Newby, Millican returned to county posts

A moderate turnout of Coke County voters went to the polls last Saturday and voted for Democratic party nominees for offices ranging from U.S. Senator down to the precinct level.

The two contested local races were both taken in the primaries by the two incumbent commissioners. George Newby was re-elected commissioner of precinct 1 with 202 votes, while his opponent, Robert Wink received 73 votes. Finis Millican was re-elected commissioner of precinct 3 with 173 votes and his opponent, Finis Harmon received 88 votes.

On the national level in a field of six candidates for the United States Senate race, Coke County supported Kent Hance and Bob Krueger, in that order.

Congressman Charles Stenholm received a heavy vote in Coke County.

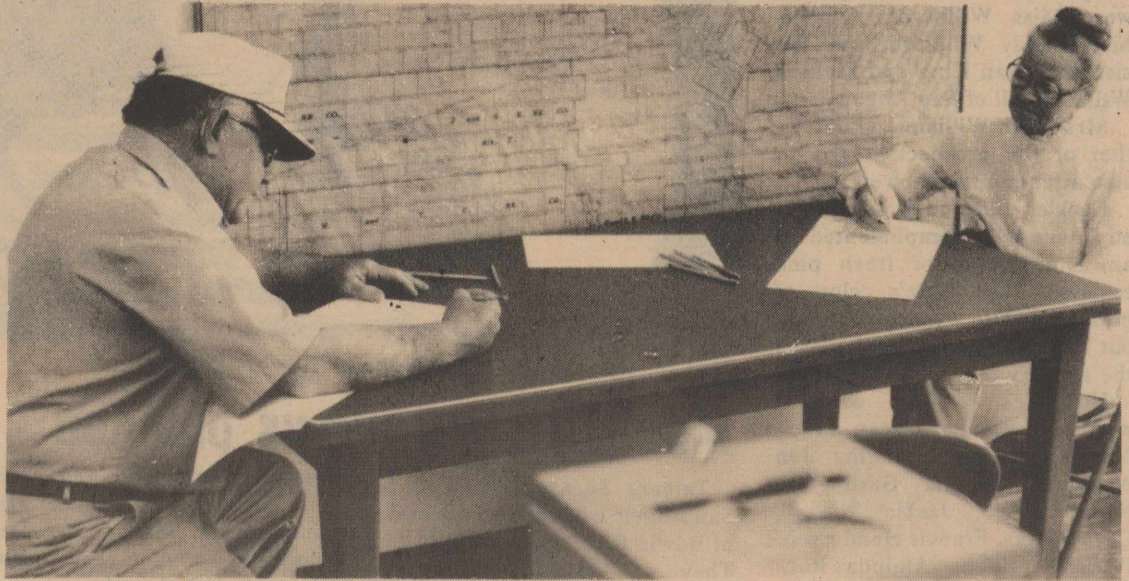

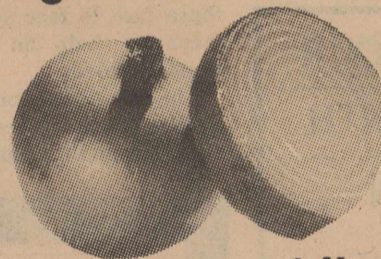

TERMITE SWARMING SEASON

Spring is the time when many homeowners discover they have termites because winged forms appear and swarm.

Winged termites outdoors are a natural occurrence, so usually there is no problem. But if they are found indoors, usually on a window sill, chances are good that an infestation has established in your home. Termites can cause extensive damage to wooden parts of your home, so take some precautions.

Quite often termites and certain ants swarm at the same time and it's important to be able to tell the difference between these two insects. Carpenter ants swarm in the springtime and can cause some structural damage to wood. However, termites are much more destructive and require different control measures.

Termites have a broad waist; ants have a narrow, constricted waist; termite wings are the same size and shape-- winged ants have a front and back pair of wings of different lengths and shape; termites have straight antennae (feelers on their heads)--ants have elbowed antennae.

Termites may be attracted to your house by dead tree limbs, stumps, old lumber and other sources of termite food. These should be removed. If soil is above the point where wood or brick meets the foundation, termites have easy access to your home. Anywhere that wood meets dirt (siding, wooden steps) is a potential spot for termite entry into the home.

Termites also have the ability to build mud tunnels over non-wooden structures to reach a food source. These tunnels (about 1/4-inch wide) may extend several feet up concrete surfaces. On a

slab home, these may be seen on foundation concrete between soil and brock. On homes built above the ground, these tunnels can be found on piers or pipes that go from soil to structure. The bath trap in homes built on a slab is another source of entry. Plumbing in this situation has contact with soil under the slab, and termite tunnels may be found in this area.

