Local elections set for Saturday

Coke County voters will go to the polls on Saturday, April 5, to elect city officials, school trustees, hospital district board members, and decide on a county water district formation.

Bronte has no contested races on the ballots. Mayor J.T. Henry and councilmen Edward Hart, Harold Dunn, and Wesley Gibbs are the incumbents, with no new candidates. School trustees Jim Morrow and Lynn Phillips are running for 2 seats on the Bronte School Board. Incumbents Noel Percifull, Eddie Alexander and LeDrew Arrott are unopposed for the East Coke County Hospital Board. All three election boxes will be located in the Bronte City Hall.

Wilson Bryan is the only candidate for mayor in the city of Robert Lee, while incumbent Alice Beaty and Jim Naico, a new candidate, are the only names on the 2-seat vacancy ballot. Voting will be in the city hall. Robert Lee School Board incumbents Jeffie Roberts and Ray Aldridge vie with new comer Wayland Drennan for 2 places on that ballot in the only contested

race in the county. Polling place is set in the school lobby. Bill Helwig and Barbara Chesney, presently on the West Coke County Hospital Board, will be joined on the ballot by candidate Linda Arledge for 3 vacant positions. That election will be held in the Coke County Courthouse.

Also to be held on Saturday is the election to confirm or deny the formation of the Coke County Underground Water Conservation District. All qualified county voters will vote in their designated precinct polling places published in the legal notices elsewhere in this newspaper.

All registered voters are urged to exercise their right to express their preferences and opinions as set forth by our American constitution. Not all peoples of the world have this privilege. Vote in elections with no opposition as a show of support to those citizens who are willing to do a community job without pay.

Meadows receives award

The directors of the Coke County Soil & Water Conservation District selected Frank Meadows of San Angelo as the 1985 Conservationist of the year. Meadows operates a ranch near Sevenmile Hill, near the Colorado River and another one near San Saba. In the early 70's Meadows entered into a Great Plains Conservation Program contract with the Soil Conservation Service, USDA in Robert Lee to improve his Coke County ranch. The ranch was cross-fenced to allow for pasture rotation and deferment, brush was controlled and grasses reseeded. An excellent stand of grass was obtained and still exists through the good pasture management of Meadows.

Ample, quality forage complements the sound livestock program which consists of about one-third of the animal units being cow-calf operation and two-thirds being sheep. This balance has worked well through the recent drought which this area has been experiencing. Temporary summer grazing is sometimes available on cropland fields to assist in resting rangeland.

Due to illness, Frank was unable to attend the recent awards banquet where he

Writer voices need for local water control

Dear Editor,

In the early months of 1985, a series of meetings were held at the Coke County Courthouse, when numerous interested, knowledgeable and informed persons came together in an effort to cause the "creation" of an Underground Water Conservation District in Coke County. Their efforts were sustained with the passing of House Bill #2418.

April 5th, 1986 will be the day we, the voters, will determine the future conservation and control of Coke County underground water "locally". We will make that choice to retain ("Local") control by voting "FOR" the confirmation of House Bill #2418 and "FOR" the ad valorem tax.

With reference to the tax: When we sit down to vote we will see a ballot "FOR" or "AGAINST" a tax not to exceed fifty cents (\$.50) per hundred dollar evaluation. That is true because of the State Statutes; however, the temporary Board of Directors, by its authority has established that only one cent (\$.01) per hundred dollar evaluation will be adequate monies to meet necessary and foreseeable expenses. The future Board of Directors shall be elected locally and we should be looking at a decrease in the one cent (\$.01) tax rate in the future.

In essence; when the State controls the Coke County Underground Water; What will be the tax rate???

Clerk attends seminar

Coke County, County and Dist. Clerk, Ettie Hubbard and JoAnn Harrison, joined some 450 other officials for the 14th annual County and District Clerk's Seminar, March 18-20. Theme of the seminar was "Informational -- Not Political".

"During an election year, we're interested in efficiently carrying out our job of conducting elections," said Mrs. Hubbard. "That means staying abreast of current information about election codes and responsibilities rather than political rhetoric.

