Pageant tale told for another year

As the Old Timer says, "Now our tale of 'OLE COKE COUNTY' is told for 1985." The eighth annual production of "Ole Coke County - Home of the Rabbit Twisters" traced the history of Coke County from the days of Fort Chadbourne in 1854 to the departure of liquor in the area some 50 years later.

Over 625 persons were in attendance for the final performances to see the 90-member cast pay tribute to the colorful history of the County of Coke, U.S.A. on Friday and Saturday evenings.

Mountain Creek Amphitheatre with its backdrop of natural flora, and colorful tepees in the far background is a natural setting for the pageant, and made a colorful setting for the Comanche children, squaws, and braves led by Chief Sanaco (Alvin Lara), his squaw Red Feather (Alice Lara), and Chief Yellow Wolf (G.O. Gomez II).

Historical events are based on fact from "A History of Coke County, Home of the Rabbit Twisters" by Jessie Newton Yarbrough. Reliving, as actors, the meeting to form "A County of Our Own" were Chairman David Tolliver Fairley (Kenneth Green); John McCabe (Fred McCabe, Jr.); Joe B. McCutchen (T.C. McCutchen); Miller Bird (Nolan Pentecost); Col.

T.L. Odom (Robert Wink); G.E. Perryman (Sterling Lindsey); D.T. Averitt (Richard Johnson & Jerry Horn); Ennis Adams (Jerome Hanna); W. Frank Buchanan (Ben Boykin); T.A. Collier (Lonnie Bloodworth); Tad Richards (Greg Fleming); and W.T. Caraway (Glen Skelton).

"To run the rummies out of Coke County" Carrie A. Nation was "borrowed". Carrie never really came to Bronte, but she could have and she "fit in" to lead the county's temperance women!

A very large group with Silver roots was in attendance Saturday night to see and hear the facts of history on Silver. "The Mountains of Silver" was written by Johnny Millican.

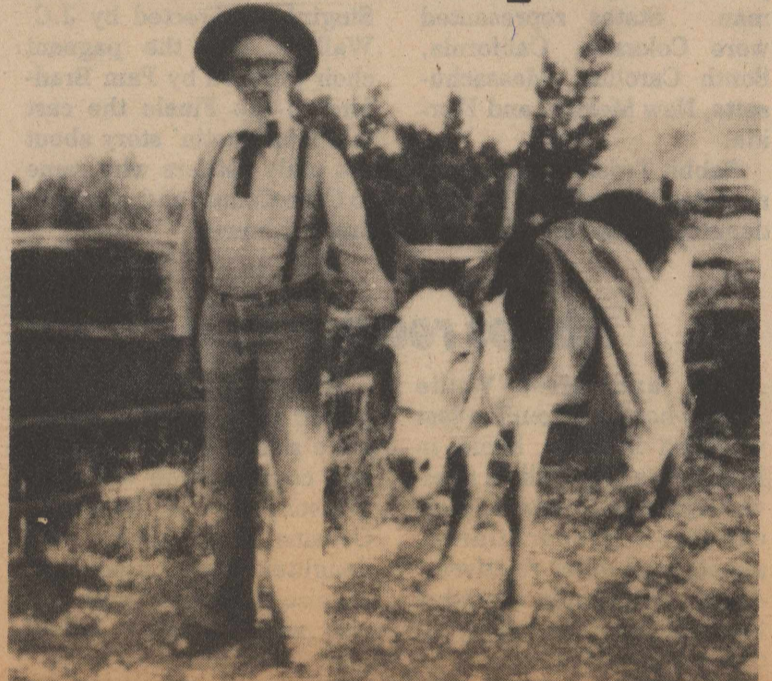

Doug Tounget awarded \$8,000 Houston Livestock Show college scholarship

Douglas Wayne Tounget, an outstanding Bronte FFA member, received a four-year, \$8,000 college scholarship July 11, 1985 from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Doug, son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Tounget (Rt. 2, Box 33, Bronte), was an active FFA member and vocational agriculture student for four years. He served as district sentinel, chapter president and as a member of the senior chapter conducting, meat judging and livestock judging teams. He holds the Lone Star Farmer degree and received awards in swine production, swine showmanship and diversified livestock production.

Doug ranked second in his graduating class from Bronte High School. He was president of the student council and co-captain of both the basketball and football teams. He was selected "most likely to succeed" and "outstanding male student."

Doug, who plans to major in animal science at Texas A & M University, was one of 50 recipients of Houston

Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarships presented at the Texas State FFA Convention. The Show also presented 50 four-year, \$8,000 scholarships to 4-H members during the State 4-H Round-Up in June.

