Sara will receive transplant

Warren and Dorcas Tomlinson of San Angelo have faced some tough situations over the last three years but the greatest of these may be before them. Their small daughter, Sara, a bright, beautiful three-year-old, has been accepted as a candidate for a liver transplant by the Transplant Center at Children's Medical Center in Dal-

Sara was born Jan. 13, 1982 at Shannon Hospital in San Angelo and at eight weeks of age underwent surgery in which a loop of the small intestine was refashioned into a bile duct. She is cared for in San Angelo by Dr. Robert S. Patyrak who has stated that children with non-working liver bile ducts (biliary atresia) cannot survive. She would have a 75% chance of surviving to adulthood with a liver transplant. There is a steady process of poisoning to the body, obvious in yellowed eyes and jaundiced skin. Sara has not at this time suffered from the internal bleeding or other side effects associated with the disease.

Dr. Patyrak commended the couple for handling their mountain of medical bills the first three years, but says the burden of the \$150,000 needed to save Sara's life is almost insurmountable. Mrs. Tomlinson was told that "the cost will not have to be paid in a lump sum but concrete proof that the obligation will be met must be presented". A trust has been established as the Sara Tomlinson Liver Fund, First City National Bank, P.O. Box 4031, San Angelo, TX. to help the family receive donations.

Warren Tomlinson operates the Sonrise Auto Parts Store on East 19th. Mrs. Tomlinson, a long-time elementary teacher, now stays home with Sara, and twoyear-old Andrew.

Tomlinson was raised in Bronte and graduated from Bronte High School. He is a brother of Geneva Simpson and Bobbie Arrott, both of



TIPS ON FERTILIZING
SHADE TREES

Shade trees seldom need extra fertilization when a good lawn maintenance program is followed. But when shade trees do need fertilizer, proper application is important.

Over-fertilization of trees can force excessive top growth, making them vulnerable to storm damage.

Trees rarely need fertilization more than once every three years except in extremely sandy soils and under special conditions.

Trees occasionally may need extra nutrients when their roots are confined by street and curb installations and other structures.

Fertilizer recommendations are generally based on trunk diameter and make no allowance for the fact that the root zone may be confined to a small area. Thus, fertilizing according to such instructions may result in over-fertilization and tree damage. The safest method of computing the amount of fertilizer to apply at any one time is to base it on the number of square feet included in the branch spread of the trees. It is recommended to use two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of branch area per application.

When fertilizing, make several applications — one in the fall at the usual first killing frost, another just before new growth starts in the spring, and a third applied as ammonium nitrate or ammonium sulfate in midsummer.

Spread fertilizer evenly beneath the spread of the tree and water thoroughly. Without moisture, roots cannot use the nutrients.

If the tree's root zone is confined by buildings, curbs, walks or other obstructions, base the fertilizer application on the actual root zone. Under these circumstances it may be necessary to fertilize every year to provide an adequate supply of nutrients.
