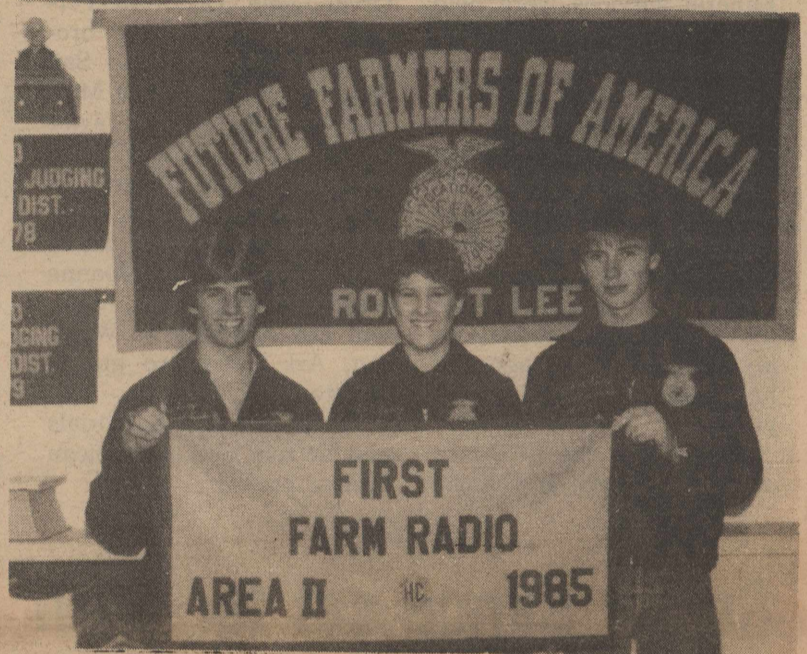
### School tax location changes

### Recipients must be recertified

All citizens of Coke County who are currently receiving Food Commodities (cheese and butter) must recertify to be eligible for the same commodities in fiscal year 1986.

If you are not receiving the commodities and think you might be eligible, come by and make an application and we will check over the guidelines with you.

Recertification day will be Tuesday, Dec. 17, 1985 at the Bronte and Robert Lee Senior Citizens Buildings from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. The Emergency Food Assistance Program - Title II is administered by the Texas Department of Human Resources and specific guidelines must be complied with. You must be a citizen of Coke County to make an application. If you are currently receiving A.F.D.C., Food Stamps, MEDical Assistance only (not Medi-

care), SSI (Supplemental Security Income) you automatically qualify if you bring your card or evidence or proof of your eligibility. You may qualify if you are unemployed. All other individuals must qualify according to income eligibility guidelines. Please be prepared to present documentation (proof) of your income such as check stubs, social security checks

or deposit-slips, 1984 income tax return filed with the Internal Revenue Service, etc.

If you cannot be there send someone authorized to represent you. To be eligible to receive any commodities in 1986 you must recertify.

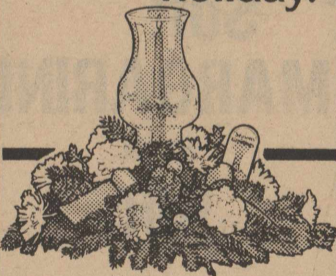

# Fur numbers termed 'unchanged'

Spotlight counts conducted by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists indicate that furbearing animal populations have not changed dramatically from last year in most areas.

The furbearer season in Texas is Dec. 1 - Jan. 31.

The counts, which were conducted along with deer surveys in late summer, revealed that the raccoon continues to be abundant and widely distributed in Texas. Biologist Chris Wheaton said 1,258 raccoons

were seen on 5,097 miles of spotlight lines, and these adaptable animals were seen in every ecological area of the state.

Next in abundance was the familiar striped skunk, with 504 observed on the same lines. Other frequently seen furbearers include the gray fox, opossum and ringtail.

Wheaton said the counts indicate general trends in furbearer populations, rather than densities or numbers. "Many fur-bearing species such as muskrats, mink and weasels are not detected by these techniques" he said.

Wheaton indicated that weather and habitat conditions were probably the main cause for slightly lower numbers of furbearers seen in 1985 versus 1984.

"The drought in 1984 increased visibility of furbearers on our spotlight lines because of less plant growth, and it caused them to be more active in search of food," Wheaton said, indicating the opposite was true this year.

Anyone taking furbearers

is required to have a valid trapper's license. The 1985-86 furbearer regulations guide is available at TPWD offices and hunting license outlets. For further information on regulations, research or management activities, contact Furbearer Program leader, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX 78744.

