Hunting season to begin Saturday

The "Big Three" - deer, turkey, and quail - fall hunting season will get into full swing this weekend in Coke County. Quail season actually began statewide November 2nd, and will continue through February 23, 1986. Bag limit has been set at 12 birds per day, reflecting the low numbers in most areas. Quail have been slow to bounce back from the last three years of record winter freezes and drought. Ranchers who have sold most of their herds off pastures, and now have sufficient cover and weeds, report seeing good coveys again, but the Coke County bird count is generally down.

Deer archery season ended on November 3rd, with local hunters taking a good number. The gun season for deer opens Saturday, November 9, and closes January 5, 1986, allowing almost an extra week this year. Coke Countians may take 4 deer, either sex, limited to 2 bucks. An antlerless tag from the landowner must be attached to all antlerless deer, in addition to the hunting license tag.

Deer prospects look good for the coming season. Animals are fat, an apparent average fawn crop was produced, although some are still quite small, and horn development is good on the bucks.

Biologist Horace Gore, with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, urges Texas hunters to again harvest over-populated does while body fat is still good. "Last hunting season, hunters took more than 100,000 antlerless deer for the first time, which is good," he said.

The state commission setting bag limits upped the total number of turkeys to be taken this season, indicating their surveys show an abundance of adult birds, with last spring's hatch about average.

The fall turkey season will run concurrently with deer hunting, November 9 - January 5, 1986, with 2 turkeys, either sex allowed. A spring season in Coke County begins April 12 - April 27, and allows 2 gobblers.

Legal shooting hours for all game animals and game birds, except migratory game birds, are one-half hour before sunrise to onehalf hour after sunset.

The 1985-86 Texas Hunting Guide (available free where licenses are sold), states that all hunters 17 years of age or older, while hunting, fishing, or trapping, must have on their person a driver's license or personal identification certificate. Coke County Game Warden Sparks Burdett can clarify any questions hunters might have.





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

Coach Max Anthony praised the Dogies efforts as the squad has played all season against opponents with a big size advantage.





Horns fall flat to Santa Anna

The Bronte Longhorns traveled to Santa Anna last Friday night to face the undefeated Mountaineers in a district 8A west action. The Longhorns looked flat from the hard-fought loss of the week before and fell 27-6 to Santa Anna.

The 1st half was completely dominated by the Mountaineers as Bronte was held to a minus 23 yd. offensively and no 1st downs. However, SA with great field position the entire half could muster but two scores and led 14-0 at the half.

The first SA score came with 8:56 left in the 1st quarter on an 80 yd. drive in 7 plays. The kick was good and SA led 7-0. Santa Anna's second score was set up by a high snap from center on a punt. SA took the ball at the Horn 23 yd. line and drove for a TD in four plays with 11:27 left in the half. The kick was good and the score stood at 14-0.

Bronte's best field position of the half was at the Mountaineers 38 yd. line as a result of a John Morrow fumble recovery. A late half SA drive was also halted by Stephen Lee's interception at the Horn 18 yd. line.

Todd Brooks brought the 2nd half kickoff out to the 29 yd. line where Bronte put the ball in play. Lee connected with Randy Draper for an 8 yd. gain to start the half. Two passes fell incomplete and Bronte was again in a punting situation. Lee took the snap and dashed around end for 9 yds. and the Horns' first, first down. Duff Kelso carried the ball into SA territory gaining 6 yds. in 2 carries. A knocked down pass attempt forced Bronte to punt.

SA took over at their own 22 yd. line. The Mountaineers were unable to move the ball and had to punt.

The Horns took over at their own 41 yd. line. Jeff

Lee picked up a couple of yards to the 43 yd. line. On the next play, Lee dropped back to pass and connected with Pete Puentez for a 57 yd. scoring strike with 6:22 left in the third stanza. The try for two points failed and Bronte was back in the game trailing 14-6.

SA struck back quick scoring on a 75 yd. scamper with 6:04 left in the quarter. The kick was no good and the score was 20-6.

The Horns appear to be untracked on offense as they drove to mid-field in four plays with a pass from Lee to Puentez, and three carries for 16 yds. from Duff Kelso. The Mountaineers then stiffened and Bronte had to punt.

SA scored the games final TD with 6:44 remaining on a drive covering 28 yds. in 7 plays. The kick was good and SA led 27-6 to the end of the game.

The bright spots for the Horns were scarce, but give some encouragement going into the season finale. Lee completed three passes to Pete Puentez for 94 yds. and one to Randy Draper for 8 yds. Defensively, it was good to welcome back Kerry Lee in the 2nd half. Kerry was in on every tackle, but three while he was in the game. (Kerry had taken a two month leave of absence since the first game due to injuries). This week's hit of the week goes to Mark Adams, who hit the SA quarterback as he was throwing the ball on the same play S. Lee intercepted. Other fine hits were recorded by Pete Puentez and Michael Teel on the special teams, and Kerry Lee on the defense.

This year's final game will be played in Bronte, versus Robert Lee. Come out to see the battle for Coke County supremacy. The game will start at 7:30 Friday night.



Letter To The Editor

The following editorial by Robert Lee Mayor Robert Vaughan, was sent to the Abilene Reporter News, the San Angelo Standard-Times, and the Observer/Enterprise.

"Taxes" is a terrible word. Even the good book speaks poorly of the tax collectors in Jesus' time. Yet from recorded time when two or more families settled at a water hole or trail crossing, the time came when it was necessary to repair some facility that everyone used. They all chipped in with work or money. This was taxes in its purest form.

