Voters 'turn out' for primaries

A better-than-average total of votes were cast in the May Primary elections in Coke County. The Democratic Primary total numbered 1117 (1015 at the polls and 102 absentee votes); 458 voted at the ballot boxes in Robert Lee and 557 in Bronte. The Republican Primary accounted for 87 votes, 10 of which were absentee.

Voter interest was apparently generated in the county by opposing candidates in the county precinct commissioner races, the East Coke JP race, and an overall interest in the governor's race. All county official candidates were on the Democratic ballot.

Coke County Republicans strayed frm the norm of the statewide voter counts by giving the nod to Tom Loeffler, 46 votes, for the nomination by his party for governor. Bill Clements received 28 votes while Kent Hance

On the Democrats' ballot,

Andrew C. Briscoe, III drew the top spot with 338 votes over Mark White's 307, to vote differently from many of the state's voters.

Most of the incumbents were returned to their respective offices after the vote tabulations in Coke County's **Democratic Primary election** last Saturday.

Aubrey Denman, County Judge, and Ettie Hubbard, County and District 17 Clerk, both of Bronte, had no opposition, as well Peace Justice Opal Jacoby of Robert Lee in the newly formed Precinct I.

Both incumbent Peace Justices, Cecil Kemp and Pete Nutter from Bronte, in Precincts 2 and 4 were vying for 1 spot in the newly formed Precinct 2. In that race, Kemp gained the position with 365 votes over Nutter's 227 total.

James Tidwell, incumbent County Commissioner in Precinct 4, received 206 votes while his opponent,

James Miller, had 55. Billy Joe Luckett, County Commissioner of Precinct 2 incumbent, garnered the majority of the vote with 273 to his opponent, Charles Timmons', 63.

Three candidates were on the Democratic Primary ballot for Coke County Treasurer to replace Jerry Thomason who will retire at the end of her present term. Mrs. Bobbie Arrott of Bronte was the top vote getter with 526 votes, Phelan Wrinkle of Robert Lee gained 345 votes, and Jackie Walker, also of Robert Lee, had 233. By virtue of the vote count, both Arrott and Wrinkle will be in the run-off (Second Democratic Primary) election on June 7 for the Treasurer's

The executive committees of each party met Tuesday at 1:00 to canvass the May 3 vote. Patti Ivey reported that the Coke County Democratic Convention will be held on Saturday at 2:00 at the courthouse in Robert Lee. According to Republican County Chairman James Pentecost, his party will be meeting there that day also.

Mrs. Ivey also stated that for the upcoming run-off election only, Bronte's voting precincts 2 and 5 will be combined and vote in the City Hall there. Robert Lee's voting precincts 1 and 3 will vote in the courthouse.

Tommy Antilley announced the scheduling of the annual Rabies Vaccination Clinic sponsored by the Coke County 4-H Clubs. The clinic will be held this year at the north end of the Showbarn at the Robert Lee county park.

He advised that pets 4 months of age and older Rabies vaccinations given annually. A veterinarian will be in charge of the clinic.

Some of the services offered will be Rabies vaccine, dogs or cats, \$5.00, Parvo, \$7.50, Wormer, \$3.00, CBR=S for cats, \$10.00, and DHLP for dogs, \$10.00. Other pet should be immunized, with shots will be available.

The summer program will open with a welcoming Texas style barbeque on Sunday, June 8 and classes will begin on June 9.


Hurley Pharmacy burglary thwarted

The West Coke County Ambulance Service volunteers announce a basic-EMT class to be held in Robert Lee. Registration will be at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, May 15, 1986 at the Robert Lee High School Science Room. All persons interested in taking this class are urged to be present at this time. The class, sponsored by the Concho Valley Council of Governments, must register at least ten students. Cost for volunteers is \$25 (\$20 for the textbook and \$5 for registration fee). Those who volunteer to work at least

one full year on the West Coke County Ambulance Service will have this fee refunded upon successful completion.

