said only two sleds per nation could go down the chute Thursday night.

That meant teams which came here with three potential crews will have to make their final selection by Thursday.

Ara Will Sign New Irish Pact

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — Ara Parseghian indicated here Tuesday that he probably will sign a new contract soon as football coach at the University of Notre Dame.

He did not rule out the possibility that some day he may jump to the pro football coaching ranks but emphasized that he is happy at Notre Dame.

"It's a fine place to coach," he said. "Practice facilities are great. It's a nice area to live in, and the administration has been great."

SALISBURY, Md. (AP) — The names of Bob Lutz, Stan Smith and John Pickens were added Wednesday to the list of those to play in the U.S. National Indoor Tennis Championships, Feb. 13-20 in Salisbury.

Pickens, 16th ranked nationally, is a freshman at Rice. In last year's Western championships at Indianapolis, Pickens defeated fifth-ranked Charles Pasarell and ninth-ranked Ron Holmberg.

ALVIN, Tex. (AP) A teen-age mother has been enrolled in Alvin High School as a sophomore, but the school board plans to challenge her enrollment through the courts.

The board voted last Monday 4-1 to reaffirm its policy of not allowing married students with children to attend classes.

**Went To Court**  
Mrs. Kathy Ann Cooper, 16, had sought a district court injunction against her being kept out of school.

Joe Reynolds, attorney for the school board, told trustees that Dist. Judge G. P. Hardy of Wharton, probably will rule for Mrs. Cooper.

When the judge indicated he would rule for Mrs. Cooper, she was allowed to enroll, but Reynolds said the board intends to appeal the imminent ruling to the Court of Civil Appeals in Houston.

**Method Hit**  
He said Mrs. Cooper should have applied to the school board and the State Education Commission before going to the courts.

Mrs. Cooper dropped out of school a year ago, was married and gave birth to a daughter, Tina Marie, in June 1965. She is now seeking a divorce and wants to finish high school and enter college.

She contends she cannot take sufficient correspondence courses to get her high school diploma and cannot enroll in adult education classes at Alvin Junior College because she is only 16.

**Position Explained**  
Judge Hardy said last week if the school board did not reach an agreement which would allow Mrs. Cooper to return to school Monday, he would grant an injunction against the school district.

The judge said his study of the law showed the young mother is entitled to attend school.

**Control Kelly Jr.** Mrs. Cooper's attorney contended the board cannot legally prohibit any student regardless of marital status or parenthood from attending public schools as long as the student is under 21 years of age.

Alvin School Supt. D. P. O'Quinn testified at the injunction hearing that if married stu-

dents with children were permitted to attend classes, "it would make teaching good conduct and citizenship difficult."

Labor Hopes To Make 1966 'Biggest' Year

WASHINGTON — Labor hopes to make 1966 its biggest year in Congressional legislation since 1935 and the landmark Wagner Act.

Pending before Congress are proposals to ban "right-to-work" laws, set federal standards for unemployment compensation and increase the minimum wage.

Wrong Man Is Called In Case Before Board

AUSTIN (UPI) — The Texas Water Rights Commission took under advisement a complaint lodged against a Grand Prairie man in connection with construction of a dam across Big Bear Creek.

Testimony indicated the commission had called the wrong man to answer the complaint. Arthur H. Waddell of Grand Prairie testified that he erected the dam in November to stop the flow of the creek water onto his property after Al Graff of Grand Prairie, who owns the adjacent land, rerouted the stream from its original flow.

Other Parties Needed — Waddell charged that Graff came onto his land without his knowledge or consent and dug channels on the property to change the flow of the creek. Hulbert D. Wells, attorney for Waddell, said Graff committed a "flagrant violation" and should "come down here with a whole battery of lawyers or find him another channel."

May Settle Privately — Waddell indicated the matter may be worked out privately. He said he constructed the dam in hopes of getting Graff to divert the water back to its original channel and had heard that he may do it.

The complaining party was R. N. Smith, another landowner who was receiving the flow created by the dam. The commission took no action on calling Graff, but resolved to study the matter further.

