Haskell Woman Killed In Wreck Near Breckenridge

Turner, 17, daughter of Mrs. Leon Curtis of 1835 N. Main St., was one of the two killed in an automobile wreck in Breckenridge, 34 miles southeast of Haskell, about 4 p. m. Monday.

The accident occurred on Farm Road 1835, near the intersection of the road with the Breckenridge road. The car was driven by Mrs. Turner.

The car was overturned and the driver, Mrs. Turner, was killed. The 17-year-old daughter, Turner, was also killed. The car was a 1955 Ford.

The driver of the other car, a 1955 Ford, was not injured. The car was driven by a man whose name was not given.

The accident occurred on a curve in the road. The car was traveling north on Farm Road 1835. The other car was traveling south on the Breckenridge road.

The cause of the accident is not known. The police are investigating the accident.

Tie in District Game with Bula Leaves Paint Creek Undefeated

The Paint Creek Pirates, bidistrict champions, finished their season undefeated when the regional game with the Bula Bulldogs last Saturday at Morton ended in a 26-26 tie. While neither team won the game, the District Championship was awarded on penetrations to Bula who had five penetrations to Paint Creek's four. It was the last football game for six Paint Creek seniors, Roddy Kuenstler, Eddie Lee Thane, Eddie Mack Earles, Leon Hokanson, Waller Overton, and Fred Selby.

Both teams were handicapped by a poorly marked field and a high wind.

The Pirates defeated Bula 61-40 in an earlier pre-district contest and played excellent ball in the Regional contest, but had trouble passing because of the strong wind.

After taking the kickoff, Bula advanced eleven yards in 7 plays to the 19 where Burley Roberts took the ball from Jr. Austin on an off-tackle play to cross easily for the TD.

Paint Creek followed with a scoring pass from Leon Hokanson to Don Hager, and a conversion by Hokanson put the Pirates ahead 8-6.

In the second quarter, a 2-yard run by Harold Nichols scored for the Bulldogs, and Leon Hokanson made a 12-yard Pirate touchdown. Burley Roberts made a Bula 4 yard score followed by a beautiful 43-yard TD run by Thane which left the halftime score Paint Creek, 20, Bula, 19.

Early in the second half, Burley Roberts took the ball from Jr. Austin for a Bula score, and Harold Nichols made a point to put the Bulldogs ahead.

In the final frame, a strong Pirate defense held the Bulldogs scoreless, while a clean 10-yard run by Eddie Earles made a touchdown for Paint Creek and the point was ruled incomplete to leave the final score tied.

Red Cross Quota Announced for Hungary Relief

Quota for the Red Cross Hungarian Relief Campaign in Haskell County was announced today as \$293, according to Mrs. Audrey Cook, local Red Cross representative.

In a letter, Frederic S. Laise, manager stated, "As each day passes the number of Hungarians left destitute increases and the need for assistance becomes more acute. The American National Red Cross in cooperation with over 40 national societies is doing everything possible to relieve the suffering of these people."

Raymond T. Schaeffer, former national director of Disaster Services, is now in Vienna directing and coordinating the assistance being given the refugees in Austria through the Red Cross Societies. The international committee of the Red Cross, at the request of the Hungarian government is directing relief activities inside Hungary. Tons of food, clothing, shelter and medical supplies are being provided those who have fled to Austria in addition to many more who are in dire circumstances in Hungary itself.

Unoccupied House On Gilliam Farm Burns Tuesday

A large five-room house on the Fred Gilliam farm about seven miles east of town burned Tuesday evening from fire of undetermined origin.

The house, unoccupied for about two months, was a total loss, along with quite a bit of furniture and household articles stored there, including air conditioning units from the Gilliam home in town.

The flames also spread to a small barn a short distance from the house, and the smaller structure was almost destroyed.

Firemen who accompanied a booster pumper truck to the scene extinguished the blaze in the smaller building before it was totally burned.

The fire had spread throughout the frame house before the smoke and blaze was noticed. Albert Feiser, who lived several miles away telephoned the fire department and reported the blaze.

Mr. Bird, accompanied by Mrs. Bird and friends from Dallas were members of the hunting party. A gun in the hands of a Dallas man was accidentally discharged, the bullet fatally injuring Mr. Bird. He died in an ambulance before reaching medical aid.

