Arrott boy responds well to treatment following snakebite incident in Bronte

Shaylon Arrott, 4 year old son of Mike and Andra Arrott, remains hospitalized but responding well to treatment for snakebites suffered last Thursday morning at his home.

Shaylon was bitten twice on the leg by a large rattle-

snake as he played in the yard. He was rushed to the hospital after collapsing and was in serious condition and placed in the intensive care unit after surgery was performed on his leg. He steadily improved and has been placed in a private room.

He returned to surgery Wednesday for suturing of incisions left open for draining.

The rattler was hunted and killed by the child's grandfather, Dick Cooper of San Angelo, who said it measured about 5 feet long.




With the end of school near, the young people will be coming to the Post Office to pick up the mail. We do not object to this as long as they have a key to the box, but we cannot hand out the mail over the counter. We have 1074 boxes in our new post office and there is no way we can hand out mail except in extreme emergen-

We have placed certified slips and return receipts on the counter in our lobby. If you want to certify an article with return receipt requested - just fill out the informa-

tion on the certified slip and the green return receipt before you come to the counter and it will save both of us a lot of time. Remember that certified means an article doesn't necessarily have any monetary value, but you want to be sure the addressee receives it. This differs from registered mail in that it usually contains money, checks, or other negotiable items and the cost of a register is determined by the value of its contents. A certified letter costs 75c and a return receipt costs 70c. You can get a return receipt on certified, registered, or insured mail.

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Soil Stewardship observed

The Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District will join the nationwide observance of Soil Stewardship Week during the week of May 12 to 19, 1985, announces Joe Rawlings, chairman of the district.

"Tomorrow Together" is the theme of the 1985 observance. As the 1985 booklet for the observance points out, human survival depends on other living things: the grasses and grain, fishes and birds, wild and domestic animals. And we all depend for our basic necessities on soil and water. Together, we must think about ways to preserve and renew the topsoil from which all our food comes. Together, we must work to purify and protect our waters.

In 1985, the soil conservation movement in America marks its fiftieth anniversary. During the Dust Bowl era of the '30s, conservation districts, local units of government, were founded to take soil conservation information and techniques out to farmers and ranchers. But their task has grown. Now conservation districts also work with urban and suburban citizens in protecting construction sites, school yards, shorelines and parks from erosion. And they are involved in work to clean up the nation's waters.

Since 1955, the National Association of Conservation Districts has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week, in cooperation with the nearly 3,000 conservation districts, as one way to emphasize the importance of good stewardship of our basic soil and water resources.

Materials especially designed to carry the 1985 theme of "Tomorrow Together" are being distributed through local conservation districts to clergymen, lay leaders, civic and educational organizations and to individuals participating in the observance.







State Comptroller Bob Bullock's quarterly report on sales tax payments to Texas cities generally reflected an upsurge in local tax rebates indicating a rise in economy. He cautioned, however, that the first 3 months of 1985 might not be a reflection of how the entire year will continue but that the rise looked promising.

In Coke County, Robert Lee's total sales tax payment fell off slightly from last year for a 3.21% decrease. The 1985 payment to date is \$11,043.54, compared to the first 3 months of \$11,410.16 in 1984.

Bronte enjoyed a gain of 16.86% in sales tax pay-

ments, reflecting a rise from 1984's \$6,343.62 quarterly check to 1985's income of \$7,413.34.





EXCELLENT YEAR FOR SPRAYING MESQUITE

This may be the year to put the "whammy" on mesquite. Soil moisture conditions are a key to mesquite control, and good rains since last fall over most of Texas should increase the effectiveness of mesquite control with foliar herbicides.

Now that mesquite is starting to grow actively due to good soil moisture, ranchers should gear up for a spray program. Correct timing and proper application are most critical.

Before applying a herbicide, make sure mesquite leaves are fully extended and have turned from light to dark green in color. This usually occurs about 40 days after bud break.

Spraying during the period of seed pod elongation will result in less control because the plants are using food reserves. Also, about 90 days after bud break, control with foliar herbicides decreases as wax builds up on leaves and overall growth slows down.

Proper timing also relates to soil temperature. Research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Tech University has shown that soil temperature at 12 to 18 inches of depth should be 75 degrees F. or above for good control of mesquite.

Soils on upland range sites

and soils with a higher sand content usually warm up faster than bottomland and clay soils. Thus ranchers need to pay attention to particular sites when planning a mesquite control program.

If rains during the spraying period start new leaf growth on mesquite plants, leaves should be allowed to mature before spraying. If foliage is damaged by insects, disease or hail, do not spray until new foliage has developed and matured.

Four herbicides are registered and effective for mesquite control on rangeland. These include triclopyr (Grazon ET); 2, 4, 5-T; picloram (Grazon PC); and dicamba (Banvel).

Triclopyr, dicamba and 2, 4, 5-T may be used alone to control mesquite. However, control may be increased with one-to-one mixtures of the following: 2, 4, 5-T and picloram, triclopyr and picloram, or dicamba and picloram. A one-to-one mix of 2, 4, 5-T and dicamba also may be used but generally is less effective that the other mixtures.

Before applying any herbicide, be sure to read and follow label directions.

Proper application of foliar herbicides at the right time can be a key step to mesquite control. Then follow up with good range management practices.