Requirements of the class include: 100½ hours of classroom instruction, 20 hours of in-hospital time and completion of five emergency runs (on an ambulance). All classes will meet in Robert Lee. The in-hospital time will be done at Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital in San Angelo and emergency ambulance runs will be made with the San Angelo Fire Department.

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Stripper wells important to industry

A look at Texas' producing oil wells-- grouped according to the volume of production from individual wells-should prove interesting and revealing even to Texans quite familiar with the petroleum industry.

According to figures provided by the Railroad Commission, in mid-March of 1986 Texas had a total of 212,713 producing oil wells. Of that number, only four averaged production of more than 450 barrels of oil per day. Another 7,874 wells produced between 50 and 450 barrels, with 204,835 additional wells producing less than 50 barrels of oil per day.

A closer examination of this last category reveals that 142,743 wells were producing 10 barrels or less of oil per day and therefore qualified as stripper wells. Of that number, 49,892 wells were producing more than one but less than three barrels per day and 42,881 wells were producing one barrel or less per day.

It is obvious that the bulk of Texas' oil production does not come from its stripper wells. But, this observation is not meant in any way to belittle the importance of these wells.

In 1984, the last full year for which complete and comparable figures on these wells are available, Texas' stripper well production amounted to 152.7-million barrels of oil, approximately 18.1-percent of the 845.5million barrels of production statewide. Based on a 1984 average statewide price for crude of \$28.76 per barrel, the wellhead value of that stripper oil was almost \$4.4billion. State severance tax collections figured at the rate of 4.6-percent amount to more than \$202-million.

The downturn in crude oil prices in recent months has caused a crisis for the producers of many of these so-called marginal wells. As prices have plummeted, the lifting or production costs for much stripper oil has begun to exceed the value of the oil in the marketplace. The loss of money on production is a disincentive to produce and many operators have no choice but to cease production. Unfortunately, because of the nature of stripper well reservoirs, once production is halted, in many cases it is impossible to resume it at some future date when prices are higher. One result is the reduction of ultimate recovery potential.

Fortunately, help for stripper producers has been forthcoming. The Railroad Commission has amended Stateside Rule 14(b)(2) -- the plugging statute -- to give operators a year -- rather than 90 days -- in which to plug or otherwise bring into

compliance wells completed after January 1, 1986.

Likewide, the federal government has agreed to allow producers of small or stripper wells to stop production without losing their federal leases. Heretofore, failure to produce from such a well on a federal lease has meant surrender of the lease after 60 days.

These actions are critically important. Not only the state of Texas but the nation needs the production of every barrel of oil which can be produced economically and without damage to the reservoir from which it comes as well as the environment both above and below the ground. The failure to produce or to preserve the production capacity of U.S. oil will serve only to increase this country's dependence on imported oil, a development which clearly is contrary to this nation's best interest.

The history of onions dates back to the days before Christ. Back then the onion was considered a symbol of eternity, fit only for the gods. Other legends claim that the vegetable made soldiers brave and kept evil spirits away. Today, onion growers claim that an onion can take the rust off a knife, keep frost off the windshield, and even suck paint odors out of a newly painted room.

Moulton Avery, Executive Director of the Center for Environmental Physiology, says that heat stress can cause problems ranging from heat exhaustion to heart failure and strokes. Older persons with heart, circulatory, and kidney problems; respiratory illnesses; diabetes; and those who have fever or are overweight are at even greater risk than other members of the older population.

In addition, numerous medications and alcoholic beverages can increase the risk of heart-related medical problems, since they may depress or interfere with the body's temperature control system.

Heat stress causes physical and mental changes which herald the onset of more serious medical problems. Mild signs, such as lack of energy or loss of appetite, are not cause for alarm unless they last for many days. More serious signs, however, should not be ignored, including dizziness, rapid heartbeat, nausea, a throbbing headache, diarrhea, chest pains, weakness, vomiting, cramps, mental changes, and breathing problems. If you experience any of these signs, seek a doctor's advice as soon as possible.