Although a thorough inspection is best done by a professional, a homeowner can make a quick check for termite infestations. If termites or damage is found, contact a local pest control company. This is one insect pest that should not be handled by a "do-it-yourselfer". Commercial pest control companies have the necessary equipment and experience to effectively rid a home of termites.

Comptroller representative to visit RL

State Comptroller Bob Bullock will have a representative from his San Angelo office in Robert Lee on May 15, 1984 to assist local taxpayers and answer questions about state taxes.

Bullock said Enforcement Officer Nancy Shattuck will meet with local taxpayers in the Conference Room at the County Courthouse from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.

"If Robert Lee area merchants, or anyone else for that matter, have any questions about state taxes or need help in preparing state tax forms, Ms. Shattuck will be there to assist them," Bullock said.

"We're trying to cut the red tape in this office, and we believe these face to face sessions with taxpayers help do just that," Bullock added.

The San Angelo office, headed by Ron Parish, serves San Angelo and surrounding counties.

Commission OK's baseball field lights

In a special meeting of the Coke County Commissioners Court Monday, May 7, the budget was amended to cover the cost of replacing lights in the Robert Lee and Bronte baseball parks not to exceed \$2000.00

Free CPR course set

A cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) course will be offered in Robert Lee by the West Coke County Ambulance Service. It will meet American Heart Assn. standards.

Persons who complete the eight hour course will receive CPR cards. The class will begin Tuesday night, May 22. Participants will register at the local high school at 6:30 p.m. and the class will then meet until 10 p.m. Students will return to class on Thursday night May 24 at 6:30 p.m.

This course is a free one; plan now to attend. No prior medical experience is necessary-- the only requirements are attendance and willingness to learn the skill needed to save a loved one.

Pancake supper rated success

The Pancake Supper, an annual joint effort of the Robert Lee-Silver Lions Club and the Coke County 4-H Club, was deemed a success even though the groups fed more than 200 less plates than last year. A total of 329 turned out to eat pancakes and bacon compared with about 550 who were served last year.

Mrs. Debbie Reber, extension

agent, reported that a total of around \$1300.00 was gained from the benefit, to be shared by the two clubs.

OVERSEAS JOB AGENCIES NOT ALWAYS HONEST

The lure of overseas employment has been expensive for many Texans both in terms of time and money. In areas of high unemployment, especially the gulf coast region, we have seen a number of dishonest operators fleecing consumers.

One particular company offered to find high-paying overseas jobs for everyone who could come up with a \$250 fee. The would-be employees were promised they would get their money back if the company could not find them jobs. Instead, the company closed its doors without finding jobs for its clients and without making the refunds. This is not an isolated case. Phoney employment agencies have been bilking consumers off and on for several years. Some operators are fugitives from justice.

WHAT THE LAW SAYS

Under state law, it is illegal for a personnel service agent to impose a fee for registration of a job applicant unless the agent refers the applicant to a place where he actually becomes employed. It is also illegal to advertise a job that does not exist. In order to advertise a job, the agent must have a "job order" from an employer, that is, verbal or written notification of a job opening.

THE SCAM

Companies operating illegally have been charging between \$250 and \$750 deposits to applicants. These companies try to get around the law by calling their fees counselling or job resume fees. But you should be aware that any company making such a request

before securing your employment probably doesn't have your best interest in mind and may be breaking the law.

It is particularly difficult to find employment in foreign countries, and many companies do all their own hiring. The areas of expertise most likely to get you an overseas job are those involving management skills, engineering and marketing skills and some computer skills.

Employees working for the U.S. government in foreign countries are hired through the civil service examination system—not through employment agencies.

CHECK BEFORE SIGNING

Be sure to check references of any agency which offers assistance in finding a job overseas. Contact the companies to which the agency claims it has sent employees; if possible, talk to the employees themselves.

As with any contract, make sure you know exactly what it says before signing it. If you have complaints about services rendered by an employment counseling firm, contact our Consumer Protection Division offices in Austin, Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, McAllen, Lubbock or El Paso. The Attorney General's Office is the People's Law Firm. We're here to help you.