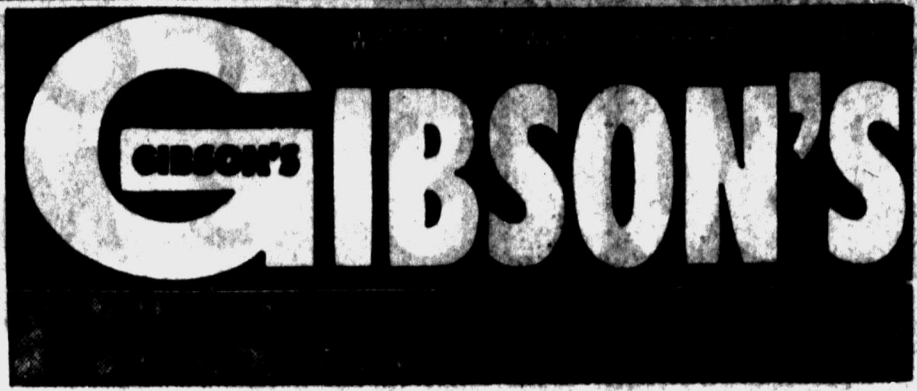

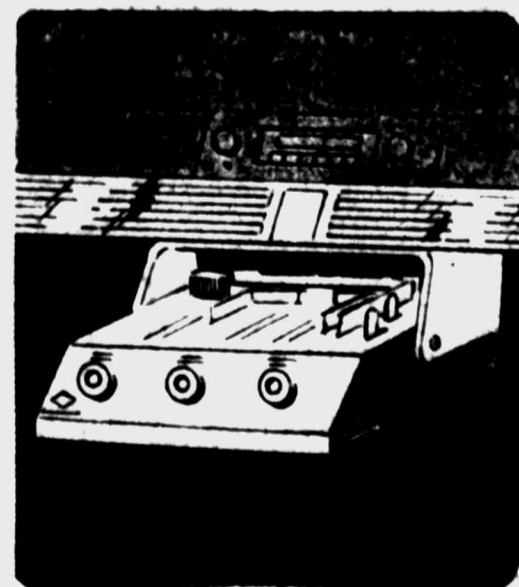

Plains Farming  
Cotton Breeders  
Facing Problems

"The first, most indispensable, total cotton planting seed means to improve cotton quality to 25 per cent or more. I prefer it is planting seed," say officials of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

But, ironically, this is considered one of the "persistent stumbling blocks" to efforts to improve South Plains cotton quality. The PCG says there hasn't been nearly enough research on improving varieties adapted to this area.

Officials of the big producer organization point out that any attempt to alleviate this situation must necessarily look first for the reason this segment of cotton production research has been slighted.

They've quoted Dr. Harold Loden, general manager of Paymaster Seed Farms at Plainview, as placing a large share of the blame on insufficient protection of plant breeders' rights.

The way things are now, seeds of poor and good varieties can get mixed up at guns and still enter commercial planting seed channels later under the name and reputation of a variety with good quality.

Seed May Be "Diluted": But quality is reduced and fiber properties aren't uniform because of the impurities in the planting seed. Then a farmer may get a distorted picture of the variety he thinks he's planting.

"That variety isn't as good as it used to be," a farmer often remarks. But it may not be the fault of the breeder. It could be because the non-certified planting seed the farmer has been using have been "diluted" and mixed repeatedly with inferior cotton.

Other problems are involved. But Loden says the important thing is that cotton breeders are going to have to be shown where their investment can be recouped before they can afford to spend the money in research necessary to quality improvement.

Loden, a widely known seed breeder, told a recent meeting of the Texas Certified Seed Producers, Inc. that most probably will agree that:

1. Research is the key to the improvement of cotton varieties.
2. The job of improving cotton varieties is becoming more and more complex and consequently more expensive.
3. The research job in cotton is not being done as well as we know how to do it.
4. Less research in cotton variety improvement probably can be expected in the future.

Cotton More Complex: "It is axiomatic," Loden declared, "that the key to producing quality lies more in the type of seed planted in cotton than with probably any other group we produce."

He pointed out that cotton presents a more complex problem from the standpoint of satisfying the producer and the ultimate consumer, since the value of cotton is determined by more quality factors than grain crops in which income is related to a greater degree to per-acre yields.

Yet Loden says the number of cotton breeders employed by commercial cotton breeders in the entire U.S. probably is less than the 27 professional employees currently engaged in grain sorghum research in Texas alone.

"The commercial cotton breeder isn't doing the job he knows how to do, or is capable of doing, because he sees little hope of recovering funds spent in an increased research program."

"If you doubt this statement, ask any cotton breeder how much he is spending on fiber uniformity, spinning performance, cotton seed quality, and other desirable characteristics which would improve the overall competitive position of cotton."

MOSSLER MURDER TRIAL

Defense Attorneys Ask Dismissal Of Charges

By CHARLES E. TAYLOR MIAMI (UPI)—Defense attorneys charged Wednesday the state's love-triangle murder case against millionaire Candace (Candy) Mosler and her alleged lover, Melvin Lane Powers, was "produced by fraud" and asked that it be dropped.

A motion filed on behalf of the blonde, 45-year-old widow and her handsome 29-year-old nephew contended the state has coerced three witnesses to get them to testify for its prosecution.

Perjury Claimed Candy and Powers are accused of the June 30, 1964 bludgeoning slaying of Candace's millionaire husband, Jacques Mosler. The state contends Candy and Powers pushed Mosler out of the way so they could continue a love affair.

The indictment returned by the Dade County Grand Jury against Candy and Powers last July 20, the motion said, was "based on testimony from witnesses before the grand jury who were subjected to coercion, duress, intimidation and threats."

The defense said it had information that the witnesses "did perceive themselves before the grand jury and that the indictment herein is the result of the afore-said coerced testimony."

Key Witness Named One of the three state witnesses named in the defense motion as having given testimony against the accused lovers under pressure is the key witness whose testimony could tie Powers to the Key Biscayne apartment where Mosler was slain.

