Terry Ross, 24, died instantly in a one-vehicle accident inside the Robert Lee city limits Saturday night shortly after 10 p.m. The wreck occurred at the intersection of 2nd Street and Highway 158, just north of the Colorado River bridge.

Ross was the sole occupant of his 1985 Ford pickup which angled to the right after crossing the bridge, left the pavement in a straight line and clipped off a gas meter riser and two carport supports, before snapping off a large tree. The vehicle carried the tree across 2nd Street and came to rest short of Big State Oilfield Service's storage yard.

The crushed pickup cab, sandwiched by the force of the front-end crash and a large butane tank in the bed, pinned Ross inside for over an hour. The Jaws of Life from the San Angelo Fire Department was used to free him.

He was pronounced dead at the scene by Coke County Justice of the Peace Cova Sparks.

According to a family spokesman, Ross had left Robert Lee immediately after work on Saturday afternoon to return his two small daughters to Midland where they reside with their mother.

He was an employee of Koch Oil Company and a lifelong resident of Robert Lee.

The accident was investigated by Texas Highway Dept. Trooper Roy Blair of Robert Lee, assisted by the Coke County Sheriff's Department.

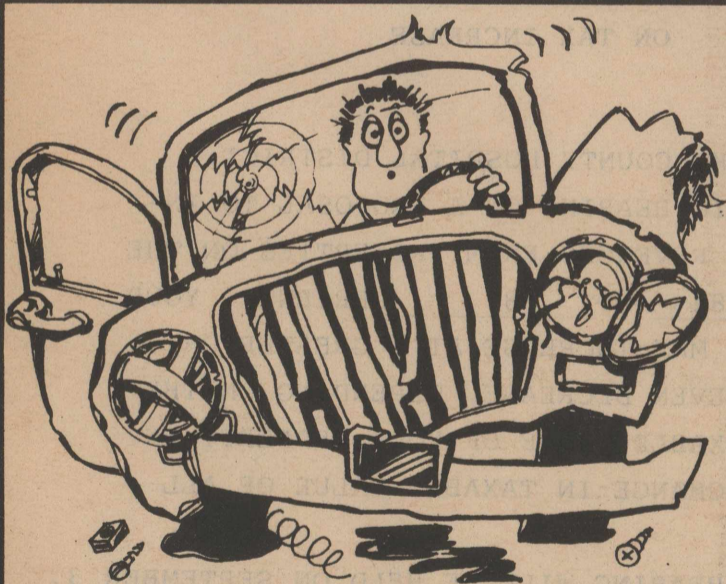

## Selecting school clothes

Most adults know that looking good is an important part of feeling good. But parents sometimes overlook how important feeling well dressed is to children.

Children who have confidence in how they look tend to be more positive in their schoolwork and their relations with classmates. Research studies also show that teachers believe school-age children with an attractive appearance are more intelligent and do better in school.

Parents can help children have that extra bit of confidence by planning school clothes carefully. The basic element in selecting school clothes is that they should be attractive, comfortable and safe. But beyond that is an enormous range for choice -- a choice to be made with the child's input.

Here are some suggestions on how to make shopping trips for clothes a success.

First make a money plan. Know how much you have to spend on clothes for everyone before you begin buying. The greatest amount of money spent on childrens' clothing usually goes for a back-to-school wardrobe.

Have a closet check at the beginning of each season. Decide what is usable, stylish, still fits, and in good repair. Agree on what to buy and when, since you don't need to have everything at once. School-age children grow fast, so purchase only a few things at the beginning of the school year to avoid outgrowing garments.

Buy clothes that fit according to your child's size, not by age. Most manufacturers base sizes on weight and height so if you can't shop with the child, take actual measurements along. Since sizes may vary by manufacturer, it's best to have the child try on the clothes.

Check for quality and safe-

ty. Look for straight seams, check buttons, zippers, belts, ties and pockets, for strength, finishing and ease of handling. Select fabrics that are sturdy but comfortable, colorfast and have easy-care requirements.

Always read labels before you buy. Permanent labels give you details for laundering. Hanging tags often carry additional information on fabric properties.

mit a soil sample now and request fertilizer recommendations for all cropping alternatives. Resulting fertilizer recommendations then can be used to assist each person in making cropping decisions.

The Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratories at Texas A & M University and Lubbock are ready to assist wheat producers in making these economically important decisions. Although new automated laboratory procedures and computerized integration and reporting of soil test results have improved speed and precision, soil test recommendations can be no better than the quality of the soil sample analyzed.

Therefore, it is important to collect soil samples which

are truly representative of the field being tested.

A composite soil sample should be collected from each field or area or a field to be tested. Each composite sample should consist of 10 to 15 subsamples randomly collected with a probe or shovel and thoroughly mixed together before taking the composite sample. To sample the soil, remove the top inch and collect the soil samples to a depth of six inches. Soil sample bags and detailed instructions for sample collection can be obtained in the County Extension Office.

## Bird recalls war

**Editors Note:** Ulmer Bird of Sanco, a chaplain during World War II, recalls a chance meeting with another Coke County soldier, Harless Puett.

At Nuremburg, Germany in 1945 I was with the 565th AAA AW Bn which was ending its part of the war. I had gone to see after the problem of some soldier. As I sat in my jeep looking over the famous Hitler amphitheater, a soldier in uniform walked up to me and asked if there was an Army eating place anywhere. "There surely is on the other side of the theater. Get in this jeep and we'll drive around to it." He went with me in the jeep around to an Army chow place. After we sat down, a register was passed to us to sign. The Army outfits were issued rations in proportion to the number of people they fed. My newly found friend was looking down at the

register to sign it. Suddenly he looked up at me in a surprised manner and said, "Are you Ulmer Bird?" "I am," I said. "That's me." "I'm Harless Puett." I said, "Of Coke County, Texas!" You can imagine we stopped the war for awhile while we talked about home and homefolks.

One of the hardest battles of the war had just been fought. Busted up trucks, other vehicles and weapons at the Nazi amphitheater were being processed.

I believe Harless said his unit had been moving on up to the front. They had been moving on with the battle and had naturally left some baggage and equipment behind that they had never used, or finished with. He had charge of accounting for the stuff that remained on the battle field somewhere around there.
