Candidates announce on final day

Monday, February 3, was the filing deadline for those seeking political offices in the Texas Democratic Primary on May 3.

Two candidates announced their bid for offices on the final day. Filing for Commissioner of Precinct 4 was James G. Miller. He will face incumbent James Tidwell. Charles Timmons will seek the County Commissioner, Precinct 2 office, now held by Billy Joe Luckett who filed early for re-election.

Mrs. Ettie Hubbard, Coke County clerk, reported that the Democratic Precinct Chairmen in charge of the

upcoming election also filed for places on the ballot. They included Precinct I, Patti Ivey, Royce Fancher #2, Lois Dunklin #3, Lora Belle Brown #4, Willie B. Edimiaston #5, and D.O. King #9.

Week slated Farm Bureau

County Judge Aubrey Denman has signed a proclamation designating February 10-14 as "Farm Bureau Week" in Coke County.

The week is part of a statewide observance during which county Farm Bureaus will make a special effort to enroll new members, according to Robert Brown of Bronte, president of the Coke County Farm Bureau.

John Stephens of Coke County is chairman of the membership committee which is responsible for membership acquisition and maintenance. Other committee members are: Bill Hartman and Robert Gallaway.

"The Texas Farm Bureau, with more than 300,000 member families, is the largest state Farm Bureau in the nation," the proclamation reads.

"Farm Bureau is a grassroots organization and its foundation is the county unit. There are 217 organized county Farm Bureaus in the state including the Coke County Farm Bureau," the proclamation states.

He said that the Farm Bureau is a general farm organization that seeks to improve income and living conditions of farm and ranch families. It represents the farmer and rancher at the local county courthouse, in Austin, and in the nation's capital, Washington, D.C.



Grazing management is essential

by Mike Mecke, Range Conservationist, SCS, USDA

Many Texas ranchers are discovering that more intensive grazing management is becoming essential to their survival. Present agricultural market conditions and the recent drought have combined to drive this point home.

A grazing system consists of two or more pastures which are alternately grazed and rested in a planned sequence; often, forage cropland is included in the plan in order to increase benefits. Although the type of system used may vary a great deal, they all have a common goal of increasing the efficiency and profitability of the operator's resources. Ranchers and stockfarmers alike are looking for sustained high yields, better livestock performance, soil protection and often, wildlife habitat preservation. Leasing for deer and gamebird hunting has become one of the more profitable and stable sources of income to landowners in recent years and few people can afford the luxury of ignoring this

A well designed grazing system should permit range improvement while increasing livestock production. Generally, the more quality forage produced on the ranch, the more economical the cost of livestock production becomes.

Summer temporary pastures such as the various forage sorghums and sudans are especially beneficial as their carrying capacity usually far exceeds that of our native pastures. The use of these crops also allows for the needed resting of rangeland during the growing season which allows the better range plants to increase in vigor, store food reserves in their roots and to reseed themselves.

A number of factors must be taken into consideration when planning a grazing system. The first step is to outline your short and longterm goals and then a good forage inventory is needed. The physical characteristics of the ranch have to be considered, as does the types of livestock produced and your calendar of operations for breeding, selling, etc. Be flexible in your system and keep it simple. Most Southwestern range experts recommend keeping your base herd at 40 to 60 percent of the estimated total carrying capacity and

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supplementing these livestock numbers by using stockers or selling excess forage production during good years. This maintains flexibility and lessens the chance of having to cull deeply into your base breeding herd during all but the worse droughts.

Any operators in Coke

County interested in considering various grazing systems can call the Soil Conservation Service office in Robert Lee to obtain help in

analyzing their present range conditions and for assistance in developing a plan for improving their

Applying dormant oil

Have you given your fruit and nut trees their annual "lube" job? This refers, of course, to an application of dormant oil to control scale

Why control scale insects? The answer is simply to save the tree. If a scale insect such as the San Jose scale or white peach gets started, it could kill your

Dormant oil can be purchased at many different stores where garden supplies are sold. Be sure to follow all label directions and apply the mixture when the temperature is between 4070 degrees F. Do not apply if a freeze is likely within 48 hours after application, and do not apply after the tree has budded out. Dormani oil is applied when the tree is dormant. Spraying flowers and leaves could cause leaf burn and flower drop.

Scale insects are difficult for most people to detect, so dormant oil should be applied once each year. Sooner or later your tree will probably be attacked by scale insects, so be ready by guarding against them with an application of dormant oil.

Hwy 158 upgrade approve

Coke County residents and area motorists who regularly travel Texas 158 at the E.V. Spence Reservoir received an early 1986 highway dividend from the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

The commission approved a contract to upgrade and reconstruct a 5.2-mile section of Texas 158 from 13.6 miles east of the Sterling County line westward. The contract was awarded to West Texas Roads, Inc., who bid \$712,306.31 on the pro-

Gene Hirschfelt, the highway department's public affairs officer at the San Angelo district office, said the work will involve widening the existing 20-foot pavement width to 24 feet and constructing paved 8-foot

shoulders. The project will also improve the grade in some areas, making the angle of the roadway less steep and providing better sight distance for drivers.