Doug becomes a part of the largest agricultural scholarship program in the United States. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is the nation's largest donor of agricultural scholarships. During the coming school year, 469 students in Texas colleges and universities will receive assistance through the annual program alone. This represents a commitment in excess of \$2 million.

The winners of Show scholarships are carefully selected from hundreds of applicants and are the best in Texas from the standpoints of leadership and academics. Winners must major in some form of agriculture at a Texas college or university.

"These scholarships represent a most important investment in the future," said Show President Joseph T. Ainsworth, M.D. "We're

proud of our continuing commitment to outstanding students like Doug, an outstanding FFA member ready to face the challenges of tomorrow with a solid education."

Ainsworth noted that the scholarship program is made possible through funding generated from the proceeds of the Show, an outstanding charity that is also an exceptional entertainment event.

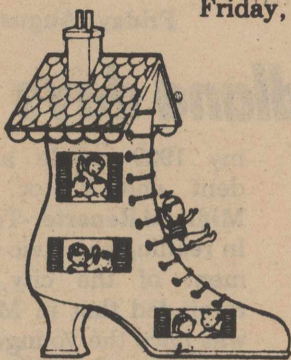

on the house

A study conducted this year by the U.S. Public Health Service has provided more evidence suggesting an association between aspirin and Reye syndrome.

Reye syndrome is an acute condition that may develop in children from infancy to the late teens who are re-

covering from a viral illness such as flu or chicken pox. It requires immediate diagnosis and hospital care. The condition is rare, but life threatening. There were 190 known cases in the year ending November 1984 and a 26% fatality rate.

The study involved 29 children and teenagers who

developed Reye syndrome and 143 who did not develop it following the flu or chicken pox. It showed that 96% of the children who developed Reye syndrome had recently taken or been given aspirin. Fewer than half of the control group had taken aspirin during their illness.

It's especially significant that older children and teenagers as well as young children developed the condition. Fifty percent of the victims were over ten years old and 15 percent were 15 or over.

Parents should be alert to the symptoms of Reye syndrome and consult a physician before giving aspirin or aspirin-containing products to a child or teenager who has flu or chicken pox. Older teenagers, who often give themselves medications, also need to be alerted to this potential danger.

Manufacturers have agreed to add a warning to their labels concerning the possible association between the use of aspirin and Reye syndrome. Also as a result of the study, the Public Health Service has launched a full-scale research project.

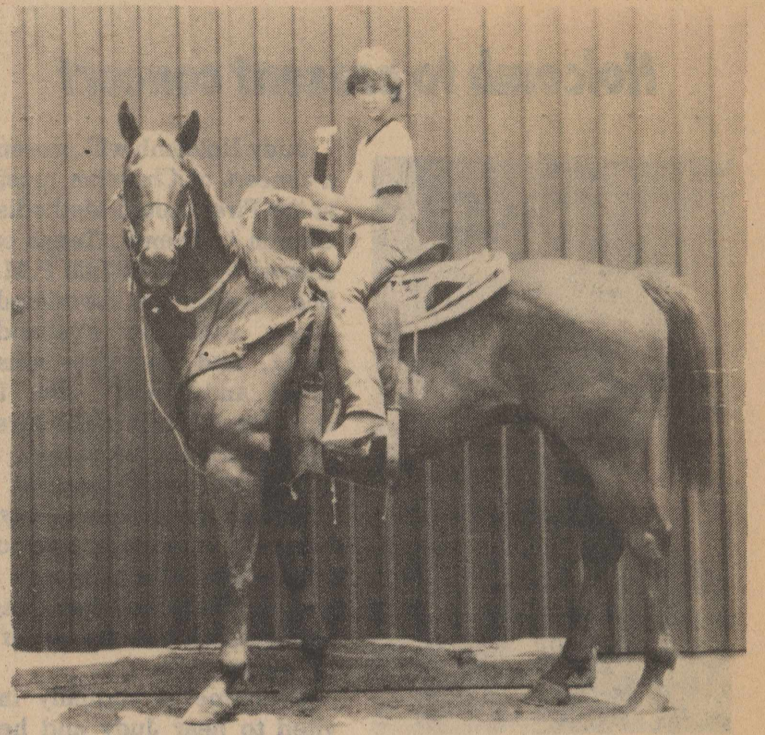

It's been raining enough to keep the fields and pas- tures green but these rains just don't run water that will put any water in the lake. As