Conferences such as this give us an advantage in providing the best public services possible while minimizing the burden on local taxpayers," said Mrs. Hubbard. "With federal and state governments cutting back on funds for local governments, county officials have to be more resour-

ceful in making ends meet."

During the seminar, the county and district clerks were addressed by Robert Aldemeyer of Kenton County, Kentucky, who is president of the National Association of Counties, and Texas Secretary of State Myra McDaniel.

Major discussions included election codes, probate law, child support enforcement, records management, juvenile law and bankruptcy sales.

The annual seminar is one of the educational programs sponsored by the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The institute provides a forum of mutual support for county officials, the Extension staff and various government, academic and business leaders in Texas.



SUPER-SIZED VEGETABLES - Gardeners can grow "super-sized" vegetables by choosing the right varieties and then providing adequate cultural care during their growth, says a horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. The secret to growing super-sized vegetables is really genetic, so gardeners need to search for appropriate varieties. These include Atlantic Giant Pumpkin, Giant Snow King Squash, Cobb Gem Watermelon, Big Daddy Muskmelon, Yard Long Cucumber, Sakura Jima Mammoth White Globe Radish, Giant Bragger and The Beef (tomatoes), Zwann Jumbo Cabbage and Jumbo Pod Bean.

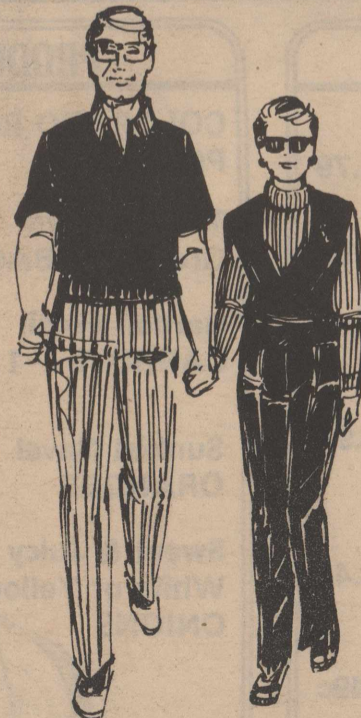
cer research, as well as for services to cancer patients and their families, rehabilitation programs for cancer patients, professional education, and public education.

Work-at-Home Schemes Earn Money—But Not For You

MAKE MONEY FAST! EARN THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS IN YOUR SPARE TIME! Do these words sound familiar? If so, it may mean you've been reading the classified section of your newspaper, looking for a business opportunity. Most of these ads are for work-at-home plans, some of which are legitimate, but many of which are not.

Unfortunately, work-at-home schemes are a continuing problem for consumers, especially the poor.

THE ENVELOPE STUFFING SCAM

The most common work-at-home schemes involve envelope stuffing. Promoters of these scams usually advertise that they will sell you their "secret" method for a small fee. Just send \$10 to a post office box and they will teach you how to earn money at home. What people generally learn from these crooks is how to place ads in the newspaper just like the ones that lured in the hapless consumer in the first place.

OTHER WORK SCHEMES

Other schemes involve assembling items or doing craft work at home. These programs frequently ask the would-be worker to invest hundreds of dollars in equipment or supplies. Others ask the worker to invest hundreds of hours in free labor before he or she starts to show a profit. Examples of the items assembled include baby shoes, sewn items, aprons, signs. The consumer is required to buy a sewing machine, signmaking equipment or other expensive items before he/she can start assembling materials. All too often, the consumer's handiwork will then be re-

jected because it does not meet the company's "quality standards." When this happens, the consumer can bet he's been stung.

ASK QUESTIONS FIRST

If a work-at-home program is legitimate, its sponsors should be happy to give you all the information you need to make an informed decision.

Here are some questions you should ask. If possible, get the answers in writing:

- 1) What tasks will I be required to perform? Get all the details.
- 2) Will I be required to invest any money? If so, how much? Are there other costs later on? Will I be paid a salary or a commission?
- 3) Who will pay me? When will I get my first paycheck?
- 4) What are the names of the other persons who have successfully worked for this company? Get as many names as possible, the closer to your home the better.

FOR MORE HELP

If you have been "stung" by a work-at-home scheme, you may ask for help from the nearest office of the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division.