Hirschfelt said work could start as early as March. Once under way, the project is scheduled to take 180 working days, weather permit-

The improvements on Texas 158, as well as similar projects throughout the state, were made possible by additional funding provided to the highway department by the State Legislature during a special session in 1984. According to figures released by the Federal Highway Administration, the work on Texas 158 will generate as many as nine construction site jobs in the area.

SOIL INSECT CONTROL IN VEGETABLE GARDENS

As vegetable gardeners in Coke County prepare for spring planting, their first step should be to control soil insects.

Soil insects can reduce vegetable quality and yields if left uncontrolled. For effective control, mix insecticides into the soil at a depth of 4-6 inches at least two weeks before the garden plot is planted.

Among destructive soil insects are wireworms, white grubs, seed corn maggots, cabbage maggots, mole crickets, sowbugs, slugs, snails and cutworms. Some destroy plant seeds, roots, tubers and underground stem parts while others cut off young plants at or near the soil surface.

Most soil insects can be controlled with diazinon 25 percent liquid concentration or Spectracide 6000 applied as a 5 percent granule. Granules usually give the best control. If cutworms or sowbugs become a problem after the garden has been planted, broadcast 5 percent Sevin bait over the soil surface. This bait containing metaldehyde will also control slugs and snails. However, it is not formulated to be mixed into soil.

Garden sites planted for the first time or those previously in grass or weeds are more likely to harbor damaging numbers of soil pests. Before treating with an insecticide, inspect the garden site by taking soil samples at several locations to a depth of 5 to 6 inches. Remove one square foot section of soil from each location and record the number of soil insect pests present. As a general rule, an average of one or more soil insects per sample suggests the need for insecticide treatment.



Heimlich is best for choke victims

More than 3,000 people die from choking in the United State each year. Most choking in adults occurs while they are eating. Meat is the usual culprit. Other foods and objects cause choking, too, especially in young children who, as all parents know, seem to delight in putting all sorts of things into their mouths.

For years medical opinion differed on the best way, or ways, of dislodging an object from the throat of a choking victim. Sharp blows to the back, finger sweeps of the throat and manual thrusts to the chest were methods often recommended. Today, there is universal agreement that these methods can be dangerous and should not be performed. A back slap or a probing finger, for instance, can drive the foreign object even deeper into the throat. The best rescue technique in

any choking situation, doctors now agree, is the Heimlich Manuever.

The "Heimlich Manuever" for rescuing choking victims was devised in the early 1970's by Henry J. Heimlich, M.D., Professor of Advanced Clinical Sciences at Xavier University. Dr. Heimlich's manuever depends for its success on the fact that a choking victim has a large volume of air in his lungs, even if he was exhaling when the choking began. If a rescuer presses sharply and repeatedly on the victim's abdomen at a point between the rib cage and the navel, that reservoir of air is expelled up the airway with a great deal of force, thus dislodging the obstruction from the victim's throat.

As we noted in last month's column, the Heimlich Manuever can be performed on standing or seated victims and on persons who have fallen to the floor. It can be performed on children and even on one's self. When the victim is standing. the rescuer stands behind him and wraps his arms around his waist. He then makes a fist with one hand a places the thumb side of the fist just above the victim's navel and below the tip of the breastbone. He grasps the fist with his other hand and presses it into the victim's abdomen with a quick upward thrust. Several thrusts may be necessary to clear the airway.

The technique for the seated victim differs only in that the rescuer kneels behind the chair and wraps his arms around both chair and victim (unless the chair back is too large, in which case he turns the victim and performs the Manuever from the side).

The victim who has collapsed to the floor is rolled onto his back, face up. The rescuer straddles the victim and places his hands, one on top of the other, on the victim's abdomen, with the heel of the bottom hand slightly above the navel. He then presses into the abdomen

with a quick upward thrust, repeating thrusts as neces-

A choking infant is either held in the rescuer's lap or placed on a firm surface, such as a table. Instead of fists and hands, the rescuer uses two or three fingers for the quick upward thrusts into the baby's abdomen. Repeat as necessary, taking care not to injure the child with too much force.

Many people have saved themselves from choking by positioning their own hands slightly above their navels and thrusting upward quickly and repeatedly. Alternatively, the victim can position his abdomen against the edge of a chair back, a table or similar solid object and press himself quickly and forcefully against it. As with the other forms of the Manuever, several thrusts may be necessary.

Whenever the Heimlich Manuever has been performed, the victim should be seen by a physician as soon as possible, even if no complications are apparent. Injury from the Manuever is rare, but it can occur if the Manuever was not performed properly.

The best way to deal with obstruction of the airway, of course, is to prevent it. The American Red Cross, whose experience with this problem is great, offers the following advice: cut food into small pieces and chew slowly and thoroughly, especially if you wear dentures; don't laugh and talk while chewing and swallowing, and avoid excessive intake of alcohol before and during meals; finally, keep children from walking, running or playing while they have food in their mouths, and keep small objects, such as marbles, beads and thumbtacks, out of the reach of infants and small children.
