Hunting season opens with a bang

Coke County hunting season opened over the weekend with a bang, literally. Many rounds of ammo were fired in spite of unseasonably hot temperatures, which threatened to make a less-than-perfect start. No information was available at press time on an estimate of deer killed in the county, but Skinner's Grocery and Station at Robert Lee (the only storage vault in the im-

mediate area), reported losing count at over 100 carcasses in storage over the busy week-end. Only four or five of these were does, with only one spike in the bunch. All others were large, fat bucks with good horns and possibly only a percentage of the number killed in the county. No report on turkey numbers has been turned in.

One big 10 point buck was taken at Tennyson, and a

monster of a buck with over a 23 inch spread was killed northwest of Robert Lee.

The Coke County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Tuesday, November 12, 1985, beginning at 10:00 am. The reason for the Tuesday meeting was due to Veteran's Day falling on Monday, November 11, which would have been their regular meeting date.

Following the Pledge of Allegiance, the minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

A representative of the Trapper's Association met with the Court, to discuss a possible trapper for Coke County.

The Extension Agent's report was approved.

Court approved re-appointment of the County Auditor.

Commissioners employed a consultant from West Texas Consultants, Inc., to assist in the airport runway paving project. Lighting the airstrip was also discussed, with no action being taken.

Only one buck was taken; Donna Wallace scored on her first hunt with a fine 8 point. Hunting was hampered by temperatures in the upper 80's and lush undergrowth in the heavy brush, result of a

recent 13 inch rain in Maverick County. The moisture also brought out South Texas' famous biting flies and mosquitoes, unfazed by repellents, which made for miserable still hunting.

The Davises stated that South Texas is the prettiest they have ever seen it with the sage, lantana, and other brush in full bloom. Deer are fat and heavy-horned but hunting is almost impossible in the thick brush except from high stands.

Hobo Depot opens

Without a brass band or ribbon cutting ceremony, San Angelo opened its newest and only operating depot this past week. The Voyles family of Paint Rock resurrected a metal clad building with railroad tracks in front and back, and stocked it with a trainload of unique gift items.

This unimposing building on the corner of Fourth and Magdalene, has been dubbed 'Hobo Depot', and is only a short distance from the spot where the Santa Fe built its passenger station at Fourth and Chadbourne. No trains will stop at Hobo Depot, but lots of visitors are expected by Ara Burns (nee Voyles), who wears the Chief Engineer's cap.

In keeping with its location and name, the merchandise will include railroad items such as engineer's caps, whistles, belt buckles, bolo ties, and a variety of wooden and metal toy trains. For the non-rail fan, there is an even greater selection. The current Christmas pieces share the spotlight with crystal, china ware, dolls, candles, greeting cards, silk flowers, wreaths, and some choice antiques. Ms. Burns says there will be frequent shifts of inventory emphasis to coincide with the season and special holidays. Particular attention will be given to items related to West Texas. The interior of Hobo Depot is

pure warehouse, but has up-to-date lighting, plumbing, and climate control. The old wooden floor is firm underfoot, a tribute to the craftsmanship of contractor Willie Voyles. Box car red walls show off the merchandise to perfection in the special displays arranged by Creta Voyles.

With the opening of this retail facility, a new chapter is being written in the area that has been a wholesale and warehouse district for the last fifty years. This enterprise is bringing new life to a section of the city that has been long neglected by the general public. Hours of operation are 10:00 am to 6:00 pm Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday.

Team effort takes Steers over Horns

You have got to admit, if you went by statistics, the Steers were not supposed to win this one. But if you go by determination and composure, the Steer took it to them. It was a good hitting ball game and with both sides loaded with youth, it seems the babes from Steer land grew up for this one. The star of the Steers? Pick one and you will be right, for this was a team effort that just hasn't been there in the past. The Steers of next year have something to remember. No pun intended, but I can't wait to read the other write up.