Circuit Court Judge George E. Schulz recessed the trial in its eighth day at midday in order to attend the funeral of a fellow jurist and did not see the motion before he left the courthouse. He will have it before him when the trial resumes at 9:30 a.m. EST Thursday.

At the Wednesday session, the defense accepted 12 jurors, one of them a woman for the first time, but the prosecution then exercised peremptory challenges to dismiss two of them, initiating again the long interrogation process.

High Court Ends Hearing On Poll Tax In Virginia

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A Richmond attorney denied before the Supreme Court Wednesday that Virginia's poll tax discriminated against Negroes.

But a Negro attorney said it was one reason Negroes had been eliminated from any political power in Virginia.

The arguments wound up the court's hearing of the case that could settle other cases. The Justice Department has filed a series of similar cases in Alabama, Mississippi and Texas. The court took the case under advisement and is expected to hand down an opinion sometime before the end of the term in June.

George D. Gibson, defending the tax, said it was no more unfair to Negroes than fees for a marriage or automobile license.

Fee "Insubstantial" The Supreme Court in the case of Negroes from Norfolk and Fairfax was "insubstantial," Gibson argued. Any economic damage caused by it, he said, affected three times as many whites as Negroes.

Gibson, a private attorney representing the state, said the poll tax was designed as an index of income, competence and ability that.

The taxes were followed in national elections by the 24th Amendment approved in 1901. But Virginia, Alabama, Mississippi and Texas still require them for participation in local and state elections.

Portugal Buying German Fighters BOSS, Germany (AP)—Portugal has bought 40 jet fighters from West Germany, a Defense Ministry spokesman announced Wednesday.

The planes, Fiat G91s, were said to be the first of a series that will be used only within the framework of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, the spokesman added.

Inquest Jury Exonerates Police In Firestore Case

By FRANK O'REILLY LOS ANGELES (AP)—A coroner's inquest jury exonerated police Wednesday in the shooting deaths of two men who attempted to kidnap rubber magnate Leonard Firestone.

The jury, after deliberating one hour and 35 minutes, ruled the death of William Calvin Bailey, 44, justifiable homicide in lawful performance of duties and protection of life.

Ruled Accidental The death of George Henry Skalla, 25, was ruled accidental with no criminal responsibility on the part of the officers.

Earlier Wednesday, a witness testified that Skalla died of wounds from bullets that ricocheted into his body.

Skalla was the informer who had tipped waiting police to the kidnap plot. The two men were shot as they entered Firestone's Beverly Hills home Jan. 13.

Told Police Skalla had told police about the planned abduction and had given officers daily reports on various phases of the plan, a

**Udall Announces  
 New Rules For  
 Eagle Protection**

WASHINGTON (AP) — New protective steps designed to halt the steady decline in the numbers of the bald eagle—the nation's symbol—were ordered Wednesday night by Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall.  
 Warning that the species is threatened over much of its range and is already classified as rare in the Southeastern states, Udall directed:

1. That bald eagle nesting sites on national wildlife refuges be closed off to protect the birds from disturbance during the nesting season, with approximately one square mile to be provided for each nesting area.
  2. That nesting areas, where appropriate, be included in designated natural areas to prevent further disturbance of cover.
  3. That timber cutting operations not be permitted within half a mile of trees containing bald eagle nests and that potential nest sites be carefully preserved.
  4. That in cases where trees with nests are in danger of being blown down, the trees are to be stabilized, if possible.
- Udall also ordered increased efforts to protect the nests of golden eagles and ospreys.  
 Both bald and golden eagles are protected by federal laws against shooting or trapping them.

**UNTIL POLICE 'FILLED IN'  
 Undertakers Run Lucrative  
 'Funeral Mafia' In Palermo**

PALERMO, Sicily (UPI) — Three Palermo undertakers were accused by police Wednesday of operating a "funeral Mafia."  
 Police said the undertakers ran a profitable racket that included selling protection, the stealing flowers from graves for resale, and occasionally settling accounts with gunshot or high explosives.  
 Nicola Vitrono, 57, one of Palermo's wealthiest undertakers, was arrested for banishment from Sicily as a "socially dangerous" person. No specific charges were filed against him.

**Charges Filed**  
 His competitor, Antonino Trinca, 63, and his 28-year-old son, Antonio, were charged with attempted violence, extortion and running a funeral parlor without a license.  
 Three relatives of the Trinca's were charged with threatening another undertaker but were not arrested.  
 Police did not say exactly what role the men allegedly played in the funeral racket.  
 The sale of protection was described as one of the principal features of the alleged racket. Bereaved families using the services of an undertaking firm the funeral mafia disliked often found the funeral route lined with "bystanders" who plucked flowers from the wreaths, stood in the way of the hearse and generally did what they could to disrupt the procession, police said.

**Steal Flowers**  
 Defying the funeral Mafia has traditionally proved dangerous.  
 A few years ago a cemetery worker told police the funeral Mafia had stolen flowers from a grave to sell to other mourners. A few days later his body was found, riddled with pellets from a Lupara, the