Our offices in Austin, Houston, San Antonio, Dallas, McAllen, Lubbock and El Paso are continuing to investigate consumer complaints concerning false advertising and numerous other consumer matters. If you have a complaint about a consumer matter, feel free to contact the nearest regional office and ask for a complaint form. The Attorney General's Office is the people's law firm. We're here to help you.

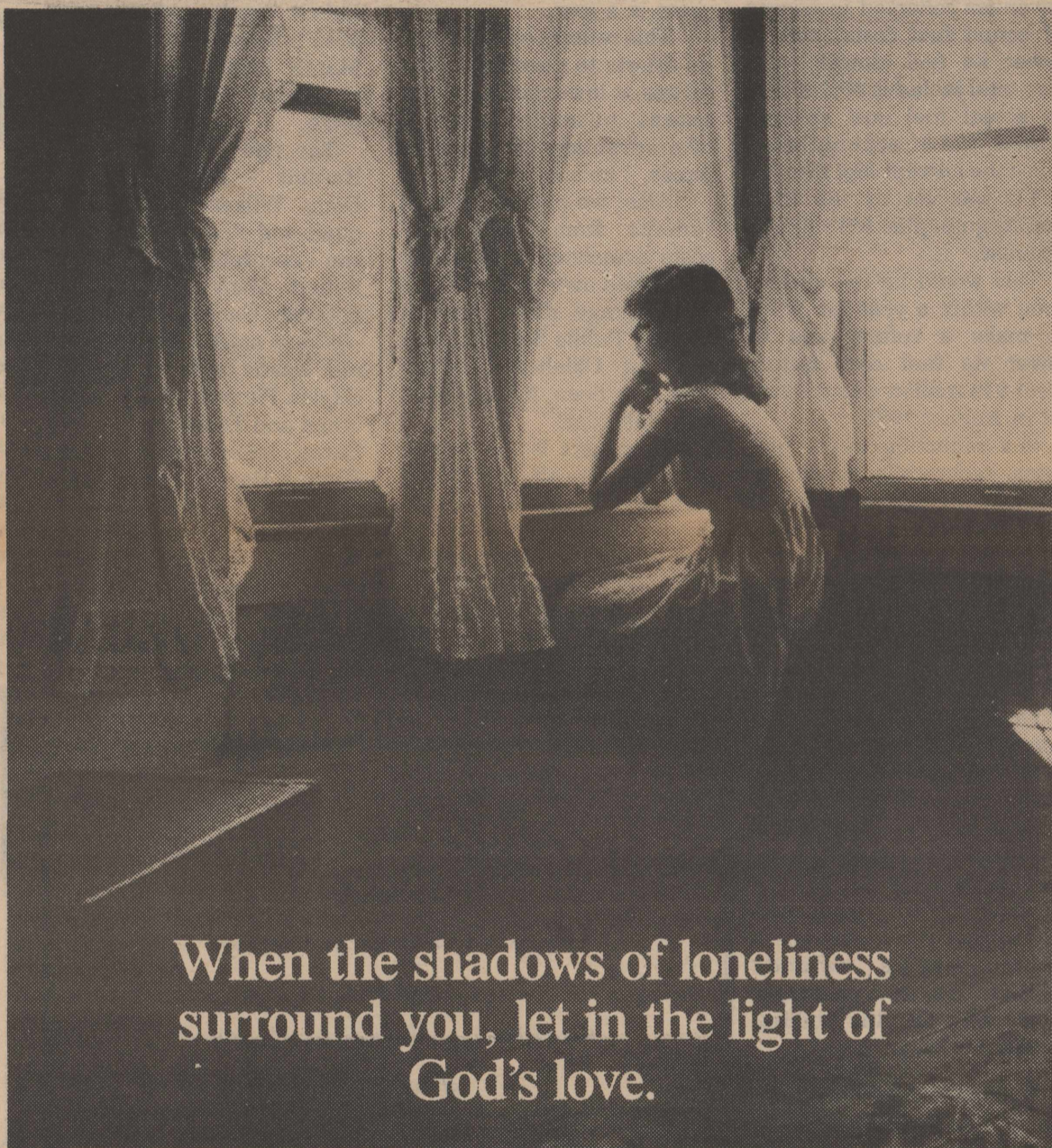

Electric bills to decrease

West Texas Utilities Company's retail customers should see another decrease in their electric bills soon if the Public Utility Commission of Texas approves a request filed Monday in Austin.