Pricés for the current furbearer season have been projected as extremely low. Large out-of-state fur buyers are reported to be overloaded with furs from the past two seasons. A #1 raccoon or fox pelt could bring as low as \$17 by mid-season and skunks and possums not worth skinning.

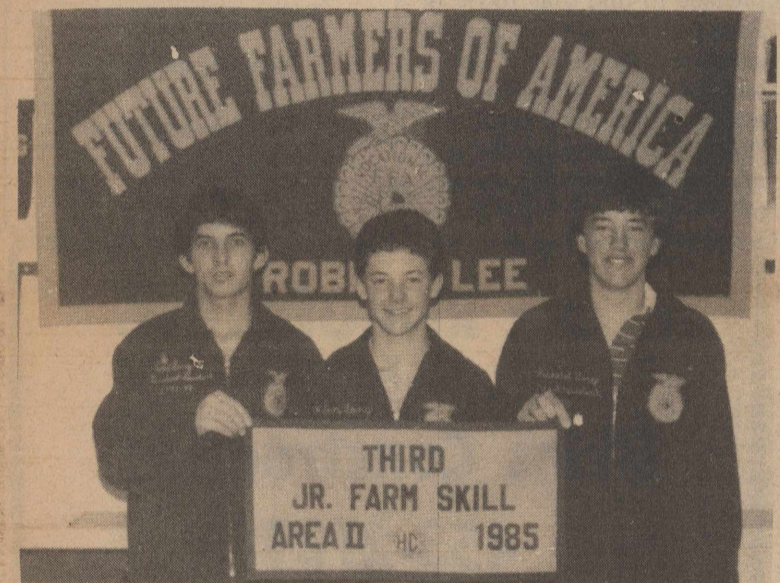

## Sales tax info

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said Christmas shopping can be a double headache for shoppers who are uncertain about taxes on various holiday purchases.

To avoid confusion this holiday season, Bullock has issued guidelines on taxing such items as Christmas trees, gift wrapping services, whole smoked hams or turkeys and gift certificates.

Retailers can buy wrapping material tax-free, but the fee that retailers charge customers to wrap gifts is taxable. When gift wrap is done by someone other than the retailer, the service charge is not taxable. However the gift wrapping service must pay sales tax when buying gift wrap material.

Bullock said the sale of whole smoked turkeys and hams is not taxable unless the seller maintains the meat in a heated state. Charges for custom smoking or cooking a customer's ham or turkeys are not taxable.

As cash registers ring in the busy Christmas season, the telephones of the State Comptroller's office will start ringing with special tax questions on seasonal sales. Bullock said Texans can call toll-free 1-(800)-252-5555 to avoid holiday tax mix-ups.

### Bass interest increases

Introduced smallmouth bass are having increased impact on fishing at several West Texas reservoirs.

Biologist Billy Follis of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said the lakes include Brady, Hords Creek, Oak Creek, E.V. Spence, Twin Buttes, Winters-Elm Creek and New Ballinger. The largest smallmouth reported from the region was a four-pound, one-ounce fish caught at Spence in 1984.

"A recent survey at Brady Lake showed excellent survival and growth rates among the smallmouth fry stocked in 1984," Follis said. The young fish caught in the sampling averaged 10.9 inches long and the largest one weighed almost one pound, he noted.

Follis points out that smallmouths are easily distinguished from large-mouth

bass. They are brownish-bronze in color and have dark vertical bars on their sides. Also, the upper jaw does not extend beyond the eye and the dorsal fin has a very shallow notch.

"Smallmouths prefer cooler water and usually are found deeper than largemouths. They frequently are found near rocky points, riprap of dams, submerged gravel bars and dropoffs, Follis said.

An American naturalist once reported a mockingbird in South Carolina that imitated the songs of 32 different kinds of birds in ten minutes.

## --- Postal Pointers ---

To help you with your last minute shopping and to avoid crowds, the post office

has stamp collecting kits for \$2.50 and \$3.00. These make wonderful gifts for young people and could start them off to a stamp collecting hobby.

We also have 3 sizes of good mailing boxes, 3 sizes padded envelopes and 2

sizes clasp envelopes.

Postmaster Coe Lewis reminds all the children that Santa Claus now has his mail box in the lobby of the post office, so bring your letters in and mail them.

The Robert Lee Stamp Club will host an Open House to display their stamp collections on Sunday, Dec. 29 from 1:00 to 4:00. Everyone is invited to come look and have refreshments with us. See what stamp clubs can do in one short year.

