Seventeen teachers from the WestTexas OIC area were named to receive fellowships to attend the 27th Annual Petroleum Institute for Educators to be held June 4-22, 1984, at the University of Houston.

Announcement of those selected was made by Mr. E.F. Motter, Cities Service Company, Midland, who is the area Insti-

chairman for the Oil Information Committee of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil&Gas Associa-

Among those honored was Ms. Dorthea Helen Wright, Robert Lee High School, Robert Lee.

The Petroleum Institute, designed particularly for science, social studies and mathematics teachers, will be coordinated this year by Dr. Jack M. Sheridan, professor of education, University of Houston. Lectures, provided by experts from the oil industry will include transportation, exploration, production, manufacturing, marketing and research. Three hours of graduate credit in the field of education are granted upon successful completion of assignments.

The Petroleum Institute is to provide a broadened understanding of oil and gas as important energy sources, and to develop an awareness of the industrial importance of the petroleum industry in Texas.

The West Texas OIC Area teacher fellowships were provided by many of the oil and gas industries and other associated businesses in this area.

U.S. Post Office started

made on the new local United States Post Office early Wednesday morning. Workers have been and a stamp vending machine. busy for over a week with extensive forms for the 3,360 square foot building and the adjoining loading dock and ramp. The large pour on Wednesday set the foundation for the structure.

The brick building will rest on a site at the corner of Houston and 8th street, with the front doors to face toward the town, the west. The building site will feature 2,963 square feet of off-site parking, 10,470 square feet of on-site parking, and paved sidewalks. A handicap parking zone will be available near the entrance, along with helpful traffic signs. A nine-space em-

plovee parking area also will be paved in an all-weather surface.

A dock and loading ramp for incoming and outgoing mail is planned for the rear of the building which will have access onto Highway 208.

The new site will be completely landscaped when the work is finished on the structure.

In the old post office facility, only 516 customer boxes line the walls, while 1,074 boxes will be available when the new one is complete. According to Postmistress Coe Lewis, about 150 persons remain on the waiting list for the boxes now available. She stated that the new boxes can be rented at this time and numbers not already taken can be selec-

The interior will contain a large

The first concrete pours were sorting and work area and a lobby which will contain public conveniences such as a copy machine

For the handing out of heavy packages, a dutch door will be separated from the counter area to alleviate the congestion of putting them through this area.

Behind the work areas, the facility will also have two restrooms, a janitors room, and ample storage space.

Postmistress Lewis said contractors have set August 15 as a target date for completion.

Sanco Homecoming slated June 9-10

The Historic Sanco Homecoming will be Saturday and Sunday, June 9 and 10 under the big tabernacle.

This is the 30th meeting and the schedule is as usual. Saturday evening a meeting of those who want to get together early as planned. There is usually singing in a vesper service with a free-for-all friendship time.

Sunday at 10:30 a program followed by a noon meal will take place under the tabernacle. Meat is furnished by the Sanco Community Association or Village. Ladies, bring your favorite salad and dessert.

Some day when you are boating along on Lake Spence where Yellow Wolf and Colorado join, don't be surprised if pictures start to form upon or in the water--a young man comes riding in with a sack of corn tied behind him-from his first crop of corn in the new country. A family of eight-two parents, three sons, and three daughters, were going through the year on sweet milk from the faithful family cow and the break from the home grown corn meal.

This was in 1888. The Synders had installed a grist mill at the ranch headquarters. Mrs. Snyder was known for her kindness and friendliness to the settlers wives and their families. It was probably no accident that when a name was chosen for the little one room school, that name was related to their way of life--"Friendship."

This warm relation between the settlers and the big ranch was continued when the Synders a cotton gin within sight of the Synder O.B. headquarters.

In 1886 there was a disastrous drouth, and also earlier a heavy snow in which the Weathers ranch lost 5,000 head of sheep in a snow that stayed on the ground six weeks, according to the late Jack Adkins who herded sheep on the open ranges for Mr. Weathers.

NOW FOR A FEW HISTORICAL FACTS AS ACCURATELY AS WE CAN GIVE THEM.

In the first surveys made in Coke County, Yellow Wolf was marked "Grape" Creek. When I first saw it grape vines-wild grapes were clinging to every tree limb along its course out of the Callahan Divide to the Colorado River. But on the south side of the Concho-Colorado Divide,

there was another Grape Creek flowing down to the North Concho, and on this creek was built a stage station of the Overland Mail or Butterfield Stage, as it was known.

Probably other considerations entered into the matter, but in the records I have read at the court house, after the Civil War later surveys had named the creek after the daredevil striking

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

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SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Mr. E.E. Edgington, who ranches south-east of Robert Lee, has been fighting the mesquite problem since he bought the ranch about eight years ago. He had areas with solid mesquite. but many areas had good grasses scattered under them. To prevent destruction of the grasses, the mesquite was treated with aerial spray. A good top kill was obtained, but very few roots were killed. The grass did improve some with the slow down of the growth of the mesquite. The same area was treated with 2,4,5,-T again several years later.

