Absentee voters turn out in record numbers

A record number of absentee ballots have been cast already for the November 6 General Election. According to County Clerk Ettie Hubbard on Wednesday morning, 68 persons had voted in her office, while 65 cast votes by mail. Absentee voting will continue in her office until Friday, Nov. 2, at 5 p.m.

In compliance with the Texas Election code, polls will be open 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 6, in 6 Election precincts in Coke County.

RL's Greg Grim ranks fourth on West Texas football rushing list

Greg Grim, senior running back for Robert Lee High School, is currently rated 4th on the Standard-Time unofficial West Texas football rushing list. Each season the sports staff for the paper compiles statistics in four offensive categories; rushing; passing; receiving; and scoring. Grim also ranks 10th in scoring.

Grim, who also was high on the lists last year as a junior, is keeping up his average despite sitting out one game with an injured shoulder. He has rushed for 844 yards in 131 carries, 6.4 yards per carry with a game average of 140.7 yards, and has scored 54 points. These stats do not include last Friday's 12-0 defeat of Santa Anna. The categories listed include larger schools such as Permian, Central, Cooper, and Midland Lee.

Another member of a District 8-A West Zone team, Terry Gauwain of Water Valley, is the rushing leader with 1019 yards on 189 carries.


Bronte Seniors to celebrate Thanksgiving

West Coke Hospital buys equipment

In an on-going effort to update and provide good medical care in our area and to make the public aware of services obtainable at their hospital, the West Coke County Hospital District has purchased the following equipment:

1. Glucometer: To get a blood sugar level within minutes in the Emergency

2. Woods Lamp: To detect foreign bodies in the eye.

3. Medic-3: A lightweight, portable Monitor-Defibrillator for use in the E.R., patient's room or outside of hospital, if needed.

4. Responder III: A new intercom system for better communication between patients and nurses.

5. Autoclave: To sterilize instruments and packs in a short period of time.

6. Overhead Exam Light: For better visualization during E.R. examinations.

7. Gomco Suction-Aspirator: To help clear airways or contents of stomach.

8. Schioetz-Tonometer: To test pressure of eye for various conditions including glaucoma.

9. Optho-Burr: Corneal rust rings remover.

10. Nova 4: Lab equipment to run blood tests for electro-

lytes within minutes.

11. Dyn-Cell 800: Hematology to run CBC's, platelets and cell indice's within minutes.

12. New surgical instruments and various supplies to update the E.R. and other departments.

13. Plan to purchase in the future: Blood Gas Machine for more accurate diagnosis of heart and pulmonary related problems, an X-Ray Processor-Dryer, a Chemistry Analyzer, an E.R. Stretcher-Table and an Electrosurg for cauterizing.

The Staff of West Coke County Hospital District is involved in continuing education courses, seminars and in-service training to keep abreast of new medical technology in order that our patients receive the best care possible. Several of our licensed nurses are taking Basic EKG Interpretation of EKG's at Angelo State University. This is to help recognize EKG arrythmias and detect problems. Those R.N.'s attending are: Ginny Jordan, Donna Hayden, Bonnie Burton and Dot Starling. LVN's attending are: Joy Ehl, Louise Bower and Mabel Clark.

The Hospital District has also purchased a Video Re-

corder and Monitor for patient education and inservice training for hospital and nursing home employees.


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


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

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New federal tax law makes low-cost veteran loans difficult

The days of low-cost housing and land loans to Texas veterans are numbered because of a new federal tax law, Land Commissioner Garry Mauro has warned.

In a Capitol news conference yesterday, Mauro said that a little-noticed application of the Tax Reform Act of 1984 phases out the taxexempt status of bonds issued under the Veterans **Housing Assistance Program** and Veterans Land Program.

Since tax-exempt bonds can be sold at lower interest rates than non-exempt ones, the tax-exempt feature of the bonds financing the veterans programs is what makes low-cost loans possible. The current loan rate for housing is 9.97 percent.

"What makes Texas different from other states is that we have always believed that we don't need to do our veterans a favor, we just need to repay one," Mauro said. "This federal legislation makes a mockery of the debt we owe our veterans and I urge all Texans to join me in demanding repeal of this unjust law.

Mauro said all the state's 1.7 million veterans will be eligible for loans until December 1985, when bonds issued before the tax act are expected to run out.

After that, the number of

eligible veterans will dwindle until low-cost housing loans are ended.

The tax-exempt status for the land program is scheduled to end in 1987, but Mauro said bonds sold to that time would keep the prigram alive until 1990.

The tax reforms in question were aimed at curbing the growth of tax-exempt bonds issued by states and localities. When individuals purchase tax-exempt bonds, the federal treasury gets

John Bender, an administrative aide to U.S. Rep. J.J. Pickle, D-Austin, said only five states have veterans loan programs, and the mood in Congress was to eliminate the veterans mortgage programs completely.

Bender said a coalition of Texans on the congressional tax-writing committees, including Pickle, U.S. Reps. Kent Hance and Bill Archer and U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, won a compromise that preserved the Texas programs temporarily.

"We came out a lot better than we had hoped for," Bender said, noting that congressman from the 45 states that cannot now start loan programs have little incentive to support the one

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

The Steers will travel to Miles to challenge the Bulldogs at 7:30 p.m. Friday


(tonight) night. Fans, let's go support the team! The Steers have made a comeback and are back in the thick of things in the district race. We should let them know we're proud of them.