WTU is asking permission to refund to customers a total of \$9.3 million in retail revenues collected in excess of actual fuel costs, and to lower its fuel charge rate. The total includes \$9,146,092 in actual fuel cost savings which have accumulated since the current fuel rate for WTU was set by the PUC last August, plus \$215,837 in interest.

This would be the second time within a year for WTU to make a refund and to lower its fuel cost factor. Over \$16 million was refunded in August 1985.

If a reduction in its fuel rates, technically known as the Interim Quarterly Fixed Fuel Factor, is approved, WTU officials estimate the fuel cost charges to its customers will drop by 8.2 per cent during the three month quarter beginning in May.

The due amounts on customer bills include both fuel costs and base rates. Utility companies are not allowed to make money on fuel. WTU has had no change in its base rates since 1984.

Under WTU's proposal, all existing retail customers would receive refunds through one-time credits to their bills in the billing month of May.

A typical residential customer would receive refunds of \$22.

Glen D. Churchill, WTU president and chief executive officer, said this refund, as well as the one made last year is necessary because of a softer fuel market and the fixed factor method of collecting for fuel costs.

The present method was ordered by the PUC after the

Public Utility Regulatory Act was amended in 1983. Previously, an automatic fuel adjustment clause matched fuel billings to fuel expense each month. These immediate adjustments prevented over-recoveries and made refunds unnecessary.

Churchill said WTU's fuel costs have declined two years in a row.

"This reflects our successful efforts to purchase natural gas at lower prices to the extent possible, and to take advantage of declining prices," he said.

"Also, we had substantial benefits from lower fuel costs associated with power purchased over our system's high voltage direct current tie with Public Service Company of Oklahoma, which now has been in operation for a full year."

Natural gas is the principal fuel for all of WTU's eight major power generating stations. In recent years, fuel costs have amounted to more than half of WTU's total operating costs, but have dropped from an all-time high of \$3.18 per million BTU in 1983 to \$2.55 in 1985.

It was reported Davis was astounded, touched, and for once, speechless, by the tribute.

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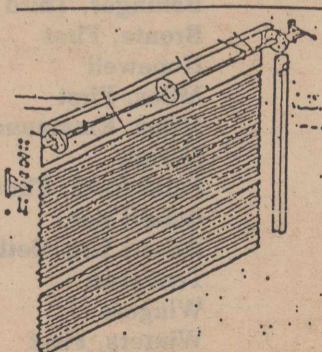

COUNTRY AGENTS NEWS

About this time of the year home lawns need a boost to get them in shape for the spring season just around the corner.

There are three operations

DIETERS' DILEMMA: EAT LESS, STILL GAIN - It's only March, but thousands of dieters have already gained back the pounds they lost after making a New Year's resolution to shed excess weight. According to Texas A&M University specialists, going on a low-calorie diet to drop a few pounds in a hurry may only compound the dieter's weight problem. TAEX nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt explains that between 20-50% of weight lost on very low-calorie diets can be water and lean muscle tissue, rather than fat. "Muscle tissue burns 2½ times the calories as fat tissue," Hunt says. "So as the percent of body fat increases, the metabolism slows down and burns fewer calories." That's why a dieter can actually gain weight while eating less, she adds. According to TAEX health education specialist Dr. Mary Ann Heussner, combination of a balanced diet with moderately reduced calories and exercise to lose weight gradually is the most effective way to achieve a permanent weight loss.

that can get a lawn off to a good start -- scalping, fertilizing and applying a weed killer.

Scalping a lawn in early spring serves to revitalize it and promote early spring green-up.

Begin the operation by lowering the blade of your lawnmower ½ to 1 inch below the normal setting. Then mow the lawn in two directions that are at right angles to each other. Remove the clippings after each mowing.

It is recommended to keep the lawnmower blade lowered until mid-summer.

