**20 Years Ago—Oct. 3, 1935**  
Mrs. Alice T. Nolen, 79, is a patient in the Stamford Sanitarium, as the result of a fall at her home here Friday in which she received a fractured hip.

Appointment of Riley Levellen as deputy sheriff was made this week by Sheriff Giles Kemp. Levellen, former Temple, police officer and ex-Ranger, assumed his duties the first of the week. J. L. LaBriere, a well-known ranchman of St. Johns, Ariz., died near that city Sept. 16. He will be remembered by a number of early settlers in this section as a cattleman, and especially as having built the first residence in Haskell.

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Burlington Lines Seek Permit to Operate Trucks

The Burlington Lines Railroad Division of the Railroad Commission of Texas was filed today by Burlington Truck Lines of Texas, Inc. for a certificate of convenience and necessity to operate as a common and as a specialized motor carrier within Texas.

R. Wright Armstrong, president; C. E. Nottingham, secretary-treasurer; and Seth Barwise, director and general attorney, all of Fort Worth, are named as officers of the corporation.

Thirty-seven tractors, 49 trailers, five straight trucks with 16-foot bodies, and other miscellaneous equipment are to be operated, making use of the terminal facilities of Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company throughout the territory to be served.

A map accompanying the application disclosed that highway truck service is to be operated throughout the entire territory now served by the Railway Company extending from the Ports of Houston, Galveston, and Texas City northward across Texas through Dallas, Fort Worth, Wichita Falls, Amarillo, and to Texline, also embracing Abilene, Pampa, Lubbock, Plainview, and intermediate towns along the railway.

In commenting on it, R. Wright Armstrong, president of the truck line, and vice president, Fort Worth & Denver Railway, said, "A persistent demand throughout our territory disclosed that the shipping and receiving public needs the additional transportation service to be offered by Burlington Truck Lines of Texas, Inc."

"The highway schedules to be provided," Armstrong continued, "will supply a long-felt need for adequate transportation facilities in the conduct of business throughout the Texas territory served by the railway."

Early hearings before the Railroad Commission are anticipated and, according to Armstrong, the new truck service will be inaugurated as soon as a certificate of convenience and necessity is issued by the Railroad Commission.

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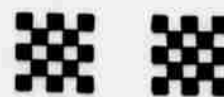

**Armed Forces Reserve Act Explained**

The following explanation of the new Reserve Forces Act has been furnished The Free Press for publication for the information of all interested men in the Haskell area.

The Reserve Forces Act of 1955 was signed into law by President Eisenhower on August 9. Its provisions are of interest to all young men, veterans and non-veterans alike.

The act was passed so that our Reserve Forces may be organized and trained and, in the event of war, can be quickly mobilized to augment the Active Forces for the defense of the United States. The act does not establish an entirely new Reserve System. It merely amends the present act, in that it (1) provides improvement in the structure of the Reserve Forces.

Qualified young men may join an organized unit of the Ready Reserve and contingent upon satisfactory participation in the unit training, be deferred from the draft and after fulfilling certain requirements may be transferred to the Standby Reserve, for part of their obligation.

The individual, both veterans and men with no prior service, who participate in the Ready Reserve is entitled to pay. In addition he is periodically considered for promotion. He may be satisfactory participation, over a period of years qualify for retirement.

Monday's Cattle Prices Lower At Ft. Worth

By TED GOULDY

Fort Worth—One of the largest offerings of cattle for the year appeared at the nation's 12 major livestock markets Monday with over 150,000 cattle reported. Prices were tending lower at all points.

It was noteworthy that while cattle numbers were large, the offerings of calves around the major markets were around 6,000 earlier. This trend toward smaller numbers of calves going to market has been evident all this year and the effect it will have on estimated cattle population, if continued, will be confusing.

At Fort Worth most kinds of cattle and calves were weak to 50 cents lower, except high grade stockers and feeders which were fully steady. Again the order buyers reported that most of the stockers and feeders they bought were destined for Texas or other Southwestern states.

Currently prices of replacement cattle and calves here are equal to or above prices at most of the Cornbelt centers, and it is evident that restocking of the droughty areas is going forward at a fast pace.

Comparative prices at Fort Worth Monday included:

Good to choice fed steers and yearlings \$18-\$22. Common and medium sorts \$12-\$17. Fed cattle eligible to top \$21 appeared. Fat cows \$8.50-\$9.50. Bulls \$10-\$13.75. Good to choice fat calves \$16-\$17.50. A few baby beef kinds higher: cull, common and medium \$8-\$15. Stocker steer calves \$15-\$21, heifer calves \$18 down; stocker steer yearlings \$18.50 down; replacement cows \$8-\$13.50.
