Seniors name officers

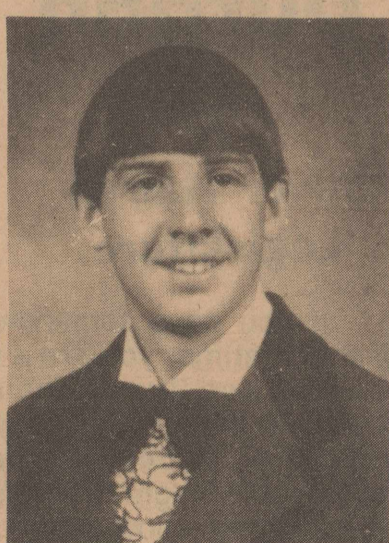
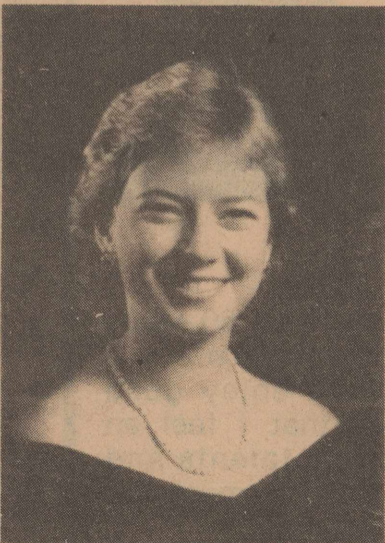

Mother Nature alters weekend

Mother Nature played havoc with outdoor Memorial Day weekend activities in Coke County although she did not assign the severe destruction of Big Spring and Ft. Worth to the area. A storm accompanied by rain and high winds struck upper Lake Spence near the Humble Crossing Saturday night, overturning or damaging several camp trailers and tents belonging to holiday campers. A number of campers were stranded and isolated overnight when a low water crossing washed out at Lake Spence Estates near the upper river portion of the lake. Mike Ross, a lake employee, and Coke County Game Warden Sparks Burdett responded to reports of the storm. According to Burdett, no serious injuries occurred during the weekend, but with some loss of property and wet camping gear. Reports of a small tornado were heard around the lake

but Burdett said this was unconfirmed and none was sighted.

Campers were again drenched on Sunday and Monday nights by fast-moving thunderstorms. Robert Lee had an official measurement of 1.80 inches for the three days, reported J.E. Quisenberry of Robert Lee. Other surrounding communities had as much as 2½ inches.

A weather-related service outage blacked out Robert Lee for 30 minutes to 1½ hours over the holiday. West Texas Utilities manager Bob Boone related that lightning struck near the Foy Askins home on Euel St., causing an overloaded line to burn apart behind the Wink home on 15th Street.

More rain descended upon Bronte over the weekend with an unofficial measurement of 1½ inches in the early Sunday and Monday morning hours.

The rainfall on Sunday morning was accompanied by high winds, some hail and a very intense electrical storm. A lightning-related fire completely destroyed a barracks adjacent to the home of Daisy Sims. The barracks was used to store furniture belonging to the James Mixson family. The Bronte Fire Dept. responded to the fire around 4:30 a.m. and stayed in service about an hour and a half, but the fire had progressed too far to be able to save the building or contents. Several televisions and appliances were also damaged by lightning during the storm.

The weather did not hamper Bronte's Mule Days or the Firemen's annual barbecue on Monday, although deep mud at the arena made for some fancy mule riding and messy spills. A big crowd turned out for both events and a fun day for all concerned.