It is estimated that with both treatments of brush spray, the total cost is less that half the cost of rootplowing and seeding. " With both treatments, I have more than a 50% kill," said Mr. Edgington. There is a good stand of sideoats grama, buffalo grass, and Texas wintergrass on the place now. These practices are

part of Edgington's conservation plan with the district.

On May 24th a brush management tour was held on Earnest and Mary Gowdy's ranch near Bradshaw. This tour was sponsored by the Taylor County SWCD. Due to the interesting results of Gowdy's brush control the tour was well attended. Joe

and was accompanied by John Wilks of Maryneal, and Mike Mecke, SCS Range Conservationist. In November of 1982 the Gowdy's had Grasslan applied aerially to control shinoak. By the end of the first year, Earnest noticed that not only was the oak being effectively controlled, but so were many of the redberry and blueberry cedars. A large percent of the cedar is being affected by the chemical and is either dead or dying. This product may hold some future hope for broadcast cedar control. The label for hand-applied Grasslan has recently been changed by adding these two cedars and also salt cedar, all of which infest much of Coke County.

Cattle grubs are undercover workers--all their damage is un-

seen, yet they cause greater economic losses to the U.S. beef cattle industry than any other insect pest.

While grubs are usually found on the backs of infested animals during the winter months, that's not the time for control measures since the pests have already done their damage.

Grubs are the larvae or worm stage of heel flies, and adult heel flies are currently active over most of the state.

The time to control grubs is during the period of May through August when they are small and before infested animals suffer stress, weight loss and decreased feed efficiency.

Heel flies cannot sting, have no mouth parts and cause no pain to cattle. Yet, they frighten animals, making them difficult to

Heel flies lay their eggs on an animal's hairs in the stomach and leg region, glued in position. Tiny larvae hatch in a few days, crawl down to the base of the hair and burrow into the animal's

Then they begin a migratory course through the animals's body, congregating in the throat after a few months, and after six to eight months, appear in the grub stage in the animal's back.

grubs in his cattle herd, it is recommended treating each animal over three months of age with one application of an approved systemic insecticide during the May through August period.

These insecticides come in various forms--dips, pour-ons, injections and spot-on treatments. A listing of approved insecticides and methods for controlling cattle grubs is available at the county Extension

'See-feel-look' books good teaching tools

A toddler's first books can be learning experiences that he can touch, feel, and see. A creative parent can create a book individualized to a toddler's own needs, according to Growing Child, the monthly child development newsletter.

"See-feel-look" books teach a number of lessons.

Heavy-duty zippers, buttons, and snaps teach hand-eye coordination and manipulation. They also help a child learn words to accompany the actions: "open, close, zip, unzip, button, unbutton, snap, and unsnap."

Unbreakable mirrors teach self-awareness and identification of parts of the head: "hair, eyes, teeth, mouth, chin, and tongue.'

Bright, colorful pictures of familiar objects reinforce lessons of representation--that the picture is a likeness of a threedimensional object the toddler can touch with his hands. Discussing and naming the contents of the picture, the objects, their size, shape, and color, the people in the pictures, and what they are wearing or doing helps speech and language comprehension.

Scrap materials (terry cloth, vinyl, sandpaper, cordurov, satin, fake fur) aid visual-tactile discrimination of different textures and feels. Describing and labeling the individual sensations -- "rough, smooth, soft, hard, fuzzy, bumpy" also gives language practice.

Books can also be made of cloth and stitched together securely. Pages can be made of heavy paper or cardboard and covered with clear plastic. Both methods produce a washable book that can be looked at and

Recombinant DNA, a practice more commonly known as "cloning" or "genetic engineering," is under study by Texas A&M University veterinary scientists to determine if it can produce healthier, heftier

Dr. James Womack, a geneticist, and Dr. Duane Kraemer, a pioneer in embryo transfer studies, are leading tests with cattle regarding the insertion of genetic material from one strain of mammal to the embryo of

figure of the man who said to those who would take him to the reservation a resounding "No" that has echoed through the Yellow Wolf Valley ever since.

As to the relation between the two Penateka Commanches, Sanaco and Yellow Wolf, in 1845 and in 1849, Sanaco was tribal chief of a large body of Indians ranging through here and as far south as the San Saba River, and Yellow Wolf was war chief, subordinate to the tribal chief.

Here are a few factsa of record as collected by Roy D. Holt, in his "Heap Many Texas Chiefs", a very thorough and creditable piece of work by this teacher of high school and college history.

Page 60, year 1845. Yellow Wolf, in his first council meeting with white men, declined to discuss the issues, speaking

briefly to say that he was war chief, and such matters were the responsibility of his chief, the tribal chief.

Pages 33,61. Year 1849. Sanaco and Yellow Wolf together near the mouth of the San Saba. Also in 1849 Sanaco was on the Clear Fork with a large band when Captain R.B. Marcy had a conferenc with him.

Page 61. 1854. At the big council at Fort Chadbourne Yellow Wolf made several speeches, acting as tribal chief, and led his tribe away from the council in opposition to going to the reservation. No reference to Sanaco. Was he there?

Pages 49-50-51. Year 1854. Sanaco was not at Fort Chad-