1st QUARTER

The Steers open the ball game with an onside kick to the S.48. It didn't travel far enough so the Longhorns get it at the S.48. Then it started looking bad for the Steers as in just a few plays, Bronte scores with just one minute and one second gone. The extra fails and it is 6 to 0. Bronte kicks off and the Steers can't move the ball so they punt to the Bronte 15 yd. line. Bronte makes 2-1st downs, the Steers hold them and they punt to the S.28. Bronte holds again and the Steers punt to the Bronte 32. Bronte makes a 1st but the Steers hold on downs at the S.46 as the quarter ends.

2nd QUARTER

The Steers made a 1st at the B.35 and then a little razzle-dazzle and Runnion hits Sanchez in the open with a 35 yd. pass and Sanchez trots in for the score. Skipworth kicks the extra and the Steers lead 7 to 6. The Steers kick off to the B.6 with a return to the B.25. The Steers hold on downs on either a misplay by Bronte or a miscue. The Steers get it at the B.19 and quickly Runnion goes to the air again hitting Jason Herring for another TD. The extras fail this time and it is 13 to 6. The Steers kick off again to the B.11 with no return, and hold as Bronte punts to the S.48. The Steers get a 1st at the B.37, but at the 33, a pass is intercepted and Bronte returns it all the way for a TD. They make their 2 pt. try good for the extras and they now lead 14 to 13. Bronte kicks off to the Steer 38 with a return to the 47, Bronte holds and the Steers punt to the B.46. The Steers hold

and Bronte punts to the S.32 as the Steers run out the 1st half clock.

3rd QUARTER

Bronte kicks off to start the 2nd half and R.L. returns to the S.35. The Runnion air express goes to work again as he hits Sanchez in the left flat and he races 65 yds. for another Steer TD. Runnion then passes to Herring for the 2 pt. conversion and the Steers lead again 21 to 14. The Steers kick off to the Bronte 8 with a return to the 29. Bronte goes to the air also on a 71 yd. bomb for a TD of their own. Their extras fail and it is 21 to 20-Steers. Bronte kicks off to the Steer 29 with a return to the S.40. RL makes a 1st at the B.45 and then guess what? Runnion hits Sanchez again for another TD. Skipworth kicks the extra point and it is 28 to 20-Steers. Then it gets quiet for awhile as they exchange the ball, and when RL punts

to the B.7, they try to pass and Skipworth intercepts at the 9 and refrigerators it into the endzone for another TD. He kicks the extra point and it is now 35 to 20, Steers. 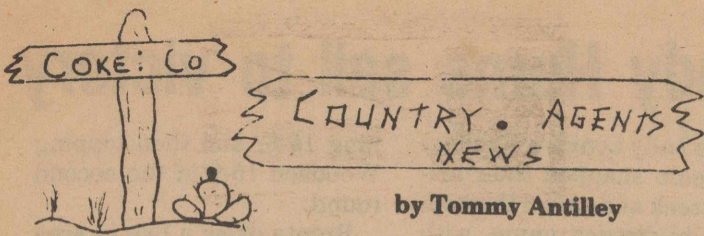
Contributions and labor would be welcomed by the Association from individuals, civic organizations, and clubs, as the work continues.

Frost will be hitting Coke County before long, and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forage.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazing after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes nontoxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10 - 15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock, follow the steps below.

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.

2. Feed animals hay or a supplement before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic material since their intake will be limited.

3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any signs of poisoning.

4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. This product is available from veterinarians.

5. Have suspect plant material checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories at College Station or Amarillo. Local veterinarians will be happy to submit samples for you.

The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period has passed.

COUNTING CALORIES AT THANKSGIVING? - Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Marilyn Haggard also reminds consumers that turkey is a highly nutritious food and can be eaten on a low-calorie diet. A three-ounce serving of turkey breast meat, without the skin contains 157 calories, while a similar serving of dark meat has 187 calories. "For the dieter, it's most important to watch the dressing, gravy and trimmings that go along with the turkey, since they add the greatest share of the calories in a Thanksgiving meal," she says.

