

Coke dominates West Texas squad Coulter named Coach of the Year

Just when you think that everything that could be said about the 1984 high school football season has already been said, the good news just keeps coming, in the form of the Class A All-West Texas football team, as selected by the San Angelo Standard Times sports staff.

Coke County dominated this year's offensive and defensive picks, placing six players on this prestigious team. As an added plus, Robert Lee head football coach Nelson Coulter was selected Coach of the Year for the All-West Texas team.

According to the Standard Times sportswriters, Nelson was selected Coach of the Year for his efforts in regrouping the Steers after a 2-4 start, and leading the way to the state quarterfinal game, winning seven games in a row in the process, before a narrow 14-13 loss to Wink in the quarterfinals. Robert Lee finished the season 9-5.

Robert Lee's star running back Greg Grim was one of only four players to make this squad for two years in a row. Grim's compact running style led the Steers to the quarterfinals, racking up a total of 1,703 yards in the process. Greg was also effective as a kickoff returner and defensive back.

Bronte was represented on this year's squad by offensive lineman Doug Tounget and linebacker Blain McGinnis. Tounget, a two-way all-zone pick, was described as an intelligent player who served as the Longhorns' "coach on the field" by knowing the blocking assignments for all the offensive line positions. McGinnis was highly regarded by rival coaches and Bronte coach Gerald Sandusky said, "Blain kept our defense together".

In addition to Coach Nelson Coulter and running back Greg Grim, Robert Lee was fortunate enough to place three more players on the prestigious team, and they include center Michael Wilson, defensive lineman Phillip Stephens, and defensive back Kirby Rasco.

Seniors Wilson and Stephens both missed their

junior year's play, Wilson due to personal reasons, and Stephens due to a neck injury.





Robert Lee resident dies from gunshot wound in scuffle

William Noel Ybarra of Robert Lee was killed Saturday, December 29, by a gunshot to the face as he scuffled with undocumented Mexican workers shortly after midnight, at a farmhouse

in Roscoe, Texas. Mary Sue Sanchez, the victim's sister, and Cesar De La Pena, also of Robert Lee, are being held under bond at the Nolan County Jail as a result of the incident, which left Ybarra dead, and a Mexican national wounded from gunshots.

Investigators believe that Ybarra, his sister Mary Sue Sanchez, and Cesar De La Pena, a friend, went to the Roscoe farmhouse to rob the Mexican nationals living there.

According to an Associated Press story, a sheriff's office jailer said the woman had been to the farmhouse before, and knew the people didn't keep their money in a bank. There were seven men staying at the house, and the trio apparently hadn't expected any resistance from the