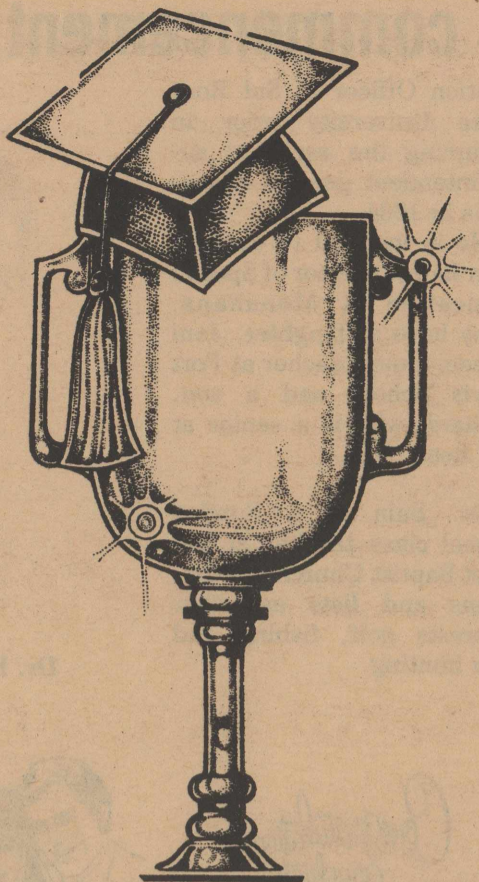
Nearly 10,000 people across the country are waiting for organ transplants. The gap between available organs and waiting recipients never has been wider.

"The biggest reason for the scarcity of organs is that the topic of donation is difficult to deal with—both for hospital staffs and for the families of people who die," says Mark Reiner, president of the North American Transplant Coordinators Organization (NATCO).

"When a person dies, the decision to donate must be made at a difficult time, when it is the furthest thing from the minds of relatives," he points out. "That's why it's important for families to sit down and talk about organ donation."

Some states have passed "Required Request" laws to ensure that hospital officials bring up the possibility of organ donation with the families of people who die.

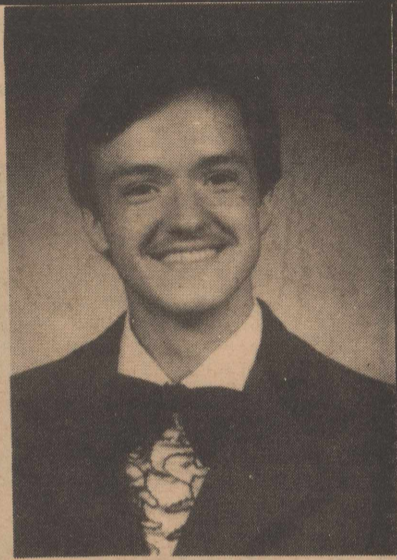

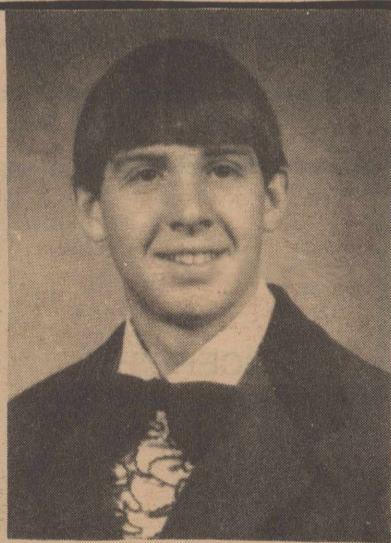

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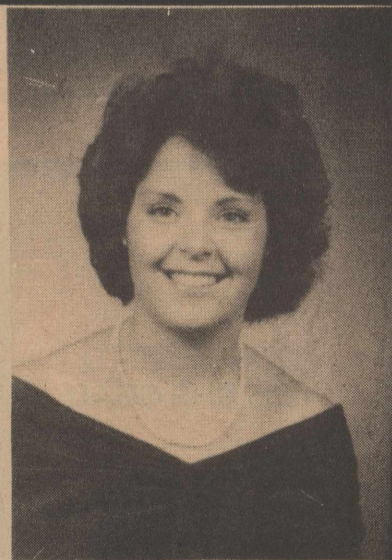