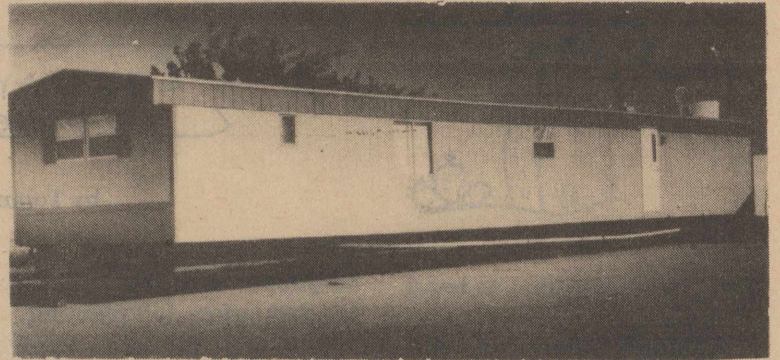
a result, the level has been dropping the past few weeks but is still in good shape for this time of year. We were not able to get the official reading but the level appears to be about 10 feet below spillway.

Fall Gardening time at hand

Although there is still plenty of hot weather ahead, it's time to start getting things in shape for your fall vegetable garden.

Much of Texas is well suited for year-round gardening, and fall vegetables generally have better quality and flavor than those grown in the spring.

Many popular warm-season vegetables such as tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, pole beans, potatoes, okra, cucumbers and squash can be planted during the coming weeks.

Also, the so-called "winter" vegetables such as broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, greens, parsley and carrots can be planted now for early harvesting. Later plantings of these cold-hardy crops will supply fresh vegetables well into winter.

What are some of the important aspects of fall gardening?

First of all, get the land into good shape. If you had a garden this spring and fertilizer was applied, little if any

additional fertilizer will be needed before fall planting.

For new gardens, apply two to three pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 10-20-10 per 100 square feet and work it into the soil. If plants make slow growth, apply a light amount of fertilizer between rows and water it into the soil.

Adequate water is vital for a successful fall garden, particularly for seed germination and early plant growth. It is suggested to pre-irrigate before planting followed by subsequent, light waterings three or four times a week to keep soil from drying and crusting. Water stress during early growth of plants can reduce later yields.

Transplanting is a good practice in the fall since this allows seed to be started in areas sheltered from high temperatures and drying winds. Check at garden centers for recommended varieties of vegetables and strong, vigorous, healthy plants. Or you may want to grow your own transplants. Fertilize for Fall Pastures, Hay

Producers needing additional pasture and hay this fall should make plans for fertilizing. Fertilizer—especially nitrogen—improves hay quality.

In addition to improving the protein content, nitrogen improves the efficiency of rainfall. This means that three to four times as much forage can be grown on the same area when adequately fertilized as when no fertilizer is applied.

Potassium deficiency is becoming widespread on many sandy soils. Potassium is essential for developing strong, healthy root systems. So it's important to get soil tested and to apply potash and other nutrients for fall growth.

A interesting program on "Guttersnipes" was presented by Postmistress Lewis. She also gave a preview of new issues during the months of July and August.

The remainder of the time was spent in reviewing and purchasing stamps available for sale.

Gerald Allen, prominent Robert Lee businessman and rancher, was taken ill at his home on Friday evening, July 19. Taken to West Coke County Hospital, he was transferred the following week to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo.

Preventive Measures Keep Pecans Healthy

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Pecans may be beautiful trees, but they have one very bad characteristic: they're very susceptible to diseases. To have a healthy pecan tree, and a bountiful harvest, you must watch for symptoms of the following diseases and take quick action to control them.

Pecan Scab—This fungal disease attacks leaves, stems and nuts. Infected nuts develop lesions that are dark brown or black and range in size from that of a pinhead to that of a match head. If infected with pecan scab in early summer, the nuts will drop prematurely. Infections that occur later in the summer will cause the pecans that form to be of poor quality. If the disease is too severe, it will cause leaves to drop to the ground. Pecan scab can be controlled with fungicides labeled for use on pecans and used as directed.

Powdery Mildew—Infected nuts

develop a white powdery covering. The disease is most common in July and August and attacks the outer cells of the pecan shuck. Fungicides provide some control, but it's best to plant varieties of pecans that are resistant to powdery mildew.



Leafspots—Many types of leafspots occur on pecans and can cause premature defoliation. They usually are controlled with the same fungicides used for pecan scab.

Hypoxyton Canker—One of the

major causes of tree death, hypoxyton canker is identified by signs of die-back and the formation of black cankers on the main scaffold and trunk of the tree. This disease usually attacks trees suffering from moisture stress and usually can be prevented through good cultural care.

Kernel Decay—Caused by several different bacteria, kernel decay can be partially controlled with fungicides. This condition usually develops if the pecans are allowed to lay on wet grass after falling or if they're not properly stored. Dry pecans after harvest and keep in a well-ventilated area.
