Youth found dead in swimming pool

Abel Rivera, 15, of Eola died at 3:15 p.m. Monday, in a swimming pool in the yard of the Nolan Pentecost home northwest of Robert Lee on Highway 208, according to Sheriff Marshall Millican.

He stated the youth was visiting his uncle, Johnny Torres, and his family at the Pentecost Ranch. Torres, a ranch employee, was working in the house installing ceiling fans leaving his eight year old child and the Rivera youth playing on a truck innertube.

The Rivera boy slipped from the tube and his cousin, unable to help him, summoned his father. Mr. Torres found the boy hanging across the tube, his face discolored, and had apparently

used his last efforts to drag himself from the water.

An ambulance was called and the boy was transported by private vehicle until meeting the ambulance. He was transferred to the unit and CPR started until his arrival at West Coke County Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

Sheriff Millican found no evidence of foul play and said the youth was an apparent victim of accidental drowning.

Funeral services for Abel Rivera were held Thursday at 10 a.m. in Gutierrez Funeral Chapel of Prayer in San Angelo with burial in Eola Cemetery.

Survivors include his parents, Lucy and Jerry Rivera of Eola.

The office for U. S. senate brought the most voters as Kent Hance and Lloyd Doggett vied for the seat to be vacated by Sen. John Tower. In Coke County Hance had 215 votes topping Doggett who had 79. Over the state Doggett totaled the most votes but the contest was so close

a recount of the votes may be called by Hance.

Other run-off elections and the winners were W.C. (Bill) Davis with 138 votes and Roy E. Greenwood, 111, in the race for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2; Bill White, 135, for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3 over Thomas B. "Tom" Thorpe with 125 votes.

Votes were canvassed by the Democratic Committee Tuesday afternoon.

Protect your pets, have them immunized.

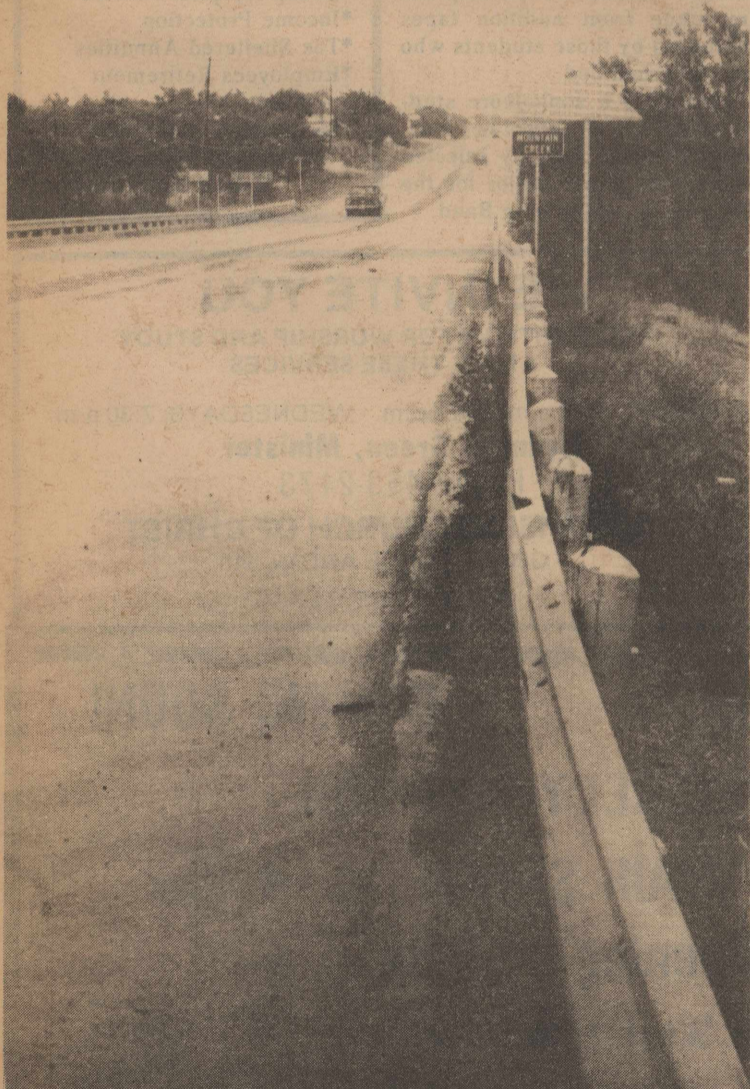
Sanco reunion activities begin

Stings painful, dangerous

Spring weather can mean danger for Texans who get bitten or stung by insects.