Funeral for Mr. Bird was held at the Garland Baptist Church at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday, and burial was in that city. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Resident of Garland for a number of years, Mr. Bird was a painting contractor.

He is survived by his wife, and four children, Joy, Alice, Judy, and Gary; three brothers, Thomas Bird of Haskell, J. D. Bird of Tacoma, Wash., Woodrow Bird of Oroville, Calif.; and three sisters, Mrs. Billie Collingsworth of Garland, Mrs. Edna Klemman of Garland, and Mrs. Clyde Anderson of Dallas.

County's Cotton Allotment For '57 Set at 126,278 Acres

Four Youngsters Win Christmas Gifts Saturday; Bicycle to Be Next Award

Haskell County's 1957 cotton allotment is 126,278 acres, Lloyd Feemster, county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office manager, announced Monday. He received news of the allotment in a telegram from ASC headquarters in College Station.

That represents an increase of 5,000 acres over the 1956 allotment, which was 120,952 acres, Feemster said.

The allotment is based on the previous three-year planting history in the county. The average cotton history for the past three years is approximately 130,000 acres, Feemster said.

Individual allotments were mailed out to every cotton farmer in the county Monday and Tuesday, Feemster said.

Cotton farmers will go to the polls Tuesday, Dec. 11, to determine if marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1957 crop.

Marketing quotas must carry by at least a two-thirds majority for them to be put into effect on the 1957 crop, Feemster explained.

If they are in effect, he said that operators who plant within their allotment will receive price supports of not less than 75 per cent of parity.

Should marketing quotas fail to gain the two-thirds majority, farmers planting within their allotments will receive price supports of 50 per cent of parity, Feemster said.

In either case, he added, farmers who exceed their allotments will not be issued marketing cards and must sell their cotton on the open market.

Marketing quotas have never failed to receive the two-thirds majority in Haskell County.

Polls will open next Tuesday at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m., Feemster said.

Polling places will be located in the following towns and communities: Brien, Rochester, Rule, Segerton, Haskell, Paint Creek, Irby, Mattson, and Wetmore.

Convicted Slayer Transferred to State Prison

Agapito Martinez, Mexican who was convicted in 39th District Court here last week for murder with malice, was taken to Huntsville Tuesday by Sheriff Bill Pennington where he was placed in state prison.

Martinez, 51, is a resident of Kingville, Texas. In his trial, he admitted the killing of Mrs. Guadalupe Luna on a farm north of Rule last Sept. 24. Fear and jealousy prompted the slaying, he told the jury.

A five-year prison sentence was imposed by the jury. Martinez accepted sentence immediately, and professed a desire to be taken to state prison at the earliest possible date.

Accompanying Sheriff Pennington in transferring Martinez to Huntsville was Garland Orr of this city.

Rochester Wins Regional II-B Crown With 14-7 Defeat of Hermleigh Here

The Rochester Steers took home the Region II-B championship Thursday afternoon following a hard-earned 14-7 victory over the Hermleigh Cardinals in a tense 48-minute thriller in Indian Stadium before a crowd of 1,500 fans.

Less than four minutes remained in the game when Rochester's Buddy Strickland raced 58 yards for a TD to break up a 7-7 deadlock and clinch the regional title.

Rochester fans went wild as Strickland hit through over right guard and raced into the end zone untouched. His TD scamper capped a 90-yard Steer drive and climaxed a 23-minute stalemate quarterback Tommy Michael snaked over from the four with 2:45 left in the first half and Doug McGuire booted the first of his two extra points and knotted the count at 7-7.

Despite a slow but steady Rochester ground game which controlled the ball most of the first half, the Cardinals put on a good offensive show for the fans.

After Hermleigh halted the Steers at the midstripe and took a punt on their own 17-yard line, Davidson broke through over left guard, cut to the right, and zoomed 63 yards to score on the first play from scrimmage with only three and a half minutes gone. Davidson converted.

Then the Cardinals' Coach Ray Isaacs turned back two other scoring bids by Rochester inside their own 10-yard line and was threatening at the five yard line themselves when the first half ended.

With Davidson chipping in two key runs, a 50-yarder on trap to the 25 and a 17-yard scamper to the 8 after faking a fourth-down field goal try, the Cards were rapping at the door and threatening for the championship midway of the final period.

But after that bit of trickery, the Steers yielded only three yards on three plays before Rochester's Lennis Tibbets speared through to throw halfback Morris Light for a five-yard loss on a pitchback and the Steers took over at the 10.