We have refined this process now and those of us who have worked on budgets for city, county, school, and other taxing bodies remember the agonizing hours of trying to bring the needs of our community equal to the money or taxes available. Thank God for a country where we have freedom of

choice in meeting our needs with a minimum and just amount of taxes.

For sometime now we have gone to the bank and borrowed a heck of a lot of money. We have lived high on the hog, extra cars, moved to a better house, boats, camping trailers, and even cabins on a lake. We have never had it so good. Oddly enough, nothing has ever been said about paying on our note. We have had a good dance, maybe it is just time we start paying the fiddler. But How?

In the State of Texas it is permissable for a city to collect a penny tax on each dollar of sales of restricted items. This little penny amounts to almost a billion dollars each year for the cities collecting this tax. Solution:

A national sales tax of one little penny on each dollar of an item used, consumed, eaten, or looked at. If XYZ Company, who has sales into

the billions and has figured out how not to pay any income tax, buys a broom or a gallon of floor sweep, or a huge stamping machine to manufacture a product, they pay the tax. The only exception would be the raw materials purchased necessary to manufacture an automobile or a link of sausage, or whatever. Then, the Consumer pays the tax.

Now the secret of this is to take all pennies collected to Washington and give them to the head bookkeeper and tell him to apply it to our note (National Debt). We don't want this money to go to manufacture left handed shot guns or a study of the sex life of the Egyptian Salamander or any other wonderful thing. Just pay it on our note. If he doesn't know how we have a couple of bankers that can sure tell him how, at least they are always calling us and saying, "Why don't you bring some money over and let us put it on your note?".

This is called upside down economics. Our note is up,

our payments are down. A big hunk of our tax money goes to pay interest on our note. Could be if the note is reduced the interest will be less and maybe some day our income tax less. Makes sen-

No exceptions, no fast tax write-off, no weird tax shelter, no depreciation, just plain, simple one penny for each item eaten, consumed, used, or looked at. Poor Uncle Bud on a fixed income. He buys a \$10.00 prescription at the drug store, he pays 10c on his part of the note (National Debt). The same with food.

If we do this then we should write the folks we sent to Washington to look after our business and tell them we took in washing, slaved over a hot stove to get this money to pay on our note and we would take a dim view of their increasing the amount of our note.

If you are not in favor of paying on our note (National Debt) then call in your children, sit them down and

tell them you are spending more than you have coming in and each week you are going to the bank and borrowing more money and signing their name to the note, and that you don't really care what happens to them. That will let them know how much you care for them and their future.



The American Cancer Society announced today that former Dallas Cowboys quarterback Roger Staubach will call signals on the finer points of quitting cigarettes as honorary chairman of the 1985 Great American Smokeout in Texas.

Recently named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the star quarterback will salute the good-natured spirit of the Smokeout and encourage fellow Texans who smoke to quit for the day -- November 21 -- to prove to themselves they can.

The annual Smokeout, now in its ninth year, is sponsored by ACS volunteers nationwide as a fun and supportive celebration to help smokers give up the habit for just one day.

A survey by the Gallup organization last year indicated that more than 20 million smokers tried to quit, the highest participation in the Smokeout's history. The same survey showed that 3.1 million smokers were still not smoking one to five days later.

"I've never been one for quitting anything" says Staubach. "But quitting cigarettes for one day might be the best thing you can do for your health. It's a chance to join a proven winning team."

According to Texas ACS volunteers planning the event, Staubach's participation should help in reaching one of the event's indirect audiences -- Texas' youth.

"Roger Staubach is a hero to many young Texans and if his support might deter some would-be smoker, so

much the better," said Russell Autry of El Paso, who is the volunteer spearheading the campaign in Texas.

As for the smokers choosing to brave the "cold turkey" day, Autry says the ACS has a number of support materials -- including survival kits and a new booklet, "How to Stay Quit Over the Holiday".

"This one came about because smokers from previous years told us they needed extra guidance and support through the hectic holiday season," said Autry. "Although some remained quit, others needed the reinforcement. This should help if coupled with support and encouragement from family and friends."

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

Beware The Bank Examiner Scam

Elderly people are often the victims of consumer fraud. Sometimes the fraud is perpetrated by persons pretending to be officials of some sort, such as police officers or bank examiners. In the case of 'bank examiner frauds,' the victim receives a phone call from someone who says he is investigating a possibly dishonest teller at the victim's bank.

How The Scam Works

The Caller convinces the victim that he or she should go to the bank and withdraw a large amount of money from the allegedly dishonest teller. After the victim has withdrawn the money, he or she may be asked to read off the serial numbers on the bills to the phony bank examiner. The the con man, posing as the examiner or as a police officer, will arrive and ask for the victim's cash. The con man says the money is needed as evidence against the teller.

Once the victim has given his or her money to the 'officer' or the 'bank examiner,' the money is gone forever in most cases. The people who commit these crimes stay in an area for only a short time and then move on.

Bank Examiners

If you receive a call from anyone claiming to be a bank examiner, ask for the name of the state or federal agency employing that person. In Texas, bank examiners work for the State Banking Department. Federal bank

examiners are employed by three different agencies. However, bank examiners do not investigate the type of employee theft suggested by those engaged in the type of fraud described above. That is left to the FBI. The FBI conducts its own investigations, without the help of citizen depositors. So the chances of receiving a call from a real bank examiner are extremely slim.

What To Do

If you get a call from

someone you suspect is involved in this kind of fraud, ask for his phone number. Then call your local police or district attorney's office to see if they are interested in pursuing the subject.

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