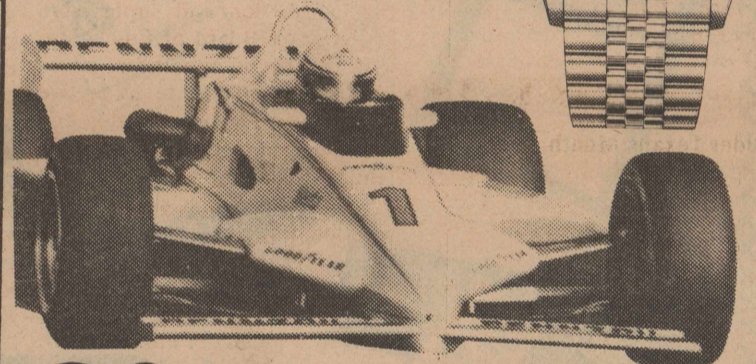

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Stay at home if tornado threatens

When the storm sirens blare and the radio warns that a "twister" is on the way, what can you do to improve your chances of surviving a Texas tornado?

For one thing, studies show that if you're in your house, you should stay there. Only 3 per 1,000 people in houses hit by tornadoes are killed— or, put another way, 99.7 percent survive.

This somewhat comforting statistic is especially welcome to the older workers enrolled in the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb employment program, because most of them live and work in the northern half of the state so often assaulted by spring storms.

More than 50 Green Thumbers from eight counties attended a training session at the Multi-Purpose Center in Eden, Texas on May 8, 1984, and learned how they could save their lives if a tornado should come their way.

"In the case of severe storms, there truly is no place like home," said Green Thumb Director Diane Parrish of Waco,

"provided your home is a sturdy house."

Parrish used a slide presentation to illustrate the kinds of tornados that can develop and to describe the techniques most likely to enhance survival. Slides of twisters that hit Lubbock, Waco, Wichita Falls, San Angelo, Clarendon, and northeast Texas were used in the presentation.

According to Parrish, most tornado deaths result from head injuries caused by flying debris. People in mobile homes are at much greater risk, and in fact may be even more vulnerable than persons in cars.

"The key to survival is to stay in your house and put as many walls as possible between you and the tornado," she said, adding that most tornadoes approach from the west and southwest. "And don't try to outrun the storm—many people are killed when they try to escape in a panic."

Also addressing the group was a representative from Texas Department of Human Resources who presented information on the

food stamp program.

Syble Haney of Texas Department of Human Resources gave information on "elder" or "parent abuse" which was re-emphasized in the film "A Time To Mourn" which was shown.

Lois Wallace and Geneva Minnick, both of Bronte, and Zola Hatley from Robert Lee attended the training session.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

In light of recent investigation and discussion of the Texas educational system, I would like to make available to you and your clientele some facts at my disposal of which you may, or may not, be aware.

Among many of the proposals made by the Governor's Select Committee on Public Education, led by H. Ross Perot, are two which I believe deserve the careful scrutiny of any person interested in Texas education. The SCOPE committee proposes to change the State Board of Education from an elected body into a body appointed by the Governor, Texas used to have an appointed State Board; however, this means of selection was scrapped as it proved somewhat corrupt and less controllable by the electorate.

The second SCOPE proposal I want to address is one in which the University Interscholastic League would be placed under the jurisdiction and supervision of the State Board of Education, with this board appointing members to the UIL State Executive Committee. The organization and the performance of the UIL is lauded by many to be the best interscholastic high school organization in the nation. It provided equal representation of each public school district in the state as well as assuring equitable rules and means of enforcement.

I would like to add that the present State Board of Education, the Texas Education Agency, and the UIL have already legislated and adopted rules which strengthened the curriculum, raised academic standards, and closed loopholes in interscholastic contest plans. In general, these bodies have gone over each respective program of Texas education with a fine-toothed comb, culling the bad and strengthening the good.

Let me encourage each citizen to protect our rights as citizens to vote and control the education of our youngsters at the "grass roots" by writing your congressmen to oppose the proposed abolishment of our elected Stated Board of Education and to oppose the proposed placement of the self-governing UIL under the jurisdiction of the State Board of Education.

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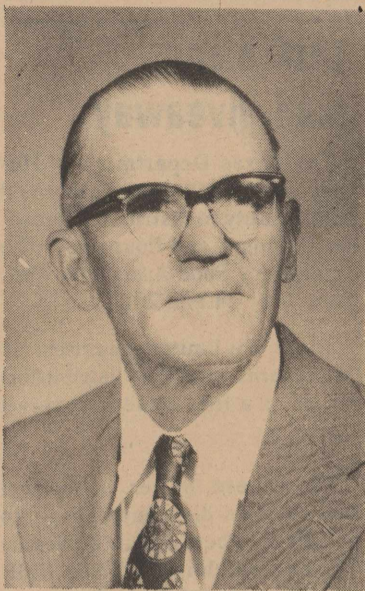

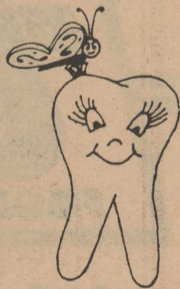
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Film series features Zig Ziglar

Tower supports victim bill

WASHINGTON-- U.S. Senator John Tower (R-Texas) today joined in sponsoring legislation to compensate victims of crime.