Then came the long march and Strickland's clincher. Hermleigh quarterback Robby Robison heaved five desperation passes in the fading minutes but couldn't connect.

Rochester threatened to score twice early in the first half before succeeding. Late in the opening period, they marched 49 yards to the Hermleigh nine before bogging down. Longes, gain in that one was a 14-yarder which was a bit unusual. Strickland took a handoff at the 30 and fumbled the ball to the 18 where Tibbets recovered. But Davidson brought down Michael, trying a fourth-down keeper around the left side to halt that one.

Rochester stopped Hermleigh at the 35 and moved back to the 10 again early in the second quarter but a Strickland fumble bogged down the drive and Card guard Gus Tolleson jumped on the loose ball to give Hermleigh new life.

But the next time, Rochester took a punt on the 38 and drove in for the score, set up by a Steer yard run off the spread by Steer back Donnie McKeely to the Hermleigh four. Michael went over from there on a sneak.

The two teams battled in mid-field throughout the third quarter.

It goes without saying that the Hospital should be run on a business basis and collection should be made in all cases when possible, but demand that cash in hand must be secured before the patient is put to bed and the full amount for services must be paid before leaving the Hospital is a little too cold-blooded. Many good people cannot pay much, some none; the old pensioners are folks and must be taken care of. Most doctors attend patients that do not pay much, some none; why cannot the Haskell County Hospital, that belongs to Haskell County, take care of its folks in a worthy manner and not make hard, harsh demands as if they were Russian Serfs?

