

New lab provides latest technology

Coke County residents are scheduled to benefit from more of the latest advances in health care, according to Dr. Tharwat Hamamcy, and Dr. Terry Pulse, Coke County physicians.

The most recent technology available to residents is access to the new \$1.5 million mobile diagnostic scanner, which is designed to serve smaller hospitals, and will be headquartered at Big Spring, Texas, and available on an at-once basis to Coke County residents.

The purpose of the equipment on the mobile unit is to make computerized scans for all organs of the body. The scans are able to detect very small tumors or cysts in any organ or lymph nodes, and the unit also possesses the capability to detect aneurisms and any other abnormalities in the body.

According to Dr. Hamamcy (Dr. Ham), in a telephone interview on Tuesday, "the mobile unit will offer Coke County residents the latest and most advanced technology available in the field of medicine, and the cost for the use of these facilities will be cheaper and much more convenient than sending the patient to San Angelo."

Three county residents have already had tests made, using the mobile facility, and more are scheduled for next week. One of the most desireable characteristics of the mobile scanning device, according to Dr. Ham, is that the results of these tests are available at once, and any recommendations for treatment, if needed, are expedited, due to the immediacy of the test results.

Concerning the cost of the mobile scanning service, Dr. Ham indicated that the use of these facilities would be much cheaper and more convenient than sending the patient to San Angelo for the same tests. He also stated that the hospital would pay the company who operates the mobile scanner, and would in turn collect for the tests performed by the mobile unit from the patient, his insurance company, or Medicare.

met with commissioners and suggested that a full time trapper be employed. No action was taken.





It will be administered through the ASC office. Technical assistance in planning and application will be furnished by the SCS. Barney Jefferson discussed results of the last legislative session, results of the last West Texas Association meeting, and other items of interest to conservation districts. The board made a request for additional matching funds, which will help with the operation of the district. If conditions are favorable, the district will sponsor a field tour to view results of prickly pear control with picloram. About 3000 acres have been treated in Coke County with picloram in the mixture this year. If there are any favorable results from the spraying, a tour will probably be held sometime in October or November.




