Committee plans museum opening

Coke County Historical Committee met at the Court House this week for its regular "4:00 P.M. third Monday" session with ten of its twenty-eight appointed members present. Chief items of business related to the group's chief goal: GETTING THE COKE COUNTY MUSEUM OPEN AS A SESQUICENTENNIEL PROJECT!

Since the officers of the Committee have served two years, the chairman called for nominations for new officers. Committee members felt that the officers had worked so successfully at keeping the organization alive, that they should keep their jobs during the sesquicentenniel year, thereby receiving the honor inherent at this historical time in Texas history. The following officers agreed to serve again: Brenda Hines, Chairman; Pat Martindale, Secretary; Bobbie Allen, Treasurer.

Needs for the museum were discussed, and the public is hereby asked to lend or donate the following items: for kitchen and dining area, plain table and chairs as used by early settlers; for bed room, chest of drawers and rocking chair; also heirloom clothes, and other appropriate items for household and outdoor use.

Items recently received typewriters, clothes, a very old metal GOOD YEAR ad from the early COKE MOTOR building, and a large poster on which "FORT CHADBOURNE LAND AND TOWNSITE CO. of Fort Worth' advertise residential and business lots for \$100 in the proposed townsite of Fort Chadbourne, terms being \$15 down, and \$10 per month. Claims are that the wonderful "Kickapoo Mineral Wells Addition is a profitable place for investment, and an ideal health resort," making Fort Chadbourne a more inviting place for building a city of 5,000 population." (If any reader has more information on that enterprise with dates, et cetera, please contact Lucile Bryan or some other member of the Committee.)

The public is invited to send memorials to Coke County Museum in care of Pat Martindale, City Hall, Bronte; or Bobbie Allen, Robert Lee State Bank, Robert Lee. Appropriate cards of recognition will be mailed to donors.

Other needs for the museum are clearing the grounds of weeds, removing the name, "Library," from the sign on the jail, ridding the attic of squirrels, and replacing articles in show cases since they have been cleaned and new identification cards prepared.

A long-standing plan of Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, life member of the Committee, is the display of farm and ranch equipment to be housed in the fenced-in back yard of the museum. Miss Jessie visualized a shed built to protect the equipment. Perhaps someone reading this may feel moved to lead a drive to bring her dream to reality.

Other members attending Monday's meeting beside the officers named were Judge Aubrey Denman, Cynthia Turner, Jim and Reba Tabor, Marie Arrott, Bobbie and Jeffie Roberts, and Lucille Bryan, who was appointed reporter.

Coke County Commissioners annually appoint representatives from each precinct who agree to serve one year on the Historical Committee, and the Commissioners are members as well. The public is invited to attend the meetings at 4:00 P.M., third Mondays, at the Court House or at the Museum if it is a "work day."

More workers are needed to prepare the museum for opening, and for serving as hosts and hostesses to visitors. A schedule of days and hours for visitation will be published as soon as feasible.

Judge proclaims Farm Safety week

County Judge Aubrey Denman has proclaimed September 15-21, 1985, as Farm And Ranch Safety Week in Coke County, at the request of Billy Johnston, Coke County Farm Bureau president. This year marks the 42nd annual observance of National Farm Safety Week, co-sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This years' theme, "Health + Safety = \$UCCE\$\$'' reaffirms the need to further reduce the number and severity of accidental injuries and workrelated illness which are extremely costly to farmers and ranchers.

In the proclamation, Judge Aubrey Denman said, "I urge every man and woman engaged in farming/ranching or its related services; especially those training inexperienced or young workers -- to establish safety procedures and instill

dedication and commitment to safety and health care in all those who can be influenced by their good examples."

Coke County Farm Bureau President Billy Johnston said, "We wish to emphasize this year's Farm Safety Week theme - Health + Safety = \$UCCE\$\$ -- because successful farmers and ranchers concerned about the economic health of their

enterprises could not bear an added burden of loss that would result from a serious accident or illness. Employing appropriate safety and health measures could help them avoid such losses and enhance their chances of financial success."

County Postmasters attend convention

Ms. Coe Lewis of Robert Lee. Mr. and Mrs. Noah Pruitt, Jr. of Bronte and Mr. and Mrs. Therell Burwick of Blackwell attended the 81st Annual Convention of the National Association of Postmasters of the United States (NAPUS) held September 9 through 12 at Las Vegas, NV. The Postmasters said the city that boasts of sun and fun was also a city of work and training for more than 5.000 Postmasters who attended.

The Private Express Statutes which allows the Postal Service to deliver a first-class letter anywhere in the United States for the same cost, and the threat of closing small Post Offices were among the important issues discussed during the four day meeting held at the Las Vegas Hilton.