## Caring for trees

This year you don't have to watch your Christmas tree droop and turn brown before the holiday even arrives.

With proper selection and care, you can keep your tree fresh throughout the season, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service forestry specialist.

"Start with the freshest tree you can find," says Alan Dreesen. "A Texas-grown tree you cut yourself at a tree farm or buy off a lot will be fresher than trees shipped from distant states."

The forestry specialist recommends the following steps to keep a fresh-cut tree at its peak:

- Place the tree trunk in a container of water, since a fresh-cut tree will still be growing when it's harvested, and will initially absorb from one-half to one gallon of water a day.

- Store the tree in a shaded area, such as a covered patio or garage.

- Before you take the tree inside for decorating, re-

move the loose interior needles by tapping the tree on the patio or driveway a few times. The interior needles turn brown when they no longer get direct sunlight, and this is not a sign of dryness.

- Cut an inch off the base before placing the tree in a water-holding stand. Then check the water daily for the first week to keep the stand full. Don't let the water level fall below the tree's cut base.

- To prevent premature drying of the needles, place the tree away from heat sources such as warm air ducts, plate glass windows with a southern exposure and space heaters.

"Keeping your tree well-watered and away from heat sources will help the tree keep its needles, shape and fragrance throughout the holiday season," says Dreesen. "A tree which retains some moisture is also less of a fire hazard in your home."

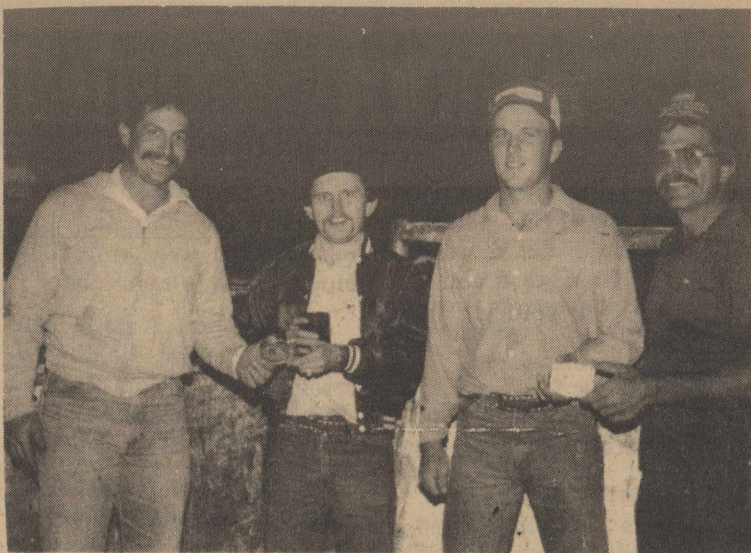

## PREVENT FOOD-BORNE ILLNESS

Unwashed hands or unsanitary cutting boards, food choppers, knives and cooking equipment can contaminate food with bacteria that cause food-borne illness. To keep food-borne illness from spoiling your holiday dinners, Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutrition specialists recommend special care in keeping cooking equipment clean. Any cutting board used for raw meat should be thoroughly washed before other foods are placed on it, advise the specialists. And to keep bacteria from growing in foods, they recommend keeping hot foods above 140 degrees Fahrenheit and cold foods refrigerated below 40 degrees Fahrenheit.

## Gun brings responsibilities

For many young Texans, a shiny new rifle or shotgun will be the highlight of present-opening festivities this Christmas.

A new gun can open the door to a lifetime of outdoor enjoyment, but it brings on a special set of responsibilities for both the new gun owner and his or her parents.

Hunter education officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said one of the best things a parent can do after Christmas is enroll the young hunter in a local hunter safety course.

The department coordinates an education program utilizing certified volunteer instructors, and the 10-hour course is taught periodically in virtually every county in Texas. A \$1 fee is charged to help defray course expenses. Although hunter education programs are not mandatory in Texas, some other states require completion of an accredited course before a nonresident license is issued.

Steve Hall, assistant hunter education coordinator, said parents giving their children guns should set aside time to discuss safety and responsible gun ownership. "They should clearly

define the conditions under which the gun may be handled and fired," Hall said.

After the gun has been unwrapped and whenever it is handled, the handler should keep the muzzle pointed in a safe direction, keep your finger off the trigger, and keep the action open and unloaded. "The often-repeated rule is always valid," Hall added, "that every gun should be treated as if it were loaded."