Bain to deliver commencement address

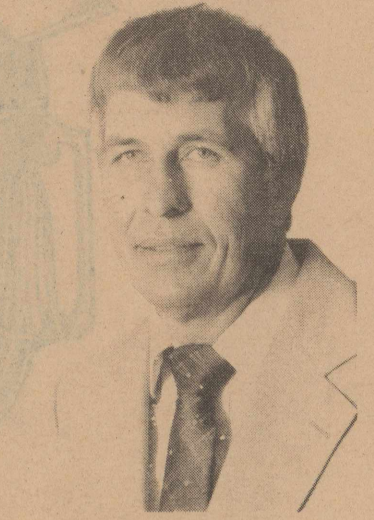

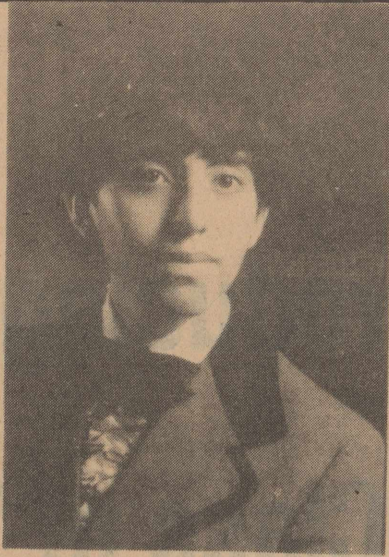
fication Officer at Sul Ross State University prior to assuming the assistant superintendent post in Monahans in 1984.

Canning safety

If you're counting on canning some of the extra produce from your garden this summer, plan now to do it the safe way.

Some canning methods, equipment and procedures are not safe and can result in food spoilage and even serious illness or death, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist, Marilyn Haggard.

She says that canning in a microwave oven, for example, is dangerous. Microwave ovens do not allow even heat penetration in the closed canning jar and the metal lids interfere with heat distribution. The use of metals in a microwave can also damage the oven's magnetron tube, requiring costly repairs.

Canning in a conventional oven is not advisable, because oven temperatures vary as the heat goes off and comes on again. The dry heat may not penetrate the food thoroughly either.

"Trying to can in a conventional oven is also a safety hazard," Haggard explains. "Pressure can build up in jars causing them to explode, or jars may break as drafts of cooler air hit them when the oven door is open."

Haggard, a specialist in food safety and preservation, says the "open kettle" canning method which was popular years ago, may not kill spoilage organisms.

In the open kettle method, foods are simply heated and put into sterile jars. Spoilage organisms can enter the jar when the food is transferred from kettle to jar. Also, the initial heat treatment may not be sufficient to destroy spoilage organisms and even if the jar seals, it may be only temporary.

Steam canners are also not foolproof for canning. Haggard says the U.S. Department of Agriculture does not recommend the use of steam canners when the process time is based on boiling water bath times.

Research shows that the ability to kill bacteria in a steam canner is considerably less than in a boiling water bath canner when using the same process times, says Haggard.

For that reason a steam canner should never be used

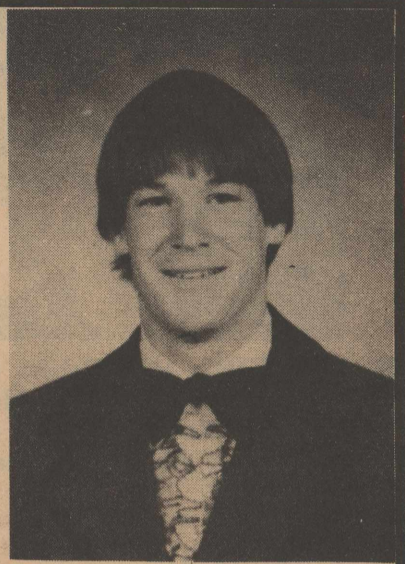
for low-acid vegetables and meats, warns the specialist.

If you are planning on doing some home canning, Haggard recommends setting aside old cookbooks, grandma's recipe or advice from friends so you won't be

taking chances with your family's health and your home-grown produce.

Safe and reliable home canning methods are outlined in Extension publications available at your county extension office.

Safety belt data collected

Safety belt usage in seven cities varying from a high of 77% in Corpus Christi to a low of 57% in Waco is cause for celebration during "Texas Buckle-Up Week," May 22-29, according to George R. Gustafson, spokesperson for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts.

The data was collected through observation studies still underway by the Texas Transportation Institute under contract with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (SDHPT) and released by SDHPT today, according to Gustafson.

"I understand that those preliminary data were collected in the period of December, 1985, to March. The seven cities were Austin (75%), Brownsville (63%), Bryan/College Station (70%), Corpus Christi (77%), Houston (69%), San Antonio (60%), and Waco, (57%)," he said.

"We know that vigorous enforcement by the Department of Public Safety and local police departments has played a key role in getting people into the buckle-up habit during this early period and that enforcement will continue to play a necessary part of helping citizens comply."