Hornets hand Horns second consecutive loss; Mountaineers next in line tonight

The Hornets handed the Longhorns their second consecutive shutout and loss in Mertzon Friday night. If one looked at penetrations the score was 2-2; however, the Hornets were able to convert penetrations into 9 points, and the Longhorns were not. The field was wet, but rain did not fall until late in the fourth quarter. Irion County won the toss and elected to receive.

1ST HALF

Todd Lee toed the opening kickoff with Doug Hoyt reaching the return man first. Irion County put the ball in play at their own 33 yard line. Todd Lee, Kerry Lee, Duff and Corby Kelso led the Longhorn tackle piles and netted Mertzon a minus 1 yard. Mertzon punted and Bronte put the ball in play at their own 23 yard line. The Longhorns appeared able to move the ball as Blain McGinnis connected with David Phillips for a 16 yard passing gain. Kerry Lee drove out seven more yards on the next play, but the following play resulted in a fumble giving Mertzon the ball at the Bronte 43 yard line. Doug Tounget, Chewy Puentez, Butch James, and McGinnis combined for the Longhorns in stopping the Hornets, then McGinnis jumped on a Mertzon fumble at the Bronte 25 yard line. The next possession netted Bronte a minus 10 yards and David Phillips punted for the Longhorns. Irion County took over the ball at midfield. Corby Kelso made two consecutive tackles for the

Longhorns allowing a total of only three yards. On third down Joel Sanders hopped on a Hornet fumble at the Irion County 48 yard line. Kerry Lee busted up the middle for 21 yards and a first down. Corby Kelso followed with a seven yard run. McGinnis again threw to Phillips for six more yards and a first down at the Hornet 14 yard line. Three running plays gained one yard for the Longhorns as Irion County stiffened. A fourth down pass attempt went in and out of the hands of a Longhorn receiver, as the Bronte scoring threat fell short. Mertzon was unable to get a first down with Blane Braswell joining the Longhorns mentioned earlier in halting the Hornets. Bronte set up shop at the Irion County 48 yard line. Kerry Lee and Corby Kelso combined for a Bronte first down at the Mertzon 37 yard line. A penalty wiped out another good gain by Lee. McGinnis got back the yardage plus more with a 10 yard scamper leaving Bronte in a second and five situation. The Hornets stiffened again holding Bronte inches short of a first down on a fourth down try. Mertzon took over at their own 33 yardline and got offensively untracked, gaining 50 yards in 10 plays as Pete Puentez and Butch James joined the tackling crew. Irion County with the ball on the Bronte 23 yard line, fumbled and Blain Mc-Ginnis recovered. Bronte did not attain a first down as they were forced to punt. Mertzon began with the ball

at their own 42 yard line and drove 53 yards to the Bronte 5 yard line with 4 seconds remaining in the half. The Hornets decided to attempt a field goal of 22 yards, it barely skimmed over the upright as time expired with Irion County leading 3-0.

2ND HALF

The third quarter passed very quickly as both teams stuck to the running game and stayed in bounds. Kerry Lee was the main workhorse for the Longhorn offense during the period. Stephen Lee stepped into punt and play some as quarterback. There were a couple of key mistakes made by the Longhorns in the third period. 

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

WTU customers will pay less this fall

West Texas Utilities Co. residential customers are paying slightly less than the state average for their electricity this fall, according to surveys reported by the Public Utility Commission of

In September and October, WTU's standard residential rate for 1,000 kilowatt-hours was \$74.74, while the state average was over \$76, the PUC report shows, For 500 Kilowatt-hours, WTU charged \$41, while the state average was \$40.41 in September and \$40.25 in October. Average monthly usage for WTU residental customers was 1,020 KwH in September 1983 and 701 KwH in October 1983.

The survey included 19 utilities, among which were 10 investor-owned companies. Highest rates in the state were those of El Paso Electric Co., which charged \$98.37 for 1,000 KwH. Lowest rates reported were by the Lower Colorado River Authority, which charged \$53.09 for 1,000 KwH.

WTU currently is awaiting the outcome of a rate case pending before the PUC. A settlement agreement presented to a PUC hearing examiner would raise WTU's base rates but lower the fuel cost recovery, resulting in only slight changes in the various rates now in effect. A final decision by the three PUC commissioners is expected in November.

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

Small intakes of alcohol are not usually harmful to the skin. A small amount of wine or other beverages gives the skin only a warm flush, while heavy intake of alcohol over dilates the blood vessels. If continued over long periods of time alcohol consumption can weaken capillary walls; when the blood expands the weakened capillary walls can burst, causing splotches in the white of the eye or underneath the skin called "spider" angiomas.

Alcohol also draws water out of the tissues and leaves skin dull and dehydrated.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

The Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District held their regular monthly meeting recently in Silver. Two conservation plans were reviewed and approved for producers who recently signed a cooperative agreement with the district. Each of these landowners plan to apply practices that are needed to solve each particular soil erosion problem. Plans were also made to attend a meeting in San Angelo where plans will be developed for the annual awards program. The information and education booth at the San Angelo Stock Show will also be discussed at the meeting.

Wilbern Millican has been elected to serve as a director for the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District for a five year term. The zone he represents is in the north-west part of the coun-

ty. District directors take care of district business and encourage operators to carry out soil and water conservation programs on the land they operate. Millican operates ranches in the Edith and the Sanco communities.

The recent rains have given the warm season grasses a chance to make some growth before frost. The old saying, "If you cut off the shoot, you kill the root", is even more true now that at most other times. New green shoots that are growing now should be allowed to grow without grazing until frost. This will allow the grass plant to develop a stronger root system so the plant can in turn make more green growth next spring. Grazing new growth now will further weaken the already weak root system and will reduce forage growth next spring.