The Victims of Crime Assistance Act of 1984 would create a U.S. Treasury Department fund comprised of all criminal fines paid to the United States, and certain profits stemming from literary, visual and audio productions relating to particular crimes.

The five provisions of the bill include:

-- Establishing a separate account in the U.S. Treasury to finance payments to the states and selected federal agencies for compensation and other assistance to the victims of crime.

-- Encouraging states to provide direct financial assistance to victims of crime within their borders, regardless of the victim's residence or jurisdiction of the crime.

-- Assisting local units of government and private nonprofit organizations to provide direct services to victims of crimes and to promote the development of comprehensive services to all victims of crime across the nation.

-- Establishing a safe, welcome environment for victims to participate in the criminal justice process.

-- Improving the federal government's assistance to victims of federal crime.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Carty Beal, of Midland, has been making great strides in improving the Wieser Ranch west of Oak Creek, which he bought several years ago. Brush has been cleared on the deeper soils and grass planted where needed. Cross-fences have been put in and water developed to improve livestock and wildlife management. With the advice of SCS Biologist Willard Richter, deer harvest data has been collected to help improve management of wildlife. Additional hand clearing of undesirable brush has been done up the canyons and along creek beds to improve deer habitat. Many of the better browse plants such as redbud, green briar, hackberry, and shin oak are making strong recovery following the thinning of cedar and mesquite. These are some of the practices set forth in Beal's conservation plan with the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District.

brush problems on rangeland. For most ranchers, brush problems are a major concern.

For many years the brush density on Tommy Bryant's ranch has not allowed adequate grass production, Bryant started to control brush to increase forage production. Using diesel fuel, fire and tree grubbing were effective, but slow. And the desired regrowth of the better grasses was not occurring.

This year Bryant rootplowed and seeded about 70% of his rangeland. This practice should greatly improve the quality and quantity of forage available for livestock. Cost-share assistance for these practices and fences are provided by the ASCS office through the Long Term Agreement program. Technical assistance is received through the Soil Conservation Service.

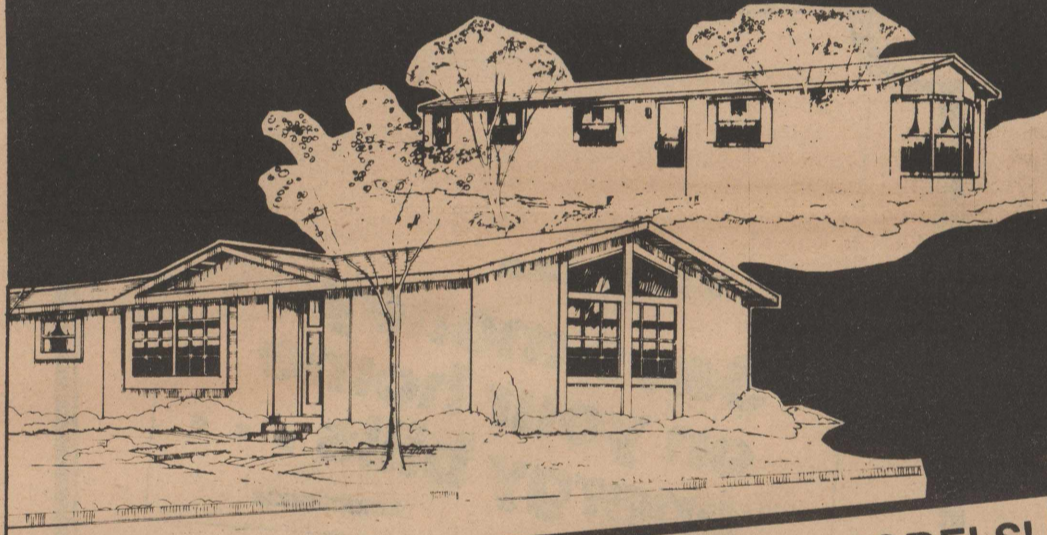

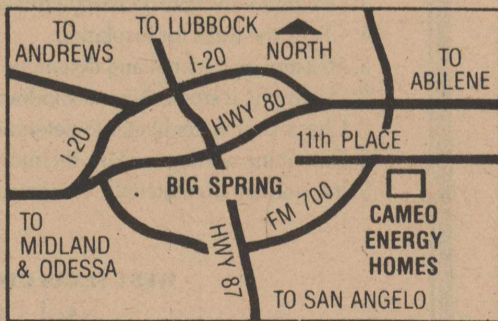