"Last fall the Texas Police Chief's Association passed a resolution in support of legislation requiring use of safety belts and support for strict enforcement. Again, the police chief's association has passed a resolution supporting 'Texas Buckle-Up Week,' May 22-29 and the continued public awareness campaign to encourage motorists to buckle up during the critical 101 summer-time driving days."

"As we kick off our summer-time buckle-up campaign, we want to remind citizens that it is important to buckle up on every trip—around the block or across the country," Gustafson said.

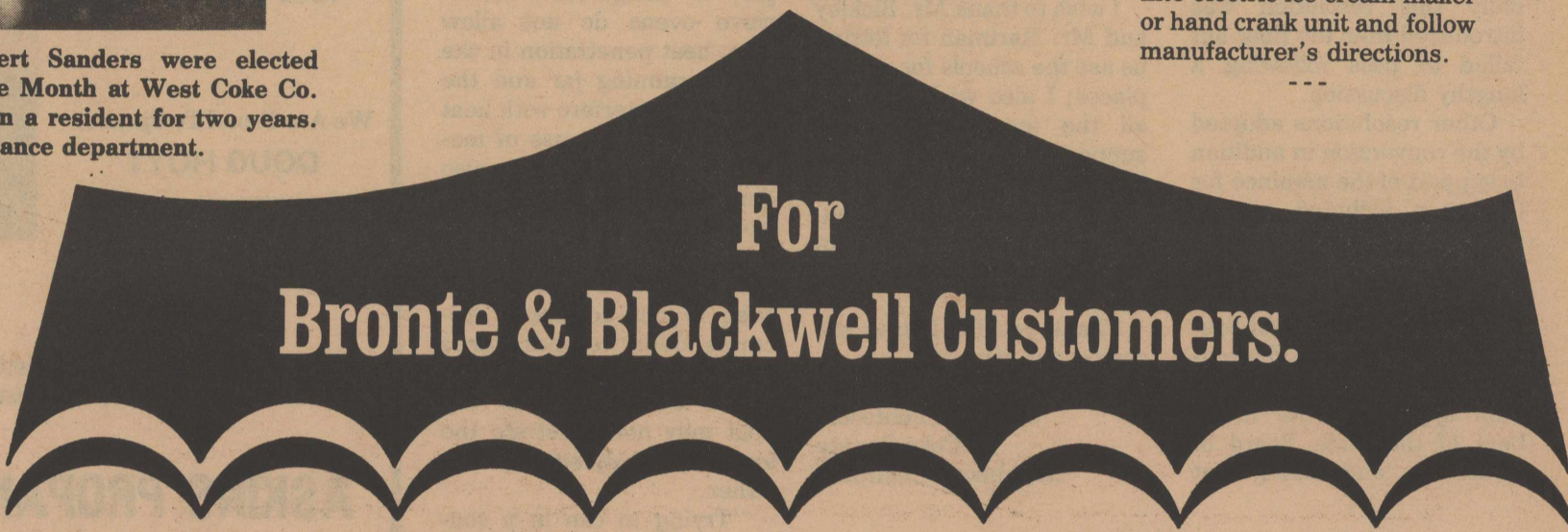

Subscriber charge increases

Single line business and all residential telephone customers across the nation, including those served by General Telephone, will begin paying June 1, 1986 a monthly \$2 subscriber line charge.

This \$2 charge represents a \$1 increase to the subscriber line charge and is the second phase of a federally mandated process that is intended to gradually eliminate the practice of charging customers more for long-distance service in order to keep residential rates artificially low. An initial \$1 subscriber line charge became effective June 1, 1986.

Business customers with more than one line have been paying a \$6 subscriber line charge since May 1984. This subscriber line charge will not change.

Under the Federal Communications Commission plan for implementation of subscriber line charges, the total revenues of the local telephone companies will not increase since the FCC in turn will reduce by an equivalent amount charges to long-distance carriers for use of local facilities and equipment. It is the intent of the FCC that this decrease in long-distance carriers' expense will be passed through to consumers in the form of reduced interstate long-distance rates. AT&T has already announced plans to reduce its interstate rates.

