Monday night, April 14, the Robert Lee City Council and the city employees surprised out-going Mayor Robert Vaughan with a dinner in his honor at City Hall.

After the meal, which was prepared by the ladies, a short program was presented. City Secretary Edna Havins gave a brief history of Mr. Vaughan's terms in office. Newly elected Mayor Wilson Bryan expressed appreciation for the time he had spent serving the city. Alice Beaty presented a gift to him from the group.

Robert Vaughan was first elected Mayor in 1962 and served the next 6 years. In November 1978, it became necessary for Wilson Bryan to resign as Mayor and Mr. Vaughan was appointed to serve the remaining 1½ years of that term. He was re-elected in 1980, 1982, and 1984, serving a total of 13½ years as Mayor.

Some of the projects and improvements during his terms in office were: City Hall improvements and fire station; constant expanding and improvements of the water distributing system, and water meter replacement program; a franchise to Lone Star Gas Company bringing natural gas into Robert Lee; a street-name sign program; in 1965 the Robert Lee Housing Authority was established and the first low rent housing units were built; in 1966 an election was held changing the form of city government from the mayor and 2 commissioner form to the mayor and 5 councilmen form; also in 1966 a grant was obtained and bonds issued for the construction of a sewer system for Robert Lee; several new additions were annexed to the city, a traffic sign program was completed; a program of lighting the city with regular addition of street lights was begun and is still being followed; a cablevision franchise was granted. The last project was the securing of a grant for the recently completed water treatment plant improve-

Robert Vaughan deserves the appreciation of the citizens of Robert Lee for his years of hard work, and dedicated service to the City. during both weeks - May 5 through 16.

Everyone is urged to take advantage of these free services to clean up and help keep the city attractive, especially due to the Sesquicentennial celebrations taking place this year.


Children must bring a Birth Certificate and their shot records in order to register for school. Hospital records will not be accepted as proof of birth. Lunch will be 85c per child.



Quilting demonstration

Have you ever wondered how a quilt is born? The San Angelo Quilt Guild will show you. They will be demonstrating how to make a quilt from start to finish in the chapel at Fort Concho during the West Texas Quilt Show on April 26 and 27. The first step is selecting a pattern, then fabric (100% cotton) selection is made. Templates are made of plastic or sandpaper. These are used to trace the pattern on the fabric. The pieces are then pieced. When the top is pieced, a sandwich is made with the pieced top, batting middle,

and a lining for the bottom. This is placed in a frame and quilted. Quilting is done with as even and as small a stitch as possible (8 stitches to the inch is the minimum -- some can get as many as 20 stitches to the inch). The quilted piece is removed from the frame and bound. As with any work of art, the quilt should then be signed and dated.

Mrs. Martin's candidacy has been endorsed by Coke County Commissioners Court. She has been involved with programs for the elderly for many years and knows first-hand all the problems we face in this county.

She has worked since 1969 with several agencies in Coke and some in Sterling and Tom Green Counties involving programs for the elderly.

In making her announcement she stated, "I know from all the previous experience the grass-roots input from each family, and have spent long hours trying to help solve the many problems.

We need the services to continue from our Senior Centers to assist all elderly to live independently, well cared-for and in their own environment until it is absolutely necessary for them to be institutionalized, but it is rewarding to know we do have the best Nursing Homes available here, and we want to keep it all this way.

A great need now is to impress upon our legislators that our rural needs should be considered in the funding because of our wide areas of West Texas.