After scalping the lawn, apply a complete fertilizer (one containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium) to promote leaf and root growth. Use 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. This is equal to 12 pounds of an 8-8-8 fertilizer or 8 pounds of a 12-4-8 fertilizer. Repeat the application in the early summer and fall.

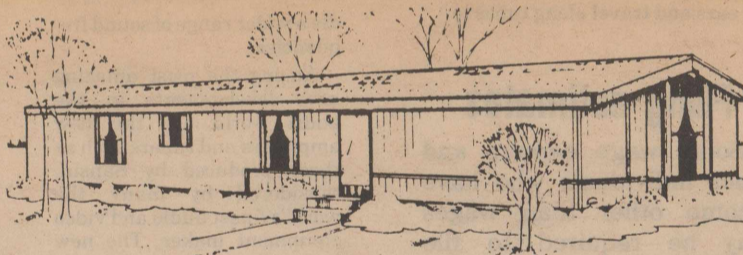
For a dark green lawn, apply nitrogen every 50 days at the rate of one pound to 1,000 square feet. Monthly applications of iron chelate or iron sulfate during the spring and summer promote a healthy color in St. Augustine lawns.

To keep crabgrass or other unsightly weeds from becoming a problem, apply a pre-emergence herbicide (weed killer) containing benefin, dacthal or bensulide in early spring, after the grass has recovered from winter. Applying a pre-emergence herbicide too early this year could further weaken turf-grasses injured by winter conditions. Combinations of herbicides with fertilizers are available and convenient to use but, as with all herbicides, should only be used according to instructions on the label.

Proper maintenance is essential for a healthy lawn, and these practices will give new life to a dormant, weedy lawn.

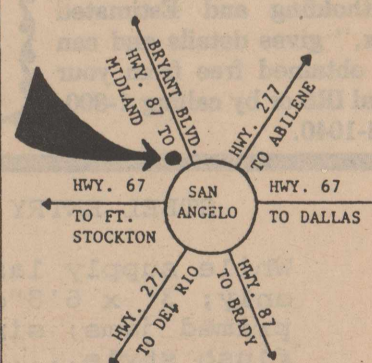

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Kids Can Have Fun In The Garden Too

Gardening isn't just for adults: children also can enjoy the hobby, while learning a lot about nature and nutrition.

However, parents must be careful not to place too many demands or expectations on the young gardeners. For example, parents need to be tolerant of crooked rows and should help the children enjoy gardening by encouraging them to try projects they're mature enough to handle. Very small children can get started in the garden by helping plant seeds, using an old spoon as a tool. Older children can take on more responsibilities. Here are some suggestions that will help children learn about and enjoy gardening:

- A prerequisite for both parent and child is being willing to get dirty and clean up the mess afterwards.

- Outdoors, plant the garden in a location near a utility room door or garage so the child can easily call to you or bring something in to show without tracking mud through the house. Children are bound to get excited about their triumphs in the garden and will want to bring them indoors.

- When it's time to weed or water, go out together and do it. Don't send the child out by himself or he'll resent it. This is supposed to be a project for both parents and child.



- Try not to impose all of your ideas about gardening onto the

child. Let him make some of his own discoveries. If he doesn't understand why you have to wait until a watermelon is ripe to pick it, let him taste a green one and he'll learn why.

- Be prepared to be excited about your child's triumphs, no matter how large or small, and give encouragement.

- Help the the child get started on special projects, such as building their own private shelter by setting up a "tee-pee" on which to grow pole beans.

- Plant at least a few crops that mature quickly, such as radishes, to help eliminate the child's frustrations at how long it takes to get anything growing.

Your Amazing Ears

If you're average, your ears can distinguish a very wide range of sound frequencies. The normal human ear can hear sound with frequencies between about 20 and 20,000 vibrations a second. Scientists refer to each vibration a second as one hertz. For example, the lowest tone on a piano has a frequency of 27 vibrations a second, or 27 hertz. Some organs have tones with frequencies as low as 15 hertz. The highest tone on a piano has a frequency of about 4,000 hertz.

The construction of the ear enables it to catch sound waves that come to it through the air. The waves enter your ears and travel along tubes to

the eardrums and other delicate organs in the head. These organs send impulses over sensitive nerves to the brain, which interprets what we hear. Some sounds do not vibrate with enough energy to make the eardrums vibrate. They are not loud enough to be heard.