The best course of action, is, of course, to prevent heat stress in the first place. During a heat wave, spend as much time as possible in

the coolest possible surroundings. Using air-conditioning to keep the temperature at 90 degrees F and the humidity at a reasonable level is an acceptable alternative to constantly using your air-conditioning.

Closing windows and drawing drapes or shades in the early morning keeps the cooler night air inside the house. Fans should be placed on a table or the floor. When placed in a window, a fan can be used to draw cool air into the house at night. Attic fans can also make a substantial difference in the temperature of the rooms below.

Cool baths and showers provide excellent relief from the heat since cool water removes excess body heat 25 times faster than cool air. Water temperatures should be around 75 degrees F. Sponge baths are also helpful although not as effective. An alternative is to use wet towels on your body while lying in front of a fan.

During heat waves it is also best to avoid cooking during the hottest times of the day since stoves generate a substantial amount of heat. As far as eating is concerned avoid hot meals and heavy foods, check with your doctor before using salt tablets, drink more than enough water to simply satisfy thirst, and avoid alcohol since it can cause your body to lose water and can place a strain on your heart.

May is High Blood Pressure month

High blood pressure doesn't hurt. It often doesn't make you feel bad. But despite its lack of symptoms, this disorder can be dangerous to your health.

Many of the 20 percent of adult Americans who have high blood pressure do not know it, says the Texas Medical Association. If you've never had your blood pressure checked, now is a good time to do so. May is National High Blood Pressure Month.

Hypertension, the medical term for high blood pressure, is a condition in which

the blood in your arteries is putting too much pressure on the vessels' walls. Hypertension usually begins at about age 30 and is more common as age increases. but it can occur in any age and any person.

High blood pressure occurs more often in men than in women. In women, the disorder often is associated with birth control pills or pregnancy. Hypertension occurs more frequently in blacks than in whites, in overweight people, and in relatives of people with high blood pressure.

Hypertension is a major

cause of stroke, heart failure, and kidney failure, but this disorder can be controlled by taking prescribed medications, reducing salt intake, not smoking, losing excess weight, exercising, and drinking less alcohol.

If medication is required, it should be taken daily, even if the patient feels well. If he feels sick, he should see a physician. Hypertension patients or those who have ever been told they had high blood pressure should have their blood pressure checked frequently. For others, a yearly check is advisable.

The American Cancer Society (ACS) has some words of warning for Texans looking forward to spending time outdoors during the long days of summer.

If you fry now, you may pay later, the Society cautions, because every exposure to the sun ages and damages skin. Skin cancer is the most serious form of "payment" for sun worshipers. More than 400,000 new cases of skin cancer will be diagnosed this year. While the vast majority are highly curable, the problem itself is largely preventable by exercising good sense and taking simple precautions.

"Young people, especially, are unaware of the cumulative amount of damage they are getting when they get too much sun," said Linda N. White, R.N., Houston, Chairman of the ACS Texas Division skin cancer program development committee. "They think because nothing happens this year, or in five years, that everything's okay."

"Also, a lot of people are unaware of the damage done other than skin cancer... wrinkles, drying out, the aging process," White add-

"Geographically, skin

cancer is more prevalent in the Sun Belt, and because we are in the Sun Belt, people are at higher risk,' White said.

Also at higher risk for developing skin cancer are people with lightly-pigmented skin, people who work or spend a great deal of recreational time outdoors and workers exposed to coal tar, pitch, creosote, aresenic compounds or radium. As with many other cancers, risk increases with age.

Because skin cancer occurs more frequently than any other type of cancer, it is important to recognize its warning signals: a sore that does not heal; any unusual skin condition, especially a change in the size or color of a mole or other darkly pigmented growth or spot.