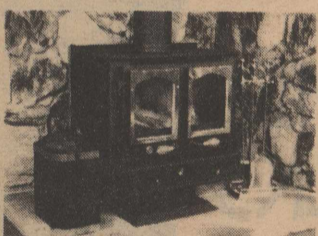

The remainder of the 1st quarter was scoreless with no serious scoring threats. However, as the 2nd quarter began RL was forced to punt at the Horns 48 yd. line, but a roughing-the-punter call was made and the Steers drive continued at Bronte 33 yd. line. Another Bronte penalty moved the ball to the Horns 28. On the next play Charles Sherrill connected with Mike Sanchez for a TD with 11:14 remaining in the half. J.P. Skipworth's PAT kick was good and RL led 7-6.

Bronte was unable to generate a first down after three plays on their next possession and were forced to punt. Stephen Lee attempted to run around end on a fake punt, but Jim Bob Jacobs, pulled him down 16 yds. behind the line of scrimmage and the Steers took over at the Horns 18.

P. Puentez dropped quarterback Sherrill for a two yard loss on 1st down. However, Sherrill connected with Jason Herring for a 20 yd. TD on the next play. J.P. Skipworth's PAT attempt was partially blocked and was no good, so with 9:24 remaining in the half RL led 13-6.

Bronte's next possession started deep in their territory at their 11. The Horns were unable to muster a 1st down and S. Lee punted to the RL 47 yard line.

RL again with good field position, drove to the B.37 yd. line in 3 plays. On 1st down the Steers attempted a pass and K. Lee stepped in front of the intended receiver, intercepted the pass and sprinted 63 yds. to the endzone with 5:44 left in the half. K. Lee added 2 more points to the Horns total on a run for the PAT and Bronte led 14-13.

No other serious scoring threats were made and so the half ended with Bronte leading.

The Longhorns kicked to

the Steers to open the 2nd half. Two plays netted 2 yds. for the Steers. Third down yielded paydirt for the Steers on a 65 yard pass play from Robert Runnion to Sanchez. Runnion hit Herring for a 2 pt. conversion with 11:02 on the clock in the 3rd quarter and RL led again by a score of 21-14.

Bronte struck back quickly. After a 25 yd. kickoff return by Todd Brooks, S. Lee connected with Puentez on a deep pass and he outran the defenders to the endzone with 10:45 left in the 3rd quarter (just 17 seconds after the RL score). Randy Stephens stopped S. Lee on the PAT so RL preserved their lead 21-20.

The Steers obtained good field position from the kickoff at their 39. RL moved very little in 2 plays but a big penalty on Bronte moved the ball to the Horns 45 yd. line. A penalty moved it back to mid-field. Three plays netted 14 yards for the Steer and so on a fourth and one yard to go Runnion passed to Sanchez again for a 36 yd. TD. Skipworth's kick for the PAT was good and with 7:58 in the 3rd quarter RL led 28-20.

A penalty on Bronte set the Horns on their own 6 yd. line after the kickoff. The Horns were unable to move

the ball. On a 3rd down pass attempt Skipworth intercepted and trotted 7 yds. for a TD. Skipworth's kick was good and with 2:30 left in the 3rd quarter the Steers led 35-20.

Brooks took Skipworth's kickoff at th 3 yd. line and raced 56 yds. before being stopped at the Steer's 41. However, a penalty moved the ball back to the Bronte 44. S. Lee dropped back to pass and wound up scrambling 56 yds. for a TD off a good block by Mark Adams. K. Lee was stopped short on the 2 pt. try and with 2:05 left in the game the score was 35-26 RL in the lead.

The remainder of the game was scoreless and the Steers prevailed to remain the Coke County Champs for another year.

Bronte finished district with a 3-4 mark and a 5-5 season record. The Longhorn Seniors are Doug Hoyt, Kerry Lee, and Duff Kelso.
