





Elderly may defer property taxes

"Over-65 Tax Deferral"

Taxpayers aged 65 or over can delay payment of property taxes on their homesteads.

Elderly homeowners can qualify for the "over-65 tax deferral" by filing a sworn affidavit at the office of the appraisal district in which they live.

If an elderly taxpayer has already been sued to collect delinquent taxes on his homestead, he can still take advantage of the tax deferral by filing an affidavit asserting age and ownership with the court in which the suit is pending.

According to Ron Patterson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, the Texas Property Tax Code provides that, once an "over-65 tax deferral" affidavit has been properly filed, taxing units may not pursue or initiate delinquent tax suits on the homestead as long as the applicant owns and lives at that property.

Patterson said that forms for the deferral affidavit are available at local appraisal district offices in the state. The form should be filled out and signed by the applicant and his signature witnessed by a notary public or other

official authorized to take

Patterson stressed that elderly homeowners should realize that the deferral only allows payments to be postponed, not dismissed. "During the period of deferral, the amounts of delinquent taxes, penalties and interest continue to add up," explained Patterson. "Once the applicant no longer qualifies for deferral-- that is, ie he no longer owns or resides at that homestead-- all those accrued amounts become due and payable. Taxing units at that time may sue and foreclose on the accrued delinquent taxes, penalties and interest."


Social Security

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

Grazed-down pastures mean lots of weeds next year. Drought throughout much of Texas last spring and summer resulted in pastures being grazed extremely short. With plenty of sunlight on the soil surface and adequate rainfall in recent weeks, pasture weeds are beginning to germinate. This spells havoc for forage producers next spring.

Seeds of most weeds live several years in the soil. With favorable conditions, such as sunlight, moisture and temperature, these weeds germinate. The seedlings may remain small and unnoticed during winter and early spring and then flourish when warm weather settles in.

Fortunately, growers have choices of herbicides which are effective and economical for weed control.

Studies have shown that for each pound of weeds controlled, 4 to 5 pounds of grass can grow.

Annual weeds are easy to control with properly timed

herbicides. The herbicide, 2, 4-D will easily control these plants when they are small and growth conditions are good.

Herbicide mixtures are available for plants that are more difficult to control including many poisonous plants. These mixtures are available as Weedmaster (1:3 mixture of dicamba and 2, 4-D) and Grazon P+D (1:4 mixture of picloram and 2, 4-D). Also, Banvil (dicamba) or Grazon PC (picloram) may be tank mixed with 2, 4-D.