Why do some stereo systems sound better to the average ear than others? Many musical factors come into play. The more bass response the stereo has, for instance, the greater dimension and "feel" to the sound you hear. Some stereos have less harmonic distortion than others, while other models can handle a wider range of sound frequencies.

Among the most amazing new developments in the audio world are the new amplifiers and tuners such as those produced by Sansui, considered by many the world's finest audio and video equipment maker. The new

X-Balanced Amplifier, for instance, features an entirely unique design for much improved performance—tighter definition, no noise, and, overall, far purer sound. For its tuners, the company has come up with the SLDD (Super Linear Digital Decoder) that makes the tuners insensitive to interference.

The company has also seen its way clear to creating VCRs with Hi-Fi audio. It's even developed a computerized turntable that plays selections from both record sides in any order. That's something that may amaze a lot of ears.

Filing estimates

Some wage earners and other individuals who have income other than wages may be required to file estimated tax payments, the Internal Revenue Service says. The due date for the first quarterly estimated tax payment for 1986 is April 15.

Just like withholding by employers, the IRS says, estimated taxes are paid in advance of the actual tax return, Form 1040, due for the year. Estimated taxes are normally paid in four installments, and there is a substantial penalty for underpayment of estimated taxes.

For 1986 returns, the three other estimated tax installment dates are: June 16, 1986; September 15, 1986; and January 15, 1987.

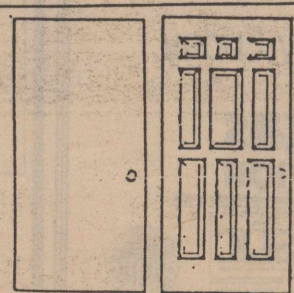

When stronger tensions seem difficult, the patient simply returns to the one that is easiest until he or she is ready to advance. The hand exerciser can be used while watching TV, listening to the radio, walking or jogging, talking on the telephone, or whenever the hands are free. It should be used regularly for best results. 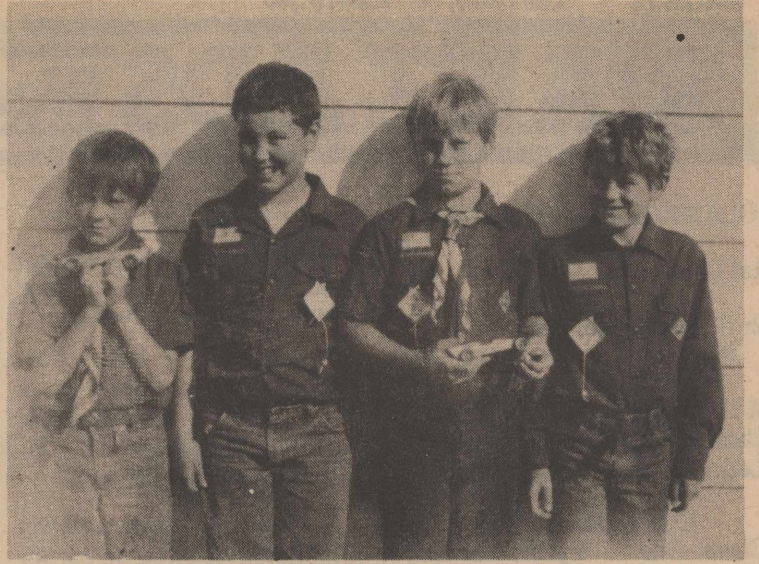

File tax extension by April 15th

The Internal Revenue Service says you may receive an automatic 4-month extension of time to file your 1985 federal tax return. The application for the extension, Form 4868, must be filed by April 15.

The IRS stresses that this is an extension of time to file your return--not an extension of time for payment of taxes due. When filing for the extension, the taxpayer must estimate their tax owed for 1985 and send that amount with the Form 4868 to avoid interest and late payment penalties.

The IRS notes that a deduction for an IRA contribution can be claimed on a 1985 tax return only if the contribution is made on or before April 15, even for those electing an extension to file.

Goodbye to pony rides...

