### **Armed Forces** Reserve Act Explained

The following explanation of the new Reserve Forces Act has been furnished The Free Press for publication for the information of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association. all interested men in the Has-

The Reserve Forces Act of 1955 was signed into law by President Eisenhower on August 9, Its proveterans alike.

The act was passed so that our Reserve Forces may be organized and trained and, in the event of war, can be quickly mobilized to augment the Active Forces for the defense of the United States. The act does not establish an entirely new Reserve System. It merely amends the present act, in that it (1) provides improvement in the structure of the Reserve Forces. (2) It establishes a clear obligation to take part in Reserve training and provides effective means to insure compliance with this obligation. (3) It provides Haskell. for the recruitment and training of young men specifically for the Reserve (4) and it establishes a lesser military obligation for individuals participating in the Re-

The act provides for a Ready Reserve and a Standby Reserve. The President has authority in time of emergency, declared by him, to order to active duty members of the Ready Reserve while those men in the Standby Reserve are liable for active duty only in time of war or emergency clared by Congress,

Qualified young men may join in organized unit of the Ready Reserve and contingeut upon satisfactory participation in the ununit training, be deferred from the draft and after fulfilling certain requirements may be transferred to the Standby Reserv for art of their obligation.

The individual, both veterans and men with no prior service. who participate in the Ready Reserve is entitled to pay. In addition he is periodically considered for promotion. He may by satisfactory participation, over a per-iod of years qualify for retirement.

Young men of this area who vish to take advantage of mempership in an active Reserve unit, or those men desiring mor, information on the Reserve Forces Act are cordially invited to atend a meeting of the 375th Replacement Battalion which meets each Tuesday night at 8 o'clock on the third floor of the Haskell County courthouse.



Mrs Artie May Burkett of this city, supervisor of education in Haskell schools, and president of the Texas Association for the Improvement of Reading, was in Dallas Wednesday where she attended the Southern Invitational Conference, held at the Adolphus Hotel in that city.

Sponsored b ythe Science Research Association, subject of the one-day conference of educators was Reading Improvement and Curriculum Planning.

Purpose of the conference was exchange ideas about ways of vercoming the increasingly serious problems that will confront secondary schools in the years est ahead.

Faced with enrollment that will skyrocket 75 per cent in the next decade, high school admintrators are seeking new ways of building better community understanding of their problems and objectives, to create a better climate of confidence in present-day educational methods.

### Monday's Cattle **Prices Lower** At Ft. Worth

Fort Worth-One of the largest offerings of cattle for the year appeared at the nation's 12 major livestock markets Monday with over 150,000 cattle reported. Prices were tending lower at all points.

It was noteworthy that while cattle numbers were large, the offerings of calves around the major markets were around 6,-000 under the comparable date a year earlier. This trend toward smaller numbers of calves going to market has been evident all this year and the effect it will have on estimated cattle popula-tion, if continued, will be con-

At Fort Worth most kinds of cattle and calves were weak to 50 cents lower, except high grade stockers and feeders which were fully steady. Again the order buyers reported that most of the stockers and feeders they bought were destined for Texas or oth-er Southwestern states.

Currently prices of replaceent cattle and calves here are aral to or above prices at most f the Cornbelt centers, and it s evident that restocking of the drouthy areas is going forward a fast pace.

Comparative prices at Fort Worth Monday included:

Good to choice fed steers and earlings \$18-\$22. Common and medium sorts \$12-\$17. Fed cattle eligible to top \$21 appeared. Fat cows \$9.50-\$12; canners and cutters \$6.50-\$9.50. Bulls \$10-\$13.-75; good to choice fat calves \$16-\$17.50, a few baby beef kinds higher; cull, common and me-dium \$8-\$15. Stocker steer calves \$15-\$21, heifer calves \$18 down; stocker steer yearlings \$18.50 down; replacement cows \$8-\$13.50.