To reduce the risk of damage from too much sun,

the Society advises Texans

* cover up - wear hats and protective clothing;

* use sunscreens - apply sunscreen at least an hour before going into the sun and again after swimming or perspiring heavily;

* avoid the midday sun between 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. the sun's ultraviolet rays (the ones that do the damage) are strongest;

* don't use indoor sun lamps, tanning parlors or tanning pills

In addition to taking precautions in the sun, the Society recommends monthly skin self-exams to note any changes in moles, blemishes or birthmarks.



Texas Land Commissioner

Interest rates drop

Garry Mauro today announced a dramatic drop in the interest rate Texas Veterans are charged to buy land through the Texas Veterans Land Program. Mauro said the interest rate on \$20,000 loans to Texas Veterans to buy 10 acres of land through the Texas Veterans Land Board will drop from 9.97 to 8.75 percent as a result of action taken Wednesday by the Texas Veterans Land Board.

"The best Veterans programs in the U.S.A. just got better. This rate reduction insures that Texas Veterans will continue to have the finest Veterans programs in the U.S.A.," said Mauro, who also serves as Chairman of the Texas Veterans Land

The rate reduction is effective immediately and applies to all land loans currently being processed by the board and all land loans made after May 1.

"Dropping our interest rate from 9.97 to 8.75 percent will save Veterans \$17 a month on a 30-year, \$20,000 loan. This amounts to a yearly savings of \$204 on each loan," Mauro explain-

Mauro said the rate reduction was made possible by a highly successful bond sale which saw the board refund \$543 million in bonds on previous issues for the Texas Veterans Land Program.

The bonds were purchased from the board by a syndicate led by CitiCorp Investment Bank of New York at an effective rate of 6.91 percent and will provide continued funding for the Texas Veterans Land Program.

"I'd like to encourage all Texas Veterans to check out our programs by calling toll free 1-800-252-VETS because we've got plenty of money to loan at very good rates for both the land and housing assistance programs," Mauro said.

More than 90,000 Texas Veterans have taken advantage of the popular Texas Veterans Land Program which makes \$20,000 lowinterest loans available to eligible Texas Veterans.

TERMITE SWARMING SEASON

Spring is the time when many homeowners discover they have termites because winged forms appear and swarm.

Winged termites outdoors are a natural occurrence, so usually there is no problem. But if they are found indoors, usually on a window sill, chances are good that an infestation has established in your home.

Termites can cause extensive damage to wooden parts of your home, so take some precautions.

Quite often termites and certain ants swarm at the same time and it's important to be able to tell the difference between these two insects. Carpenter ants swarm in the springtime and can cause some structional damage to wood. However, termites are much more destructive and require different control measures.

Termites have a broad waist--ants have a narrow, constricted waist; termite wings are the same size and shape--winged ants have a front and back pair of wings of different lengths and shape; termites have straight antennae (feelers on their heads)--ants have elbowed antennae.

Termites may be attracted to your house by dead tree limbs, stumps, old lumber and other sources of termite

food. These should be removed, if soil is above the point where wood or brick meets the foundation, termites have easy access to your home. Anywhere that wood meets dirt (siding, wooden steps) is a potential spot for termite entry into the home.

Termites also have the ability to build mud tunnels over non-wooden structures to reach a food source. These tunnels (about 1/4-inch wide) may extend several feet up concrete surfaces. On a slab home, these may be seen on foundation concrete between soil and brick. On homes built above the ground, these tunnels can be found on piers or pipes that go from soil to structure. The bath trap in homes built on a slab is another source of entry. Plumbing in this situation has contact with soil under the slab; and termite tunnels may be found in this

Although a thorough inspection is best done by a professional, a homeowner can make a quick check for termite infestations. If termites or damage is found. contact a local pest control company. This is one insect pest that should not be handled by a "do-it-yourselfer". Commercial pest control companies have the necessary equipment and experience to effectively rid a home of termites.
