The first major norther triggered good rains for our thirsty West Texas territory. Thunder began to roll after midnight on Saturday with good showers following. Sunday morning lows dipped to 40 degrees with strong winds from the North.

County measurements were generally equal with Robert Lee's official count at 1.30 inches, Bronte had 2.00, and Blackwell gauged 1.75. Coke County neighbors did receive more, however-San Angelo, 2.46; Colorado City, 1.90; Ballinger, 2.36; and Mertzon 3.15.

Traditional Texas weather, famous for sudden changes, ranged from 32 degrees in the Panhandle to the mid-90's in South Texas over the weekend. Amarillo shivered as snow flurries fell for about an hour on Sunday morning. The Midland-Odessa area was shaken by 82 m.p.h. winds Saturday night as the weather system

approached.

The cold front set or broke records to the North for late September. Ten inches of snow fell in Nebraska, Denver, Colorado had more than 8 inches, and Kansas was blanketed by a 4 inch snowfall.

Though residents in the region were glad to see the needed rains, little runoff was noted and most ranchers feel it's "too little, too late". The immediate future looks grim for Coke County ranchers. Pastures are bare and some who have not cut herds to the bone are already feeding every bite livestock get. They say if warm seasonal weather returns for several weeks, some winter grass and weeds might grow.

Area farmers don't expect the weekend rains to hurt their cotton to be harvested in the next few weeks unless a long rainy spell should follow up. The moisture will aid those who are ready to week.

Sheriff attends psyche school

Sheriff Marshall Millican of Coke County Sheriff's Department attended a Psychological Profile School which was conducted at the Department of Public Safety Academy in Austin, Sept. 16-19. The School was sponsored by the Sheriff's Association of Texas.

There were 50 in attendance at the School. The instructor was William T. (Bill) Peters of Albuquerque, N.M. Peters is retired from the FBI where he was a psychological profiler for over 20 years.

Psychological Profiling has been used for many years. Thousands of cases have been thoroughly studied to gain the necessary knowledge to describe the type of individual that leaves a certain type of crime scene. The information has been compiled and put to use to be used in investigations throughout the United States.

The "Psychological Profiling" School, thought to be another way to aid investigators in all types of crimes, is new in the sense that for the first time this information and skills is made available for the use of officers outside of the FBI.


Mrs. Fuller, a former receptionist for Dr. Seale T. Cutbirth, died in the San Angelo Shannon Hospital after a one-year illness.

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





Horns handle the Wildcats

The Bronte Longhorns defeated a robust Water Valley team last Friday night to improve their season record to 3-1 and a district record of 1-0.

The first half of the game was dominated by the defenses of both teams as no score was posted by either team. The Longhorns could get very little yardage running the ball against the big Wildcat line in this half, however; there were several good open field blocks that caused some excitement in the press box. Waylan Ensor made one block that allowed Todd Brooks to return a punt a few yards further upfield. Corby Kelso made two good blocks to allow Stephen Lee more time to throw the ball. Bowie McGinnis made a good block to permit Stephen Lee to gain some yardage around the corner. The majority of yardage was gained through the air with passes from Stephen Lee to Pete Puentez and Mark Adams for gains of 18 yards and 33 yards respectively. Defensively the Longhorns swarmed the ball with Duff Kelso, Corby Kelso, Joel Sanders, Mark Adams, John Morrow, Jeff Lee, Eric Hoffman, Waylan Ensor, Pete Puentez, Johnny Flores all reaching the ball first at least one time. Joel Sanders got an interception off a pass tipped away from the Wildcat receiver by Duff Kelso.

The 2nd half looked much different than the 1st half with Bronte getting its running game untracked. With about 4 min. let in the 3rd quarter, Water Valley was forced to punt. Todd Brooks took the punt and with a good block from Jeff Lee returned the ball 25 yds. to the Wildcat 31 yard line. Stephen Lee gained 14 yds. on the next play following a Corby Kelso block. The next play Stephen Lee went 14 yds. again to the Wildcat 3 yd. line. Corby Kelso punched out two more yards to the one yard line, and Stephen Lee carried the ball in for a score with 2:46 remaining in the quarter. The try for two failed and Bronte led 6-0.

The second Bronte score occurred in the 4th quarter. Corby Kelso picked off a



Water Valley pass and returned it to the Wildcat 35 yd. line. Stephen Lee was sacked for a 7 yd. loss and then threw two incomplete passes. On a 4th down and 17 yds. to go, Pete Puentez (who was doing the punting for Bronte) took the snap and whizzed around the corner for 25 yds. to the W.V. 17 yd. line. The ball was then moved to the 8 yd. line on a face mask penalty. On the next play Pete Puentez rambled over for the TD with 7:33 left in the game. The try for two failed again and Bronte led 12-0.

The Longhorns seemed to relax at this point and allowed W.V. to drive 78 yards in 11 plays for a score with 3:28 remaining in the game. Most of the yardage came on two big pass plays. The Wildcat kick failed and the score was 12-6.

The W.V. onside kick attempt was successful as the Wildcats gained possession at the Horn 37 yd. line. However, the Bronte defense stiffened to preserve the victory.

Defensively the Horns played very well the 2nd half with Bowie McGinnis joining the Horns mentioned in the first half in making many tackles. Also, Corby Kelso hopped on a Wildcat fumble deep in Bronte territory along with Stephen Lee intercepting a third quarter W.V. pass. The hit of the week was a tough selection as there were many solid