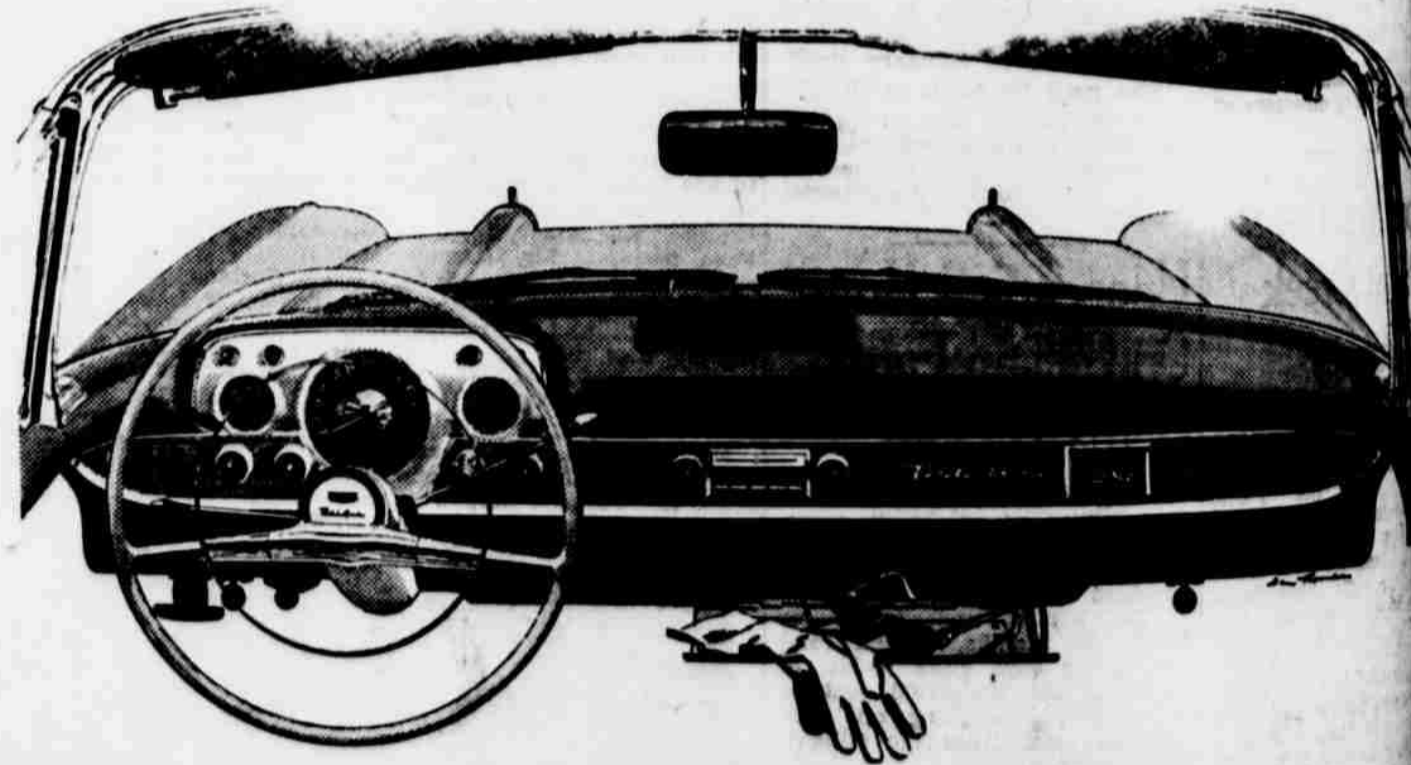

The couple has lived within several miles of their present home all of their married life. Children of the couple are Glenn Cobb, Route 1, Lueders; Mrs.

Burl Bunkley of Altus, Okla.; and M. B. Cobb of Haskell. They have three grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Mrs. Cobb was the former Miss Lillie Newcomb, whose father, John Newcomb came from Missouri before the Civil War and settled near Fort Griffin.

Mr. Cobb's parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Cobb, brought their family from Gonzales County to West Texas in 1890, settling in Southeast Haskell County near the Clear Fork of the Brazos.

After their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Cobb lived on the U-Heart Ranch of the old Reynolds Land & Cattle Company, whose properties were known as the X Ranches. Mr. Cobb had been working for the X's since 1900. "There were no fences between

In 1911 he took a job as manager of the Procter Bros. Ranch in Haskell and Shackelford Counties, which he managed until 1929 when the Procter's sold their cattle and later disposed of their ranch holdings.

In the meantime, Mr. Cobb had accumulated a farm and ranch holdings to become a leading farmer and stockman in that section. He recalls that he and his wife purchased their first quarter section of land with money realized from the sale of pecans they had gathered along the Clear Fork in the fall and winter of 1907.

A never-to-be-forgotten incident on the day following their wedding was a devastating prairie fire which swept the southeast part of the county, Mr. and Mrs. Cobb recall.

The couple and a large group of relatives and friends had gathered at the home of the bridegroom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Cobb, for a wedding dinner.

Shortly before noon, a heavy pall of smoke was noticed in the south, which had only one meaning—a prairie fire. Then, most of the men, including the bridegroom, were off to fight the blaze. Only ones left to enjoy the banquet were the womenfolk, a minister, and several of the more elderly men.

The fire came closer toward the house and ranch buildings, but with the protection of the intervening road, the fire fighters were able to control the blaze and point it so that the fire parted and passed on both sides of the house, leaving it undamaged.

"To this day I still believe that was one of the most stubborn grass fires I've ever helped fight," Mr. Cobb declares.

Mr. Cobb is still actively engaged in farming and ranching. Each year he takes part in the Old Timer events at the Texas Cowboy Reunion in Stamford and one of his most prized possessions is a watch he won there in calf roping.

Mr. and Mrs. Cobb both are members of the Baptist Church.

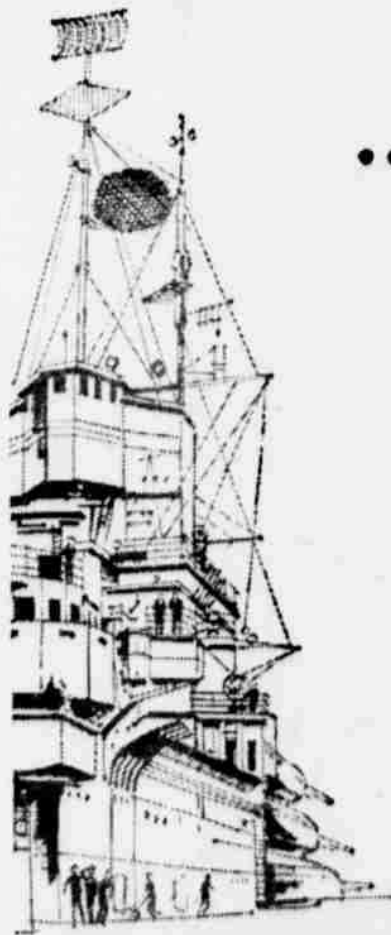