Costin, Jr., Lynn, MA, said that postage rates could jump as high as \$1.50 a letter "or more" if Congress passes bills to allow private businesses to deliver the first class mail. The Postal Service would have to raise the rates to break even and continue delivery in rural areas while the private businesses would deliver only to the profitable areas such as the large

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

The Steers can't move so they punt to the S. 10. Then on a pass attempt, Loraine is tackled in the end zone by Sanchez for a safety and the score is now 11 to 0. Loraine kicks off to the S 32 on the free kick rule and the Steers return to the L. 42. The Steers put on a drive, driving to the L. 4 only to let the clock run out for half time.

3rd Q.

The Steers receive at the 20 with a return to the S. 36. Then with a 4-1st down drive, Garringer scores from the 3. Skipworth kicks the extra and it is 18 to 0. The Steers kick off with L. returning to their 13. The Steers hold and they punt to their 40 with a return to the L. 33. The Steers make a quick 1st at the 6 yd. line on a pass, Robert Runnion to Wes Hood. Then Garringer scores again. Skipworth kicks the extra point and it is 25 to 0. The Steers kick off and Loraine runs 3 plays as the 3rd quarter ends.

4th Quarter
The Steers hold Loraine
and they punt to the S. 20
with a return to the S. 32.

Then Loraine holds and the Steers punt to the L. 20. Steve Ebenstein then intercepts a pass and the Steers have it again. But the Steers then fumble and Loraine recovered at their 36. Then after a swap of 4th down tries the Bulldogs get the ball at their 30 yd. line. They get on the scoreboard real quick on 2nd down as their

main running threat breaks through the middle and goes 70 yds for their lone TD with 2 minutes left in the ball game. They kick off to the Steers and they make a 1st and run out the clock.

The bad part of this game is that the Steers have probably lost Kevin Johnson for the rest of the season due to a knee injury.

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

After a nice Bearkat punt the Longhorns found their second possession beginning at the nine yard line. Bronte pushed the ball out to their 35 yard line in seven plays with Corby Kelso carrying twice for 14 yards, Duff Kelso carried the ball three times for 10 yards and Stephen Lee made one try for 2 yards. In the meantime the quarter ended.

Garden City only kept the ball three plays before punting. Conda Richards joined the list of Longhorn tacklers on this series. Todd Brooks returned the punt 13 yards for good field position at the Bronte 47 yard line.

Bronte recorded its second scoring drive with 4:40 left on the clock, after an 11-play drive. This drive included a combination of running and passing plays. Corby Kelso carried the ball 3 times for 23 yards, Duff Kelso had one carry for 3 yards, Pete

Over 30% of the American population is overweight. Twice as many women as men have a weight problem. As a result, one in every four women wears a size 16 or larger dress.

Some people choose to change their physical appearance through diet and exercise, while others accept their body size and try to improve their dress. Most men and women want clothes that are attractive, comfortable and reasonably priced. They don't want clothing that makes them look larger or exaggerates their weight problem.

An important part of looking your best is good fit. A good fitting garment is one which fits the body with sufficient room to be comfortable when sitting, bending or reaching. That extra room is generally referred to as "ease."

A good fitting garment is also free of wrinkles at seams and points of strain such as waist, bust, hips, thighs and upper arms. Other critical areas are the neckline and shoulder as they frame the face and will cause the eye to focus there. Garments that are too tight generally give an impression of excess weight.

People may have real or imagined figure faults. For women, these problems are commonly thick waists and/or large hips, bosoms, abdomens or arms. Generally, mens' weight problems are focused at the waistline.

Use clothing as a camoflage by selecting certain design features which can de-emphasize figure faults. Carefully try on garments, viewing yourself from all perspectives to get the best look.

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

CUT FIREWOOD NOW

It's not too early to cut firewood for next winter.

Firewood cut now will be dry by the time cold weather rolls around.

It takes as much as a year for split and stacked firewood to reach an 'air dry' condition. This is when 20 percent of the wood's weight is water. However, four to six months' storage will dry wood enough for use.

It is suggested to stack the wood off the ground, in an open area to allow air circulation. Covering the wood pile to keep off the rain will speed up the drying process.

When cutting firewood, safety should be a primary consideration. A chainsaw is probably the most dangerous piece of equipment most people ever handle. Chainsaws cause more than 30,000 accidents each year, mostly due to operator carelessness.

If buying firewood, be sure you know what you're getting. First, ask if the wood is green or dry. Then, check on the amount and price. Firewood is often advertised for sale by the cord, but the seller usually means 'face' cord.

A cord of wood is a stack 4 feet wide by 4 feet high and 8 feet long. A face cord is a stack 4 feet high and 8 feet long. but the pieces are only 18 to 24 inches long. From the front, or "face," it looks like a cord, but is only one-third to one-half a cord. A pickup load of wood is generally equal to a face cord.

Plan to cut or buy your firewood early, so that it will be ready to burn once the winter season sets in.