America is awaking to the fact that the liability crisis is for real. But how many have considered how much the crisis could affect us all from cradle to grave?

Or even before the cradle, for that matter. Early February saw a strike by obstetricians in Boston fed up with rising malpractice insurance rates. And once Junior is born, a number of vaccines, including diphtheria-pertussis-tetanus, may be unavailable because litigation-shy manufacturers have stopped making them.

The baby may have been unplanned. G.D. Searle recently was forced to stop selling a safe and medically approved intrauterine birth-control device. Searle had never lost a lawsuit, but just defending them was eating up nearly a tenth of the company's income.

Junior's cradle itself is bound to be more expensive since lawsuits have abounded over injuries to babies in their beds. He might not be able to get a car seat either.

And who's going to take care of Junior if Mom works? Many day-care centers can't get insurance.

As Junior grows up, life may not be as much fun for him. All those neat Toys he sees during the cartoons may be off the market after being attacked by consumer safety acti-

vists. Skip the carnival. Who can afford the \$5 per ticket to cover the insurance for the pony rides?

And forget about peanut butter sandwiches and the Twinkies. They've been battered by suits over allegedly misleading labeling and turning youngsters into "junk-food junkies."

Watching the Super Bowl on TV - or participating in sports himself - is out of the question. Ten of thirteen football helmet manufacturers already have been driven out of business by lawsuits over injuries. Mom and Dad had to send the dog to the pound since they couldn't afford the increase in the homeowner's insurance in case he bit somebody.

Depressed by the loss of these privileges - and his dog - Junior goes to discuss his problems with his minister. Sorry, the minister won't do any more spiritual counseling because he's been burned by malpractice suits.

Despite these setbacks, Junior manages to struggle through school, after he signed a release promising not to sue if he didn't learn how to read. But there aren't many new jobs. Those companies that haven't been forced out of business are laying off employees to cover higher insurance premiums.

Junior finally finds a job as the clerk of the court's office. They have plenty of work handling their share of the two million lawsuits filed every

year.

At a ripe old age, Junior suffers a stroke and is rushed to the hospital. His bill for the 18 hours before he dies is \$20,000, largely because the doctors order a battery of extra tests to avoid a malpractice suit.

But that's OK. The insurance will

pick it up.

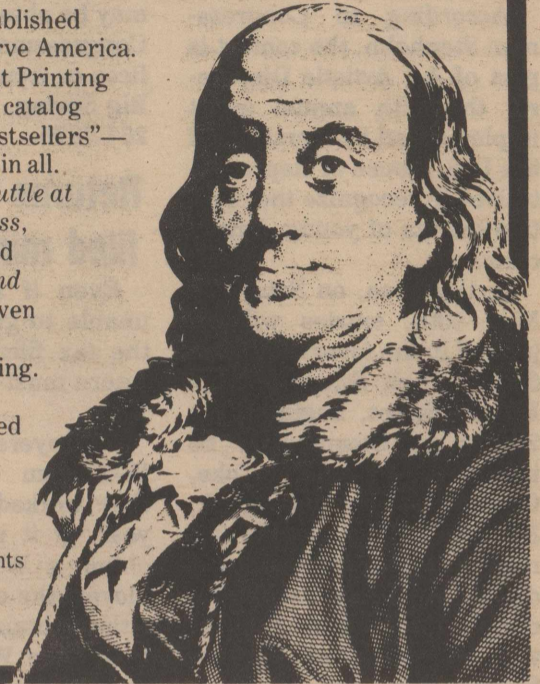

Returns may be filed minus W-2's

Even if an employee is unable to get a W-2 before the tax filing deadline, the return must be filed by April 15.

Taxpayers must have a W-2 from every employer they worked for during the year. If it is impossible to obtain a W-2 from an employer, the employee should either obtain a Form 4852, Substitute Wage and Withholding Statement, from the IRS or attach a signed and dated statement showing the tax withholding information and attach it to the tax return, according to the IRS.

Selective Service System

Young men born on or after January 1, 1960 are required to register with Selective Service within a month of their 18th birthday.

The registration process takes less than five minutes at the post office. A young man fills out a simple form asking only for his name, date of birth, address, telephone number and Social Security number.
