Rodeo 'kicks off' this weekend

The annual Coke County Rodeo kicks off this Friday evening followed by a Saturday evening performance at the Coke County Arena in Bronte. The shows will open at 8 p.m. with a colorful grand entry each night introducing a host of area and local contestants, led by flag bearers Melinda Gentry and Teresa Vaughn.

Saturday's performance will be preceded by a downtown parade at 5 p.m. featur-

ing equestrians and floats. The parade route will originate at the Nursing Home and proceed north on Hwy. 277, then left on Main Street to the Masonic Hall (Old depot building). All parade entries are welcome, in the form of floats, horses, decorated bikes, carts, and what-have-you. Parade entrants should meet at the Masonic Hall by 4 p.m. on Saturday to be assigned a place.

This year's rodeo promi-

ses many exciting events with lots of thrills and spills. The younger cowboys and cowgirls will compete in barrels, poles and flags while older boy and girl contestants will vie for prizes in barrels, poles, flags, breakaway roping; plus tie down roping, ribbon roping and bull riding for older boys. There will be a Jackpot Roping for 20 teams (10 each night) of Class C ropers.

Reigning over this year's festivities will be Senior Rodeo Queen Sandy Hilliard and Jr. Queen Jodie Hilliard, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Barry Hilliard.

Bull riding judges for the shows are Tony Barrett and David McMullan. Serving as this year's officials will be David McMullan, rodeo chairman and Tony Barrett, arena director. Rodeo association president is Wilburn Riordan; treasurer, Beverly Riordan; secretaries and timekeepers, Brendi Gentry, Janel Vaughn, Lisa Sharpes, Mary Jane Cooper and Lynn White.

The concession stands will be in operation offering tasty food and drinks.

Ticket prices remain at \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children, furnishing a lot of exciting entertainment for the price of admission.

Storm batters Blackwell

The Blackwell-Oak Creek area once again took a battering from Mother Nature when a storm plowed through last Wednesday evening. It was almost a re-run of the May tornadic winds which ripped through homes and out buildings.

The 6 p.m. wind snapped a row of power poles and cut a path of havoc around Oak Creek Reservoir. Many residents reported wind and water damage to their homes, and losses of carports, porches and sheds. The rain fell hard but briefly as the storm moved through with some recording 2.3 inches of rainfall in 15 min-

utes while others only got .2 as the freak storm hit Northern Coke County moving from northeast to southwest.

Ike Pate at Sportsman's Lodge on the lake received damage to his home, rent cabins and store, and added that other cabins nearby had roof and ceiling damage. Four boats were sunk by the tempest, and fences and satellite dishes were blown down.

A power outage occurred in the area, but W.T.U crews worked through the night and had all service restored in the early morning hours Thursday.

The ladies reported that time flew so fast they felt they were in a dream until they left the airplane in Dallas and the heat hit them in the face!

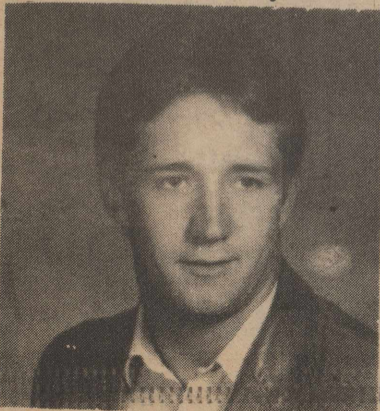
Messick receives scholarship

The Appraisal Review Board for the Coke County Appraisal District has rescheduled their property value appeals hearing date to July 29, 1985 at 9:00 A.M. The hearings that were scheduled for July 18 and July 25, 1985 are being postponed until then. Taxpayers who wish to appeal their appraised values are required to file a written notice of protest with the Board. The deadline for requesting a hearing is July 22, 1985. A form has been provided with the reappraisal notice. Members of the ARB are Ed Cumbie, Fred McCabe, Jr., and Bill Allen.

The Texas legislature passed a law in 1979 that requires the Appraisal District to reappraise all property every four years, and that properties be appraised at 100% of their fair market value. The last reappraisal was performed in 1981.

Studies conducted by the State Property Tax Board since then, have shown inconsistent appraisals between classes of property, and occasionally within classes. The chart at the right shows the resulting ratios for each category of property.

These figures have a direct impact on the amount of state aid each school district receives.

These ratios are factored into an assigned market value index and are certified to the Texas Education Agency. The Commissioner of Education uses the indexed values to calculate each school district's local fund assignment and eligibility for enrichment equalization aid. If the ratios are low, the school district is penalized and loses state aid. When that happens, local taxpayers have to make up for the loss with increased property tax dollars.

Another law that affects the amount of tax that will be paid on a homestead, changes the local-option percentage homestead exemption from 40% of the appraised value, to 30% for 1985 through 1987. In 1988, the allowable exemption changes to 20%. Therefore, one-fourth of the exempted value on a homestead is again taxable in 1985, which will make the taxes somewhat higher, even though the tax rates can be lowered because of the over-all higher valuations.

Fire Dept. reports grassfire

The Bronte Volunteer Fire Department reports only one call to a grassfire north of town since their last report. They urge everyone to help keep this good record by continuing to use caution as July and August hot weather conditions dry out vegetation.

The department received a \$100.00 donation from Ger-

mania Farm Mutual Insurance Association in appreciation of their service in responding to a fire call, and were commended by the company president for helping keep fire losses to a minimum.

The VFD also received a memorial donation for J.C. Boatright from Maude Collins and Royce Dean Clark.

NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently, there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.