General Telephone officials said the subscriber line charges are designed to shift from long-distance users to local customers, a larger portion of the actual costs of providing the line from their residence or business to the

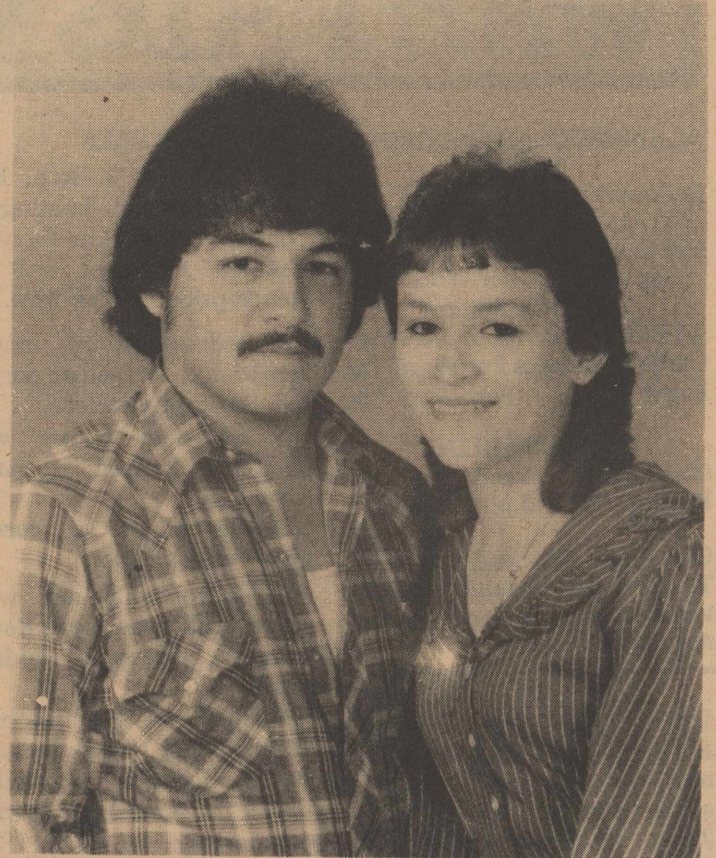

For a parent to obtain a Social Security number for a child, the parent needs evidence of the child's date of birth, citizenship, and identity. The parent will also need evidence of his or her own identity.

The direct mail advertisement also indicates that new legislation may require that children be listed by Social Security number on the parents' tax return. There is no legislation, Upp said. In addition, Social Security

does not provide counties with information about which children have Social Security numbers.

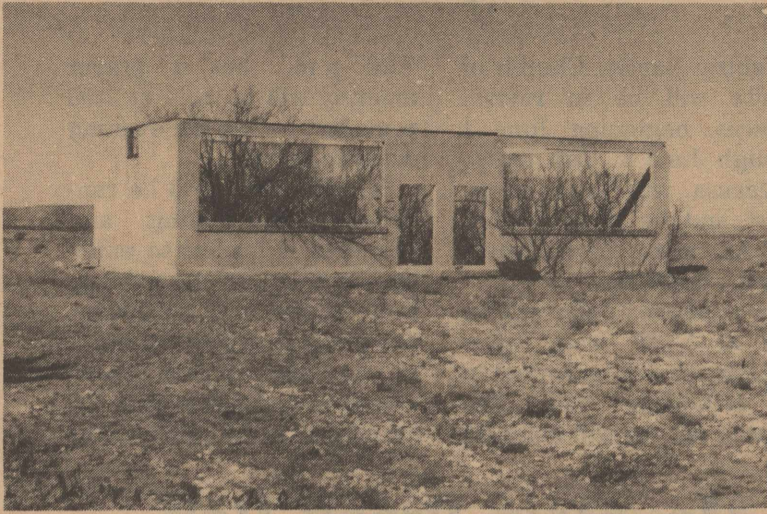

About an hour and a half later, he was observed in Robert Lee by Yvonne Devoll, a deputy in the sheriff's office. She followed the suspect onto Highway 158 Bronte while radioing for law officers, who intercepted him.

Millican related that the two suspects arrested for burglary of a building at Bronte's Hurley Pharmacy remain in Tom Green County jail on the related charges.

An undetermined amount of drugs were taken before dawn on May 7 from the pharmacy on State Street.