Insects cause a number of injuries to people each year when outdoor activities increase. The worst offenders are bees, wasps and yellow-jackets. The greatest peril from insect-people encounters is allergic reactions, points out Dr. Phil Hamman, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. He notes that insect bites kill at least nine times more Americans than do snake bites.

People have different reactions to insect venoms, and allergic reactions are classified by the severity of one's body reaction, notes Hamman.

He cites at least three levels of reactions insect bites and stings can cause:

Slight reactions, including itching, inflammation of the skin or anxiety.

Moderate reactions, including swelling, abdominal pain or nausea.

Severe reactions, including difficulty in breathing or swelling, hoarseness or confusion.

Most severe would probably be a shock reaction that causes a drop in blood pressure, collapse or unconsciousness, says Hamman. Moderate and severe reactions from an insect bite or sting are enough cause to see a doctor. Capture the offending insect if possible to help the doctor in providing treatment.

To reduce contacts with venomous insects, Hamman advises people not to walk around in the

yard barefooted; to avoid wearing sweet smelling colognes or perfumes; to keep ripened fruits, watermelons, soft drink cans or other sweet smelling materials covered when outdoors; and to avoid mowing lawns or working in flower beds when bees or wasps are active. Insects are less active in the early morning hours.

Among the variety of venoms produced by insects are these:

Those producing blisters, caused by certain stinging caterpillars, centipedes and blister beetles.

Those attacking the central nervous system, produced by scorpions, black widow spiders, bees, wasps, yellow-jackets and hornets.

Those destroying skin tissue, produced by fire ants, wheel bugs, brown recluse spiders, mites, scorpions, chiggers, bees, wasps, yellow-jackets and hornets.

Those preventing blood from clotting, caused by fleas, lice, mites, ticks, biting flies and true bugs.

FCC changes will affect phone service

Changes approved by the Federal Communications Commission on May 25, 1984 will affect General Telephone customers using interstate long-distance directory assistance, customers using AT&T to make long-distance calls, and businesses with more than one line.

An interstate directory assistance charge of .50 cents per call with a two-call allowance for each billing period was approved for AT&T, the nation's only provider of interstate directory assistance service. To obtain the two-call directory assistance allowance, the customer must make at least two interstate calls during each billing period. If the customer makes one or no interstate calls, the allowance would be one or zero respectively.

The FCC also ordered AT&T to reduce its interstate long-distance rates by approximately 6.1 percent.

At the same time, the FCC approved interstate end user access charges of \$6 per line for businesses with more than one line.

All of the changes became effective May 25.

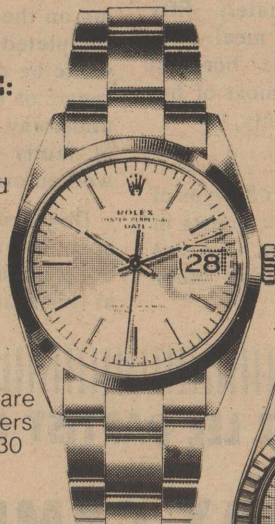

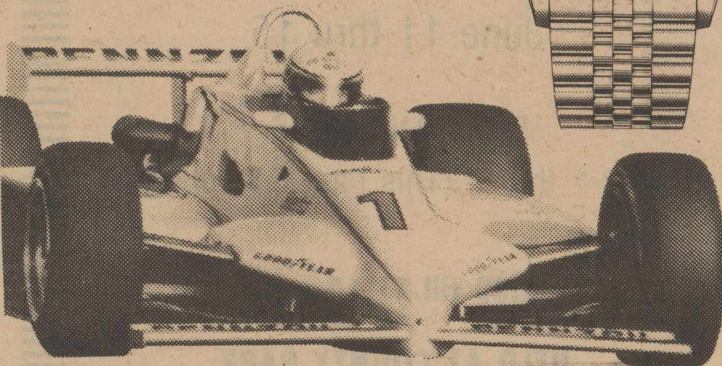
